Hospital commissioners plan for communications event

CHELAN – On May 8, the Lake Chelan Community Hospital Board of Commissioners will hold a communications event at the Chelan Senior Center starting at 5:30 p.m. Refreshments will be provided.

The event will serve as a way to generate open discussion between the Hospital Board and the Chelan community in a town hall style forum.

Mary Signorelli, member of the communications committee, mentioned that "communication" is a major goal of the event. "We want to be able to give them an update on decisions that we

have made ... and bring the public up to speed on where we are with our facility, with our committees, with our strategic plan," Signorelli explained.

The last time the hospital brought the community together was two years ago and so much has happened since. Signorelli states that the event will fill in gaps to the questions the community has. "It's time," she said.

Agenda topics are but not limited to: committee reports, facilities, strategic plan and pillars, updates on EMS program and a Question & Answer session. The idea is to present to the public where the hospital was, where they are now and

where they want to go. "We are making changes, we have made progress but we are still not there," said Phyllis

Gleasman, Board Chair.

Leading the workshop was Mary Murphy. She stated that she would like at least 50 percent of the time to be for interaction with the public. "We represent them and I know people may want to raise their particular questions, concerns, ideas and requests. That would be a time to do that," Murphy added.

The board also discussed the idea of having a facilitator to help with the flow of the event. Some of the names that were brought up as possible facilitators include Concie Luna and Mike Steele.

The two-hour public forum will also include an educational part for the public regarding the Board functions. "In addition to what our board is, we should include what our board is not," added Murphy.

Chelan Fire Commissioners schedule May 30 for public forum

Ladder 71 to arrive later this week

CHELAN – Ladder 71 is ready to be picked up in Alabama, informed Chelan Fire Chief Tim Lemon during the April 17 commissioner meeting.

Chief Lemon, along with volunteer Lieutenant Johnny

Snyder from Station 73 in Union Valley, flew down to Alabama on Sunday, April 21. Both will drive the ladder truck back to Chelan in a four to five day trip across the country. Lemon mentioned that they are expecting to be back in town by Friday, April 26.

The commissioners unanimously approved their out-ofstate travel for picking the ladder truck. They also approved travel for Chief Mark Donnell in August for the National Fire Academy, which is a six-day conference.

Commissioner Russ Jones had updates regarding the rescue boat. "After some discussion we decided to replace some of the steering cabling," said Jones. The commissioner will conduct a research to figure out the different technologies that could be used in the boat to help locate people in the water. This



30th Annual Earth Day Fair celebrated in Chelan

CHELAN - The festivities honoring Mother Earth began early Saturday, April 20 when the 30th Annual Lake Chelan Earth Day Fair kicked off in Chelan's Riverwalk Park. More than 95 booths were spread out throughout the whole park to help educate people on ways to take care of Earth.

Using the Global Sun Oven, Chelan High School students Naomi and Daniela demonstrated how to bake solar oven cookies. The solar oven bakes, boils and steams food naturally with sunshine, heating up to 360-400 degrees. "It takes about 20 to 25 minutes for the cookies to bake," said Naomi. The Global Sun Oven can cook breads, cakes, muffins, pizza,

meats, poultry. fish, vegetables, pizza and other foods. After the cookies were cooled down, attendees were able to give the solar baked cookie a try.

For the first time, Glass to Sand at Lake Chelan participated in the Earth Day Fair. During their time there, Megan Clausen was able to crush some bottles and show all how the GLSand works. For \$2 kids were

able to create a recycle sand craft. Clausen announced that on June 23, from 1-3 p.m. Glass to Sand will hold a Community Bottle Drop Off at Manson Elementary School. The event will take place at the bottom parking lot and no broken glass will be accepted. There will be a \$3 recycling fee said Clausen.

The Chelan High School Interact Club sponsored by the Lake Chelan Rotary was also in attendance. The high school students explained the purpose of the ShelterBox and promoted their Walk for Water event. On Sunday, May 19, Interact Club will host the event in order to raise awareness and funds to help people have access to clean water. The Walk for Water will start at noon in Riverwalk Park.

Chelan Public Library hosting 'Gallery of Legacies'

Local artists Carol Jenkins, Dan Crandall, Shiamoom Nevaz, Anne Claussen, Concie Luna, and Valeria Martinez, joined Cam Elder in initiating the project. Their original artwork took many forms—some realistic and some very abstract—in a variety of media. The diversity of styles delighted the residents of Heritage and their

Dan Crandall, president of the Lake Chelan Arts Council described his experience painting Larry Eldred's portrait, "It's important for people to realize that when they meet an older person such as Larry, or any other resident of this treasured institution we know as Heritage Heights, that each person represents a rich history replete with many astounding experiences."

The library viewing is open to the public. After the exhibition, the "Gallery of Legacies" will be on display in the hallways of Heritage Heights. Each hallway is a "neighborhood," and the project will proceed in phases by hallway. The seven pieces in the library exhibition are just the beginning. Already a new group of artists have started getting to know the residents of another "neighborhood" and adding another hallway to the Gallery.



Free brush, yard waste disposal in Chelan May 3-4, 10-11

CHELAN - There will be a free brush and yard waste disposal on Friday and Saturday, May 3-4 and 10-11, 10 a.m.-5 p.m., at the Chelan County Transfer Station, 23235 Highway 97A (across from Wal-Mart). Dispose of vegetation to help reduce your risk to wildfire and decrease impacts to air quality from outdoor burning. Accepted: trees and limbs up to 12 inches in diameter and less than 8 feet long, leaves, pine needles and shrubs. Not accepted: rocks, plastic bags, grass clippings, sod, rood wads, and weeds.

Create a defensible space

around your home by removing highly flammable vegetation, including Juniper and Arborviate from your landscape, rake leaves and pine needles from around your structures, clean gutters and roofs of flammable material and prune tree limbers 5-10 feet high around structures.





Flax is an oily grain grown for its fiber, seeds

Q: My sister takes flaxseed oil because she can't stand getting "fishy burns" from the fish oil and insists that flaxseed is just as good for you as fish oil. Is this true?

Flax is an oily grain grown for its fiber and seeds. While the fiber is used for clothing, the seeds are sold as whole seeds, partially defatted seeds, ground seeds, flaxseed meal and flaxseed oil. Flaxseed is used as a natural way to decrease your total cholesterol and "bad" LDL cholesterol levels and can relieve menopausal symptoms like night sweats and hot flashes.

Both flaxseed and fish oil have high concentrations of a type of fatty acid called Omega-3. Eating foods rich in Omega-3 fatty acids helps counteract the effect of "bad" fatty acids called Omega-6, which create inflammation in your body.

Omega-6 fatty acids contribute to arthritis and heart disease, and there are lots of them in a typical American diet. Omega-6 fatty acids are found in popular foods like popcorn, pasta, potato chips, corn chips, bread, French fries and hot dogs as well as many salad dressings, canola oil and soybean oil.

The "good" Omega-3 fatty acids EPA and DHA help counteract the inflammatory effects of a diet high in Omega-6 fatty acids. Flaxseed also contains large amount of an Omega-3 fatty acid called ALA, but ALA is inactive until it is changed into EPA or DHA, and most people can't convert it into an active form.

Although flaxseed oil CAN decrease menopausal symptoms in SOME women, this supports the fact that most people can't convert enough of the inactive Omega-3 fatty acid ALA in flaxseed into biologically active EPA or DHA to get much benefit.

Flaxseed is a very good source of fiber, especially



soluble fiber. Adding fiber to your diet with flaxseed has been shown to decrease LDL and total cholesterol. Flaxseed's fiber helps you stay regular because it works as a bulk laxative, similar to psyllium or Metamucil®. In fact, most of the documented benefits of eating flaxseed can be explained by the effect of more fiber in your diet. Flaxseed oil has not been shown to lower either LDL or total cholesterol.

The outer coating of flaxseed is a gummy layer that's very high in fiber, especially soluble fiber. Getting adequate fiber in your diet helps decrease your "bad" cholesterol (LDL) level and your total cholesterol level

The beneficial effects of flaxseed over flaxseed oil or lignin extract on your LDL and total cholesterol can be explained by the increased fiber from its seed coat, whether from eating the whole seeds or grinding them up like flaxseed meal.

You can add whole flaxseed to your diet by adding it to cereal, granola, or smoothies. Ground flaxseed or flaxseed meal is less gritty and can be blended into smoothies or baked into breads, muffins or cookies. Whole and ground flaxseed each contain lots of fiber and act as a bulk laxative very similar to psyllium or Metamucil®. When starting them, add flaxseed to your slowly to avoid suffering intestinal distress such as gas, bloating, cramps or diarrhea and get plenty of fluids to avoid intestinal blockage. Most sources suggest up

to 40 grams flaxseed daily (4 tablespoons of whole flaxseed or 7 tablespoons of flaxseed meal) to lower LDL and total

cholesterol. Avoid taking more than 45 grams per day (4.5mg tablespoons of whole flaxseed or 8 tablespoons of flaxseed meal) to decrease your risk of intestinal problems.

Here are 5 Key Facts About Flaxseed and Omega-3 Fatty

1.The Omega-3 fatty acid ALA found in flaxseed is not active in

ALA from flaxseed needs to be converted into active Omega-3 fatty acids like EPA and DHA by your body before it can benefit you. Some people can make this happen, but most cannot.

2. Fatty fish, fish oil and krill oil have high concentrations of the active Omega-3 fatty acids EPA and DHA.

The foods containing the most Omega-3 fatty acids EPA and DHA are fatty fish like salmon, herring, mackerel and sardines.

3. The soluble fiber in flaxseed lowers total cholesterol and LDL (bad) cholesterol. Flaxseed's soluble fiber is

concentrated in its seed coat. Flaxseed oil and lignin extracts do not significantly affect cholesterol levels.

4.Start slowly and limit whole or ground flaxseed to 45gm daily to avoid intestinal distress.

Add fiber to your diet gradually to minimize painful gas, bloating or cramps.

5.Avoid flaxseed while pregnant or breastfeeding.

Flaxseed contains phytoestrogens and should be avoided if possible during pregnancy and while breastfeeding.
