

Chelan County Commissioner race Bugert versus Smith too close to call

The Chelan County Commissioner's race Seat 2 is still too close to call as of the latest county official vote count held last Thursday, Nov. 9.

The nearly dead heat may be decided by the next county vote tally on Wednesday, Nov. 14 (today) with Nov. 27 as the certification day.

Independent* Bob Bugert, as of press deadline, maintains a slight lead over Republican Shon Smith by a mere .6%. Smith received 13,365 votes (49.7%), while Bugert received 13,525 (50.3%), which equals only 160 votes out of a total of 26,890 cast.

No Democrat managed to get through the traditionally Republican stronghold of Chelan County, but the heavily promoted campaign of Dr. Kim Schrier still won the 8th District as a whole, formerly held by Republican Bob Reichert, despite losing the local vote to Republican Dino Rossi. The 8th District is comprised of Chelan, King, Pierce and Kittitas counties

Democrat Maria Cantwell also won her U.S. Senate seat as the incumbent, but Republican Susan Hutchison beat her in Chelan County by more than 13%.

Schrier became the first female pediatrician to ever be elected to Congress from any state and was greatly aided by a national Democratic Party financial push to drive the anti-Trump vote across the nation in what was part of the so-called "Blue Wave."

The exact figures aren't in yet, but Rossi and Schrier apparently spent millions on television, print and radio advertising as well as billboards and especially direct mailings to potential voters.

Rossi called Schrier "Dr. Tax" while Schrier's campaign leveled charges of corruption on Rossi for past business dealings in real estate.

Two land-slides occurred in the state 12th Legislative District vote when existing Chelan County Commissioner Republican

USDA Forest Service reports back on the five-year review of Holden Mine

CHELAN – Holden Mine Remedial Project Manager Mario A. Isaias-Vera reported back to Chelan area residents on the project's five-year review during an open house on Nov. 8 at the Lake Chelan Chamber of Commerce.

The open house served as way to share new information about what has been happening at Holden Village, as well as a way to answer questions from the residents.

The underground copper mine operated from 1937 to 1957 and after it was abandoned, contaminated groundwater and surface water with toxic metals were washed downstream along Railroad Creek.

"There was a need to clean that up," said Chelan District Ranger Kari Grover-Wier. In 2012, the Forest Service along with the United States Environmental Protection Agency issued an order for the site's cleanup.

The hazardous substances affected wildlife, water and everything else surrounding the Holden Mine. The Forest Service is highly invested in this project because they are thinking long-term. "We are doing it for you, for your children and for generations to come," said Isaias-Vera.

They are also doing this in order to protect the environment and the natural resources of the area. In order to do so, Remedial Action Objectives were set.

- Protection of aquatic life
- Mitigation of sediments
- Protection of groundwater
- Prevent migration of contaminants of concern that exceed cleanup levels
- Protection of human health
- Compliance with applicable or relevant and appropriate requirements

Holden Mine was divided into sections in order for the

Chelan Council votes 'yes' to property acquisition

CHELAN – The Chelan Airport property owned by Eugene Kelly will be purchased by the City.

In a 5-2 vote, the Chelan City Council decided Tuesday evening, Nov. 6 to acquire the three acres of land adjacent to the Lake Chelan Municipal Airport in partnership with the Port of Chelan County.

This piece of land was previously owned by the City of Chelan, however in 2003, they did a land swap with Kelly for another piece of land east of the airport.

Discussion got started on the subject during the last Council Meeting on Oct. 28, in which the Port of Chelan showed huge interest in the property. Yet Councilmembers decided to put on hold in order to obtain more information regarding the parcel.

Based on the request from the Council, City Administrator Mike Jackson had back and forth conversations with the Port and the Kellys. "One of the things they did say is that they would be willing to finance the City's share over five years, which would help us quite a bit for our cashflow

... it was the most agreeable terms we could come to," stated Jackson.

On the other hand, this purchase would reenergize the relation between the Port and the City, "Jim and I are going to renew that commitment," said Jackson. An agreement among both agencies has been drafted, which includes cost share of the property as well as other additional support from the Port.

The plan would then be to lease the property to create some revenue to offset some of the expenses from the airport. A typical lease for

a building that size usually tend to aim for six to eight percent return on investment per year.

Since the property is constrained by waterflow, it could only be used as a storage facility. However, in the future when water becomes available, revenue and possibilities for the land will be expanded.

The Council heard from an airport neighbor, Nicholas Pasco who knows more about the area. "The building is old and rundown which really makes me question the value of the property ... no more

hangers can be built until we can get water up there," Pasco said the Council.

Pasco also informed the Council that there has not been any type of industrial development in the area except for only residential.

"We can't really make a case for a revenue generator or in any way, it might contribute a few dollars towards paying for this," said Jackson.

The Council shared their opinions regarding the purchase. Council woman Kelly

project managers to help explain and describe the project with one another.

Not only did Rio Tinto hire locals for the work that needed to be done in Holden Mine, they also hired many from all over the nation.

On a regular basis, the team has to communicate with Holden Village, that way the project doesn't interfere with their lifestyle.

A key component of the project, included the creation of intersecting channels that helped separate clean water. "It diverted it away from the tailings," explained Isaías-Vera.

A barrier wall was the hardest part to build, "it protects Railroad Creek from the water that is contaminated and in the contaminated side we developed a collection system."

The collection system collects the contaminated water and it sends it to "a new developed water treatment plant." The water treatment plant was designed to treat 2,200 gallons of water per minute.

In 2015, the Wolverine Fire

was huge setback for the project, everyone on the site had to be evacuated. However, in 2017 after the site was regraded, 80,000 plants were planted, with all native vegetation. "The site is recovering very rapidly, it's pretty neat," said Isaías-Vera.

A network of trails was developed in order to bring recreational opportunities to the area, "not just for the Village but for everyone who wants to visit the site, it's in a beautiful location."

The site will continue to be monitored for many years, "we are working with Rio and many agencies on doing monitoring, so far we are happy to see improvements," informed Isaías-Vera.

Phase 1 of the project will wrap up at the end of the year and a construction break will start. "Rio Tinto has been putting a lot of effort, they have been doing a wonderful job," he added. The team is scheduled to come back for additional work in a few years from now.

Allen said, "do we let something go and be left with unintended circumstances?" Regardless, she does see the value in purchasing the property and holding it for future use.

Councilman Tim Hollingsworth also had something to say, "the other thing that gives me pause, is the number of things that may have a greater return, that \$300,000 is money that we could target in other areas."

For Chelan Mayor Mike Cooney, it's just a matter of having the Port give back to the City. "We send about a quarter million dollars in property tax to the Port each year, we want to see some kind of return," Cooney said.

After the discussion, a vote was conducted and the mo-

Manson Parks Board signs letter of support for Manson Chamber to purchase Leffler Field

MANSON – Manson Parks Board will support Manson Chamber of Commerce on their acquisition of Leffler Field.

According to Board Chairman Rob Campbell, the Manson Chamber has been working on purchasing the property, which will then be handed off to Parks in order to maintain it.

The property will be purchased as is, in order to secure it. However, the property has a few issues. "There's not irrigation on it," said Campbell.

Campbell did mention that a big part of this will be parking and it will also include a bathroom. "Unfortunately, I have not talked to the Chamber of Commerce to really see what they are planning for it," Campbell explained.

Commissioner Taylor Quigley, stated that he is "all for it." Yet he wants to know what the Chamber's long term goal for the property is.

In the long run, Commissioner Travis Schoenwald thinks purchasing this property is smart, especially because it's centrally located in Manson.

After reading the drafted letter, the Board unanimously voted to support the Chamber's acquisition.

Another major item on the Thursday (Nov. 8) agenda included conversations regarding the 2019 preliminary budget.

Campbell believes four items will stand out in next year's budget. One of them being wages. The minimum wage is going up, therefore they have to increase the wages for some of their jobs in order to attract people to do them. "Three percent is the cost of living adjustment I have seen going on," said Campbell.

He explained to the Board that they could be looking at a five percent increase. Another big item mentioned was a pickup truck that hardly

gets used. "We are going to look at selling that and getting a smaller pickup with a plow."

When the pickup was purchased, Parks was looking into replacing it every five years, "this is the fifth year" stated Campbell.

Campbell has in mind the possibility of purchasing two smaller ones, one will be a four wheel drive. The pickups would either be used or new depending on what fits in the budget.

Funding will also be needed in order to renovate the playground at Singleton Park. Lastly, the Board briefly talked about allocating money the Board would want to put aside for Pacific Engineering's work. During the upcoming meeting the budget will be discussed more fully.



Brush Fire Washington Creek area out in under 60 minutes

CHELAN - The fire was reported last night around 6:51 p.m. Rescue 71, Brush 79, Tender 71, Battalion 7, Chief 701, 702 responded on the first alarm. Rescue 71, the first unit on scene, reported a working brush fire in light to medium fuels, wind driven, with flame lengths at 3 to 5 feet. Rescue 71 requested a 2nd alarm and made a direct attack on the head of the fire to slow it down until additional resources could arrive. Chief 701 arrived and established Washington Creek Command, coordinating the fire attack and resources as they arrived. Tender 71 arrived next and supported Rescue 71 with a pump and roll turret operation. Brush 79 followed and deployed on the south side of the fire under the direction of Battalion 7, who also served as the Incident Safety Officer. Tender 74 finished containment on the north and west side of

the fire with a pump and roll turret operations. The fire was contained at 7:42 p.m. in 49 minutes and 9 seconds. Two Rescue/brush trucks, two tenders and eleven personnel were used in the fire fight. 2nd alarm resources, which included Station 72, 73, 75 and units from Chelan County Fire District 5, 8 and Douglas County 4 were cancelled en route. The cause of the fire was a debris fire that spread from the winds. Fire was out at 7:44 p.m. 59 minutes and 52 seconds after the 9-1-1 call.

Chief Lemon credits early notification from the home owner and aggressive fire attack from the firefighters for the quick containment and extinguishment of the fire. The chief also wants to remind everyone, while it is cooling off outside, the fuels are still very dry and it does not take much to catch them on fire. All out door fires are required to be monitored until such time as they are completely out.

Mary Louise Emrich


Mary Louise Emrich was born September 28, 1937 in Evanston, Illinois, just outside of Chicago. 

Changes coming to your local newspaper

I've heard it for years now. The Internet is killing newspapers. It's only a matter of time before the Internet will replace the printed word.


Actually as it turns out, the Internet is the best thing that could have happened to local community papers like ours. Let's look at some of the reasons why.

It gives community papers immediacy they could not afford before now

What do I mean by that? Well, in small communities that could not afford to print more than once a week, important local news wasn't available until the next week's edition hit the street. The ability to post news to a website means small local papers can post important news stories immediately.

Websites provide the local paper more ways to share the local news

It took newspapers the better part of the last century to add color photos to the newspaper. Our websites not only include one or two photos about local

events, today we can post entire photo galleries and even videos. Want a sample? Go to the Activities Tab at LeavenworthEcho.com and click on the story – Playing Spiderman, or, just type “playing spiderman” in the search bar at the top of the page.

Time, staff and the cost of printing often limited the amount of content

News and information doesn't happen in convenient packages that perfectly match advertiser support. It has always been true that advertising pays the bills. Subscription revenue has never covered the cost of producing the paper. At best it was hoped subscription revenue would cover the cost of paper and

distribution. With our websites content is only limited by computer storage and server farms are growing. So currently, it is virtually unlimited.

Nearly all consumers are connected to the world through technology

Not everyone has a computer, but nearly everyone today has a cell phone and most have a “smart” phone. That means they have a hand held computer in their pocket or purse. This means they have instant access to the local newspapers website and they can even contribute local news and photos to share with the community.

All of our online content is tracked

Advertisers for years have asked newspapers how they could determine if their advertising was effective. Newspapers developed a number of strategies to help advertisers gage the impact of their ad campaigns. But when the Internet came along digital providers began providing advertisers with hard statistics on the number of

people who actually “clicked” on their ad. Print advertising did not respond and the result has been a steady decline in advertising. National click through rates aren't especially impressive, generally run in the .01% to .02% range. But they have been responsive to advertiser's concerns.

As it turns out, tracking content is not only important to our advertising customers. It is also important to helping us determine what our readers are most interested in. This helps us focus our resources on the issues and events of primary importance to you – our readers.

Each of our local newspapers has had active website for years. In the last year we have made significant changes to the functionality of those sites. One big change is to make sure the site automatically adjusts to fit the screen you are using to view it. Those websites now have more unique online subscribers than print edition subscribers, and those subscribers are

willing to pay for their on-line subscriptions. In fact, many have expressed that they only want on-line access they don't want the printed paper.

Our unique on-line user counts increased by 41% on average last year, while our print subscribers remained nearly the same.

The first rule of marketing is to give the customers what they want. It takes a while for an old dog to learn new tricks, but it is abundantly clear what our readers and advertisers want is accountability and more timely and relevant content.

So, we have begun to make some big changes in the way we publish.

Effective immediately, we are posting stories directly to the websites first. We will no longer hold them until they have appeared in the print edition. Our goal moving forward is to have new content posted every day. That doesn't mean the entire site will change every day, but we will endeavor to post something new every day.

We hope to start posting a “Photo of the Day” every day. We need your help with that since we do not have a full-time photographer at any of our community papers. So, we encourage readers to send us their best photo of life in your local community.
