Town Hall meeting focuses on Lake Chelan

CHELAN – Water quality, supply and sustainment was the topic of the City's second town hall meeting, Thursday, April 19.

The meeting included presentations by Mike Kaputa of Chelan County Natural Resources Department, Phil Long of the Lake Chelan Research Institute (LCRI), Marcie Clement of Chelan County PUD, John Olson of Friends of Lake Chelan and Jake Youngren of the City of Chelan. Each presentation touched on an issue or concern for Chelan's proudest asset, its lake.

Initiating the night's presentations was Mike Kaputa on Lake Chelan's water quality and supply. "What we're trying to do differently," he explained, "in the Watershed Planning Unit and those of us working on water quality, is approach problems (such as irregular data) from a long-term data trend analysis." Using a long-term approach allows for a greater amount of data to be collected, and a larger number of variables to be factored into any data retrieved. Once the data is understood, he explained, the groups will then be able to better come up with local solutions. "We want to take a very deliberate, scientific approach around understanding what's going on with water quality," he stated, "and then if it does

look like it's trending negatively, for whatever reason, then we want to be able to respond to that." The major efforts of the Watershed Planning Unit currently include a long-term water quality monitoring program, he continued, "and we started doing annual, monthly sampling over the last couple of years," he added, "with partners who have contributed to that effort." Recently, however, there have

been more discussions on the possibility of the presence of aquatic invasive species in Lake Chelan.

The invasive species, including the Zebra and Quagga Mussels, can be transported to the lake on or in other watercrafts such as boats. "It is a point of concern," said Kaputa, "we're not over reacting to it, but it is something we need

Chelan Fire and Rescue commissioners updated

Hear recruit progress, annexations and discuss meeting times

CHELAN – Fire and rescue commissioners and staff gathered for their regular meeting, Wednesday, April 11 at Station 71.

Initiating the meeting's agenda was Fire Chief Tim Lemon with the Chief's Report. "Response calls from March," he began, "we're up 10 from last year for the month of March, already had two brush fires and assisted on a structure fire in Manson." The district has also participated in three automatic aid calls, he added, as well as seeing eight overlapping calls so far this month. Overlapping calls refer to an instance when firefighters are at one scene and a call comes in for assistance to another scene. "Overall, in January, February and March," he pointed out, "year-to-date, we're up 47 calls from what we did last year." The district has been reviewing the calls to try and understand the

increase, however there has been no real significant event that would drive the calls up, he explained.

Covering the operations side of the department, Deputy Chief Mark Donnell began by discussing staffing and volunteer levels. "The recruit class right now," he began, "stands at up to 30 members, for all three departments of Chelan, Entiat and Orondo." The recruits have completed classroom training and are getting ready to begin field exercises, he said. "Hopefully within the next couple of weeks we will be able to red card certify them," he expressed, "so that they'll at least be capable of doing wildland with wildland season coming." Recruit class graduation is scheduled to take place Thursday, June 14 at Station 71.

Annexation proposals were discussed briefly during the regular meeting. The Chelan Falls and Navarre Coulee annexations are ready to go and talk to the assessors, explained Lemon. Friday, April 20, a meeting also took place with residents of the South Shore area to discuss to go through the process, however are still waiting to hear

back from the Knapps Coulee area.

Moving into resolutions, Lemon reappraised Resolution 2018-03, which focused on surplus items in the district. These items include the iPads looking to be replaced by Surface Pros and miscel-

laneous surplus equipment. The resolution was originally brought before the board in March and was tabled at the request of Commissioner Phil Moller to allow time for review of the items to be considered a surplus. After review, the adoption of the resolution was passed by commissioners unanimously.

Concluding the unfinished business, was a discussion on the vacant commissioner seat two position. "We've had six applicants on file," said Lemon, "and have copies of those for each of the board members to take a look at and come to a consensus on an individual." Commissioners will have the next month to review the applications with the hope of narrowing down the candidates to a single individual.

Upcoming events for the district include the Commissioner's Conference in Chelan, Saturday, June 2 and the Recruit Class 2018-01 Graduation, Thursday, June 14. Before moving on from calendar items, however, Commissioner Moller took a moment to mention the invitation of the family of the fallen police officer out of Pierce County,

he explained. "We'll have that family over here to honor him in the parade," he stated, "which will probably end up being a large contingency of police officers."

After completing discussion of the agenda items, Commissioners Russ Jones and Moller opened up a conversation amongst each other, as policy doesn't provide for commissioners to communicate on district related items outside of public meetings or hearings. One particularly

noteworthy item included addressing the possibility of moving the time of the regular commissioner's meetings. While no action can be taken during this time, it is a thought that will be further discussed and looked into for further down the road.

Chelan Fire and Rescue 7 commissioners meet for regular meetings every second Wednesday of the month beginning at 4 p.m. The next scheduled meeting will be Wednesday, May 9.

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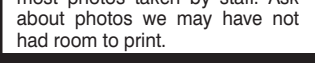
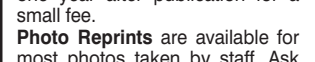

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Michele LaRue resurrects vintage voices at NCRL performances

CHELAN - Professional actress Michèle LaRue is bringing her repertoire of stories from America's Gilded Age to several North Central Regional Library branches and the Washington State Apple Blossom Festival stage this spring.

LaRue will perform four stories of her 30 Tales Well Told lineup in what is billed as a story hour for grownups. The four stories are:

Someone Must Wash the Dishes, an anti-suffrage satire written in 1912 by prominent pro-Suffragist and Unitarian minister Marie Jenney Howe, which satirizes arguments against women's right to vote that were seen as accurate in their day — but ridiculous today.

Gettysburg: One Woman's War, which views the American Civil War from a female perspective, introducing Mary Bowman on the day the battle of Gettysburg began. The program dramatizes three tales from novelist Elsie Singmaster's classic Gettysburg: Stories of the Red Harvest and the Aftermath published in 1913.

The Apple Tree, a comic celebration of spring and poor housekeeping. In this story written in 1903 by Mary E. Wilkins Freeman, the collision of two very different couples — one obsessively good at housekeeping and the other not so much — reveals the true value of a

glorious spring day.

A Pair of Silk Stockings, the story of Little Mrs. Sommers, who is swept away by an impromptu holiday from home.

All four stories harken back to a time when literature was written for the ear, LaRue explained.

"Long before radio, family members and friends shared stories aloud — reading by kerosene lamp in farm houses, or by gaslight in Victorian parlors," LaRue said. "Over the years, during my performances, I've seen contemporary adults light up like children hearing a new story. Despite TV and films, the internet and special effects, we still crave to simply listen to a tale well told."

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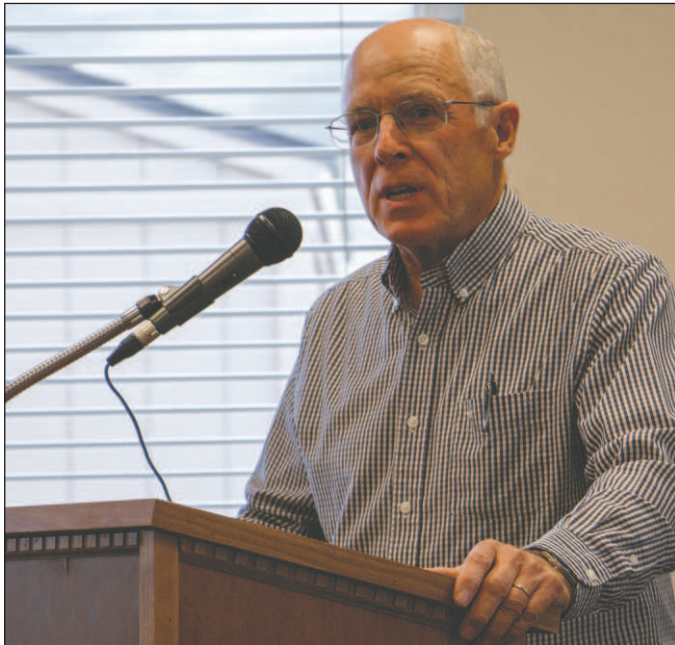

to look at."

Next to present information and concerns was Phil Long with the Research Institute. Leading into his presentation, Long presented an outline addressing threats to Chelan's water quality and how our lake is comparable to other lakes of significance in the western United States.

"We are the third deepest lake in the U.S.," Long began, "but we lack this long-term monitoring." There were no water quality measurements performed between 2007 and 2016. The LCRI was created in 2016 to ensure that gaps, such as the nine years previous, didn't occur and to promote a forward-moving exploration and research program.

Long's presentation also addressed a lingering question for many in the community. With such a pristine lake, why such concern that it warrants a town hall meeting? "What are the threats to our high-water clarity, low nutrients, low algae and low contaminants," he began, "I've broken these down into two categories," he continued, "natural, things we don't control, and human impacts, which we potentially have a chance at controlling." Under natural threats, things such as forest fires, pollen deposition and bird defecation were among the several concerns. On the man-caused side of threats, concerns such as leaky or failed septic systems, fuel hydrocarbons

from powered-watercrafts and boats, as well as invasive species were included.

Studies conducted currently to gather information on the lake by LCRI include monthly water clarity testing, monthly nutrient concentration testing, temperature measure at 15-minute intervals and key water quality parameter readings at 15-minute intervals which include temperature, electrical conductivity, dissolved oxygen, turbidity, chlorophyll and blue-green algae.

Marcie Clement, with the Chelan County PUD, provided a presentation on the utility district's hydroelectric project. The project, she explained, comes with licensing requirements, governed by the Federal Power Act and Clean Water Act. The condi-

tions for attainment of the license require protection, enhancement and mitigation of the water. The PUD participates with several other water-quality orientated groups throughout the valley, including the Watershed Planning Units in Lake Chelan, Entiat and Wenatchee, as well as Fishery Forums with Chelan River and Lake Chelan.

Access to the lake was next to be addressed during the informational presentations. John Olson, of Friends of Lake Chelan, began by voicing the group's concerns on the impact from the ever-looming population growth and the current and future lack of access to the lake. His presentation pointed out that no individual or entity can say exactly how many people are coming into Chelan. The

Lake Chelan Community Open Space Vision was referred to by Olson, utilizing several of the statements as to the growing concern for the lack of public access to the water. The last segment of open land with lake access, he emphasized, is the three fingers. "Only the lower end of the lake provides any physically accessible shoreline," explained his presentation, "of that shoreline, 99 percent is privately owned, yet the public owns 100 percent of the lake."
