Manson Future Farmers of America filled with year round activities




Manson School District Future Farmers of America (FFA) participants along with Chelan School District FFA during a field trip to the Ag Expo.

FFA advisor Kevin Amsden explained that all students who are enrolled in his classes are eligible to be an FFA member. At the moment

25 to 30 students out of the 55 are active members of FFA, "last year we had a bunch of seniors graduated so we are down a little bit, but we have four, five new kids this year," he said

Throughout the year, FFA members and advisor participate in an array of activities. They do the Chelan County Fair, District and State Apple judging, travel to Spokane for the Ag Expo and do a Leadership Contest, to name only a few.

The Leadership Contest consists of giving speeches and doing job interviews, this is something they enjoy the most because it is a real-life experience and it prepares them for the future.

Preparations for Apple Judging began almost two months in advance, the kids

"My older brother started off with FFA and I got another older brother who started off with 4-H and then went to FFA, plus my family has kinda been doing it for a very long time," said Blake.


At the beginning the Cochran's were raising chickens and then both transitioned into raising pigs instead. They have now been raising pigs for

said Blake. Cole agrees, "with pigs you get more attached to them, you get more involved with them."



Starting on Tuesday Chelan kids will get the chance to dress in camo, as an agriculturist, a farm animal and will show their FFA by wearing their FFA t-shirts on Friday for a chance to receive a prize for their participation from FFA advisor Bailey Dezellem

Each year. Chelan FFA participates, organizes and competes in different activities throughout the months.

One of the most popular activities Chelan FFA and alumni are part of is the Lake Chelan Rodeo, which kicks off the year. In 1981 the Chelan FFA Alumni was started with the mission of supporting physically and financially the members and activities of the Chelan FFA Chapter. The Chelan FFA Alumni provides chaperones for trips, judges for contests, guest speakers for classes, help to haul animals, coaches for teams, and dollars for travel scholarships, academic scholarships and SAE project grants. FFA students sign up to help out during the event along with their parents and other volunteers.

In mid-August, the kids start preparing for upcoming fairs, they shear goats and get their personal bios and educational posters to pres-

ent. Last year, during the North Central Washington Fair, Carlos Venegas won the Grand Champion Market Goat title.

During the 2018 Chelan County Fair, Chelan FFA

had the Overall Supreme Showperson, Grand Champion Market Goat, multiple Grand Champion Fitting and Showing, Reserve Grand Market Steer, finalists in Market, finalists in fitting and showing, and plenty of blue ribbon showpeople.

Another 2018 highlight for Chelan FFA was the December State Apple Evaluation. The team representing Chelan FFA took fifth place

statewide. The students were required to complete in a multitude of tasks including identifying pests, blemishes, varieties, as well as grade apples, pressure test, and more.

In January, Chelan FFA hosted the annual Lake Chelan Horticulture Day at the high school. Now, the kids are gearing up for the 2019 Chelan High School Plant Sale which will be May 2-4.

The first year Heimark was around livestock was during the summer of his sophomore year going into his junior year. He decided to give goats a chance, "goats are not that fun, they are such a pain ... they are such a struggle to show". This overwhelming experience made Mark Heimark show pigs this time around, "pigs do their own thing and they are quite smart animals and are capable of feeling, when they see me they come and greet me. I feel more of a connection to pigs because they are more laid back, they are also more easier to take

He enjoys participating at the fair because "it's fun, I really enjoy it. You get up early in the morning and you take care of your animals, clean their pens and wash them up, get them ready for showing." After the showing ends, FFA members hang out after dinner and have even more fun, "some of my best friends I met through FFA and by sharing some of the same experiences and they are people that I will have a connection with for the rest of my life and it means a lot to me," said Heimark.

Every two days Heimark visits his two pigs to make sure they have enough food and water, he also takes them out of the pen and walks them with him to get them ready for showing.

Mark has two male pigs, BLT and Brought, only BLT will be competing at the Chelan County Fair. "I have been told that if you name them it makes them harder to let them go at the end ... I know what I am getting into and that they are an investment," explained Heimark.

It is going to be hard for Heimark to let go of his pigs,
