Woodin Avenue Bridge, Landing Park project starts back up



This past week, work kicked-off for the final phases of the Woodin Avenue Bridge Project in Chelan. Nearly all aspects of the project are expected to be completed before Memorial Day Weekend at the end of May. Above: Contractors work on adding concrete in front of Coldwell Banker on the Woodin Ave. side. In the next couple weeks, contractors plan to: remove existing curbs and sidewalks from the bridge towards downtown, work on stormwater improvements, start construction on the Landing Park, which will include: excavation, construction of the retaining walls, relocation of existing light poles and manufacturing of handrails. There are no bridge closures anticipated, only short stops in traffic to allow equipment and trucks in and out of the work areas. Pedestrian access continues to remain open at all times with bicyclists using the same area to cross. For safety, bicyclists are asked to walk their bikes due to the limited space and compromised condition of the roadway. Manson Community Council gives recommendations on Comp Plan

Willoughby resigns, council seeking replacement

MANSON - The Manson Community Council will submit their comments and recommendations to the county regarding the Manson/Chelan County Comprehensive Plan. Two major comp plan sections the council reviewed were the Plan Development and Master Planned Resort.

"What we've been asked to do is to put our changes in writing of what we want and a reason for wanting those changes and then submit that to the county. Then they will look them over and review them ... then it gets down and voted on," said council member Kathy Blum.

Council chairman Chris Willoughby explained the current Plan Development

has a lot of "loopholes," instead the council wants a basic plan for developers to follow. "By striking the Plan Development it doesn't mean that they can't do some of these things, it just means they have to request a variance to be allowed to do some of those things that are in the Plan Development section ... so it doesn't allow for these developers to come in and use the Plan Development to do things in a sneaky way," said

Willoughby. On the Master Planned Resort section, the council recommended to the county for a proposed MPR to have a setback of at least 1,000 feet from any bordering parcel or residential dwelling. The landscaping of the setback should "offer reasonable privacy and noise limiting barriers," and should not be developed in a way that it would intrude the boarding

residences of the MPR. The updates to the Comprehensive Plan will be sent to County Commissioners and they will finalize all updates by September.

"I was originally approached by Kathy to be on the council and I agreed to do six months stay to help get things back on track," said Willoughby as he announced his resignation from the council as chairman. His six months as a council member are coming to do an end, he explained he has other personal commitments coming up he needs to take care of. "I will be at the April meeting, but after that, I will be a participant in the audience,"

Willoughby leaves a council position open which means the Manson Community Council is looking to appoint someone to fill in the position by majority vote. The council will be looking into appointing a new council member during the next regular meeting on April 16.

Chelan Fire Commissioners start talks on fire chief replacement

Superintendent DePaoli speaks to board on 2019 Bond

CHELAN - Lake Chelan School District (LCSD) Superintendent Barry DePaoli visited the Chelan Fire and Rescue Commissioners during their regular meeting on March 20 and presented them with information on the LCSD 2019 Bond. DePaoli went over the proj-

ects the bond would include and the costs of each. "It's a \$75.5 million proposal ... pretty bulk vision and I would say to you that leadership is about bulk visions ... we have lots of buildings that are outdated and need to change so our kids, our teachers, and

our community are moving towards the 21st century," DePaoli explained to the commissioners.

The LCSD Superintendent mentioned the fact that there have been a lot of comments from people on the radio regarding school enrollment. "I want to address that," he said. "The comment is that we have no growth in enroll-

Chelan PUD holds open house for proposed Wenatchee service center

Chelan office to get minor improvements this year

CHELAN - On March 18, the Chelan County PUD began holding Open Houses throughout the county to hear the community's say on the Service Center that was recently proposed.

The Service Center is designed to consolidate the PUD's Wenatchee-area operations said PUD's Shared Services Director Dan Frazier. After a few years of study, the results showed that consolidating Wenatchee operations is the best long term option. "Eventually, the consolidation kept making more and more sense. Financially, it is the best investment, because we invest in new buildings, but you get a lot of productivity because everyone is together in one building," said Frazier. According to a press release from the PUD the center will also provide better customer services and meet

industry safety standards. The Lake Chelan Chamber of Commerce hosted the PUD's Open House on March 21 for Lake Chelan area residents to stop by and provide their comments. "Almost everybody here just wanted to see what was going on," explained Frazier. The main concern he heard from locals had to do with the PUD office in Chelan and whether

that will be closing. "That was not part of the plan," clarified Frazier. "In fact, we are making some minor improvements to the Chelan office this year," he added. Others dropped by to show their support to the PUD. "The folks who came were excited it about it.'

In the Wenatchee open house for example, "people wanted to make sure that whatever goes on the current PUD site doesn't compete with downtown," stated Frazier. The City of Wenatchee, Port of Chelan County and the PUD have partnered up and hired a consulting firm to help with "visioning on that site." According to Frazier, the firm has interviewed about 20 local business owners so they can get an idea of what is Wenatchee missing and what would complement what they are doing right now. Frazier mentioned that this is an ongoing process and the firm will continue doing research for another four to six months. Cashmere and Leavenworth residents like the idea of having the center closer, "instead of going all the way downtown."

Questions about rates going up have also been raised. "Because of the financial analysis we did, we show that over 50 years period it actually stabilizes rates ... it shouldn't really cause an increase in the rates over a long period of time," said Frazier. The estimated cost for the new center is of \$135 million and PUD commissioners already have set aside \$50 million for the project.

The last and final Open House will be held on Monday, March 25 at the Entiat Fire Hall in Entiat from 4-6 p.m. PUD also has a virtual open house at www.chelanpud.org/ ServiceCenter.

PUD Commissioners will review all of the survey results, comments and questions from customer-owners in early April to decide the next steps.

ment," added DePaoli, before going into some statistics. From 2003 to 2019 LCSD had an upward trend. According to DePaoli, they were "up as high as 1,430" students. However, in 2016 enrollment dropped by 35 to 40 kids, "but you have to remember we are already overcrowded," DePaoli stated.

Based on the State mandate, kindergarten to third-grade classrooms need to have less than 17 kids in them. "After 17, we need another classroom. Enrollment is deceptive," said DePaoli.

Taxpayers will be looking

at an increase of .86¢ per thousand in 2020 and .76¢ in 2021. "I do not think it is an unreasonable ask for the next 30 years," stated DePaoli as he went over the bond and the tax rates.

After hearing from DePaoli, the commissioners moved on to regular business for the meeting. Commissioner Russ Jones informed that the rescue boat's engines are on their way from Michigan. "They have never been in salt water before. They ran them and they did a compression check and everything else on them, so they are good to go," he said. The shipping costs ended up being higher than predicted, so Jones had to "roll out a check for that." Fire Chief Tim Lemon said that a couple surplus radios from Orondo will be acquired for the boat at no cost.

Commissioners began a conversation on the replacement for the Fire Chief. "We have two approaches, evaluating internal candidates and our open testing," said Chief Lemon. In order to conduct the open testing, Chelan Fire and Rescue would need to contract with a firm that specializes in executive recruitment. Lemon mentioned that Prothman out of Issaquah charges between \$17,000 to \$24,000 and ESCI out of Portland, Oregon averages between \$12,000 to \$20,000.

"Those are huge numbers," said Commissioner Phil Moller, "I wasn't expecting to see those kinds of numbers for that," he added. He suggested to the other two commissioners to chat about hiring someone internally instead of "spending these kinds of monies."

If the commissioners were to hire someone internally, they would need to conduct interviews with the candidates and then collectively decide on one. "Externally, you typically want to have a four-month window, so you have one to two months of advertising and at least two weeks to a month of deliberation," stated Lemon. To him, it makes more sense financially to hire someone who is already part of the fire district.

Commissioner Jay Witherbee mentioned that somewhere along the hiring process he would like to receive feedback from the community and the rest of CFR staff regarding the fire chief candidates. The commissioners are in no rush, but they need to make a decision as to where they should go next. Commissioners agreed to continue with the discussion during the Long Range Planning meeting scheduled for March 28 at 11 a.m.

The next regular commission meeting will be on April 17, 3 p.m. at the fire hall located at 232 E. Wapato Avenue.

Fire Strong workshops launch ambitious public education campaign

CHELAN - Last week the Okanogan County Long Term Recovery Group in partnership with the American Red Cross, launched an ambitious and comprehensive series of six day-long free Fire Strong Workshops aimed at educating and preparing citizens for the increasing incidence of

Beginning at Pateros High School on Tuesday, March 19, and Campbell's Resort in Chelan on Tuesday, March 20, representatives from more than a dozen agencies and organizations that deal with natural disasters convened for a day-long schedule that included moderated slide presentations, displays, information and volunteers. Among the participants were:

 Okanogan County Long Term Recovery Group (www. okanogancountyrecovery.com) – OCLTRG brings a detailed display of facts and photos of its efforts over the years since the wildfires help fire victims recover and rebuild. The display recognizes the more than 126 teams and 2,000 volunteers over the past four years, along with dozens of photos of home sites in various stages of construction. OCLTRG projects also include:

1. Map Your Neighborhood As the name implies a neighborhood preparedness program that focuses on one street and 15-20 homes at a time and tap the most immediate source of help in times of disaster. Online MYN support materials avail-

able at www.mil.wa.gov/myn. 2. Share Your Story – Stories from those affected by the 2014-15 wildfires. The stories are for a series of books that will be available to the public. The story coordinator is Jessica Rounds at jessicaocdcm@gmail.com or phone 509-846-5101.

3. Insurance Survey - Responses from insured, underinsured, and uninsured residents to comprise a true picture of the factors and gaps in process of disaster recovery. Online at www.surveymonkey.com/r/

5. The Fire Shaped Landscape Project – A map and Points of Interest guide to major fire activity from 2008 through 2015 together with recommended visitor sites connected to local

Last year set a record for state wildfires with the DNR recording 1,850 wildfire responses.




