CHELAN - Last week, Chelan Mayor Mike Cooney announced his intent to run for re-election later on this year as his term comes to an end.

"I ran determined I was only going to do it one term and now I am on my fourth year," Cooney told the Lake Chelan Mirror in a May 1 interview. Cooney mentioned that he had a couple of opportunities presented to him, however

After three and a half months of training, 21 volunteer recruits from Chelan. Entiat and Orondo received their badges and certificates as volunteer firefighters and are now ready to serve the three communities.

Serving Chelan will be: Tim Cote, Laura Cross, Michael Doyle, Marco Garcia, Kelcie Keys, Megan Kosel, Spencer Oberfelder, Billy Poppie, Jasmine Shattuck, Atticus Sheffield, Greg Simpson, Kammi Spence, Guillermo Venegas, Muel Vierra and Carlos Venegas. The recruits will be spending their time as volunteer firefighters at the Chelan airport, South Lakeshore and City of Chelan fire stations.

Nereida Cardenas, Misty Marcyes, Josh Peerson, Blake Pipkin and Mark Ward will be joining Chelan County Fire District 8 personnel in Entiat. Meanwhile, Wyatt Dietrict will be serving as volunteeer firefighter for the Douglas County Fire District 4 in Orondo.

Last year, the recruit program graduated 27 volunteers. "We are 13 months in and we have 48 new faces joining the volunteer fire service ... we are being very successful in that aspect," said Assistant Fire Chief Brandon Asher. He thanked the graduates for their commitment to the program and their hard work. "To have these 21 faces and 27 from the last class is huge



to see showing up to these wild land fires. It allows us to protect more houses at once and get all of our apparatus out the door in a timely fashion," Asher added during his speech.

During a short speech he said, "I am here to build bridges, not walls," as he emphasized the importance of the Latino community in Chelan.

more. On top of that the people he works with make the job more enjoyable. "They are responsive, they're customer oriented, they re team oriented and they help each other out tremendously," he added. In his term as Mayor, Cooney mentioned that "you never hear whispers of people working against each other" at City Hall.

"In a small town you can have projects, a vision of how things get done and what's important for the city and the best thing I like about my job as Mayor is seeing results," answered Cooney. Cooney emphasized that "no one person can get it done." The Mayor just sets the vision while working hand-on-hand with "a dedicated council and a dedicated staff." From his perspective, Cooney sees that council meetings run well and business get done.

If re-elected, Cooney mentioned that he will continue his work on the following:

• Build a network of bike passes and trails

• Acquire lower levels of the Chelan Butte

• Affordable homes in the valley

• Employee dedication to customer service

• Improve downtown area

Some of the items on the list are tangible and others intangible, however community members tend to receive those items well.

During the interview, Cooney told the Mirror that he will not purse a third term as Mayor if he were to be re-elected.







Jedwabny followed her parents in healthcare

CHELAN - With the idea of taking the best from both worlds, Jane Jedwabny followed her parents' footsteps in healthcare as she became a Psychiatrist and Chemical Dependency Nurse.

"My father was a psychiatrist and my mom was a nurse, it was sort of marrying those two together it made perfect sense," explained Jedwabny on her career in nursing school.

Before she began her journey in nursing, Jedwabny recived her B.A. in communications in Pennsylvania. She then went back and study nursing. After graduation in 1982, the Ohio native, moved to Philadelphia where she began her first nursing job in a 25 bed psychiatric hospital. Jedwabny worked there for 13 years before moving to North Central Washington.

gram Director of the Sanctuary Department of the Lake **Chelan Community Hospital** & Clinics. "A couple weeks later, they offered me the job ... we decided to relocate and moved officially in 1995," said Jedwabny.

It has been 22 years since she joined the team at LCCH, and she loves it. "I love the treatment team I work with. By far, this group surpasses any team I've worked with in terms of their compassion and willingness to put out 150 percent for the patients ... it's a close group," she

May 6 - 12 is National Nurses Week

National Nurses Week begins each year on May 6th and ends on May 12th, Florence Nightingale's birthday. These permanent dates enhance planning and position National Nurses Week as an established recognition event. As of 1998, May 8 was designated as National Student Nurses Day, to be celebrated annually. And as of 2003, National School Nurse Day is celebrated on the Wednesday within National Nurses Week (May 6-12) each year.

The nursing profession has been supported and promoted by the American Nurses Association (ANA) since 1896. Each of ANA's state and territorial nurses associations promotes the nursing profession at the state and regional levels. Each conducts celebrations on these dates to recognize the contributions that nurses and nursing make to the community.

The ANA supports and encourages National Nurses Week recognition programs through the state and district nurses associations, other specialty nursing organizations, educain the 1955 Congress, but no action was taken. Congress discontinued its practice of joint resolutions for national weeks of various kinds.

1972 Again a resolution was presented by the House of Representatives for the President to proclaim "National Registered Nurse Day." It did not occur. 1974 In January of that year, the International Council of Nurses (ICN) proclaimed that May 12 would be "International Nurse Day." (May 12 is the birthday of Florence Nightingale.) Since 1965, the ICN has celebrated "International Nurse Day."

1974 In February of that year,

a week was designated by the White House as National Nurse Week, and President Nixon issued a proclamation.

1978 New Jersey Governor Brendon Byrne declared May 6 as "Nurses Day." Edward Scanlan, of Red Bank, N.J., took up the cause to perpetuate the recognition of nurses in his state. Mr. Scanlan had this date listed in Chase's Calendar of Annual Events. He promoted the celebration on his own.

1981 ANA, along with various nursing organizations, rallied to support a resolution initiated by nurses in New Mexico, through their Congressman, Manuel Lujan, to have May 6, 1982, established as "National Recognition Day for Nurses." 1982 In February, the ANA Board of Directors formally acknowledged May 6, 1982 as "National Nurses Day." The action affirmed a joint resolution of the United States Congress designating May 6 as "National Recognition Day for Nurses." 1982 President Ronald Reagan signed a proclamation on March 25, proclaiming "National Recognition Day for Nurses" to be May 6, 1982. 1990 The ANA Board of Directors expanded the recognition of nurses to a week-long celebration, declaring May 6 - 12, 1991,

as National Nurses Week.

1993 The ANA Board of Directors designated May 6 - 12 as permanent dates to observe National Nurses Week in 1994 and in all subsequent years.

1996 The ANA initiated "National RN Recognition Day" on May 6, 1996, to honor the nation's indispensable registered nurses for their tireless commitment 365 days a year. The ANA encourages its state and territorial nurses associations and other organizations to acknowledge May 6, 1996 as "National RN Recognition Day."

1997 The ANA Board of Directors, at the request of the National Student Nurses Association, designated May 8 as National Student Nurses Day.

A Brief History of National Nurses Week

1953 Dorothy Sutherland of the U.S. Department of Health. Education, and Welfare sent a proposal to President Eisenhower to proclaim a "Nurse Day" in October of the following year. The proclamation was never made.

1954 National Nurse Week was observed from October 11 - 16. The year of the observance marked the 100th anniversary of Florence Nightingale's mission to Crimea. Representative Frances P. Bolton sponsored the bill for a nurse week. Apparently, a bill for a National Nurse Week was introduced

Free brush, yard waste disposal May 10-11

CHELAN - This Friday and Saturday will be the last of the free brush and yard waste disposal. It wil lbe on Friday and Saturday, May 10-11, 10 a.m.-5 p.m., at the Chelan County Transfer Station, 23235 Highway 97A (across from Wal-Mart). Dispose of vegetation to help reduce your risk to wildfire and decrease impacts to air quality from outdoor burning. Accepted: trees and limbs up to 12 inches in diameter and less than 8 feet long, leaves, pine needles and shrubs. Not accepted: rocks, plastic bags, grass clippings, sod, rood wads, and weeds.

Create a defensible space around your home by removing highly flammable vegetation, including Juniper and Arborviate from your landscape, rake leaves and pine needles from around your structures, clean gutters and roofs of flammable material and prune tree limbers 5-10 feet high around structures. for the past 21 years. This simply means that the Lake Chelan School District has had the same number of students in its schools and has been operating extremely well for decades. This \$59M expenditure is not justified.

2. It has been stated that we need new school buildings for the teaching of Century 21st skills. Yes, we do need the current technology of today for staff to use in their teaching and work with students. That technology does not require new buildings. These 21st Century skills are taught by the quality teaching and support staff. Therefore, quality instructional skills are what

was approved by the voters in 2016 for technological improvements.

3. Replace the HVAC units at the buildings when there is a need. Simply, if a unit needs repaired, fix it. If it needs replaced, replace it. Each of us do that in our personal and business lives. We do not install entire new systems when a simple repair would solve the problem.

4. In the "flattop" area buildings, I suggest making the improvements that have been identified. There are improvements and "fixes" that can be made without total remodels. Again, repair and fix as needed.

improvements in all buildings. The superintendent has stated that the DOT will provide (for free) additional flashing lights for the safety of our students. My recommendation is to ask them to install these lights in any area of need.

8. Crowded concerns; Our schools are like any other school in the surrounding areas. When you have class changes, and all students are released at the same time, the hallways are crowded. When it is lunch time and all students are released at the same time, the lunch area is crowded. When school dismisses at the same time, it is crowded in the parking and exit areas. When a well-attended activity ends, it is crowded when the event culminates. I suggest that the administration continue to review options to mitigate those "crowded" concerns.

9. There are some improvements, repairs, and "fixes" that can be made at the football field. A \$2.5M parking lot, and a \$2.25M synthetic turf are not the improvements that are necessary. I suggest that only small improvements and repairs should be made.

Overall, I would suggest the administration and school board review how to use limited local tax resources to make the necessary improvements; not the "wants" that some have. Millions of local tax dollars have been spent recently to upgrade and improve our facilities. Please continue that approach. Remain debt free, prioritize existing revenue for the areas in need, and solve any facility problem like you would do in your personal and business life. Spend the public resources wisely.

MANSON – It was 1948 when Edna Bennett started making crowns for the Manson Apple Blossom royalties – ever since the tradition was kept in the family.

That year Queen Marjorie Bennett wore the first crown ever made by Edna. Before then there was no crown given to the Queen nor Princesses. The handmade crowns are made from shells that are formed into apple blossoms, decorated with nail polish and unique rhinestones. For many years, he tabulated the Apple Blossom Royalty selection ballots.

Manson Apple Blossom Festival History

BY MANSON APPLE BLOSSOM COMMITTEE

The first Manson Apple Blossom Festival was held on Wednesday, May 11, 1921. The first royalty queen of the festival was Ruby Phelps Brown in 1928. 1947's Manson Apple Blossom Festival was special for two main reasons. The Festival was moved to Saturday and the first parade was held that year. The parade route was uphill, from west to east.

The first Manson Apple Blossom Festival button was added in 1949. Many buttons were ordered and the extra buttons were used the following year. The date 1950 was printed over the previous year's date with fingernail polish.

There were three Bennett women (Edna Bennett, Nita Bennett, Susi Bennett) who created the first crowns for the

royalties starting in 1948. The only outdoor coronation was held in 1949. The coronation robe was added in 1960 for Queen Jeanine Ferree.

Picnic and Basket lunches were served until 1938 when the chicken noodle dinner was added, yet in 1969 and 1970 fried chicken box lunches were served.

The Lake Chelan Fortnightly Club began honoring the Royalty in 1970. In 1973, Edna Bennett made a permanent crown and scepter, with personal tiaras for the Queen and Princesses which the Apple Blossom Committee kept.

The Edible Apple Contest began in 1980 in which Jama England was the first chairperson.

In 1985, the Royal Court had a Queen and seven Princesses.

Two queens were ill during

WENATCHEE NATIONAL FOREST

WENATCHEE - As snow melts off along lower elevations in the Entiat valley, Acting Entiat District Ranger Kari Grover Wier is ramping up for what could be a bumper mushroom season in areas burned by the Cougar Creek Fire last year. By the first weekend in May, her staff will have designated locations along Tyee Ridge, and five other locations on the Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest, selected as commercial harvester camps to help meet the demand for folks coming to collect this beloved fungi from public lands. It's all part of the commitment to excellent customer service.

"Mushrooms are just one of the many benefits public lands provide," said Grover Wier. "Depending upon how prolific the mushroom crop is, we could see a



large number of mushroom harvesters coming to pick in areas that burned in 2018. Which, in turn, can benefit local businesses and communities."

Commercial mushroom harvesting permits went go on sale April 29, at USDA Forest Service offices in Wenatchee, Entiat, and Chelan. Permits went on sale May 6 in the Methow Valley where snow still covers more of the wildfire areas. Permits and maps are available for harvest areas in the McLeod, Cougar Creek, and Crescent Mountain fire

People must have a commercial permit if they plan to collect or possess more than five gallons of mushrooms per day or if they intend to sell mushrooms. A two-day permit costs \$30, a 30-day permit is \$80 and a season permit is \$100; the season runs from April 29 through July 31. Permits must be in the harvester's possession when collecting mushrooms.

Commercial harvesters camping overnight are encouraged to utilize designated camps, where garbage dumpsters and toilets will be placed to minimize impacts. Camps will be up and running the first weekend in May in the Entiat area including Tyee Ridge, Potato, McKenzie Ridge, Mud Creek, and Mad View. In the Methow Valley, camps will be up and running the second weekend in May including Goat Creek Sno-Park, a

5130430, Twisp River Sno-Park, and the Gravel Pit. Commercial harvesters are prohibited from camping in developed campgrounds.

there "While are thousands of acres open to mushroom harvesting, folks need to be aware of prohibited areas too like Wilderness," Grover Wier added. "By respecting the rules and minimizing impacts, mushroom harvesting can continue to be a sustainable forest product."

Harvesting mushrooms for personal use, up to five gallons per person per day, is free but collectors must carry a copy of the Free Incidental Use Mushroom Information Sheet with them while harvesting. This information sheet can be printed off the forest website at https://go.usa.gov/xQ3YJ and is also available at local national forest offices.
