Chelan Fire commissioners plan town hall meeting by month's end

Karla Mendoza hired to replace Faye Barker

CHELAN - On Thursday, March 28, Chelan Fire and Rescue (CFR) Board of Commissioners had a meeting regarding the district's Long Range Plan.

"The Long Range Plan's main focus is looking at the next five years, but also keeping an outreach for the next 20 years on large projects," said CFR Chief Tim Lemon. Commissioners covered different agenda items including staffing, apparatus and funding the

morning of the meeting.

In terms of staffing, Commissioners would like to hire two more firefighters to bring total staff numbers up to nine. This would allow CFR to have three firefighters per shift, Chief Lemon explained. This would ensure at least two people would be on duty "if someone is on vacation or sick leave." However, the district's ultimate goal is to have four people on duty at the fire station and one on-call. At the moment, CFR is relying on "qualified volunteers to supplement career staff," and are only guaranteed to have one career staff on duty. Fire Commissioners recognized that building the career staff is

going to take time, yet within the next five years they want to hire two more individuals.

There was also discussion on the apparatus replacement fund. "With the failure of last

year's levy, we really don't have much surplus money to be able to move over," said Chief Lemon. Commissioners were presented with a program that is being developed

that evaluates apparatus use, repair and maintenance cost, among other things and helps deliberate when it needs to be replaced. "That will help us align what rigs need to be replaced sooner and plan for that," says Lemon.

Another huge item that was addressed at the meeting was funding. Lemon mentioned that CFR has not received any authorization funding from the public since the last levy lid lift was approved in 2006. He says that CFR continues to operate from the 2006 fire levy lid lift and one percent of new construction money.

"We discussed fire levies and going back to the

public to ask for funding, an increase in our budget up to \$500,000," Lemon stated. The rate amount would increase to .21 cents per thousand dollars, yet nothing has been decided. Commissioners are planning on holding a town hall meeting sometime this month, to inform the public on their plans.

Chelan Fire and Rescue welcomes a new member to the staff, Karla Mendoza. Mendoza will take the place of Administrative Assistant Faye Barker who retired after 30 years of fire service. Baker's last work day with CFR was on Friday, March 29, 2019. Mendoza will start full-time on April 8.

Manson Bay Park gets safety improvements

MANSON - A two part project at the Manson Bay Park swim beach to help with safety improvements was conducted by Chelan County PUD starting on April 1.

The first part of the project included adding handrails to the existing stairs by the swimming area to increase accessibility. From there contractor Jason Sanderson of Chelan worked on extending the current swim beach stairs as the second part of the project.

"We noticed that the sand has a tendency to migrate further out into the lake so there's quite a bit of a drop off on that last stair down to the beach and by adding two more stairs there won't be that drop off," said Project Manager Court Hill.

The project was expected to last 12 days, yet on April 3 concrete was added to the new steps, putting the project ahead of schedule. Hill stated that the contractor

Chelan Fire and Rescue responds to brush fire near Purtteman Gulch Rd.

CHELAN - On April 4 at 2:55 p.m. Chelan Fire & Rescue crews were dispatched to a reported brush fire in the area of Chelan Ranch Road and Purtteman Gulch Road. Arriving crews found a fully engulfed chicken coop threatening adjacent structures with fire that had spread into approximately 2 acres of grass and brush behind the residence on Whitetail Lane. Chelan Fire & Rescue called for a second alarm with notification to CWICC due to the rapid fire spread that was driven by 10 mph winds. A third alarm was called when the fire threatened nearby structures and the eastern fire spread had moved towards Union Valley.

This early season fire was eventually brought under control by Chelan Fire & Rescue with mutual aid assistance from Chelan County Fire District 5 (Manson), Chelan County Fire District 8 (Entiat), Douglas County Fire District 4 (Orondo), US Forestry Service, Department of Natural Resources, and Chelan County Sheriff. Total size for this fire was estimated at 7.5 acres with the only structure loss being the chicken coop. Cause of the fire is undetermined at this time.

Chelan Fire & Rescue would like to remind all Fire District residents that the 2019 fire season has started early and we expect a busier than normal fire season due to the low moisture and snow pack and the drier than normal grass and shrubs.

Manson Community Council recommendations on Searles project includes soil testing

MANSON – On April 2, the Manson Community Council held a Special Meeting to discuss and make recommendations regarding the proposed Searles project in Swartout Road.

The project entails on building a two story, five bedrooms, single family residence of 6,000 to 7,000 square foot located on a 1.23 acre lot. With a pool, a utility building, a hot tub, fire pit and a landscape yard as amenities to the home.

Property owners requested the County for the residence to be used as a "Guest Inn" in Commercial Agriculture (AC) designation. The application also requested variance setbacks for the residence and the pool. "I love the idea, I think it is a nice set up but I do not like where they are located," said council woman Kari Sorensen. Summer Breeze neighbors who drive by the property on a regular basis mentioned the fact new grapes have been planted near the proposed property.

Location is the biggest problem for Sorensen since the proposed project would be surrounded by orchards and exposing renters to possible chemical sprays.

For council woman Kathy Blum, this property is a "better opportunity for vacation rentals because the owners are onsite." Chris Willoughby also addressed his "mixed feelings with the Guest Inn." He mentioned that upon

check-in guests should be notified of the activity within the area as one of the requirements. Sorensen made a motion for the "Guest Inn" to not be permitted unless all agricultural setbacks are in place. The motion moved forward as council members voted 3-1.

In regards to the pool variance council members unanimously voted to decline the request due to the ability of relocating the pool within the property lines.

Concerns with the property being on old orchard land were also addressed by Willoughby and Sorensen. "You are using it for commercial purposes and many people are unaware of the contamination and potential harm," said Willoughby. The council made the recommendation for the property owners to conduct some soil testing prior to building the home which will be used for commercial purposes. As well as, disclosing the results with all the people who are guests.

Council recommendations and suggestions were sent to the County on Friday, April 5 by Willoughby.

The council will be looking into appointing a new council member during their next regular meeting on April 16, to fill in the spot Willoughby is leaving behind after resigning. Anyone who is interested in the position contact anyone from the council at www.mansoncommunitycouncil.com/contact/.

"It's actually not bad to have a little moisture to help cure the concrete," said Hill.

The total cost of the project was estimated to be under \$25,000, with \$15,000 going towards the additional steps. Handrails added an extra thousands dollars.

Hill mentioned that Manson Bay Park swim area will now accommodate all the people who use it.

Rebutting Dr. Busey

Small Bonds and Small Projects Won't Solve our Educational Challenges

Our former Superintendent of Public Schools, Dr. Jim Busey, has been a vocal critic of the upcoming LCSD Bond. But based on his critiques, I respectfully submit he has inaccurately analyzed the needs of our kids and their education. If you are still an undecided voter, I invite you to consider this rebuttal to his recent letter to the editor.

First, Dr. Busey suggests that the recent addition of four classrooms at the high school should solve our overcrowding issues. But the overcrowding issues are rooted at MOE, our elementary school, and extend up the grades. If anything, the four new high school classrooms are a good example of why small bonds and small projects won't solve our issues. The classrooms offered an improvement at the high school but didn't touch the systemic issues spanning both campuses. A microproblem was solved but the macro issues remain.

Second, Dr. Busey questions the recent decision to remodel the District's administration offices versus upgrading the HVAC units at the high school.

His quote, "Why has new administration space been prioritized over the needs of our kids and buildings?", illustrates a lack of knowledge of the issue. The District had an opportunity to increase the rent and the rentable space of a stable long term tenant (ChelanFresh) and consolidate its administrative team. The HVAC units didn't have the same degree of urgency as the rental expansion. Thus, the remodel is precisely the type of wise fiscal decision we should expect from our board.

Finally, Dr. Busey suggests that by denying access to Choice Transfer kids (kids who live outside the district but chose to attend our schools), we can solve our overcrowding issues. But only 40% of the Choice kids attend MOE where the overcrowding issues are most pronounced. And of this percentage, 20% are kids belonging to our teachers or other District employees. So, not only would a ban on Choice kids not solve the overcrowding issues, it would also be disruptive to teachers and staff with kids in our system. Keeping our Choice kids out won't address the systemic issues requiring a new high school.

The bottom line is our kids need more space to achieve

the level of education required for future success. At the core, our ability to educate our kids is constrained by our facilities. Dr. Busey fails to recognize this as the salient issue driving this bond. His recommendations to think small and stay debt free are appropriate when a system has extra capacity. But our schools have long since reached their capacity. A new high school is the wise and logical solution.

If you are an undecided voter, a tour of our facilities is the best way to understand these overcrowding issues. I invite you to call the District office at 682-3515 to schedule a tour. Then I encourage you to vote yes on April 23.

Our schools are overcrowded, this issue is not going away

On April 23, 2019, voters in the Lake Chelan School District (LCSD) will have the opportunity to approve a bond measure that will make important capital

improvements in our schools. Our schools are overcrowded, and this issue is not going away. The District is currently debt free, and now is the time to invest in our future.

The District has proposed a \$75 million bond, which will build a new high school by Mountain Goat Field, convert the existing Middle/High School to an Intermediate School for grades 4 - 8, and move Pre-K to Morgen Owings Elementary. It will also renovate iconic Sargent Field. Building a new high school and reconfiguring and modernizing our existing facilities is the right solution to the issue of overcrowding, and offers us an opportunity to create state-of-the-art learning facilities and consolidated athletic facilities.

In the last 25 years, enrollment at Chelan schools has dipped and spiked, but has generally trended upward. Since 1993 (the earliest OSPI archive data available and around the time the new high school was occupied) enrollment district-wide has increased by 193 students, with the population in the Middle/High School building increasing by 170 in that same timeframe.

This enrollment combined with a reduction in class

sizes has caused our schools to become crowded. Space has been created for necessary classes to house more students by dividing classrooms or converting non-classroom spaces. Some grade levels are taught in outdated or temporary facilities. Our littlest learners, the Pre-K program, are housed in a basement. Programming offerings, particularly at the middle school, have been reduced to accommodate high school student access to the classrooms for those programs. Our athletic facilities are geographically spread out, outdated, and in some cases, not regulation size.

While these capital projects require community investment, when Chelan's estimated tax rate is compared with that of regional school districts, and with districts state-wide with similar taxable property values, the LCSD is significantly lower. If the bond passes, the Cascade School District - which is similar in size, demographic makeup, and property value - will still have a higher estimated tax rate than the LCSD.

The best solution to the overcrowding in our schools is to build a new high school and modernize all of our existing facilities. Our District is debt

free, and now is the time to invest in our kids! On April 23, Vote YES for bond 201901, and Vote YES for our future!

Prescribed burn planned on more than 10,000+ acres

NCW- This spring, firefighters across Central Washington will once again be using fire to help restore watersheds and better protect nearby communities. Excluded from the ecosystem for nearly 100 years, frequent, low-intensity fire is essential for restoring public lands and the communities who depend on them.

"As wildfires were advancing towards the communities of Ardenvoir and Winthrop last fall, decades of proactive thinning and prescribed fire robbed these fires of fuel and allowed firefighters a safer place to make a stand" said Forest Fire Management Officer, Rob Allen. "This spring we're continuing to share stewardship, working side by side with local, state, tribal, and other partners to bring more good fire back to the lands that so desperately need it."

While more than 10,000 acres are planned this spring, fewer acres may be completed if conditions are not favorable. Conditions include correct temperature, wind, fuel moisture and ventilation for smoke. When these criteria are met, firefighters implement, monitor, and patrol each burn to ensure it meets forest health and public safety goals including air quality.

"Together with our partners, we're burning on days that maximize safety, minimize smoke impacts, and do right on the land" added Allen. "We're taking the long-view that breathing some smoke in the fall and spring is a time-tested way to stop living in this era of megafires."



CHELAN - The Chelan Lady Goats win in the bottom of the 7th inning against Granite Falls on Tuesday, April 2.



PUD commissioners hear what customers have to say about service center proposal

Nearly 800 people responded by survey and at public meetings

WENATCHEE - Chelan County PUD commissioners on Monday were briefed by staff on the results of a month-long public outreach effort to hear from customer-owners about a proposed consolidation of Wenatchee-area operations

into one location in Olds Station. Commissioners reviewed survey responses and comments from nearly 800 customer-owners and community stakeholders.

More than half said the proposal would not affect them. Of those responding to the survey, more than 62 percent said they "almost never" visit the PUD office in downtown Wenatchee. About 20 percent said they visit frequently or monthly. (At 00:40 on the board meeting audio recording)

Customer feedback also included many comments and

ideas:

- At the Wenatchee Open House
- Consider impacts to Riverside Playhouse and downtown businesses
- At the Cashmere & Leavenworth open houses
- Will be easier for me to access PUD services
- More centrally located for the entire county
- At the Chelan and Entiat open houses
- Keep great customer service
- Consolidation just makes sense

Dan Frazier, Shared Services director, said planned traffic studies will help answer questions about the impact of a possible move on North Wenatchee Avenue and Olds Station roads. The PUD also will work with LINK Transit to secure bus service closer to the new location if the proposal moves ahead, said David Lodge, project manager.

Customers asked if the proposal might cause future rate increases. Frazier said consolidation would provide rate stability and has less rate pressure than other facility options studied including the baseline of staying at the present location.

If the proposal is approved, Chelan PUD would work with the city of Wenatchee, Port of Chelan County and a range of downtown stakeholders, including Music Theatre of Wenatchee, to start planning for the future of the PUD's Fifth Street campus, Frazier said.

Several Music Theatre advocates spoke Monday to emphasize their concern about preserving parking for Riverside Playhouse. Citizen Advisory Board member Tom Green sent his support for the proposal by email, writing in part, "...it is an excellent plan in my view."

Frazier said staff will be back at the April 15 commission meeting with any additional community feedback and a resolution asking for board approval of the recommended consolidation plan and the project budget.
