

# Chelan Basin Conservancy joins Earthjustice on SEPA fight

CHELAN - A little over two months ago, the City of Chelan proposed to raise applicability thresholds for project review under the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA). With this change, certain proposed residential developments on contaminated old orchard lands could avoid SEPA review and avoid addressing potential lead and arsenic contamination in the soil.

In response, local residents contacted the Earthjustice office in Seattle to alert them on this issue, under the belief that this proposal violated SEPA regulations.

Earthjustice, the largest nonprofit environmental law organization in the country, agreed to submit public comments against the proposed increases in SEPA applicability thresholds by the City of Chelan.

Earthjustice is working on behalf of members of the Chelan Basin Conservancy, and in their August 14 comment letter they concluded that, "in sum, the City may not move forward with a

categorical exemption for new development on former orchard land due to the likelihood of exposing residents, including children and pregnant women, to unsafe levels of lead and arsenic. A categorical exemption that includes such human health risks does not comply with state law and is inconsistent with the City's obligation to protect some of its most

vulnerable residents and visitors from a known severe public health hazard."

As many locals know, the Chelan Valley has had a long history of the agricultural industry dealing with contaminated soil due to pesticide and herbicide application. Between about 1905 and 1948, the legal use of lead arsenate as a pesticide in orchards caused surface soils to become contaminated with lead and arsenic well above health-based thresholds established by the Washington Department of Ecology (DOE).

In 2003, a study was conducted by the Washington DOE, utilizing 815 surface soil samples within the greater Manson area. It was

## New Chelan Agriculture **Education Teacher and FFA Advisor**

CHELAN - After teaching for seven years away from home in East Wenatchee and Oregon, Bailey Dezellem found her way closer to her family in Brewster, as the new CTE Agriculture Education teacher and FFA Advisor for Chelan High School.

"Around here a lot of kids work in the orchards or show at fairs because of the resources that are available," said Dezellem.

Dezellem "likes being able to see the kids find something they get excited about ... opportunities for kids to take pride in something they have done is so cool to me."

This year she is planning to make the classroom her own, "the FFA side of things to me is a student organization so what the students want to do with it is more up to them I am there to advise them and push them to be successful."

As the FFA advisor she would love to see many more kids spark some interest in FFA, "let's see where this takes us over the next couple of years," said Dezellem.

## Chelan, Manson schools to share resource officer, new finance director named

Council signs off on some awaiting agreements

CHELAN - The Chelan City Council covered several agenda items at the August 28 meeting.

It has been a few weeks since John Olson requested the city to help with the Chelan Senior Center improvements for more public parking at the east end of the ballfields by the river. In a previous meeting Public Works expressed their interest to assist with some relative minor improvements to the ballfields.

Olson listed unique considerations to transportations issues beyond parking. One of them being having two state highways meeting right in the middle of town, funneling all of the traffic in the downtown. The wide variation between summer and winter demands, is another issue Olson spoke about.

Reports state that Chelan has over two million visitors per year and those numbers will likely grow as time goes by. Olson's "viable solution is to separate people from their parked cars with an efficient and effective summer bus system." He encouraged

the council "to think outside the box and to plan for the future."

After following up with Chelan and Manson schools superintendents on sharing one school resource officer (Deputy Hunter) between both school districts and clearing up all concerns, the council agreed on moving forward with amending the agreement.

This change is not concrete and if any problems with the students tend to

happen the agreement will resolve and go back to the old way.

The second floor of the Chelan Library will be leased to the Living Stone Church, after they formally submitted their request to the city. A three year agreement was agreed on with a monthly rent of \$1,400 with a one additional renewal of the contract.

HDCA Woodin Avenue Landing Project will move forward after the council

agreed on executing the agreement with them. HDCA agreed to sign a charitable donation agreement of \$168,279.45 which will cover bonding costs and interests. The HDCA will make payments to the city twice per vear for the next 15 years, HDCA will also donate other monetary amounts towards the design, construction and landscaping of the project.

Councilmember Wendy Isenhart claims to be excited for the project because it will be a "great water access."

Mayor Mike Cooney emphasize the great partnership the city and the HDCA have. He believes this project would not have moved forward without Erin Mc-Cardle's guidance.

On Tuesday, September 27 at 6 p.m. at the Chelan Senior Center a Town Hall Meeting will take place. The lead subject will be whether or not the community is interested in purchasing land on the Butte.

Nine hundred and forty acres of land are for sale and the Mayor wants the community's input on the subject. This land could be put aside for future generations, however the city can't do it by itself.

The whole county is invited to attend, "if it looks

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

found that almost 90 percent of surface soil samples collected from old orchard lands had arsenic concentrations exceeding the DOE threshold for residential land use.

Lead and arsenic can be extremely harmful to humans, especially children. In the long run, such exposure can lead to slowed childhood brain development and cancer.

Dr. Brian Patterson, a local resident and retired environmental scientist, has completed calculations comparing the potential lead exposure to children living in a home in the Chelan Valley located on old orchard land that has not been mitigated, to potential exposure to children drinking lead-contaminated drinking water in Flint, Michigan in 2015.

The calculations show that the potential lead exposure to a child in a house on old orchard land is higher than for a child drinking municipal water in Flint, Michigan.

Dr. Patterson's calculations have been reviewed and validated by a toxicologist at the University of Washington School of Public Health.

SEPA regulations were first approved in 1971, with the goal of protecting the health and welfare of people within the state of Washington. Under these regulations, local government entities such as cities and counties, are required to ensure that projects subject to SEPA review do not result in "probable significant adverse environmental impacts.

SEPA review for residential subdivisions in Chelan is conducted by the City, while SEPA review for residential subdivisions in Manson is conducted by the County.

In the Chelan Valley many large residential developments partly located on old orchard land

have undergone SEPA review over the last 20 years. Some of those developments include:

- The Lookout in Chelan · Northlake Division II in
- The Village in Manson · Summer Breeze in Man-
- Wapato Terrace II in Man-
- Manzanita Court in Man-· Northshore Village in Man-

Although located on old orchard land, none of these developments were required to test for, or potentially mitigate, lead and/or arsenic in the soil.

In the last 10 months, various new proposed residential

> nic contamination, including mitigating potential exposure to future residents if lead and/or arsenic levels exceed thresholds.

Currently under SEPA review are Holiday Hills in Chelan, Marita's Vineyard Village west of Chelan, and Blackcap Farm in Manson. Representatives of these developments are being pressured by community members to test the soil for lead and arsenic and come up with a mitigation plan. Soil testing at the Holiday Hills and Blackcap Farm locations has demonstrated that both have extensive lead and arsenic contamination, whereas the land at Marita's Vineyard Village has yet to be tested.

The Chelan Planning Commission and the Chelan City Council held a joint workshop on Tuesday, September 4, to discuss developments of new city ordinances to address issues related to development on old orchard lands in Chelan (See story on next week's paper)

their name after reading the Honor Code just to ensure they are fully aware of it.

"It is very important that you cover this with your son or daughter and make sure they understand the Honor Code. It's a privilege to be a Chelan Goat and a Chelan Pirate and we have expectations that represent our community," said Rainville.

Some examples covered in the Honor Code are:

- Dishonorable Behavior
- · Possession of drugs and/ or alcohol

The District has high expectations for the athletes and they will be consequences if they go against the Honor Code.

Students who are also involved in other extracurricular activities need to pay double the attention to the Honor Code. To paint a clear picture Rainville played off this scenario for the students, "if I am an athlete, I play volleyball and I am an elected ASB officer, it doesn't only ding my athletic club it also dings my club."

The students Academic Success is another thing Rainville went over at the meeting. He reminded parents that every couple weeks grade checks are going to be happening and their students need to be responsible for getting those grades and signatures from their teachers.

Transportation from games is another major issue students and their parents must be aware of. Keep in mind that a parent must signed out their kid with their coach on paper before leaving the event. When riding with other parents there needs to be approval by all parties. Absolutely no student driving other students is allowed, "we want to make sure kids are safe, that they always make it home safe."

Unexcused absences will not allow the student athlete to play or practice for that day. Rainville also requested all parties to be respectful of each other in social media

platforms and mentioned instead to talk it out if there are any problems to be addressed.

Rainville encouraged parents to follow the Parent Involvement and Communication Plan. A copy of the plan was handed out at the beginning of the meeting. In it parents can find the following;

- · Parent/Coach Relation-
- Communication you should expect from your child's coach
- · Communication coaches expect
- Appropriate concerns to discuss with coaches
- Example questions to ask a coach
- Issues not appropriate to
- discuss with Coaches · Communication Proto-
- Key reminders
- · Parents Code of Conduct

This plan will help increase the communication with parents in a correct manner, "we got a lot of great kids, a lot of great coaches and we got a lot of great parents."

Recognition for Student Athlete of the Week will continue on for this year, one middle school athlete and one high school athlete will be picked every week, "they get a gift certificate, their picture and they get some sort of award."

Parents were also notified that their help is needed. Helpers will be taking care of score clocks, lines for volleyball, chain crews, tickets and PA announcing. If parents volunteer for at least three games, Rainville will provide them a pass for all games.

Lastly, an Athletic Summit is in the works for September. The District wants people's input in order for the Athletic department to come up with a philosophy to live by, this philosophy will make the programs work a lot better said Rainville.

## Statewide partnership preparing for annual count Sept. 25-27


Counting on volunteers to tally people who walk and bike

OLYMPIA - Each year, the number of people who choose to walk, ride bicycles or take other active travel means as their mode of transportation is increasing in Washington. How do we know? Volunteers annually count the number of people who walk or ride bicycles at selected locations during a three-day survey. For those who would like to help, volunteer registration is now open https://bikepedcount.wsdot.wa.gov for this year's survey starting Tuesday, Sept. 25.

Volunteers are vital to the success of this project, and about 400 people are needed for the count. For the 2017 count, volunteers tallied more than 63,500 people biking and walking in ington. In 2017, the number of people who walked, biked or used other active modes increased 4 percent over the 2016 count, when evaluating comparable sites.

For this 11th annual survey, the Washington State

Department of Transportation and Cascade Bicycle Club https://www.cascade. org/ are partnering with FeetFirst http://www.feetfirst.org/, Washington Bikes http://wabikes.org/ and Futurewise http://futurewise. org/ to help count the number of people bicycling and walking Tuesday, Sept. 25, through Thursday, Sept. 27.

"This volunteer effort makes sure that people who bike and walk are counted

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as essential users of the transportation system," said WSDOT Active Transportation Division Director Barb Chamberlain. "Each year that volunteers make the collection process possible, we get a more robust picture of the growth in active transportation."

"We're excited to once again work with the Washington State Department of Transportation to ensure that biking and walking counts across Washington state," said Richard Smith, Executive Director of Cascade Bicycle Club, "This is possible only because of the hundreds of volunteers who care about safer biking and walking."

Data collected during the count is used by state and local agencies to estimate demand; measure the benefit of bicycle and pedestrian project investments; and improve policies, project designs and funding opportunities. The data also helps agencies understand how and where to address active transportation options for people who don't have the income to choose other transportation alternatives. For these people, walking and biking might be their only mode, or part of a multimodal trip to access transit.

As WSDOT embarks on an update to the statewide active transportation plan, this effort will shape the vision of a future with a complete, comfortable network for all ages and abilities.

In addition to the annual count, WSDOT, Cascade Bicycle Club, and local agencies are partnering to install permanent counters at locations around the state. ## Democrats are favoring socialism in 2018 elections



# Current Chelan PUD Commissioner Randy Smith wants to stay on board

CASHMERE -- Chelan Public Utility District Commissioner Randy Smith, who is a retired orchardist from here, has decided to run for reelection. NCW Media Managing Editor Gary Bégin was able to catch up with the super busy Smith and pose a few questions about his reasons for running for office again. His answers follow:

NCW Media: How long have you been on the Board and why do you want to remain?

Randy Smith: I've been on the board for 12 years and have found the position to be a tremendous opportunity to provide policy guidance for delivering the services to our county residents that we all take for granted, electricity, water, and for a limited group, waste water. Also to help lay out the roadmap for the next essential utility service, fiber optics, to reach the maximum number of people possible in Chelan County. All of these utility services are continually a work In progress, and I'd like to be there for the next six years to help ensure that we "stay the course" in how we are providing all of these for our customer/ owners

NCW Media: Why is bitcoin and block chain technology regulation so important to our electric grid?

Smith: While I do not pretend to understand how bitcoin really works, what I do know is that we have to get our policies regarding large installations right to protect our Chelan County residents. We understand that bitcoin can consume a HUGE amount of electricity, and could leave literally overnight leaving stranded infrastructure that costs millions of dollars to install. Those policies need to include the right price for the

electricity and the right amount of upfront payment from the operators for infrastructure improvements, to ensure that we don't get stuck with those costs if they leave.

have you completed and/or started as a PUD Commissioner that you are proud to point to?

Smith: Several years ago in 2013, the Commission and Senior Management embarked on a very large outreach during our Strategic Planning Process. We had several thousand Chelan County residents engaged in this process. What came out of that process is nothing short of astounding ... we would not have done many of these things without the public input: Free day use passes at our parks operated by the State Parks system; A slow sustainable buildout of our fiber optics network; The creation of a "Hydro Research Institute". One that we were in the process of doing, and was reaffirmed by the public was to pay down our debt. We have now paid down nearly 50% of our debt from over a billion dollars eight years ago, to a little over \$500 million today ... and more reductions are planned. Lastly, and maybe most importantly, was how our customers were looking to the future and saying, "reinvest in our assets", meaning, make sure that our dams and other facilities were ready to go for another 50-100 years. We are in the beginning stages of a very large reinvestment in our dams and facilities.

NCW Media: Are there plans for more power production in general and especially for those aforementioned new

Smith: With our current large production of electricity, there are no immediate plans for additional power production. However, if there was customer demand for the new technologies,

NCW Media: If you had one paragraph to educate the public about the purpose of the PUD, in your vision, what would you say?

Smith: PUD's are publicly owned not for profit utilities dedicated to the belief that local decision making can produce the best results and lowest costs possible that our customers want in their utility services. We are not driven to produce profits for sharehold-

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affairs and always try to make decisions with my eyes on the future of our utility. Maybe most importantly is that my 12 years of experience gives me the insights to how to best move our utility forward in a rapidly changing world. NCW Media: Is selling pow-

er to other areas of the state a profitable venture?

Smith: The very short answer is YES. With the addition of wind and solar power as a mandate for utilities at the state level, the profitability has been diminished, but we are working to get recognition of our "renewable" hydro in the near future which should enhance our prices.

NCW Media: Tell the readers about the PUD partial ownership of alternative power source such as the windfarm.

Smith: Chelan PUD owns 8 megawatts of phase 1 of the 9 Canyons Wind Farm near the Tri-Cities. That was purchased nearly 20 years ago when wind power was in its infancy. To put that in perspective, we use around 210 megawatts to serve Chelan County residents, so this represents about 4% of our usage. Our utility has always attempted to be supportive of the exploration of energy generation research, and this

ownership is part of that seeing just how it would work in our regional energy supply.

NCW Media: What are your goals if elected to another term?

Smith: If reelected, this will be my last term. In looking at the next 6 years, we have many opportunities ahead of us. We are doing major rehabilitation of Rock Island Dam, which should be just about complete during that time. We are working to modernize the Columbia River Treaty (With Canada) which expires In 2024, and if negotiated well, could enhance our revenues for many years into the future. Maybe most importantly we are In the beginning stages of putting together our application to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission for the relicensing of Rock Island Dam. Our current license expires in 2028. These licenses normally for 50 years in duration, so the requirements within them we have to live with for that time period. This will be an exciting time to utilize the experience I have gained over the past 12 years to provide input into all of the above items for the benefit of the people of Chelan County.

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



ENTIAT - Recreationists longing to visit their favorite campsite in the Entiat River Valley are able to do so as of August 31. The successful construction of fire containment lines and decreasing fire activity have allowed a partial reopening of the Entiat River Valley.


While some areas will remain closed for public safety, Fox Creek, Lake Creek, Silver Falls, and Cottonwood campgrounds will reopen Friday. Shady Pass Road #5900, North Fork Entiat Trailhead, and trails within the Glacier Peak Wilderness area on the Entiat Ranger District will also be open and accessible. In addition, the Chiwawa River Road, and campgrounds and trails off that road, will be

"Public and firefighter safety remain our number one priority, so we encourage people to use caution as fire fighters and fire vehicle traffic will be in the area," Entiat District Ranger James Simino said.

To ensure public safety, road and trail closures remain in effect in the Tommy Creek, Mad River, Upper Mad River, Potato Creek, and Mud Creek areas. Ongoing suppression actions continue to occur in those areas.

Forest visitors are encouraged to view the interactive closure map, located on the Okangan-Wenatchee National Forest website, before traveling to the national forest. This map shows areas of the national forest that are closed to public use, it is available at https://bit.ly/2vpoLOz . There are many area closures in effect due to wildfires. Check to make sure the area you want to visit is open.
