CHELAN – Now that summer just got started, we will start to see temperatures in the rise. Next week it is predicted to be in the high 80’s and potentially reach the low 90’s.

Not only do humans suffer with higher temperatures, pets do too.

In Washington State it’s illegal to leave an unattended animal in your vehicle in hot weather. Those who the break the law could be fined \$257, so remember to not leave your pet in car because they could suffer from the heat, dehydrations or improper ventilation.

Cracking your windows is not enough. Inside the car temperatures reach 114 degrees Fahrenheit in a course of 10 minutes. In Washington State, it’s against the law to break the window to free ani-

mals who are suffering inside the car, however law enforcement is allowed to do so in order to rescue the animal.

Chelan Valley Housing Trust in need of donations

CHELAN – Rachael Goldie, Mayor Mike Cooney and City Councilman Tim Hollingsworth have been working together in order to create affordable housing for the community and now run the Chelan Valley Housing Trust.

Back in spring, Goldie and Hollingsworth attended the Community Land Trust Conference. Community Trust is known for developing single family homes and have been successfully running for over 50 years.

“In that gathering we learned so much, we thought that this is the market we are missing here, single family homes, it’s what people are asking for. It is the only thing that doesn’t have an organization working towards it so we

figured that’s where we would start,” said Goldie.

The Chelan community is helping with this new project and different businesses are in support of it. North Cascades Bank already contributed to the project by donating \$5,000 towards the Trust.

Currently the team is working on putting together some project bidding that way they know where to start. There are different projects in mind and each will be disclosed as time approaches.

The organization will mainly run on funds and donations. As of right now they have a couple of land donations on the table, however the team is carefully looking at each property to determine which one will be the best investment.

Fireworks explode over Manson and Chelan

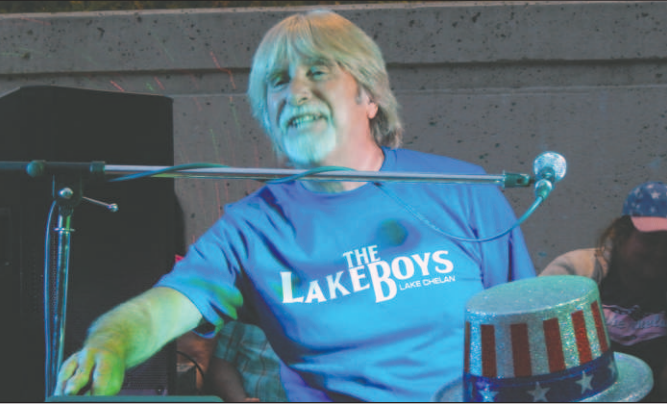

Trust's main objective is to “remove those barriers towards your first home, initially we want to make sure that people who are working hard every day, 40 hours a week and trying to make this community better, have an opportunity, a chance to own a very first home ... there's no American dream available right now, we are trying to make that more fair.”

Income will determine if one is eligible for one of the Chelan Valley's homes in the future. The organization is there to help anyone from

different backgrounds and demographics as long as they are eligible.

By spring of 2019 the Trust is hoping to have something built, yet it could take up to two years for ground breaking to happen. “People have to keep in mind that this is all volunteer hours” stated Goldie.

The Spanish speaking audience is highly encouraged to get involved with the Trust. “We want to have our documents written in Spanish, we are trying to make it accessible for the Hispanic/Latino population. We do not want anyone to be left out,” she says.

Goldie emphasizes the

importance of donations by sending out a message: “If organizations and business members would like to come forward and donate, we are trying to house their employees, we are trying to house people that makes this town greater. It will be awesome if those people could donate, anyone that wants to make sure this community thrives.”

Thrive Chelan Valley partners with ChelanMan to change lives

CHELAN - Mentoring changes lives, and transforms whole communities -yet one in three young people grow up without this critical asset. Family poverty, ethnic minority status, and individual trauma experiences are highly associated with academic and social risk, and adolescents at risk benefit from healthy, supportive relationships with adults.

Thrive Chelan Valley's newly expanded Thrive Mentoring program provides one-on-one-mentoring relationships to Chelan Valley youth, and has partnered with ChelanMan to give 25mentor/mentee pairs \$100 to invest in their relationship. Our mentors have been able to doactivities together, including drawing, snowshoeing, learning how to ride a bike, coffee dates, attending plays and games, meeting up for a day at Disneyland, paint parties, and a trip to tour the Seattle Police Department and FBI.

Our mentors focus on getting to know and building trust with their student, which provides asense of belonging and has the capacity to offset the effects of poverty, i.e. shame, security/safety, and exposure to trauma, addiction, etc. Current research

shows that mentoring is the solution to trauma, and that students with mentors are more likely to have better success inschool and in life.

"ChelanMan seeks to support local youth in the Chelan valley," said Tara Elsner, ChelanMan board member, "and partnering with Thrive Mentoring is the perfect way to help support youth through caring relationships."

"We are thrilled to partner with ChelanMan in giving students in our valley this opportunity," said Cindy Knight, Thrive Chelan Valley Board Presi-

dent. "Not only has ChelanMan supported Thrive Mentoring through funds for mentors/mentees to invest together, but several people on their board are mentors in our program and are investing personally in the lives of children in our valley.

Chelan Fire and Rescue welcomes new firefighter

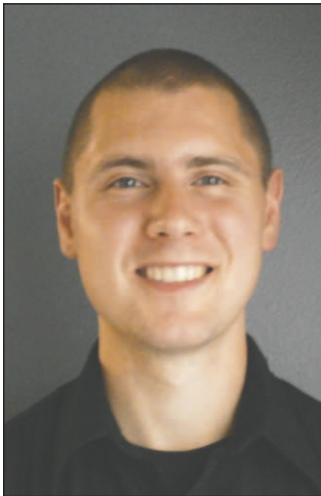

At times the high winds and the heavy sand brought challenges the players' way, regardless "they love the changes and the challenges" added Phelps.

This is the second time Phelps has taken a group of players down to this tournament and they always have a great time whether or not they are competing.

In one of their off days, the girls had a training session with McKenna (Witt) Thibodeau and Madison Witt, who are part of the Professional Beach Volleyball Tour AVP at Huntington Beach. The girls trained with them for an hour and a half, the girls seemed

"very comfortable it was a very positive experience."

As a coach, Phelps takes opportunities such as these three tournaments to watch how others play and how her players can improve. All players had their moments during playing time and as Phelps said "all are there for the right reasons."

LETTER TO EDITOR

Public comments needed by August 14, Public hearing July 18

I find it interesting the City posted the Public Notice for a Determination of Non Significance SEPA A2018-05 SEPA Flexible Thresholds only in the Chelan Mirror. This limits awareness, and the amount of comments from the Public due by August 14, 2018, concerning a change that could adversely affect many of Chelan’s residents. This proposal will make changes to the SEPA (State Environmental Policy Act) applicability thresholds for the “Single Family Residential” and “Multi-Family”, and “Townhomes” projects collectively referred to in the document as Residential Developments. Included in the amendments are; raising Multi-family up to 60 units, and Townhomes up to 20 units. Raising the SEPA thresholds (which will be less stringent) will allow

applicants’ proposals that are less than or equal to these thresholds to forego the SEPA Application process, which could potentially allow for a probable significant adverse environmental impact. With a SEPA review, the probable significant adverse environmental impacts can be identified. These are impacts such as traffic, soil contamination, critical habitat areas, power, water, infrastructure, etc. Identifying impacts through agencies and public comments can in turn help mitigate the impacts. SEPA allows the public to be included with the ability to comment and share concerns. Therefore, raising the thresholds as proposed by the City would eliminate some proposals from the SEPA review process. Public safety and protecting the quality of Lake Chelan should come first and foremost. Holding developments to high standards to protect this beautiful valley, community, and Lake Chelan should not be compromised in order to make it easier to build here, even in the name of affordable housing. The

proposed changes to the SEPA Flexible Thresholds is irresponsible for public safety due to the land use history in the Chelan valley, and the known toxins in the soil. It is important to keep measures in place to know what and how proposals will affect our Lake quality, infrastructures, traffic, water, sewer, schools, neighborhoods, community. We need to hold accountable our City Planning Department and City Officials for what is happening, and how our beautiful valley will be developed in the future. Please submit your comments concerning these proposed changes to the SEPA Applicability Thresholds by August 14, 2018. The Public can also attend the Public Hearing and Open House for this and other proposals July 18, 2018 starting at 5 p.m. at Chelan City Hall.

Beware of contract slavery

“Freedom at Last” as three teachers were enjoying their coffee in Wenatchee shouted when the Supreme Court ruling concerning compulsory union WEA and agency dues was considered a violation of the First Amendment. This decision directly affects every teacher and employee who belongs to the WEA. No union dues would be subsidizing the Washington State Democratic party for those candidates and policies that directly affect their deeply held religious principles and values in violation of their First Amendment rights, relating to “compelled Speech.” There is no doubt there will be fewer WEA members after this decision. Teachers can opt out of the WEA immediately. Of course, the WEA will throw up all sorts of road blocks, such that they cannot accept a resignation from the union unless the school WEA representative is part of the process, and then “slow

walk” the request to the State WEA who have their own set of “moon walking” behavior patterns. New teachers will be faced with a WEA contract who do not understand the significance of this momentous decision. Beware of the small print if you elect to join the union on your application. You have signed a contract that is legally binding for your entire teaching career in Washington state as a union member that prevents you from withdrawing from the union at a later date. This is known as “contract slavery.” You may resign from the union but they collect the dues from your paycheck. The Washington state SEICU is a master of this technique. Governor “sleepy” Insley is working with other labor unions to guarantee union dues from every government worker by legislative initiative through the Democratic House and Senate. Just say “No” to the WEA representative at your school district when that issue of union dues is approached. Too often teachers and other

government employees don’t read the fine print, only learn later that they have signed away their First Amendment rights forever. For those with an “agency shop” agreement with the WEA, these individuals do not have to pay any WEA union dues whatsoever. Send a certified letter, and hold a duplicate copy, requesting that no WEA fees be deducted from their paycheck, and cite the most recent Supreme Court decision concerning “compelled speech” as a reason for your letter to the WEA. Send a cc to the Cascade or Cashmere school district HR section of your intentions. If you are still having problems with the WEA, contact Washington Freedom Foundation, by phone or mail who may act on your behalf within the legal system. The next case to hit the Supreme Court will be “compelled speech” in the private sector with union sometime in 2019.

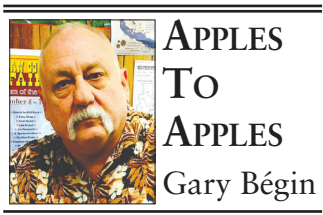
I am making the basic assumption that the cities are filled with leftist liberals anyway and that means the Democrats control them.

The following are his answers to a variety of questions:

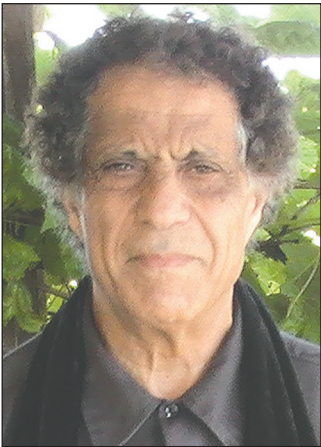
WBJ: Tell the readers about yourself as much as you care to:

Said: Elected Experience: Precinct Committee for Grant County. State Delegate-Democratic Convention several times. National Platform Committee 1988. Former Vice Chair-Democratic Central Committee - Grant County. State Committeeman Grant County 2018.

Other Professional Experience: Expert in healthcare, holding one of the highest medical degrees in the US. Expert of US-Arab/Muslim relations. Facebook Dr. Mohammad Said & drsaid.net-drsaid.net.

Education: M.D. with honors, PhD with honors, MPH, Specialist in Internal Medicine, Family Practice, Geriatric, Preventive & Alternative Medicine, Former Asst. Clinical Professor at VA in Fargo, North Dakota.

Community Service: Volunteer for 14 years at Washington State correction facilities and other local, county, and state.

WBJ: If elected, how will you be different than Maria Cantwell?

Said: I will be different in several areas:

- Foreign policy, particularly to Israel as our unconditional support for Israel caused the birth of Osama Bin Laden and terrorist attack of 911. Our invasion of Iraq engineered by the Pro-Israeli Zionist Jews so called Neo Conservatives, caused the birth of ISIL. We have spent trillions of dollars in those wars for nothing. We need to finance our Infrastructure.

- We have to reign in the military and not treat them as a sacred cow, we need to save that money.

- I call to change the Second Amendment of the Constitution to make it a privilege and not a right to bear arms.

- I am in favor of cutting foreign aid, particularly to countries who do not need it such as Israel. Former President Obama, before leaving office,

gave Israel \$38 billion from our tax payers in the next 10 years. His reasoning if he didn't limit the amount, Congress would have given them more. Nobody in Congress dare to question Israel and its treatment to the Palestinians, the native people. When it comes to Iran we are super power, and when it comes to Israel we are a Banana Republic.

WBJ: You are running against other Dems so I take it you are of a different "wing" of the Party?

WBJ: What is the biggest issue Washington needs help with in D.C.

WBJ: What about the American Embassy in Jerusalem?

Said: It is the most ridiculous thing that happened in my lifetime. In June 6, 1967, 51 years ago, my beloved city Jerusalem fell under the Israeli control, the same day I graduated as a Doctor from University of Granada in Spain. Transferring the American Embassy is fomenting a religious war between 1.7 billion Muslims and the 12 million Jews, unfortunately the tremendous influence, particularly in the United States, keep them holding on the Palestinian land as Israel has become an apartheid State.

WBJ: How best do we deal with N. Korea?

Said: If North Korea comes down it is because of the economy, as we see the tremendous difference between North Korea and South Korea, I am in favor of sanctions until North Korea gives up its nuclear arms. Unfortunately we have one country in the Middle East which has nuclear weapons at the Dimona nuclear facility in the Nagev Desert, but nobody talks about it, it is Israel.

WBJ: Are tariffs going to hurt or help our economy

Said: Some might hurt and others might help. I am in favor of free trade provided it's a fair one.

WBJ: Are there specific national, state &/or regional issues you want to change, fix or remain the same

Said: I feel Canada Is our greatest ally, I do not have any specific changes at this time.

WBJ: How do you feel about DACA.

Said: I am in favor of Amnesty for immediate family of those who were born in the U.S. To institute a guest worker program where Latinos come and work the land, leaving their families' behind, giving them enough time to go back and visit

WBJ: Can you get along with Republicans in D.C. in order to make real changes

Said: Yes, after all we are all Americans and our country is on top priority regardless of parties.

WBJ: Do you have any public elected office experience or is this your first go at political office.

Said: I have been President Committee Officer for 71 in Grant County for over 30 years, I was elected as a committeeman representing Grant County in the Democratic Central Committee for the last two years.

WBJ: If you are new to politics, what caused you to throw your hat into the ring?

Said: I am not new in politics, I ran for public office before as a way to express my views regardless of ethics, religion, background in accordance with the first amendment of the Constitution

WBJ: Feel free to make additional comments.

Said: What motivated me

to file for U.S. Senate on May 15, was exactly 70 years ago I was expelled with my family from the Port city of Haifa Palestine, which is now part of Israel along with 700,000 Palestinians who remained refugees, to make room for people who claimed to have that promised land by God over 4,000 years ago. For the Palestinians it was called Al-Nakba or the catastrophe, most of those who occupied the land was with the help of Great Britain, and if we accept their reasoning as the famous English historian Arnold Toynbee, who said that we have to divided the whole world again, as nobody can claim he had this land or that even centuries ago. It has been always politics and not Prophecy or anything of that nature. The Palestinians still in Palestine, where their numbers are equal to the Jews and there is nowhere to go. The Israeli Jews can come to U.S. as they have dual citizenship. They have tremendous power in this county, through news media, the financial institutions, Hollywood and entertainment Industry, the banks, Congress and White House.

J.D. Greening seeks to replace Cary Condotta

He's a Navy veteran with experience in legislative affairs

NCW Media Managing Editor Gary Bégin interviewed 12th District State Legislative Representative candidate J.D. Greening of Waterville about why he is running to replace the retiring Cary Condotta. Here is what he had to tell us:

NCW Media: Tell the readers about your personal profile:

J.D Greening: I'm 28 years old, Christian in faith and love being outdoors with my dog, whether it be hiking or simply going out for a ride in the Jeep with the top off. I have enjoyed swimming since I was a kid, and currently am passionate about running, have been running marathons for the past year and plan to run in the 2019 Boston Marathon. I'm involved with the Eastern Washington University Alumni Board of Directors and the Free and Accepted Masons.

I was born and raised in Wenatchee by my parents Kevin and Joanne, both Wenatchee natives alongside my older sister, Meagan. I attended Lewis and Clark Elementary, Foothills Middle School then Wenatchee High School before moving up to Waterville, where I graduated from Waterville High School. After graduation I served in the U.S Navy and received my honorable discharge in 2012. After, I attended Eastern Washington University and earned a BA in Political Science with a minor in Sociology. Before I moved back to Washington State I was employed by the U.S. House of Representatives in Washington, D.C. and prior to that I worked at the Washington State Legislature. Currently I am working on a Master's in Public Administration back at Eastern Washington University.

NCW: Why are you running to replace Cary?

Greening: I am running to replace Cary Condotta because this is the right moment for a fresh voice in Olympia. I believe my experience in both the State Legislature and in D.C. working for Congress make me an excellent candi-

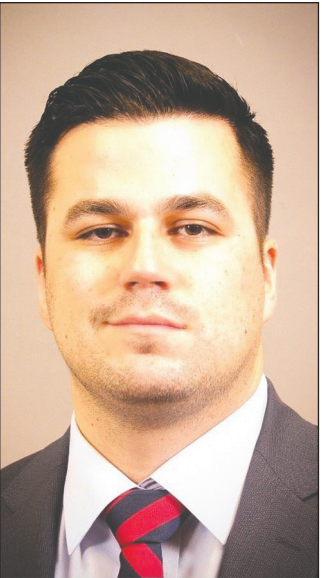
date for the work. Not only did I get exposure to what is entailed in the legislative process, I was actually working for most of the District on both levels. So I'm tuned in not only to the needs of the community but how to implement solutions for them in Olympia.

I think my service in the military is also crucial because during my service, I gained the confidence to take the lead but also I understand how to be a team player and that is vital when working over in Olympia, because we are there to work together to figure out how to best take care of our resources. That requires diplomacy and co-operation.

Another reason I am running is because I believe that to strengthen democracy we need to segue from a milieu of career politicians to that of citizen legislators. We need State Representatives from all walks of life and not just people that are shifting from one governmental position to the next. Need to be fighting for the priorities that truly represent the interests of people here in the 12th District. There is not a single issue here that doesn't connect to other issues and other groups, so it is important to hold the needs of the whole community in mind when doing the work. This is the moment to invite a slightly different but completely relevant perspective to the table. I am not planning on making this a career - I don't believe the Founding Fathers ever imagined the rise of the career politician. They envisioned citizen legislators, public servants that apply our practical experience to solving our state's toughest problems and then we go home.

NCW: Is there a specific issue or topic that you want to clear up as your goal if elected?

Greening: So, my experience as a veteran makes Veterans Affairs close to my heart. The amount of support offered departing service members for their transitions is entirely inadequate. Three to seven days is the usual for preparing service members for their transition into the civilian sector. This means less than a week to learn about putting together a resume, how to compare military experience to relatable job skills, filing a claim with the department of Veteran Affairs and so on. A minimum enlistment is about

four years. Then at the end of our veterans get less than a week to properly acclimate to returning to the civilian sector? During my own transition, I was never even talked to about PTSD or mental health, even though I am a combat deployed veteran. So when people are asking "How do we combat the rise in PTSD related suicide? How are we getting these homeless veterans off the streets?" Well, the solution can start here, with us at the state level. I'd like to see Washington State become the gold standard for transitioning veterans back into the community they sacrificed to serve.

NCW: Agriculture & tourism are the two driving industries in the district. What will you hope to achieve to help these two vital industries?

Greening: Agricultural and tourism are such vital aspects of the economy of the 12th District, and rightly so. This is an abundant area that is also alluring for visitors. But balancing the two is necessary. The needs of the orchard or farm sometimes are in conflict with the interests of tourism. There's also the burgeoning agritainment industry that needs a chance to flesh itself out. Does the local ag industry have adequate infrastructure-roads, access to affordable fuel and seasonal workers? Do the local businesses that serve tourism have the opportunities and support to entice visitors? Both have a lot of regulation to contend with on top of the challenge of doing the work itself, so most importantly, I will work to ensure that those who do this work have support in Olympia not to bog them down with further

regulation, and I will provide the venue and space for good communication to occur so that we can grow together.

NCW: What is your attitude towards Marijuana Farmers and the industry as a whole?

Greening: Washington State has put itself in a position to be at the ground floor of this new industry. Representative Condotta has done a lot of hard work to make this happen and I'm grateful that groundwork has been established. Growth is not always easy or comfortable and locally there has obviously been some flashpoints between priorities, as we've seen in Chelan County.

Ultimately, I think that diversifying our economic base and saying "yes" to the opportunity to grow small businesses and jobs is the way to look at the cannabis industry. Helping those businesses and workers navigate the needs of the surrounding community is going to be better in the long run than a prohibition.

NCW: Do you have allies in Olympia ready to help you with any specific agenda?

Greening: I like to think anyone that wants to work for the betterment of our state is an ally, but specifically yes, I have a working relationship with several members of the House of Representatives as well as staff from the Office of Program Research who directly assist members of the House in a nonpartisan basis while I was employed there. I have a deep respect for how Senator Hawkins and Representative Steele have been working hard for the 12th District and will definitely take pages from their book in that regard. How these relationships will evolve if I get elected for District 12 remains to be seen but I envision good things coming from working with others for the betterment of the state.

NCW: Do you have any plans to spur business growth in the District?

Greening: I think the best thing I can do as a legislator is help Olympia stay out of the way of the innovators and makers that create and grow businesses in the 12th District. Sometimes it's difficult to tell what concerns will arise from even the best intentioned bills, so being committed to protecting an open and equitable environment for business in my community is the foundation of how I will approach busi-

ness growth for this region.

NCW: How do you feel about the Hirst decision?

Greening: I think the future holds more challenges like the "Hirst decision", as growth puts pressure on resources, there are going to be a lot of opinions about what the fix is, but the fact of the matter is there is no perfect fix and there is no ideal solution - at least that would be universally agreed upon. But burdening local government and hamstringing property owners isn't how to go about it. Actions has been taken to fix this issue and that's the silver lining of this story so far - that the State House and Senate reached a deal to fix it and the governor signed it. That's exactly the job of the elected in this case. As this and other issues continue to unfold, I'll work to protect my community from being overly burdened by regulators and be willing to work hard to find a solution instead of using these instances to play politics.

NCW: The McCreary decision?

Greening: The McCleary decision is rightfully a huge deal but doesn't come out of nowhere- this drum beat goes back a long way and has only become louder. As a graduate of a rural school, I was educated and supported by hard working people who did amazing work with very little - and I know that is the case throughout public education. Washington State's Supreme Court put a deadline on addressing a particular part of this issue and the Legislature made some tough choices to try to meet that expectation- but there are wrinkles that need to be massaged out - the ripple effect into how schools can fund through local levies, among other concerns, needs to be handled and not ignored.

The idea of public education is that it is not only good for the individual, but the whole community, and ensuring that means the workers and leaders of tomorrow have the skills to excel in new opportunities and meet new challenges. In my opinion, this is fundamental to protecting our community's resources and values. I know that money to fund public education must come from somewhere. People talk a lot about government living within its means and we should - so how can we work together to help our money work better for us

here? How can we make sure educators are willing to live in rural communities to teach our children? It's a bigger issue ultimately that McCleary, and a conversation that should always been happening at the state level.

NCW: Will you seek local allies in the Douglas County and Chelan County commissions, city councils and other local government to accomplish a specific agenda?

Greening: Yes, actually I am scheduling meetings as we speak with local agencies and nonprofits that are working on housing, mental health and fire wise efforts so I can hear directly from them about what is preventing them getting the work needed done. I plan to win this election to support those who are doing the hard work at the community level and learn from them beforehand so I can serve them better in Olympia. I also already have contacts in the community from my previous work with the State Legislature as well as Congress and will build on those relationships as well so that on Day One we are working to make those fixes and solutions.

NCW: Will you seek common ground with all the Democrats ... if there is any?

Greening: Yes absolutely- much as Condotta has, there are many opportunities to cooperate. When I worked with the Legislature, I ran the Capitol Budget Committee as their Legislative Assistant and being bipartisan is crucial when it comes to figuring out the budget for the state and so it was refreshing to see both sides of the aisle working together to make it work for Washington.

When I was working in D.C. for Congress it was disheartening to see both parties refusing to work with each other, whether it be cosponsoring bills or just having a dialogue with each other. That's what I think is really amazing about the Washington State legislature and working on the state level, because it's easy to be in D.C. and forget what you are fighting for and it's easy to understand the disenchantment the public has with Congress. But here in Washington you see cooperation every day to fix the things you are trying to fix, help the people you are trying to help, because we all live here together. And I think most of the members see that too.

The statute requires investor-owned and consumer-owned electric utilities with more than 25,000 customers to develop IRPs and progress reports. Among other things, IRPs must include a range of load forecasts, assessments of commercially available, utility scale renewable and nonrenewable generating technologies, a comparative evaluation of renewable and nonrenewable generating resources and conservation and efficiency resources and an assessment of methods for integrating renewable resources and addressing overgeneration events, if applicable. The District must hold a public hearing prior to submitting its 2018 IRP Progress Report, which is due to the Department of Commerce by September 1, 2018. Utilities must produce progress reports reflecting changing conditions related to and the progress towards the IRP every two years and an updated IRP must be developed at least every four years.

Public Participation Opportunities

This will be the Board's final public meeting on the development of the 2018 IRP Progress Report. 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Four injured in vehicle versus pedestrian accident

CHELAN - On July 5 at around 1825 hours, Sheriff Brian Burnett reports a vehicle versus pedestrian accident at the intersection of West Woodin Avenue and East Center Street in the city limits of Chelan. The Chelan County Sheriff's Office, Chelan Fire, and Lake Chelan Community Hospital EMS responded. Upon arrival there were three pedestrians injured and the causing driver was trapped upside down in her vehicle. Lake Chelan Community Hospital EMS transported the three pedestrians and the driver to Lake Chelan Community Hospital. The most serious injury was a head injury to an adult female who was ultimately airlifted to Harborview Hospital.

Witnesses at the scene said the driver of a white SUV turned into the driveway at 2208 West Woodin Avenue and drove at a high rate of speed through the patio area of the business and struck three pedestrians who were in the patio area. The vehicle continued to accelerate driving over the embankment, across the top of an unoccupied parked vehicle, flipping and coming to rest upside down against a parked vehicle. Two of the three vehicles were totaled to include the causing vehicle.

Early indications are a medical condition may have been a contributing factor, the investigation is ongoing.


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
