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Manson Community Council debates on Blackcap Farm support

MANSON - Blackcap Farm representatives were present at the Manson Community Council meeting on Sept. 18 to request the council's support for the Sept. 19 hearing.

"Blackcap Farm has come out and spoken to the public, there's an email I received from Guy and it has information and details about the process and I have the staff report right here from the County," said Council Chair Kim Ustanik.

"The staff has recommended approval, it is a good report of the public process, the modifications and the plan they have taken place in response to this project," added Ustanik.

She clarified that Blackcap Farm requested that they make affirmative vote or statement on these things, "the project fits into the zoning as prescribed by the Community UGA in 2009, the project has followed all applicable rules and has modified details in line of public comment, the project offers needed housing to Manson community, the project features an inclusive design with trails and open spaces that connect it to the larger neighborhoods, said Ustanik.

Real Estate agent Guy Evans, developer Ed Gallaudet and architectural designer/ engineer Jonathan Davis, were present to answer any question the council had regarding Blackcap Farm.

The first to talk was Evans, "the project has come a long way .. it doesn't allow any vacation rentals as we discussed, we are just here to request the support from

the council."

Both Kathy Blum and Kathy Miller did not get a chance to look at the staff report before the meeting. Due to this a member of the public requested the council to postpone making a decision that night and waiting for the next meeting.

"The hearing is tomorrow,

so depending on what these folks right here say or agree to, if there is a comment, it would be made by us as a group or we would decline to make a comment. Those who have had the opportunity to read or will read it tonight will have the opportunity to make their own individual comment," replied Ustanik.

Regardless of this request by Blackcap Farm, Miller stated that she addressed a letter to the Chelan County Department of Community Development. "I did have concerns, basically being an orchardist, I really have a problem with the prime development being so close to an active farming orchard. They said that they were going to advise to whoever bought the homes in that area that there will be an orchard practice next to them ... I still have a concern with rental properties, I think it is neat idea but they could only have 30 day rentals which I find it very hard to enforce ... I have a great deal of concern with the closeness of the homes and not having adequate position for the EMTs and emergency department to get close to a fire and the homes being so close together," said Miller as to what some of her concerns were.

Along with that, Miller stated, "I don't think there has been adequate notice of the public hearing, I heard some people were not even aware that this meeting was going to be due on the 19."

Miller informed the representatives that Brian Patterson made the council aware that the hearing was going to take place, she also stated that the County didn't informed them about the

hearing until about a week and a half ago.

"Knowing that the community was so against this project before, I would like to see another open meeting just to receive some information ... I would support this project if we had another open meeting," Miller said.

On the other hand Kathy Blum stated, "I agree with Kathy's point on the housing being near the orchard and the practices that are going on there. My problem is, one gentleman was killed there this summer because he was walking in the middle of the street in the dark and numerous times this summer, there were people walking on Manson Boulevard towards Manson and I watched a lot of people hit the brakes, go around. I am not saying

What is next for **Manson Parks?**

MANSON - During the Manson Community Council Meeting on Sept. 18, Manson Park and Recreation Director Robin Pittman had updates for the council and the attendees.

'We had announced earlier that we were attempting to acquire the property at Ernie's and we are very, very disappointed to say that it didn't worked out ... we put a lot time and energy into it and it just did not worked out," said Pittman.

Since they were not able to acquire the property, now Parks is talking about making improvements to Manson Bay Park. "Right now we are in talks with the PUD just

able to purchase Ernie's, "we were working with a local group that was willing to fund it, wholly with us paying them back ... these are some locals who are really familiar, particularly with gas station properties. They were not willing to move forward without an environmental study being done, we needed 40 days, when we had the paper work ready to sign, they got an offer of no contingencies, cash in one week and everything we had, that night they got an offer, the perfect offer for a gas station." Campbell reported to the council that he has spoken to the current owners letting them know that Parks is still interested in that property. "I do not know if it's out of the question, but nonetheless it's a huge disappointed from our part," he said. Kim Ustanik offered the council's total support to Parks in case it is needed. "So many people in the community are pro Manson Parks and I think that whatever is needed if the word is put out there the public will always support the parks," said Kathy Blum.

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Brown describes those four days as a "conference of

CHELAN - Back in 2012, 39 community members were part of the very first Thriller dance in Chelan. It is now back and the community will be able to witness the more than a dozen zombies dancing in Downtown Chelan on Wednesday, Oct. 31 at 6 p.m.

"It started off as lady's bucket list item and she asked me to teach her Thriller," said Jen Phillips.

That first Thriller happened, Phillips described it as "magical ... we did it again two years afterwards and we didn't get as many people." Due to this it took a while to bring Thriller back up again.

The other day Phillips saw a lady that was involved with Thriller years back, "when

This year around 35 are participating in Thriller, 20 of them from Chelan, eight from Manson and eight from Wenatchee. Phillips wants these group of people to "discover their own genius,"

while bringing their own magic and having fun while dancing.

"What I love is that we get to break social taboos such laying down in the middle of the street, staring at strangers, we are not trying at all to fit in," said Phillips.

By doing this, Phillips gets

to meet friends of all ages she never knew she had, "they are my instant friends, it's like a little community."

For the first time Natalie Jenkins will be dancing Thriller, "I wanted to get more involved with the com-

Pittman also reported that Parks has gotten feedback from the community, "everybody wants to see more water access, everybody wants to see more green space and see what type of improvements we can do on that."

Parks has been facing other bumps along the way, some having to do with the state's RCO Grant. "What happened there was that the PUD was making some changes and we are no longer able to use RCO Grants on PUD land, so that was a big hit," Pittman said.

Manson Parks Board Chairman Rob Campbell explained why Parks wasn't

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Teacher of the Year and I just went into it with the feeling of I'm going to speak from my heart and I know that when I do that whatever happens is going to be positive ... it felt less of a competitive thing," said Brown.

The students, staff and

administration showed total support to Brown. "The day before I felt, I went to get a District vehicle and the entire school had put sticky notes on the inside of the car with just really meaningful notes and I was just great until I made it to the car, it was a lot of emotions," explained Brown.

He said he read the sticky notes before doing the panel

interview in Olympia, "it was a nice reminder of who I am representing and why I am doing what I am doing." He will now frame every single sticky note as a memory that will last forever.

"I am very appreciative of the staff and the administration they have really helped the program to thrive," Brown described how much the music program in Manson has

grown over the years. "This program started as high school band of 18 and now we have over a third of the high school in music and over 90 percent of the middle school is in music," he stated.

Every sixth grader in Manson has the opportunity to play music regardless of any factor, "it's because of the community support, the staff support, parents and administration."

Now Brown has a few goals in mind, "I still plan on being a voice for small schools, for music educators as well and for those that are in both situations, in small schools and as music teachers ... and to spread positivity what I mean is looking at situations and going to them with a solution ... it can change lives."

Orchard Arsenic and Lead Legacy

An effective means of controlling pests in orchards was to spray the trees with a mix of lead and/or arsenic. This practice continued into the 1950s. As lead and arsenic are elements. they do not go away. As such old orchards are often locations of residual contamination. Other pesticides may be present as well from past agricultural activities, but the long term use of lead and arsenic simply do not go away.

"Conversion of agricultural land to residential or other uses has created a potential risk to human health due to the residual soil contamination. Washington State Department of Ecology has been attempting to address this issue and has conducted numerous soil cleanups where schools have been located on former orchards with elevated lead and arsenic levels in the soil," Dan McShane/July 28, 2016

How to donate blood

A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.
