Lake Chelan School District to build new high school if bond proposal is approved by voters in April

CHELAN – The Lake Chelan Mirror met with Lake Chelan School District Superintendent Barry DePaoli to talk about the Lake Chelan School District Bond Proposal which will be voted on April 23.

It all began in 2016 when the Lake Chelan School District held a community visioning forum in which 100 people participated. The forum was an opportunity to look at long-range strategic plans and goals for the district which for the most part focused on academics. Time was also spent discussing facilities, early childhood learning, as well as community business partnerships and technology.

“With that, we looked at what do we align those strategic goals with the facilities and learning environments of the future,” said DePaoli. From there a facilities audit took place, “we brought in

a contractor to look at all of our buildings and they looked at all the demands the school district has, what repairs we need to do. Then we had an architect come in and analyze our buildings and look at how we can best reconfigure for the future,” DePaoli explained.

During a the long process, the Facilities Committee and the School Board spent lots of time looking and exploring ways to realign the district.

Right now the district has two campuses, the elementary and the middle/high school. Morgen Owings Elementary houses more than 600 students, kindergarten through fifth grade. Across the street from MOE there’s a portable building with two fifth grade classes and a special programs building where the Pre-k is located in the basement and above that is the Chelan School of Innovation.

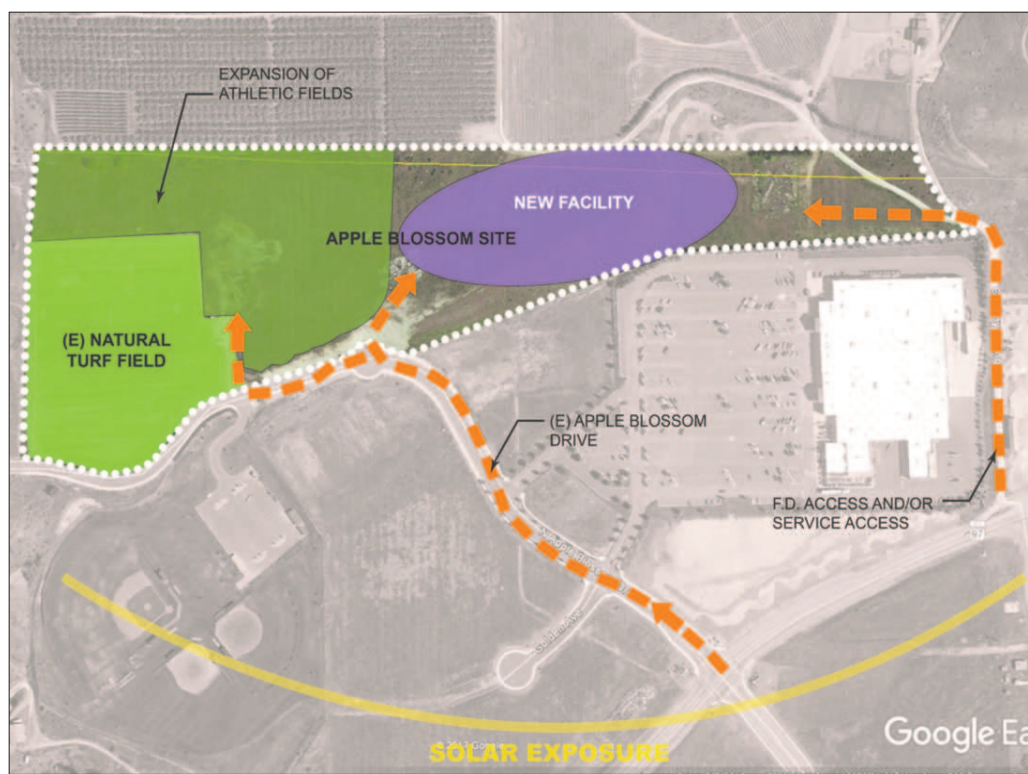
“On that total campus which is a very small footprint, we

have 680 students, Manson has two campuses for fewer students than that,” said DePaoli. “We have traffic issues, we have congestion and we have substandard learning environments,” he added.

A similar situation is taking place at the middle/high school, “we have extreme traffic congestion there, we have nine buses, 150 students cars, 50 staff and middle school parents trying to pick up students and leave the building at 3:05 p.m.,” said DePaoli.

He also mentioned they are also compromised with all athletic facilities being offsite, “they have to drive to tennis, they have to drive to baseball, they have to drive to softball.”

Due to this, it was decided that MOE will be converted to a primary school, Pre-k to third grade. “It will shrink down the classes and we will

City of Chelan refuses to pay airport property with city funds

CHELAN – In recognition of her 100th birthday, Georgia Duff received a standing ovation by those who attended the Chelan City Council on February 26.

Chelan Mayor Mike Cooney began the meeting by congratulating Duff for her centenary, “we really value you as a community member,” he said. Cooney then went ahead and listed events that also took place in 1919. “I think it is pretty cool to think about what you’ve seen in your lifetime ... all the countless things that have taken place, you even know what the internet is,” Cooney stated. “Yeah, I know the internet, we didn’t have that in my days,” Duff cheerfully replied.

From there the council heard from Chelan County PUD Managing Director Justin Erickson on a proposed PUD Service Center located in Wenatchee’s Old Station area. “This is customer service oriented, this is what is driving this decision ... it’s about customer service operations what is best for those people,” he said. The Old Station site is the closest to the center point of PUD’s customer base with 70 percent of their service calls being north of the Wenatchee River.

The site highlights a four-story administrative building along with shops, warehouses and storage buildings. “We understand the importance of design, this is a public building and paid with public funds, so we have this balance

that it needs to represent the community and it needs to be fair in terms of cost and price ... we want to make sure we capture the uniqueness of every community in the county and the diversity,” Erickson explained. The new facility is expected to house 800 plus employees and if the construction were to happen it would take about two years to complete, the expected occupancy will be in late 2022.

PUD will be hosting a series of Open Houses throughout Chelan County. They will be visiting Chelan on March 21 from 4-6 p.m. to hear from the public and answer any questions regarding the project, including the finances. The Open House will take place at the Lake Chelan Chamber of Commerce office.

Back in October, the council had a conversation regarding the acquisition of three acres

Chelan Valley Housing Trust holds open houses, updates given

CHELAN/MANSON – The Chelan Valley Housing Trust held two open houses on the last day of February for the communities of Chelan and Manson.

On Feb. 28, CVHT representatives were present at the Manson Grange to answer questions about the organization and share up-to-date progress on plans and structure with the public. Later on that evening they gather at the Lake Chelan Chamber of Commerce office to give the Chelan community a chance to learn more about CVHT.

CVHT Board member Guy Evans went over a few changes on the current property plan from what was developed

back in December. “The first is our access it is now entirely off of Bluebell, that’s because it was not possible to do the requirements to come off Big Horn being so close to SR 150,” he said.

The other change is the homesites, the subdivision is now down to 17 homes due to the City of Chelan cottage code. “That creates two clusters that are divided by a trail and landscaping,” explained Evans. Having parking on each side of the neighbor remains, creating a pathway for those properties closer to SR150 to access their homes. Seven homes would have parking behind them, creating a mix to accommodate all.

An infrastructure contrac-

Hawks Meadow residents raise concerns with water tank aesthetics during ULID public hearing

CHELAN – Commissioners of the Bear Mountain Water District met on Feb. 27 at the Chelan Fire Hall in order to hold a public hearing for the proposed Utility Local Improvement Districts (ULID) No. 2 and No. 3.

A notice was sent out to all of the owners within the district that are involved with the two separate ULIDs prior to the hearing.

“There has been some confusion, under state law, there are two ways to form an ULIDs they can be initiated by a petition or they can be initiated by

resolution of the board. There was a petition process a couple months back, the bond council reviewed that petition that had been submitted and they had concerns over whether the petition was going to fill the elements of the status. As a result, they recommended the board to a ratification process to initiate the ULID formation via the resolution process,” clarified Attorney Mark Marquis.

The board met last month and adopted the resolutions to attempt to form ULIDs No. 2 and No. 3. Following that meeting legal notices were published in the paper and

notices were sent out to all potentially affected property owners.

The notices included estimates of the project costs, such estimates come from the work that was done by the district’s engineer on the two projects.

“If the ULID formation is approved then the project will proceed, at the completion of the project the final cost will be known at that time,” explained Marquis. He also mentioned that there will be a final hearing when the project is completed to close the assessment roll. “Additional notice will be published in the

paper, letters will be sent out to all property owners again, saying the final project costs and these are costs that being assessed in your property,” he added.

The standard terms for financing a Municipal Bond include a 20-year annual repayment plan at one percent interest. “When you have your assessment you will have the option of paying in full without any interest. The county treasurer will issue invoices to property owners and you will pay your assessment as part of your taxes,”

be able to renovate and provide an early center for Pre-k and kindergarten, so they are no longer in the basement," DePaoli stated.

The fourth and fifth grades will transfer to the current middle/high school, which will become an intermediate/middle school with grades fourth through eighth. A new high school, for grades nine through 12, will then be built on property already owned by the district on Apple Blossom Drive near WalMart and soccer and baseball fields.

"When we move that high school we move 150 cars, half of our staff and we connect

them to all of our facilities," he added.

The new high school would have tennis courts, all of softball, baseball facilities right on campus, including a new rubberized track. The plan also includes the renovation of Sargent Field, which will become a soccer and football stadium with turf to accommodate more users. The field is 53 years old and the district has looked at restoring and modernizing that facility.

"We believe it is the best way to amplify learning opportunities in our schools ... we feel that the project are extremely well thought out and it serves the best interest of our

students and the community at large," said DePaoli.

The LCSD will have no capital bond debt as of 2021 and it is estimated that the property tax will increase by .86¢ per thousand in 2020 and by .76¢ in 2021 over a 20 year

period. The total bond costs are \$75.5 million, which 79% of the money will be allocated to building the new high school campus.

If the bond is approved, the LCSD has 30 days to issue the bond. Following the issuing, LCSD will spend May and June with community and staff engaging on Sargent Field and how it will come together. This will be followed by a year-long process of planning for the high school, which will be constructed in the 2020-2021 school year and it will be ready for occupancy for the year 2021-2022 school year. Renovations at MOE and the intermediate school would follow after the construction of the new high school. "This is a pretty

clean transition for us," said DePaoli.

A brochure will be mailed out by Monday (March 4) which contains more information on the Bond Proposal. To learn more visit www.chelanschools.org, type "Bond" on the search bar. Barry DePaoli is available to meet and answer questions with the community in person or over the phone (509)682-3515.

Five district informational meetings will take place starting on Monday, March 4 at the Lake Chelan Chamber of Commerce at 5:30 p.m.

The ballots will be mailed out April 5 and Election Day will take place on April 23. If approved homeowner will begin paying for the bond in 2020.

of property by the Lake Chelan Municipal Airport. During that period of time, the city had the first right of refusal for the property. The Port of Chelan County jumped in and agreed to pay for half of the property's cost, \$150,000. The council went forward and voted to approve the purchase and sale agreement which was then executed by the Mayor.

City Administrator Mike Jackson presented the council with an Interlocal Agreement between the Port and the city for the Kelly property

purchase at the Airport. The Port offered to pay the property in full and for the city to pay them back over a period of five years with 2.5 percent interest. After reviewing the agreement, Jackson noticed that it included the language that the city could not use Airport funds for the acquisition and that they would use the city's General Fund.

The Port contributes \$50,000 to the Lake Chelan Municipal Airport and they feel that the city could be using their own money to pay them back. However, Jackson clarified that "most of the reserves are generated by the profit we make on hanger leases and that sort

of thing."

Council doesn't recall ever discussing the money coming out of the city funds. All talks were around the Airport funds. The council has three options: to continue with

the agreement and utilize city funds to pay for the property, to retract from the acquisition and let the Port purchase it independently, or to convince the Port to let use Airport funds as it was

initially agreed.

Majority of the council members agreed that they should push the original agreement and they will get an update from Jackson at the next city workshop.

said Marquis. All numbers that were given are just a target, finals numbers will not be set until the final hearing in the fall.

Marquis mentioned that if anyone has an objection, it must be submitted to the board in writing. "You have 10 days from the day of this hearing to file," he said.

If during the 10 day period, 60 percent of the area property owners within the ULID object to the formation of such then the board will not go forward.

ULID No. 2 involves the Hawks Meadow and Hawks Ridge area and ULID No.3 consists of Bear Mountain's Bandera. District's engineer Doug Wilcox explained that ULID No. 2 project consists of upgrading the existing well

pump, building two 250,000 gallons tanks that will serve as reservoirs, plus an additional 50,000-gallon reservoir. Each 250,000 gallons tank will be 30 feet high by 30 feet in diameter, he mentioned that these two will costs less than a single 350,000 gallons tank. Electrical service upgrades and interconnecting piping are part of the improvements.

Neighbors from the area

where the tanks will be placed expressed their concerns on the aesthetics. Someone asked if landscaping could be done in order to camouflage the tanks. Another homeowner mentioned to the board that they should explore the possibility of burring the tank and analyzing the costs that it would imply.

On the other hand, the Bear Mountain project is much simpler. It deals with the

installation of an intertie to the District's water system sourced from Lake Chelan, plus related infrastructure along with the necessary engineering, contingency and plan upgrades.

Objection letters could be sent to P.O. Box 3091, Chelan 98816. If approved the property owners could start seeing construction during the spring time.



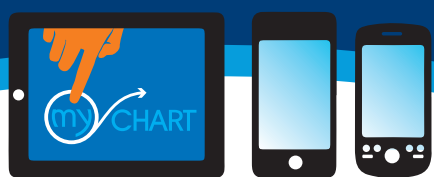

Vehicle prowl, theft, and extortion, ends in arrest of Chelan man

WENATCHEE - A vehicle prowl that occurred at a gas station on North Wenatchee Avenue on Valentine’s Day resulted in an arrest on Feb. 27, 2019 for Vehicle Prowl 2nd Degree, Theft 1st Degree, Trafficking in Stolen Property 1st Degree, and Extortion 1st Degree. Joseph W. Meadows, 44, of Chelan was identified from surveillance camera video at the gas station and ultimately contacted after he tried to extort money from the victim to get his own property back later.

Wenatchee Police initially responded to a reported vehicle prowl at a gas station in the 1800 block of North Wenatchee Avenue just before 6:30 p.m. on Feb. 14, 2019.

The victim was in Wenatchee on business from New Zealand. He stopped to put gas in his rental car and went inside to pay. While he was inside, a Dodge Challenger pulled up to the gas pumps. A male from the Challenger entered the victim’s car and took a backpack before

leaving the gas station. The backpack contained several thousand dollars of computer and electronic equipment related to the victim’s work.

The victim went back inside the gas station to call police. The responding Officer was able to obtain video and still images of the suspect from several angles, but was unable to identify him at that time. The victim returned to New Zealand without his property, which was believed lost.

On Feb. 24, 2019, the victim received e-mail from a Gmail address that contained Meadows’ first initial, middle name, and last name. The e-mail requested contact from the victim regarding an urgent business matter and requested a U.S. phone number where the victim could be reached. The initial Officer used this information to locate a suspect in our local records management system and matched his driver’s license photo to the video from the gas station.

Detectives coordinated with the victim in New Zealand to contact the suspect via e-mail. The suspect accepted a local

phone number belonging to a Detective as the victim’s local contact phone number. The suspect wanted an “incentive” from the victim for the return of the stolen property. Once they agreed to a price, they set up a meeting in Wenatchee.

Meadows arrived at the meeting location and was arrested by Detectives. His vehicle was seized pending a search warrant. The stolen backpack was in plain view on the back seat of Meadows’ vehicle.

Meadows was transported to CCRJC and booked on the above charges. The initial vehicle prowl was an opportunistic theft of an unattended bag from an unlocked car at the gas pumps. This is an uncommon occurrence in our area. Most vehicle prowls occur with vehicles left unattended and unlocked for hours. Even less common was the attempt to extort the victim to get their property back. This case was a great example of cooperation with a victim, even from across the entire Pacific Ocean, to recover his property and make an arrest.

tor is currently reviewing the subdivision plan who is going to provide the first round of budget estimate. “We had our civil firm take this design through roughly 30 percent of design, so we have an initial layout of sewer water, stormwater and that sort of thing,” Evans added.

CVHT has been work-

ing closely with the City of Chelan through multiple meetings which are making the application process a lot easier.

So far, the home footprints have not been changed, however, Evans mentioned he has talked to architect Mike Johnson and he is putting together a list of interior and exterior materials that will be durable and affordable. “Once we have that developed we can go to a builder

or two and get some initial numbers,” said Evans.

A preliminary homeowner survey has been created. CVHT administrator Rachael Goldie mentioned that the survey helps to gather information and it is a way for the organization to get initial contact with the public. 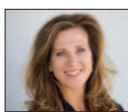

Encourage your elected officials to support SB 5343, the High School Success Bill

There are destinations where we live that are not connected by roads. To get there, you must find alternative means - by air, by boat or by foot. I'm the proud principal of Chelan High School. Getting all of our students to graduation day feels like this too, sometimes. But our job, as the educators and adults that see them every day, is to help them find their path to their high school diploma, whatever it takes.

The Washington Roundtable has identified that there will be 740,000 job openings in Washington by 2021. The challenge is that the majority of those opportunities require training or college after graduation, and currently Washington's graduation rate is in the bottom 10. A coalition of organizations that is diverse in mission but united in the common belief that we must help Washington's students stay in and finish school is supporting the High School Success Bill that is currently underway in Olympia. The bill is data-tested and the programs it supports are succeeding across our state and elsewhere in our country. I know, because the programs are working at my school.

At Chelan High School, 96% of our students graduated last year. Our goal is 100% with 80% destined for post-secondary education. Additionally, we want to increase the percentage of our graduates with a 3.0 GPA. I have urged my elected leaders to support

SB 5343 because of students who walk our hallways every day. I know of a young man who passed the appropriate assessments, earned the required credits his first three years, and found gainful employment. But he also quit school and was locking himself into low paying jobs. Because of programs like the ones supported in SB 5343, we were able to track him down, meet with him repeatedly, and put together a personalized plan to get him on track. Today he is back in class with a schedule that will allow him to earn credit to graduate and work a job in a manner that allows him to support his family. He is also considering post-secondary education.

High school principals are facing a changing environment that affects classes and teachers. Most importantly, there are things that affect kids that we are aware of, and other things that keep kids from succeeding that we miss. The High School Success bill tackles these dynamics head-on. For example, the findings of research on the importance of freshmen year cannot be argued with. The bill includes programs like the one at my school for at-risk freshmen coming to us from 8th grade. We have adults and upper-class peer mentors

who work with them one period per day. This approach changes the paradigm for underserved students by ensuring their success as freshmen and their enrollment in advanced coursework that might not happen otherwise. Preventing dropouts, ensuring freshmen stay on track, raising enrollment in dual credit classes, and ensuring that we have on time graduates is going to take additional school counselors and capacity building throughout the system. Each of these critical measures is supported in SB 5343.

I'm asking my lawmakers to support the High School Success Bill because our current model for facilitating high school success in Washington must improve. In this neck of the woods we know how to get places even without a road. It's time to support this legislation to create pathways for Washington kids' futures.

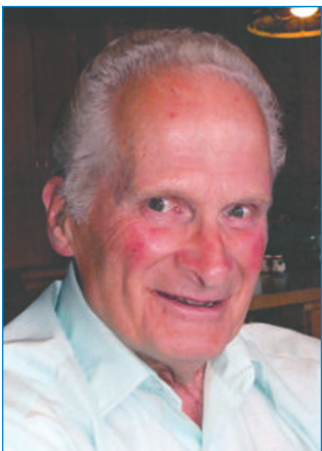
Laurence (Larry) Eldred

Donald Leroy Brown, Jr.

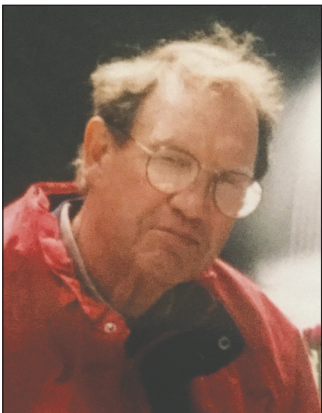
Donald Leroy Brown, Jr. (age 76) went to be with his Lord on February 19, 2019.
