Tacoma man drowns after inflatable kayak flips

Friend rescued by nearby boat

CHELAN - Sheriff Brian Burnett reports a 36 year old male drowned in Lake Chelan on Saturday afternoon April 13 when an inflatable kayak he and another subject were in flipped over. Both subjects were ejected into the cold water. The incident occurred north of the dock area at Lake Chelan State Park.

At 2:49 p.m., RIVERCOM 911 dispatch began receiving calls reference the two subjects in the water. One of the males had not surfaced. Several boaters who were participating in a fishing derby in the area began actively looking for the missing subject. State Park Rangers, Sheriff's Deputies (with a marine vessel), Chelan County Fire District #7 (with rescue swimmers) and Lake Chelan EMS responded to assist in the search.

It was determined that Bonventure Gitau 36 years of age of Tacoma, Wash. had not been wearing a personal floatation device when the two-person inflatable kayak he was in with his friend capsized. Gitau was seen momentarily in the water by witnesses but then disappeared under the surface. His friend, Jackson Njaru 31 years of age of Puyallup, Wash, made it to a nearby boat and was pulled from the water in fair condition.

Just prior to 4 p.m., Gitau's body was spotted on the bottom of the lake at a depth of about 30 feet. A diver from Fire District #7 made the recovery. The body was released to the Chelan County Coroner's Office.

The Sheriff's office would like to remind everyone planning to recreate in lakes and rivers this season, to please utilize personal floatation devices when in any type of vessel.

Chelan Council hears updates on WSDOT 2020 paving project

CHELAN - An agenda item to approve food trucks at Lakeshore Marina was included in the April 9, City of Chelan Council meeting which was pulled out of the agenda by Chelan Mayor Mike Cooney.

"Since I brought it up, I am going to take it off of the agenda tonight ... there's a number of reasons for doing that. I know that businesses have had a tough winter to be brutally honest," said Mayor Cooney.

Looking out for the well being of the town and the business owners, Cooney decided to talk about the food trucks at a later date.

Citizen comments followed Cooney's decision, John Olson commented on the same topic. "I am pleased to see you are taking it off the table and I encourage you to really involve all the local business owners," said Olson.

Russ Jones had a similar view. "I am glad you're pulling it off the agenda; I am going to encourage

permanently," he said. Jones explained that as a banker he helps out restaurants in town and he knows that many of them "are getting by and that's about it." Jones also mentioned that parking is a big issue at the marina and food trucks would only make it worse. With Jones' comments, Cooney restated that the agenda item was taken off.

The WSDOT 2020 paving

updates, informed Jeff Deal and Christopher Shell, representatives of the Wenatchee office of WSDOT during the meeting.

At the beginning of the year, Deal and Shell presented the paving project to the Chelan Council which involves: paving from Lakeside up to Apple Blossom Drive, redoing the ADA ramps through town, replacing the slab from both sides of

keeping it off the agenda project in Chelan has a few Dan Gordon Bridge, as well use path to a cycle track on as a shared use path from Lakeside all the way up to the Woodin Ave./ Webster Ave. intersection and bike lanes along the continuation of Hwy 97A up to the SR 150 highway intersection.

The first update to the project includes an additional crosswalk at Millard St. Deal also brought up the bike transition on Woodin Ave which will help bicyclists transition from the shared

the northern side of Webster Ave. past the Dan Gordon Bridge.

During the initial project presentation in January, council members noted their concern with the intersection on Farnham St. and Webster Ave. The concerns involved sight distance and it was a "hot topic for crossings," said Deal.

Leffler Field purchase, summer school discussed at Manson Parks board meeting

MANSON - Manson Park's Board of Commissioners met last Thursday, April 11 on what it seemed to be the shortest meeting of the vear.

Negotiations for Leffler Field are still ongoing. Rob Campbell mentioned to the board that a letter of intent to purchase the property is ready to be signed by Park's Director Robin Pittman. "The first thing we are going to need to do is to get an appraisal of the property," said Campbell. Then he went ahead an made a motion to authorize Pittman to spend up to \$7,500 for the appraisal. With everyone in favor of the authorization, Pittman will move forward with the appraisal and get it done as soon as possible. Other than that, Campbell clarified that

the Leffler committee is still waiting to hear back from the state on funds for the

Commissioners heard Viki Downey's, Manson Parks's lifeguard, comment on the handrail recently installed at Manson Bay Park swim area. "I would like to see it be kept a light color because those get so hot ... people can't hang on to them during the late afternoon," she said.

Downey suggested a light gray color opposed to a dark color. Commissioner Taylor Quigley doesn't have a preference to color as long as the handrail is visible. Downey will get a hold of Pittman and come up with a favorable color for the railing.

Manson Parks and the Manson Library will be partners to the Manson School District as it is in process of obtaining a grant to hold summer school for kids in second and third grade. "If they are awarded the grant, we will be required to organize some sort of program during the six-week school session," said Campbell. He informed that Pittman is thinking of holding fishing lessons and possibly another ice staking/ roller skating trip.

On March 23, Parks held an ice skating event at Town Toyota Center which was a

huge hit. "Everybody there had a really good time," said Campbell. Thirty-five first through fifth-grade kids enjoyed ice skating and snack sack that contained apple slices, apple juice, and other items. "It was probably one of the best little programs we have done in a long time," stated Campbell.

The next regular meeting for Manson Park will be held on May 9, at 4:10 p.m.

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
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Cinco de Mayo royal court to be selected

Natural Resources Conservation Service local work group meeting in Chelan April 22, Chelan Fire Hall

CHELAN - Local working groups provide recommendations for consideration on local natural resource priorities and criteria for USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) conservation activities and programs. At least once per year, the local working group hosts a gathering to discuss natural resource issues, opportunities, and priorities in geographical areas across the state. NRCS considers these recommendations from the local working group discussions, along with technical expertise and national and State program policies, to develop the local NRCS conservation program(s) available both statewide and through local funding allocations. The results of these meetings have potential implications on not only how NRCS spends its dollars as an agency locally, but also on recommended treatments to improve the natural resource conditions of private agricultural lands, forests, and other associated agricultural lands.

The local working group has many responsibilities which

1. Assisting NRCS and the conservation districts with public outreach and information efforts and identifying education and producers' training needs.

2. Identifying priority resource concerns and, as appropriate, high-priority areas needing assistance.

3.Recommending USDA conservation program application and funding criteria and eligible practices.

4. Utilizing the conservation needs assessment to identify priority resource concerns that can be addressed by USDA programs.

Please come ready to discuss and share your input on the resource conditions of the areas below and activities that would make the biggest positive impact on agricultural and non-industrial private forestlands. The data collected at these meetings plays a major role in the agency's direction at the local level and of the funding received for "Locally Led Conservation."

After a closer look at the intersection, Deal mentioned that WSDOT would want the City of Chelan to partner up with them in order to install

a rapid flashing beacon. The estimated cost for the beacon would be of \$40,000. Deal presented other options which included tree trimming. However he made it clear that beyond the edge of the curb

it is the City's responsibility

to trim.

'One thing you will benefit from on here with the cycle track is that both lanes of traffic will be shifted to the right side of the bridge ... you will actually see oncoming vehicles a lot sooner," explained Deal.

WSDOT will hold an Open House in May to present the public with the project. The Chelan City Council will meet next Tuesday, April 23 at 6 p.m. for a regular meeting. The full agenda could be found at cityofchelan.civicweb.net.



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

Overall, the game was a much closer match up than the score suggests- with a lot of great things coming from the Lady Trojans.


