City Council gives Planning Commission

CHELAN – On September 4, the City of Chelan held a joint City Council and Planning Commission workshop at City Hall.

Chelan Mayor Mike Cooney opened up the workshop by thanking the Planning Commission for all the work they have done. "We want to recognize the hard work the Planning Commission does behind the scenes," said Cooney.

The evening's agenda was

The following proposals have been examined by the Planning Commission and are very complex. During the meeting Sarah Schrock presented each agenda item to the Council and then Council gave the Planning Commission feedback.

The Shoreline Master Program for short term vacation rentals - currently the ordinance doesn't speak about vacation rentals at all, now the Planning Commission is thinking about locals wanting to rent out their boats. Due to this the Commission drafted a code amendment to the Shoreline Master Program to address those concerns

The changes include, allowing overnight rentals night rentals on boats will be limited to two to 30 days. All Overnight rentals on boats are subject to a Conditional Use permit and will also require special conditions for parking, occupancy, access and length of stay.

To this the Council had different comments, specially on waste disposal and how it will all work with a boat.

At the end it was agreed that talks with Sunset Marina should take place, that way the Commission could get a more in-depth idea of what they do when it comes down to short boat vacation rentals. Revisions to the Inadver-

CHELAN – The Living Well with Diabetes workshop returns Friday, September 14 at the Lake Chelan Community Hospital.

The program originated at Standford and it lasts for six weeks, each Friday participants will learn how to better manage their diabetes.

The free workshop runs from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in the Hospital Board Room. Celest Thomas and Agustin Benegas will be running the sessions, both of them are certified leaders.

Participants will receive a free book containing lots of helpful information and they are more than welcome to bring a support partner or their caregiver to the sessions.

"This is great opportunity for people to come together and support one another," said Thomas.

This makes the second diabetes workshop offered through the LCCH, it was so popular within the community Thomas and Benegas decided to reopen

the course.

"Diabetes is huge problem in the community with very high numbers," said Benegas

Thomas and Benegas will teach about healthy eating, safe exercise, managing medications, preventing low blood sugar, dealing with depression and stress and working with a healthcare team.

Each session focuses on problem-solving, decisionmaking and coping skills which helps with live planning and accountability, "we want to empower the patients," Thomas added.

"I really saw a lot of progress from people who were in our class, really embracing life and improving their quality of life," said Thomas.

Development on former orchard lands addressed in joint workshop

CHELAN – During the Sept. 4 joint workshop between the Chelan City Council and Planning Commission a discussion regarding development on former orchard lands was raised.

In response to the ongoing discussion at all levels, the Planning Commission went back to the Subdivision Code to find a way to better address the issue.

The proposal the Planning Commission came up with is a three step process. 1.Identify

2.Disclose

3.Choose a Track – Track 1 Voluntary Soil Testing or Track 2 SEPA

For example, if they answer "NO" to " was the land an orchard before 1950?" they proceed with the subdivision, if it's "YES" it will be required to have a Plat Disclosure which will read "Historical agricultural use of this land may present a health risk due to the possible presence of residual concentrations of pesticides, including lead, arsenic, or organochlorine." The applicant will go on to step three, there

they have two different options. The could chose to voluntary do soil testing or through SEPA procedures.

Depending on the results of voluntary soil testing there could be three outcomes.

1.No contaminants -No further requirements, **Optional Disclosure note** change on plat.

2.Residual levels under DOE limits - Additional Plat Disclosure.

3.Residual levels above DOE limits - Additional Plat Disclosure and deed restrictions, Additional Dust

Mitigation and Limit soul contact through BMPs. See graphic A3.

"To have them voluntary do the soil testing to me is up front planning," said Craig Gildroy.

However it was not clear to councilmember Ray Dobbs, why they are trying to avoid SEPA.

"We are making it easier for the developer to not jump through all of the processes that SEPA has put in place and they are the experts in the area and we are having

Second Senior Living Summit to be held Wed., Sept. 26, at Senior Center

CHELAN - "It's time to report back to the community," said Mary Murphy, Senior Living Initiative facilitator, "on what has been accomplished with the specific initiatives adopted at the Senior Living Summit held two years ago." In that 2016 Summit, attended by over 100 community members, recommendations were made to:

1) Expand services to assist more seniors to live in their homes as long as possible, such as transportation and affordable home care.

2) Build a Campus of Care that offers many services in one location near town, school, hospital, and a walkable environment, maintaining a sense of community and neighborhood.

Those two objectives became the focus for task forces of the Senior Living Initiative.

The task force working on the first objective, the expansion of services in the home, was headed by Kathy Miller. Under the umbrella of In Home Services, two programs were brought forward: Tender Loving Care for Seniors and the Chelan Valley Community Nurse programs.

The second objective, building a Campus of Care, was headed by Amanda Ballou. As CEO of Heritage Heights, she develops and executes strategy, under the direction of the Board of Directors. Heritage Heights, as local non-profit organization with a 20-year operating history, has undertaken due diligence on investment in this expansion on behalf of the community.

The upcoming Summit is open to the public. To be held on Wednesday, September 26th, from 5-7 pm at the Chelan Senior Center at 534 E. Trow,

the agenda will bring the community up-to-date on the accomplishments of both task forces. The Summit has been underwritten with support from the Community Services Council, Lake Chelan Chamber of Commerce, and Heritage Heights.

Tender Loving Care for Seniors (TLC) was modeled after the successful Guardian Angel program established by our neighbors to the north, in the Methow. The TLC program was welcomed under the sponsorship of Chelan Valley Hope. TLC manager Kathy Miller will be joined by coordinator Claudia

Swenson in describing the results delivered to seniors in the Chelan Valley. Funded by a grant from United Healthcare and donations from caring individuals, the TLC program has recruited and trained volunteers and has become an active support

to seniors and their families, who deal with the many challenges of ag-

ing, and an advocate in raising awareness of the needs of seniors who stay in their homes.

A complimentary but separate Chelan Valley Community Nurse program, developed by Michelle Jerome under the sponsorship of the Lutheran Church, addresses more clinical needs and assessments. Both programs assist seniors in accessing other resources. Kathy, Claudia, and Michelle will share their experiences in the Summit.

On the Campus of Care initiative, Heritage Heights has taken leadership. Funded by a grant from the Community Foundation of North Central Washington, Heritage Heights' board of directors selected speaker John Shoesmith, AIA, LEED AP, NACRB, of ShoesmithCox Architects, PLLC, to guide the pre-design process for a Campus of Care. Sites were identified and feasibility evaluated. The Board intends to make a final decision on the site by the end of this year. The Board, through Amanda, has also reached out to explore potential partnerships with other organizations who have developed similar projects.

Chelan Fire and Rescue awarded a third FEMA grant

Chelan Fire and Rescue, in conjunction with Chelan **County Fire Protection District** 8 (Entiat) and Douglas County Fire Protection District 4 (Orondo) were notified this week that we have been awarded a third FEMA grant in the amount of \$829,011. The purpose of this grant is to replace all the Self Contain Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) and spare air bottles in all three departments. This specialized piece of equipment provides firefighters with breathing air when working in an IDLH (Immediately Dangerous to Life and Health) environment such as a house fire filled with smoke or a chemical spill.

"This is a huge benefit to the local fire departments that have been using aging SCBAs with

actual practical interventions required and if something happened there was really nothing I could do about it ... there was little to nothing that I could do to make sure that my kids were safe in the classroom."

Hunter then wanted to be prepared for any situation in his future he could encounter. At that time he was still young and wanted to give law enforcement a try, "if I have the opportunity to do something different that would still provide for my family I would do that."

In 2015, Hunter was picked up by Chelan County Sheriff Department. "I am very grateful to be working here, because I do believe that this agency has the right idea about the role that law enforcement plays with the general public," said Hunter.

This is Hunter's first time

an increasing maintenance cost," said Chief Tim Lemon. Replacing all of the old SCBAs provides improved safety for all of our members and a decrease in maintenance costs. Additionally each district will see a cost savings by not having to replace out of service SCBAs.

Chelan Fire and Rescue has received three FEMA grants in the last three years:

• FEMA SAFER Grant for six firefighters fully funded for two years in the amount of \$895,434

• FEMA Regional SAFER Grant for a Volunteer Recruit and Retention Coordinator fully funded for four years in the amount of \$947.534

• FEMA Regional AFG for new SCBAs in the amount of \$829,011

Total grant funds in the last three years: \$2,671.979

as a SRO and he sees this new position as a new opportunity. He is responsible for the public safety, however Hunter is also there for community support.

So far his experience working for both Districts has been very positive. He claims that both Chelan and Manson Schools are very similar which makes it easier for him to leave one school and go to the next one, he wears the same "hat" at all the schools he monitors.

Currently, Deputy Hunter is working on getting to know the students at the different schools and building a healthy relationship with the staff.

A personal goal of his to understand the culture of both Chelan and Manson and what is like to be from a small town community.

Deputy Hunter encourages everyone to speak out if they sense risk or threat, "we are here to make Chelan a safer place."

CHELAN - Chelan Fire and Rescue will not be retaining the six SAFER Grant Firefighter/EMT positons after funding runs out on December 31, 2018. This will reduce the career duty shift staff from 12 (four per shift) employees back to six firefighters (two per shift), which provides two career firefighter on-duty 24 hours a day 87% of the time. The balance of the time is when we anticipate one of the two member crew will be offduty on approved leave and/ or hour reduction days (Kelly Days). This is the same shift staffing level the department had from 2009 through 2016.

While this is a significant reduction in staffing, CFR is working diligently to reconfigure the remaining staff and solicit additional support from our volunteer firefighters. CFR's goal is to maintain four firefighters on duty as much of the time as possible. This staffing model is heavily dependent on volunteer






