

Wildfire Town Hall coming to Chelan in early 2019

CHELAN – Chelan Mayor Mike Cooney announced that a Town Hall meeting will be planned for the early months of 2019.

The topic of this Town Hall meeting will be wildfire.

At the meeting, different departments will come together and talk to the community. Some of them include; Cascadia Conservation, Manson and Chelan Fire Departments, the Sheriff's Department.

"The idea will be to come up with solid things that the community can do ... we will take a lead and have a discussion there as far as what we can do ahead of time, instead of waiting," said Cooney.

Weidner Apartments present GFC numbers to Council

CHELAN – Guy Evans and Financial Analyst Cody Vickery of Weidner Apartments talked GFC rates to the Chelan City Council during a City Workshop held on Dec. 4.

Evans began the presentation by saying, "I had a great conversation with Andy Baker around how to approach the new rate structure and I think there's a way ahead that this could be a win-win for everyone."

According to Evans the housing crisis in Chelan has many different components to it, "Weidner is here to talk about rentals through a for profit mechanism."

Regardless of the for profit status, Chelan Mayor Mike Cooney asked, "is there a section of housing in other cities that is affordable rental units for profit?"

Vickery answered, "you have for profit institutions that are trying to build affordable housing, they are going to utilize different avenues, the city, the state, to finance the development."

As an example, Vickery mentioned a project that contains affordable housing in Minneapolis. "We were grant-

ed a tax increment financing (TIF) credit and 20 percent of our units are affordable," he reported.

Last December, Evans came in front of the Council and presented the development proposal of 284 multi-family units at the Apple Blossom Center.

This time around Evans had updates for the Council and the public present. "Just to get everyone up to speed on where the conversation has been, we have an expensive infrastructure," he said.

Weidner would be looking to spend \$10,280 in GFC hookup fees in 2019, per unit. Evans stated that these are not practical numbers, "I reached out to Mike and said I have some ideas, we have this data set from Weidner's water use down in Wenatchee."

From there Evans contacted Andy Baker of FCS Group to discuss GFCs. "Based on this Riverside 9 data, the Weidner ERU water use would be of around 903 gallons per day," stated Evans.

Coming in at a low peak water use, would then benefit Weidner. "That translates into .1 or water ERU ... we find that

Valley Winds: A community of musicians

Oldest member in his 80's

CHELAN – It started as a brainstorming idea by music teachers from the area and it evolved into what is now the Valley Winds Community Wind Ensemble.

Chelan Music teacher Stephen Burdick along with a couple of music teachers from around the Valley brainstormed on the idea of creating a group for high schoolers and community members to play in, while attending a student music festival.

"In the beginning we thought that we more than likely end up with mostly a student band with a couple adults," said Burdick.

With an equal mix of students and adults and more than 40 people, Valley Winds surpassed all expectations.

"Most areas will have a community band or town band ... that didn't really exist in this immediate area, we went for it and it exploded," explained Burdick.

Musicians of all ages are part of Valley Winds, the youngest one being in the seventh grade and the oldest one being in his 80s.

Those participating in the ensemble are from Wenatchee, Bridgeport, Brewster, Manson, Orondo, Mansfield and of course, Chelan.

The group has a spread of abilities. "Some people have

played in college, some people have played in Military bands, some people are in seventh grade and they play the clarinet," said Burdick.

Valley Winds officially kicked off in January of 2017 and four months later, in April, they held their first concert at the Chelan High School Performing Arts Center (PAC).

So far the ensemble has performed in four concerts. "From January to April every year we have a four month opportunity where people can come together and play," explained Burdick. However, upon request from members, Fall concerts were added to the mix.

The very first Valley Winds concert benefitted a family that had just encountered tragedy. "We took donations ... we raised a huge amount of money for them and then the next one we did for the Food Bank," Burdick explained.

The monies from the last two concerts will go towards a scholarship fund to support students. "They want to do a Youth Music Scholarship ... for any high school student that is seeking to go to any music camp or maybe going off to college for music," said Burdick.

According to Burdick, one or two scholarships will be awarded in the upcoming Spring concert.

Before each concert, the group tries to get together eight to 10 times. "We tried to designed it so it was a commitment, but it wouldn't

overwhelm somebody ... we tried to make it manageable for people who have other things going on and still want to be part of something like that," stated Burdick.

Practices are twice a month and run for 90 minutes. The music is handed out to the musician on the first day of practice. "We typically perform eight pieces. It's a lot on their own practicing their part," said Burdick.

Helping Burdick with the conducting of the band is Pateros Music teacher Jonathan McBride. "We split rehearsal

and a lot of planning goes into it between him and I ... a lot of behind the scenes planning to make sure all the music and selected programs are appropriate for the group," said Burdick.

During concerts Burdick and McBride conduct four pieces each. When one of them is not conducting, they join the ensemble and play along with them.

Aside from all the preparation from the group members, their mission includes "sharing it with the community when it's done."



The creation of the band, not only allowed students and adults to play, it also "flourished into neat relationships and opportunities for people to grow." The 2019 Spring Concert is scheduled for Wednesday.

the \$10,000 number drops by
half, it gets us down to \$5,084
per unit," Evans added.

Evans then asked the Council
to allow Weidner to use the
data from Riverside 9 in order
to set an initial GFC. "In year
one, two, three we are going
to look at the actual numbers
down there, and that's when
we are going to clean up the
books," said Evans.

That way the City can deter-
mine whether the amount paid
by Weidner was enough, or if
they would have to pay more.
Evans believes Weidner would
get a credit instead, because
there's already an irrigation
system installed at Apple Bloss-
om. "The Riverside numbers
are paying for irrigation," he
explained.

In terms of the benefits
this project brings to the City
of Chelan, Evans mentioned
that based on construction
numbers and real-estate sale,

day, April 25. With rehears-
als starting up on Jan. 9. "If
there's anybody out in the
community that wants to jump
in and join us, contact me,"
said Burdick.

With a long term vision for
this project, Burdick is start-
ing up talks about having a

a little over \$300,000 in sales
tax will made by the City. Plus

and sales tax each year.

Council member Ray Dobbs,
asked if there's any way the

affordable housing, Vickery,
responded, "there's room for

The Council also discussed
vacancy rates, "even though
we are calling this market value
pricing, as soon as 300 units
hit the market, that is going
to add a significant amount
of vacancy," said Councilman
Ty Witt.

"I think everybody gets it,
I think everybody around the
table get it, people in the com-
munity get it. You go out there
build 280 units, it frees up all
these homes that are rentals
now, lowers the cost of a home
rental significantly," said the
Mayor.

The next step is to start
conversations between the
Council, Evans and Weidner
Apartments.

Manson High School Robotics Club travels to Central Washington University

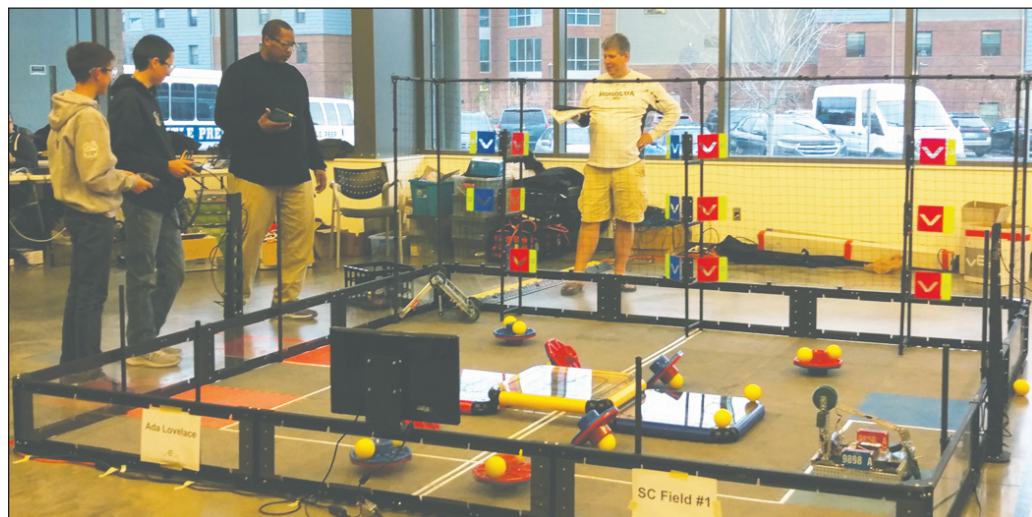

Help stop a new Master Planned Resort being considered in agricultural area, meeting Jan. 8

The Lake Chelan Valley is again being asked to approve a large commercial development in the middle of a quiet, rural area of Manson. A Master Planned Resort on 19 acres, consisting of a 14-room hotel, swimming pool, an Amphitheatre for live performances, a wedding venue, a café, a retail store, 24 "glamping" sheds (storage sheds), two 26' radius geodesic domes, and more.

The design shows parking for at least 120 vehicles. While this project might be a great addition to the valley, it is being proposed in the middle of an area zoned AC which is commercial agriculture and homes on 5 acres or more.

This is in an area of apple, cherry and pear orchards with personal residents. Large scale development in

the valley is rapid; areas like The Lookout, Black Cap, Holiday Hills, large winery and event center all intruding on peaceful neighborhoods. This isn't just a problem for the people who live on Klute Road. This is something everyone who cherishes this valley should be concerned about.

Some Manson community members will be hosting an informational meeting and they would love for the entire Chelan Valley community to come and express their concern regarding what is happening; help guide growth, so it is thoughtful to everyone, not just developers and business. If we don't act now, it will be too late. We won't be able to restore the rural agriculture areas once they are gone. The process can't be reckless, it must be thoughtful and careful.
