Chelan Fire faces uncertainties in upcoming staffing, finances

CHELAN – While Fire and Rescue commissioners were prepared for the planned agenda items during the regular commissioner's meeting, Wednesday, May 9 at Station 71 on Wapato Avenue, the borderline packed meeting room suggested a slightly different agenda.

Before addressing the night's agenda items, commissioners provided the public time to speak their minds. Lisa Garvich began, "I was personally so disappointed in the outcome of the levy, and I'm sure that almost everyone in the room feels about the same way," then expressed, "I want to encourage the commissioners to not stop the momentum and the forward motion that was kind of the groundwork that the focus group was on, and the administration." She explained that her belief is that the 60 percent of people that stated they didn't agree with the levy, felt that way because they simply just didn't know. "I asked several people after the election about how they voted and why," she continued, "and I got answers all across the board, 'we don't need a fancy department,' and 'we don't need more firefighters, we just got six new firefighters,'" she expressed. She stated her belief that people don't understand what capacity a volunteer department has and what a step backward for the department it would be.

Steve Garvich was next to speak, beginning by stating, "I'm going to ditto what my wife (Lisa Garvich) just said, but I'm more concerned about, being a volunteer, I feel the

responsible involved here is more on me than ever," he explained, "knowing that there's an unknown, (whether or not the exiting firefighters will be replaced), I'm concerned about my neighborhood," he expressed, "I'm concerned about my house, that there's less firefighters on duty to save my house and my neighbors, I'm concerned about the level of staffing and the response time, and everything else that goes with fighting a fire ... I would like to see the commissioners move quickly on coming up with a plan," he said.

Tom Peters, previous commissioner with the district took advantage of the public comment segment to express his standing. "At the time, we as commissioners voted to present the levy LID lift, I didn't necessarily agree with that," he voiced, "I didn't agree that the timing was fit to do that, because of the recent huge property tax increase we all experienced. I didn't necessarily think that that was the best thing, but we all agreed that it was important to give the community an opportunity to vote, and that it was important to give those people who are the most affected the time to make decisions if the community had voted in a negative way." Concluding his thoughts, he stated "the community has voted, and I urge you as commissioners to accept that vote."

Finishing up the public comments was Jacquelynn Dalton. "I chose to speak up today because I felt there was a sever lack of community support with this last levy,"

MANSON – The volunteer-based fire department, Chelan County Fire District 5 (CCFD 5), recognized Volunteer Firefighter Karen Sargeant for completing training and becoming HazMat certified during the board of commissioners meeting, Tuesday, May 8 at Station 51.

"These certifications are huge," Fire Chief Arnold Baker said to Sargeant, "and it's not an easy thing, but it's very appreciated. You put in the time and the effort, and the citizens get value out of it." Sargeant explained that, after setting the goal of completing the HazMat training, there

EPHRATA – The Chelan baseball team won the district championship Friday night by defeating long time CTL powerhouse, and number 2 ranked team in the state Cashmere Bulldogs by a score of 10-6 at Johnson/O'Brien Stadium in Ephrata. This is the first district championship for the baseball team in over 20 years.

Cashmere jumped out to a quick 1-0 led in the bottom of the first, but that would

not last for long, as shortstop Gage Estes smashed a 2-run homer to deep left field, giving the Goats the lead in the top of the second. The Goats never looked back, cruising to an eventual 10-6 win behind Connor Wilsons masterful performance on the mound, earning his 6th win of the season vs no losses. Sophomore Brennan Moody, and freshman Drake Bird each had two hits in the game, along with two RBIs apiece.

Coach Papasedero would personally like to thank the many administrators

and fans who traveled to Ephrata to cheer on the young Goats in their quest for a state championship. He would also like to acknowledge his dedicated, hard-working, assistant coaches, Brandon Boyd, Evan Reister, Derek Todd, and Ryan Moody who have all played a huge part in bringing Chelan Baseball back to the state level.

Next up: State Playoffs, Saturday, May 19 in Moses Lake. Time to be announced.

Chelan Council has subtle evening of considerations

CHELAN – Reports and considerations consumed the night's agenda during the regular city council meeting, Tuesday, May 8, held at City Hall.

Leading into the motion

considerations was a proposal for obtaining services through Lisa Grueter with Berk Consulting to assist in the completion of short term rental regulations and update the sign code for compliance with Gilbert vs. Reed Supreme Court

Decision. Planning Director Craig Gildroy began by explaining that "staff did start the process of updating short-term rules, or rental rules, by holding two planning commission workshops and presenting it to the city council workshop." From

the meetings, he continued, the decision was made that it would be best to hire a professional consultant on the issue. "The Berk scope (of services) specifically states to ensure that short-term rentals are regulated

Moving into regular agenda items, discussing calendar items, Chief Baker stated that he would like to attend the upcoming Lake Chelan Community Hospital and Clinics (LCCHC) monthly board meeting, Tuesday, May 22, and reminded commissioners of the upcoming Washington Fire Commissioners Workshop to be held Saturday, June 2.

The district is looking into purchasing a parcel begin station 52 on Wapato Lake Road for the purpose of utilizing it for a training center. The property is flat and ideal for training, stated Chief Baker. Well there is no idea on pricing for the site as of now, the ability to have a training ground would help the district but also would increase their points with the survey and rating bureau. "There's some specific props (that need to be in place), not just a burn box," he

explained to commissioners, "but a two-story burn box." If the purchase of the property is viable, the department would put in place various training props, as well as an access road to the site.

Discussing new business items, Manson Fire commissioners passed Resolution 2018-08 unanimously. The resolution allows the district

to recoup expenses from out of district calls. This resolution would also apply to motor vehicle accidents that take place out of district boundaries, as well as fire occurrences.

The chief's report revealed an abundance of non-emergency nuisance calls from residences within the community with complaints on smoke in the air from neigh-

boring properties. Air quality concerns from smoke in the air should be directed to the Department of Ecology, explained the board, unless it is a fire emergency. The calls, however, are expected to stop come June 1, when fire bans begin being placed throughout the area. Switching topics to the chassis for engine 54, the equipment is expected to be

ready sometime in the beginning of July, explained Baker.

After receiving a denial on a grant application for replacement of brush engine 52, Chief Baker requested information on the reasoning for the denial. There was nothing wrong with the proposal, he was informed, there's just too much competition for the grants for replacing older engines. "We had a plan that we were going to talk, if we didn't get the grant, to just go ahead and do the project," he stated, "I'd like to go ahead and do a board workshop later this month and talk about the strategy." After some discussion on dates and times, staff and commissioners set the board workshop meeting for Tuesday, May 22 at 4:30 p.m. at Station 51.

Manson Fire meets every second Tuesday of the month, beginning at 4:30 p.m. at Station 51 on Manson Boulevard. The next regular board meeting will be held Tuesday, June 12.

appropriately," he stated, "and avoid impacts to their availability to the city year-round housing stock. So, that is definitely one of the goals that we want to have for short-term rentals."

"The adopted 2018 budget did include \$20,000 for professional services," Gildroy began stating the financial aspect of acquiring the services, "we spent about \$2,000 of that for an affordable housing consultant earlier this year, so there's about \$18,000 left. This scope of work is \$26,000, so we would require a budget amendment in the amount of \$8,000." The motion was passed unanimously.

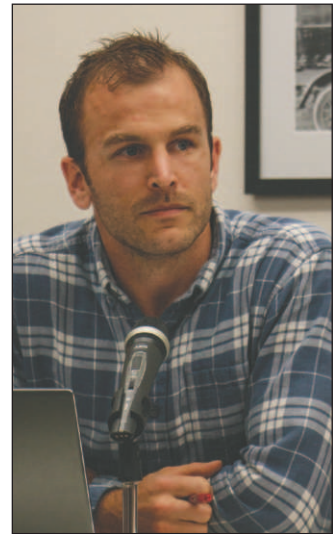
The next motion for consideration by the council was a fuel tax agreement with the Transportation Improvement Board (TIB)'s Relight Washington Program. City Engineer Jake Youngren began by informing the board of an application submitted by Chelan County PUD on behalf of the City in 2017. The grant application, he explained, was to "convert approximately 165 standard sodium fixtures with LED lights, and that grant application was successful." The total grant amount was in the amount of \$63,627, he continued. Part of the approval process is a requirement through the TIB that the City enter into a Relight Washington Grant Agreement. "This is one part

of it," he continued, "and we'll also be following this with what is called an interlocal agreement with the PUD as well. Following Council's approval." The agreement, he affirmed, just makes the funds available to the City for reimbursement.

Mayor Mike Cooney requested further explanation from Youngren, stating "there's 'x' number of lights in the city, how many are done now through the grant that we had previously and how many are left to be done?" he asked. "I've talked to the Project Manager, John Goodwell, with the PUD," he began, "this is part of a larger, county-wide project, integrating over something like 4,000 lights, and this is part of that." The grant agreement is for the remaining lights to be done, he continued. "Ultimately, there's seems to be some good benefit to do it,

on the City's behalf," he explained, "even though we're not incurring any cost to do it, there's power savings."

After providing further clarification for councilmembers, the motion was unanimously passed.

Moving into the sole administrative report for the evening, Parks Director Karen Sargeant explained difficulties incurred in finding a replacement towing service for the City, after the discontinuation of services from Burkhardt Towing. "I was informed by Rob that he was no longer going to be in the towing service, because he bought the NAPA store," she began, "he was switching careers ... since that time, staff and I have been doing research on other options for the City." Towing services are utilized very often by the City, she stated, "it's more rare than anything else, but we do use them. We try everything we can to locate

the owner before we tow anything."

After some research, Sargeant stated that they discovered only two towing services that were interested in doing the towing services for the parks department in the city. "In light of that, I took a look at the towing policy," she explained, "we had some issues with the original language, it kind of ties our hands. So, we wanted to implore Council that we need to change the language a little bit in the code." In the original policy, it states that towing services should be done on a rotating basis, in order to spread the business throughout the towing companies. However, be-

cause the parks department doesn't have the capability of dispatch services in order to track towing services utilized, the area of the code would be best to add a contractual section.

The next segment of the code that was recommended for amendment was on the location of the towing service's impound yard, stating that it should be located within the city's urban growth area. "We contacted all the towing services within the area here," he expressed, "and, again we only had two that stepped forward, and neither one of the impound yards are within the urban growth area. So, this statement really ties our hands because we need a towing service." She recommended revising the portion

of the code to state that the impound yard is within a 50-mile radius. "We understand that we want to keep the impound yard as close as possible," she said, "because we don't want people paying huge amounts of money, which

is why we go through all the hassle of finding the owner of the vehicle before we have it towed." Seeing no other options available, councilmembers requested Sargeant return with a contract proposal from companies interested in working with the City.

she began. "I feel it's necessary to state that I'm here as a Chelan local home owner, tax payer, employee of a local business and small-business owner," she continued, "I feel that it is imperative to safety and well-being of our community to provide them another opportunity to become more educated about our fire department, and why we really need this levy to pass." The answer is very simple, she stated, "the youth of our community." The safety of the children is top priority, she emphasized, and nearly half of our population is under the age of 18, and "we are all responsible for them in one way or another."

Dalton continued explaining to commissioners how important maintaining the current level of staffing is to the youth in the community and pleads for the community to have another chance to become educated on that importance and allow the opportunity to represent the levy.

In response to the increase audience and public commentary, Commissioner Russ Jones expressed, "I fully appreciate the people that came and talked to us, we'd like to have more of that," he said, playfully adding, "I think we just set a record for number of people speaking."

Moving into regular agenda items, Chief Tim Lemon reviewed budgetary items, including a \$63,000 check from the California Wildfires, which was the first installment from money owed to the department. "Other than that," he added, "most of the budget is pretty routine on the rest of it." Leading into the emergency response report,

"The most remarkable thing is looking at where we were this time last year and where we're at now," he began, "we're up 60 calls and there's no real measurable item that you can put your finger on to say this is why you're up that route, if that continues," he expressed, "it's going to be an extremely busy year, so hopefully that will taper off." April presented four over-lapping calls, he stated, meaning "there were two calls going simultaneously out there."

Moving into the operations side of things, Deputy Chief Mark Donnell explained that currently the department is in position of a piece of training equipment, provided by the Washington State Fire Training Academy. The platform will allow the firefighters to practice forced entry methods in emergency situations. Chelan Fire and Rescue is the first district to have the opportunity to utilize the equipment and will have it for use until the end of the month.

"On the staffing side," Donnell switched topics, "we have a resignation from Firefighter Austin Murdock." He stated that they have scheduled interviews for three individuals the next week, but "that position still needs to be filled for the remainder of the year," he explained, "and all three are interested in filling that position." All three applicants are already qualified as Firefighter 1, 2 and EMTs, he stated. The last count on volunteers, he said, who are trained to some degree or another in support, driver operator, wildland and/or structural firefighter is 32.

Moving into the burning topic of filling the vacant commissioner seat two position, Commissioners Phil Moller and Russ Jones voiced three top candidates they felt would

best fit the district's needs. Commissioner Jones recommended the consideration of Nan Bolimay and Karl Johanson, with Commissioner Moller, opposed to Jones' suggestions, recommending Jay Witherbee. "I can't consider Jay," expressed Jones, "what I had hoped for in this ballot measure was that people in our community would have the opportunity to become informed about how our fire district operates and what the real issues were. And, Jay certainly has some very good qualifications, however his selection of what information he allowed to go to the public certainly was one-sided." Jones continued by stating that the community should have had information available to them to base their decision on and voiced that he feels Witherbee may have a specific agenda and that wouldn't benefit the district.

Moller rebutted Jones' opinion, stating that he would disagree as he believes that Witherbee has the community first and foremost in his mind, and he believes that "there was plenty of information put out for the community to make a decision, whether it was Jay's information or from publications from the house here (the district)."

Free yard waste disposal event May 18 and 19

The first of two free yard waste disposal events was held last Friday and Saturday at the Chelan County Transfer Station in Chelan. It will continue this Friday and Saturday, May 18 and 19, 10 a.m.-4 p.m. both days. Items accepted: Trees and limbs up to 12 inches in diameter and less than 8 feet long, leaves, pine needles, and shrubs. Not accepted: Rocks, plastic bags, grass clippings, sod, root wads and weeds. Seventy-five individuals took advantage of the on event on May 11 and 12, and traveled a total of 460.25 miles. They worked 435 hours, and dumped a total of 338 cubic yards of trees, limbs, etc. Their number of trips totaled 104. This program is organized by Cascadia Conservation District in partnership with Chelan County Public Works and the City of Chelan. MANSON – Chelan Tennis had a spectacular day at the CTL Tourney on Saturday, May 12. We played excellent tennis and secured several berths into the district tournament next week.

The purpose of the tournament was as an individual qualifier, the first of three levels of the tennis post-season. The top four finishers in each bracket (girls singles, girls doubles, boys' singles, boys doubles) advance

to the district tournament next week, which is the qualifier for the state tournament on Memorial Day weekend.

Emma lost to Aleah in straight sets but will move on to the district tournament as the #2 seed out of the CTL.

In girls' doubles, Chelan had an historic day. We opened Saturday with all three of our doubles teams in the semifinals, possibly a CTL first ever occurrence. Junior Sierra Rothlisberger and senior Madeline Peebles were the #1 seed, and in the semifinals defeated Evans/Vandel of Cascade 6-3, 6-3 to earn a spot in the championship match. The other semifinal featured the two Chelan doubles teams of junior Abby Martin and senior Sydney Hawkins vs freshmen Elle Rothlisberger and Bella Gatzemeier. That Chelan vs Chelan semifinal was closely fought, with Rothlisberger and Gatzemeier winning 6-3, 7-6.

This set up an all Chelan girls doubles championship match that pitted sister vs sister. Sierra and Madeline defeated Elle and Bella 6-2, 6-4 in a closely contested affair to win the CTL girls doubles championship. As a coach and father, that match was a special memory, and definitely a career coaching highlight.

The Chelan girls doubles team of Hawkins and Martin now needed to fight through the consolation bracket and did so by defeating Hannah Smith and Sarah Dixon of Okanogan 7-6, 7-5. That win clinched a district berth. With a subsequent forfeit by Cascade, Hawkins and Martin earned the #3 seed. So, the three Chelan girls doubles teams took the top three placings in the CTL tourney - once again, possibly a first ever occurrence!

with various private and public agencies to accomplish this goal. The NCWEDD brings together the private and public sectors in a partnership necessary to provide a coordinated strategy and an on-going economic development program for the region.

The NCWEDD is governed by a Board of Directors chosen from our membership and the Board elects officers to oversee operations. Committees are established to progress the work of the NCWEDD as needed.


