



Water, sewer rates in Chelan to go up in 2019

CHELAN – Residents of Chelan will see an increase in their monthly water and sewer rates starting as early as 2019.

During the last budget City of Chelan council workshop on Oct. 25, the FCS Group presented new water and sewer monthly rates to the Chelan Council members.

Project Manager Andy Baker, Senior Consultant Brooke Tacía and Analyst Luke Slaughterbeck conducted a 2018 study to help set long term financial management plans, while ensuring financially sustainable utilities and evaluating the cost-of-service and rate design.

The rate study consisted of three steps, first they had to find out how much revenue is needed, who causes those costs and how to charge.

From there the FCS Group was able to calculate results

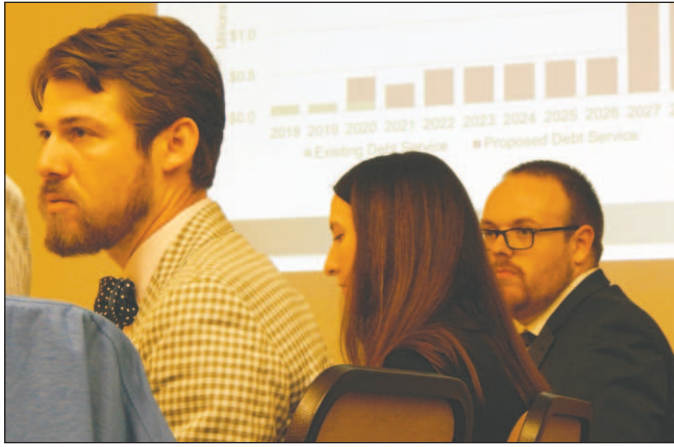

for a 10 year period, focusing on the next five years the most.

It was found that \$11.4 million will be needed in the upcoming years to fund the capital improvements plan. That cost covers annual pipe replacement, collection sys-

tem upsizing, lift station improvements and media replacement.

Such amount of money will mainly come from debt issuances in 2020, 2022 and 2024 equaling 69 percent of the

City of Chelan looking to acquire property near Lake Chelan Airport

Port of Chelan County willing to contribute

CHELAN – The City of Chelan is looking into purchasing another piece property. This time it is a lot owned by the Eugene Kelly located next to the Lake Chelan Airport.

During the Oct. 28 Council Meeting, city attorney Quentin Batjer brought forward such consideration.

“The land owner has notified the City of an offer to purchase that property on certain terms,” said Batjer

The lot is being offered to the City for \$294,000 with \$254,000 down at the time purchase. The remainder \$40,000 would be carried out for five years at five percent interest for a five year term. The five percent interest would only apply in the initial six months, the seller and buyer also split closing costs.

Currently the Lake Chelan Airport is run and maintained by the City, in partnership with the Port of Chelan County.

Due to this, the adjacent property to the airport is key for future operations. Port of Chelan County Deputy Director Jim Kuntz, Executive Director Patrick Jones and Commissioners Rory Turner, gave some feedback on the subject to the Council that evening.

“We think it’s a great asset out there and this is certainly your decision,” said Turner. He also explained to the councilmembers that over time the cost of operation at the

airport will increase. However, Turner added that properties surrounding the airport could help bring in revenue.

Jones also showed his support towards the acquisition, “if you look at long term importance of air transportation to the community, it’s our view and experience that acquiring airport related land with direct access to the runway is a really smart long term investment ... aviation is here to stay.”

According to Jones the Port has seen a bigger demand for hangars at the LCA, which will only keep growing. This growth will also be favorable for opening up businesses around the airport.

At the moment the lack of water access is holding back the airport’s growth.

Kuntz also believes that is a key property, “have that in public ownership, lease it back to generate revenue to reduce the subsidies that our taxpayers are paying.”

Since the Port is airport partners with the City, they will paying half of the property costs after the City purchases it from the Kelly’s.

A bona fide offer was received by Kelly from Kamron Blevins, owner of North Wing. “I am leasing a facility and I realized that unless I can buy a piece, a building and acquire that, having an asset for myself, I cannot afford to keep on paying someone else’s rent,” said Blevins.

Blevins approached Kelly because owning the property is a great opportunity for his business. For 22 years, Blevins has been designing and manufacturing hang gliders, this is consider an “airport related business.”

LCCHC Board votes on surplus property recommendation

USDA funding approved for new hospital

CHELAN – The Lake Chelan Community Hospital and Clinics Board voted on the Facilities Steering Committee recommendation to sell the current hospital property at their Tuesday, Oct. 23 meeting.

LCCHS Board Chair Mary Signorelli presented a drafted resolution which addressed how to deal with surplus property, along with the committee’s recommendation. It’s believed by the District that is in the best interest to sell the property.

However, Board Member Mary Murphy wasn’t quite convinced on moving forward with the resolution without having a letter from USDA. The USDA letter would approve the loan for the new hospital building project.

The signed USDA letter should’ve been delivered on Monday Oct. 22. Yet, for one rea-

son or another the letter wasn’t delivered. It would then arrive in the next upcoming days according to LCCHS Interim CEO Steve Patonai.

“We still don’t have proof of evidence of the ability to build the new facility until we have that in hand,” said Murphy.

Ultimately the resolution would only serve as a way for the Board to show their interest in selling the property. With

that being said, Board Member Jordana Laporte clarified “we are just agreeing to surplus it, we are not picking a price.”

Signorelli explained that at the moment there’s interest from different parties to acquire the property. She also mentioned that the resolution was being presented that day because it was anticipated that

LCCHC receives USDA funding to complete financing package for new hospital building

Chelan – Lake Chelan Community Hospital & Clinics (LCCHC) received USDA loan approval Tuesday, Oct. 23 for a total of \$22,026,000 for the new hospital building project.

“This is the approval we have been waiting to receive,” said LCCHC Board Chair Mary Signorelli. “It represents the diligent work of many, led by our very capable Chief Financial Officer Vickie Bodle, and we are grateful to all involved and to the community for continued support throughout this process.”

“With this approval we are able to move forward on our building process with much gratitude and excitement!”

The new hospital building project is about strategically planning for healthcare services to meet the needs of the Lake Chelan valley in the future, said Steve Patonai, LCCHC interim CEO. “Our goal is to build a facility to help patients receive the

medical care they need, right here, in our community.”

Hospital district residents voted to approve a bond to help fund construction of a new hospital facility in Chelan in April 2017. The cost of the construction project is \$44.5 million, and voters voted to pay \$20 million. The USDA loan, which is a low-interest Department of Agriculture loan, will fund the remainder of the project, as well as grants, hospital funds and donations from the Lake Chelan Health & Wellness Foundation.

The new building, which will be located on hospital-owned property at Apple Blossom Drive, near Wal-Mart and across from the new Columbia Valley Community Health Clinic building, will have private patient rooms, larger birthing rooms, increased outpatient capacity and a larger Emergency Department. It will also have space for Rehabilitative Therapy, Laboratory and Radiology, as well as an expanded Surgery Department and a helicopter pad for emergency transfers. The fully

ADA accessible hospital will be designed for cost effectiveness, said Patonai.

Architects from CollinsWoman have made two site visits to meet with caregivers about space and design of the new facility. With recent loan approval, the architects and general contractor Bouten Construction Company will resume the design process.

“We have concept drawings that will be very helpful,” said Barry Leahy, project manager. “Our next step is to finalize those and begin the permitting process through USDA, the city of Chelan and the Department of Health. If all comes together as hoped, we hope to break ground in 2019 and complete the building in 2021.”

Bouten Construction Company, based in Spokane, has been a regional leader in healthcare construction for more than 70 years, building some of the largest and most complex facilities from eastern Washington to western Montana, as well as critical access hospitals like LCCHC.

CEO Recruitment Update:

LCCHC Board Chair Mary Signorelli, informed that four candidates were interviewed via video last week. All candidates were of “fine quality” and the Board was very impressed with them all. The candidates have been invited into town and will visit the Lake Chelan Community Hospital to continue with the interviewing process.

The first candidate was interviewed on Sunday, Oct. 28 and Monday Oct. 29. The second candidate will arrive Nov. 2 and 3, the following two days will be reserved for the third candidate and lastly on Nov. 6 and 7 the last candidate will be interviewed.

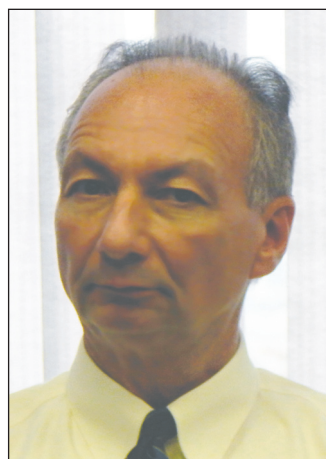

the USDA letter would already be in hand.

If the Board tabled the resolution for the next meeting which is at the end of November, by then it would be harder to put it in the market. Signorelli also stated that they don't want the parties to lose interest in the property by having them wait for too long.

After further discussion the Board voted on the resolution and it was agreed that it would be dated once the USDA funding letter was received. The board has received the letter. See separate story.

The airport currently has a budget of \$170,000 which according to Finance Director Steve Thornton purchasing the property at the moment is very tight. The money in the budget at the moment provides all the cash flow for operations and it also supports equipment replacement at the airport.

Turner stated, “if financing is an issue, the Port could step in and help somehow if that

helps you. Again it is Council decision and we want to be supportive in whatever way we can.”

That evening there was a lot of variables on the table and Council needs more information in order to get a full clear picture of the gains and losses of purchasing the parcel.

The City has until Nov. 9 to act on this and notify Kelly if they are interested in the offer. A final say for the property acquisition will be put on hold until the Nov. 6 budget workshop.

total cost. The remainder of the money will come from General Facility Charges and Rate Funded Capital.

Based on the findings a rate design was completed along with recommendations from the FCS Group.

They suggest to continue with the monthly charge per ERU, for all customers along with incorporating the Utility Tax in the rate, this way billing is simplified.

For example, in 2018 the monthly rate per ERU is of \$36.58 plus the Utility Tax per ERU of \$3.48, which is equal to \$40.06. In 2019, the monthly rate will be of \$43.46 with the Utility Tax already included.

In the last four years there has only been a 1.5 percent increase to sewer rates, therefore FCS Group recommended rate adjustments. In the next two years residents will see rates raise by 8.5 percent.

The water rate study, had a different story. In the 10 years FCS Group estimated that \$33 million dollars will be spent for capital improvements.

That is \$370,000 a year for pipe replacement, \$8.3 million for transmission/distribution system improvements. The Water Treatment Plant capacity expansion alone will cost \$14 million, however this im-

provement will not be needed until approximately 2027.

More than half of the funding for the improvements will come from the new debt issuances.

In the next five years water rates will increase by 5.75 percent, it will not be until 2024 when residents will see a drastic 15 percent spike.

Peak demand for water comes mainly from single family homes, while it was found that multifamily homes do not.

Based on this, rate design recommendations were given to the Council deal with including Utility Tax in the water rate, removing separate booster charge, setting the indoor water use allowance at 7,000 gallons per unit and establishing a “peaking tier” at 40,000 gallons per units which would only apply to single family and multifamily homes.

Those who reach the “peaking tier” will then be charged per gallon after the established 7,000 gallons. Which means that during the summer time residents could potentially see their billing statement increase.

When it comes time for the new rates to kick in, the City will make communicate why they are doing it, while also focusing their attention in educating residents on water conservation.

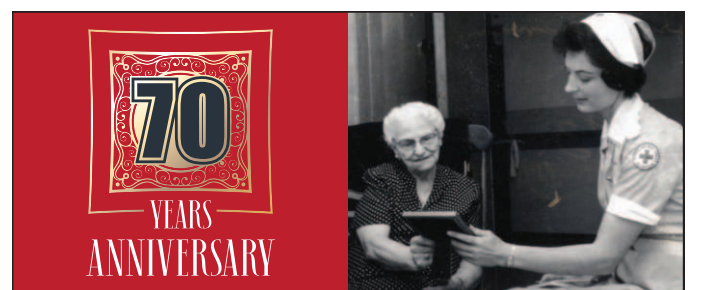

Consumers Pay Higher Gas Prices

Washington already has the third highest gasoline prices in the nation, and I-1631 would drive these prices even higher. An independent study shows that I-1631 would increase gasoline prices by 13 cents per gallon in the first year, with automatic increases every year, indefinitely. These increases would quadruple to 59 cents more per gallon within 15 years.

Hurts Families and Small Businesses

Families and small businesses would face higher costs for gasoline, heating fuel, natural gas, electricity and other goods and services.
