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Citizens for Fire District 7 hold informational public forum

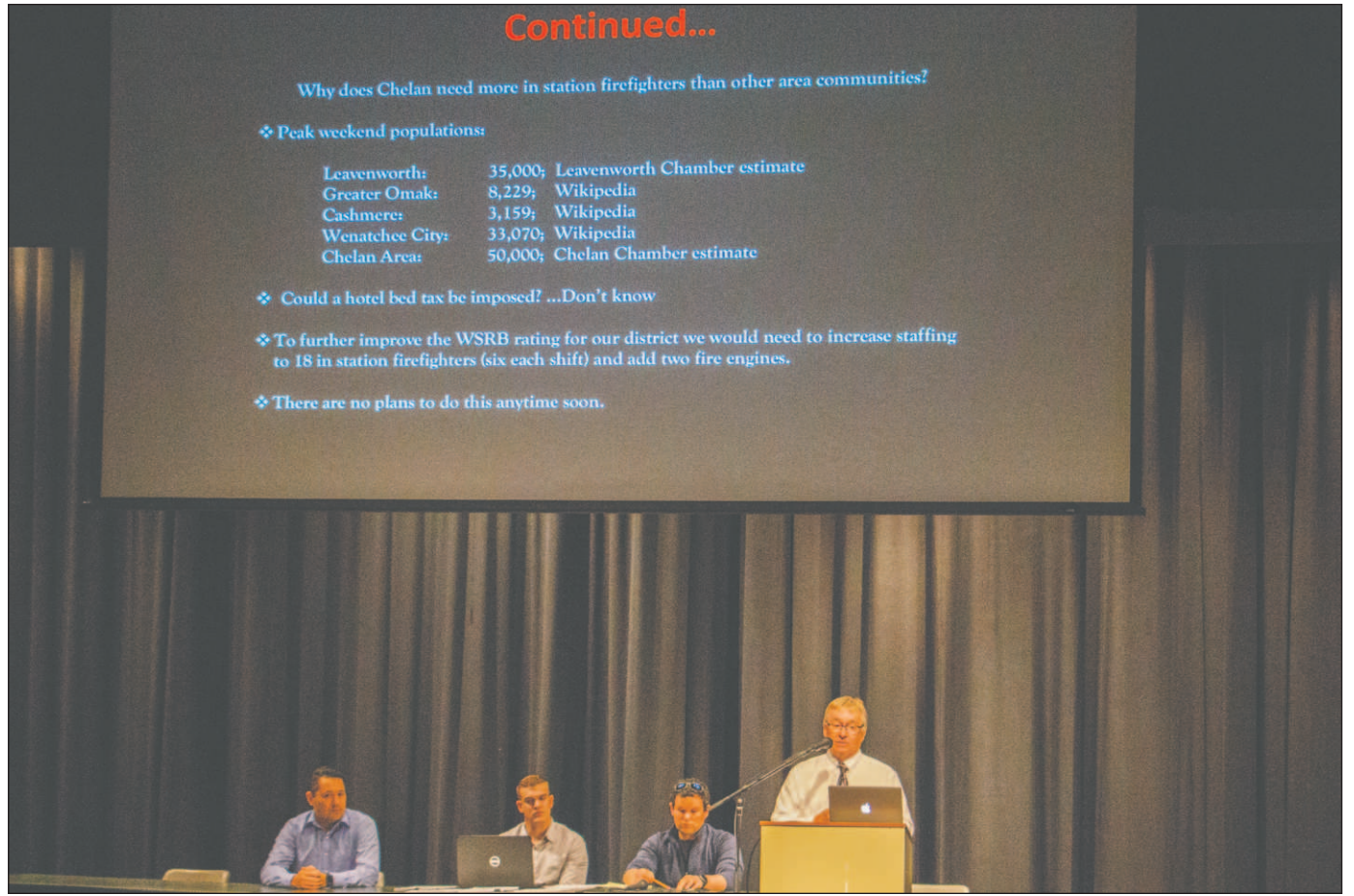
CHELAN – Citizens for Fire District 7 conducted an informational public meeting at the Performing Arts Center within Chelan High School, Wednesday, April 4. The intent of the meeting was to not only present facts on both the benefits and the risks involved with a levy LID lift, but also to answer any lingering questions from the community. The levy, which is placed on the ballot for April's special elections, is requesting an additional 40 cents to the existing 92 cents per thousand Chelan residents currently pay in their property taxes for the fire district, for an annual total of \$1.32 per thousand of assessed property value. The levy, if not passed, does not eliminate the 92 cents per thousand already being paid, that will remain in place. Instead, the new levy, if passed, will add 40 cents to what is already being paid in taxes.

In the Chelan Fire and Rescue's (CFR) fact sheet, approximated cost comparisons are provided based on the assessed value of a resident's home. Cur-

rently, at 92 cents per thousand, a home with an assessed value of \$400,000 will pay around \$368 a year for fire tax. That same home, with the proposed 40 cent increase, will see just over \$150 in increase with an anticipated annual fire tax of \$528, which breaks down to \$44 monthly.

Leading into the meeting, Commissioner Russ Jones began by explaining the situation. "The biggest challenge for me has been to try and gather input from the community," he began, "and unfortunately, we don't see a lot of people at our meetings to come and talk to us and tell us what they think. Part of this ballot is to try and get that feedback from the community." He then began to address comments echoed throughout the community, "I've been examining some of the questions that I get and some of the common misconceptions or misunderstandings that I get. One of the biggest is how our revenue works," he voiced, "In the community, I've heard a lot of people talking about how the assessed value

Goodfellow Brothers keep fingers intact

What's next for the six-acre fills?

CHELAN – For decades the six acres of fill on the northernmost South Shore area of Chelan, locally referred to as "three fingers" due to their aerial appearance, has been debated upon and argued against on the legitimacy of the fills' placement and property rights. The argument is finally concluded, over 50 years after Goodfellow Brothers Inc. (GBI) added to its property in an effort to "keep the formerly dry property permanently above the artificially raised seasonal water fluctuations of Lake Chelan," according to court documents. The fingers will remain in place and in the possession of GBI.

After a ruling in 2015 by Chelan County Superior Court Judge Leslie Allen to immediately remove the fingers from a prior statement that the fin-

gers were "in violation of state statute as a public nuisance" in 2014, GBI appealed the order. The final ruling, signed by nine justices identifies the fill as a legal fill and safeguards its placement against any further debate.

Concluding the court document, explaining the decision, Justice Madsen stated, "I would hold that the savings clause does not substantially impair the jus publicum (which refers to legal rights enjoyed by all citizens, specifically the right of public access to shorelines)," he stated, then concluded, "these fills have been in existence for 50 years or more and have not been challenged, strong evidence that the legislature's action caused no injury to the public. Accordingly, I concur in the majority."

"I think it's a positive move," suggested Mayor Mike Cooney, "I think anything that's out there will be a positive move. It's now clear that it's Goodfel-

City Council, Staff work through rental regulations

CHELAN – A bulk of the allotted time at the Council's scheduled workshop, Tuesday, April 3, at City Hall, was consumed with discussion and direction for vacation home regulations and impacts in the city.

Initiating the discussion, Mayor Mike Cooney began, "I hope this is a free-range discussion of any and all items the councilmembers would like to see put on the table for Craig to consider," he explained. "Really,

what I'm looking for is direction from Council," said Planning Director Craig Gildroy, "what are the goals for short-term rentals, how do you want to address them in the city." Planning commission had concerns of parking requirements, trash, noise and also had concerns that if the rules were too erroneous or difficult for people that they just wouldn't comply, he explained, so code enforcement concerns were brought up as well.

There's an option for hiring a consultant, Gildroy explained, and have already received a quote from Berk Consulting of about \$12,000 that would involve Berk helping draft the regulations of short-term rentals within the city, but they would not be involved in the public review process.

Gildroy had pulled information from other cities and how they've managed short-term rentals in their cities. These cities include City of Bend, Coeur D Alene, Port Townsend and to some extent Seattle. The City of Bend, he emphasized, uses proximity standards, limiting how many short-term rentals you could have together, there's also standards out there that limit the number of vacation rentals that a property owner could have, which was usually two.

The question of whether or not a vacation rental, using a management company, should be held to the same rules as an individual renting out short-term rentals was brought up at planning commission as well, he explained. "What if someone is using a management company, a professional company, should they be held to the same fees and application requirements," he reiterated, "I think it needs to be fair for everyone, and zoning is always site specific, so we need to have an application, in my opinion, for each property, whether or not a management company is doing it for you."

Councilman Ray Dobbs suggested that "somewhere in this ordinance there needs to be a local responsible party, whether it's a management company locally or somebody that can be there in five minutes."

"For me, it's really important to understand what the objective is," suggested Councilwoman Kelly Allen, "what you're really wanting to achieve," allowing

her to be able to respond to questions from the community and explain "as a city, what we put the driver behind," she said. "It's our goal to provide additional income for owner-occupied, for people that live here ... allow them to generate more income, maybe allow them to open up their accessory dwelling unit (ADU) or rent out their house or vice versa," stated Gildroy, as a short-term rental. Allowing individuals to open up their ADUs provides some solution to financial difficulties

that citizens of the community may be enduring with their mortgage payment and/or property taxes. "It's our goal to track and monitor these short-term rentals, so we know how many there are and what the impacts are," he explained, "and of course, the base goal is public health, welfare and safety." He continued by explaining that if the City issues a license for the rental property, that the renter expects that it has been inspected by the city, "I think that's one of the reasons that we have a license."

"I'm going to answer Kelly's question totally different," Mayor Cooney supplied, as to why the City is doing this, "I think they negatively impact communities like Chelan," he suggested, "for taking the value of a regularly priced home and moving it into a different strata ... we're trying to keep homes affordable instead of letting them become unaffordable." Allen asked how these ideas would be applicable to something like GrandView that is not competing in the housing market. "For a single-family home," clarified Cooney, "from a regular neighborhood home, that's an affordable home, and then is put as a short-term

rental, and it's legal, then all of a sudden it's value is jumped up. I think that's one. The second is that they become nuisances."

Previously, direction from the Council was to let the industry self-regulate, Gildroy explained, during a time where vacation rental nuisances included parking issues, partying, noise disturbances and lewd behavior. Since that time, after a discussion between the property owners and then Councilmen Mike Steele, "we

have not had a complaint in the past year and a half," he stated, "so, I do agree that one of the big things we need to address is our housing stock and making sure that we have enough housing. That's where the cap on how many (short-term rentals) you would allow, is good, based upon the percentage of housing you have or need."

"I think there's a lot of lost revenue for the City," suggested Councilman Ty Witt, "people that are already renting and maybe doing it peacefully and quietly and legally, to the point where maybe they're in the right place (zone) that they could do it, but they're not doing it with a business license and they're not paying their taxes on it. Do we have a handle on that piece?" Gildroy replied that he believes that the City does have a handle of it, with the work put in by City Code Enforcer Casey Tjeerdsma. There are already penalty fees in place for non-compliances, he advised.

Another cause of concern, suggested Councilman Tim Hollingsworth, is the renting of boats for use as a dwelling. "We're talking about someone who owns a boat and/or a slip,

it's over."

Looking into the future of the three fingers landfills, there is nothing set in stone at this time, explained Goodfellow, "because of the cloud that's been over them (the fingers), we really haven't been able to go over any concrete plans." A year or so ago, he explained, Mayor Cooney held a meeting in regard to development around the city in general, and Christopher Martin, nephew to Goodfellow, showed preliminary plans. The plans displayed cottage style homes and a possibility of a small commercial-type area on the finger closest to town, he explained. "We aren't looking at doing anything like that down on the fingers," he laughed, "I have no idea where those came from ... we have never intended to do any of that, and that's one of the sad things," he stressed, "there's been so much misinformation put out into the world about our development plans. Never, have we ever thought about developing anything there that we wouldn't come together with the City and the

community to try and come out with something that everybody felt good about."

"We are still trying to work out a way for Chelan Airways to have a home again," Goodfellow offered, "whether it be with the previous operator or a new operator, because I think the community would like to see a float service back and forth to Stehekin again." While keeping the seaplane in mind with plans, there's plans for development on another area of the three fingers property that frequently gets overlooked, he said. "The focus is always on the fingers, but we have the property above the fingers, up on the bench there ... and we're looking at probably doing some development up there," he added, "but the main thing ... is all of the land in between the fingers and the highway, the city and the mayor in particular have been working

with us to come up with a plan where that's a very nicely landscaped walking trail or bike trails, maybe a restroom facility, but really try to make that whole frontage something that would kind of welcome people to Chelan."

In conversations with Mayor Cooney, Goodfellow said that one of the Mayor's voiced goals has been to try and improve the entrance to Chelan, "so, as a part of whatever we do," he said, "we're looking at trying to do some things with the City to try and enhance that."

"I hope that, as a part of this process, as we go forward and we work together with the city, and we work together with the community, to get the community input on this, that in the end all that goes away and it's just part of history," he highlighted, "I'd rather focus on the future than focus on the past."

homes, supplied Gildroy. "No further business licenses or zoning changes in existing neighborhoods for vacation rentals," reiterated Cooney. The point is already outlined in the comprehensive plan, stated Gildroy in response.

Other topics discussed during the workshop included:

Recycle – Containers should be out mid-April, with the first residential collection being the second week in May, and the drop-off facility will remain open until the end of May. Commercial customers will have their first pick up Tuesday, June 5.

Burkhard Towing – no longer towing for the City due to the purchase and management of NAPA Auto Supply, so the City needs to find a replacement towing company.

Washington Apple Commission Logo – requesting the City to sign over the rights to their logo, which includes apple, leaf and banner. "It's a very important logo to them," said City Administrator Mike Jackson, "and they're concerned about protection (of it)." The City would still be permitted to use the logo however, the copyrights would belong to the Washington Apple Commission.

SEPA Subdivision process – Subdivisions are a two-step process, the first being a planning plat, which a decision goes in front of a hearing examiner, and second step is the final plat, which is presented to the Council.

Chelan Fire and Rescue 7 – Chief Tim Lemon and Deputy Chief Mark Donnell joined at the City Council's workshop to discuss contingency plan on emergency services.

The City Council convenes for council meetings every second and fourth Tuesday of the month, beginning at 6 p.m. at City Hall. The next council meeting is scheduled to take place Tuesday, April 24.

low Brothers' (GBI) property, from my standpoint, we're wiping the slate clean." GBI and the City will work together on the future development on the fingers, he explained, "one of my main goals was to get a good resolution for the three fingers and for the butte, and that's what we are working on," he stated, "the idea (for the fingers) will be to get a win for the residents of Chelan and a win for them (GBI). They don't have to do anything," he emphasized, "they could put a chain fence along the thing and not allow any entry ... (however) there's work being done, they will do beautification, do landscaping for the city to help enhance the lakeside trail," he stated. Instead of putting forth the minimal work needed, they are look at doing the most amount of work that they can, Cooney voiced. "It's very clear in talking with Steve Goodfellow, that he wants a positive outcome for the town of Chelan, that it's basically part of the family legacy that has been in courts for a long time," he explained, "knowing that

they will not make everybody happy in the community, what they want to do is the greater good for the community." While there is nothing definitive for that property, there is a lot of potential and possibilities. "I feel very optimistic. I feel that it will be something of a betterment, that people will use it," suggest Cooney, "I'm confident that I know what Steve Goodfellow is thinking well enough that it will turn out to be a win for the town. I've not seen him be anything different than a civic-minded land owner that wants to do something good for the town."

Steve Goodfellow expressed that the family feels good about the ruling, "we felt all along that those fills were put in legally and have been legal ever since they've been put in," he stated, "the fills were put in prior to 1969," expressed Goodfellow, "so it's pretty nice to finally have it over." The court process had been long and difficult, he voiced, "and I also feel that it's caused some problems just within the community, it's become kind of a divisive issue," he stated, adding, "it's been a part of the community of Chelan forever, I'm just glad

of the community has gone up and up and up, and I think it's around \$2 billion or so," he suggested, "as that assessed valuation of the community goes up, that doesn't necessarily mean that our revenue goes up. If we collected \$100 last year, the most we could collect without doing a LID lift is \$101," he emphasized, then added, "it doesn't matter if our assessed value goes up \$500 million or \$1 billion or anything else. So, when we have inflation that's been running two or three percent, wages tend to go up, cost of equipment tends to go up. If we're limited to one percent, we can't keep up. Eventually those lines are going to cross, and we have to find ways to cut costs."

Jones voiced that he appreciates the one-percent cap and its ability to keep taxes down over time, however "we can't keep up with the growth in our community and we've been hearing a lot about growth lately," he emphasized with concern, "and that presents additional demands and challenges for us. I've spent the last two years trying hard to learn the role of commissioner. It's a lot more challenging than I expected, but I've been trying to build, for myself at least, what some of the main criteria are and decision making of the criteria." He then offered a couple of the criteria used for his decision making, including whether or not the decision will help save lives and/or reduce suffering. "In the case of this debate of whether we have career staff or not," he explained, "statistically we know that career staff will arrive sooner. Volunteers respond from home. If you have a coronary situation, that's pretty important. If you have a fire, you only have so much time before a flashover occurs and a structure is lost. Will it reduce damage to property? Same thing applies."

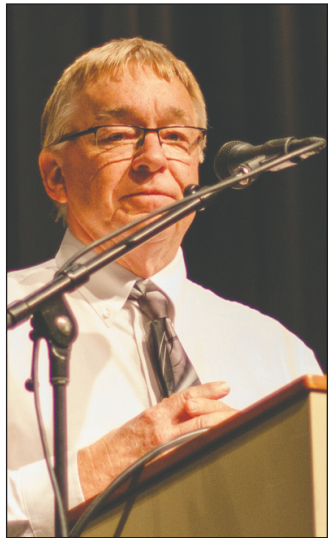
The presentation took place with the use of informational slides, providing statistics on the levy. "This (levy) will gener-

ate \$660,000 in funding to retain the six firefighters currently funded by a federal grant ... another \$150,000 will be generated for additional funding for equipment replacement ... finally, the lift will fund an additional \$50,000 for volunteer programs and stipend shifts."

One slide, in particular, stated notable statistics. The slide, addressing the question as to why Chelan needs more "in-station firefighters" than other communities, provided peak weekend population statistics. Most locals have heard the standard, "Chelan doubles in size during the peak season," or at least something similar. But, what does it look like when you place a number to it? According to Chamber of Commerce websites, Leaven-

worth at its peak weekends has a population of 35,000. Chelan surpasses that number with an eye-opening 50,000 people during peak weekends.

The multi-skilled department faces a number of day-to-day challenges and tasks that are not necessarily in the public eye, because on average, statistically, on-staff personnel allow shorter response times, by several minutes, in comparison to volunteers.

Chelan doctor Tobe Harberd named 2018 Outstanding Rural Health Practitioner

CHELAN - Dr. Tobe Harberd of Chelan was honored as the 2018 Outstanding Rural Health Practitioner this week at the annual Rural Health Conference in Spokane.

Harberd, who has practiced family medicine at the Lake Chelan Clinic (LCC) for 10 years, is an advocate for rural health and an inspiration to medical students, said John McCarthy, who presented the award March 27. McCarthy, Assistant Dean of Rural Programs at the University of Washington (UW) School of Medicine, oversees the UW programs that place medical students in rural primary care clinics to learn from established doctors.

Lake Chelan is one the program's participating clinics, and Harberd plays an active role mentoring medical students. His nomination included a letter from Scott Hippe, one of LCC's students who ultimately chose to pursue a career in Family Medicine in the northwest, in large part to what he saw Harberd doing for patients in Chelan.

"Dr. Harberd showed me what it is possible to do as a rural physician," said Hippe, "and I strive to gain the proficiency and scope he attained. Dr. Harberd is committed to educating the next generation of rural physicians. He is a clinical professor in the University of Washington system ... he is

an excellent teacher, having bestowed on me experience as a medical student that has helped tremendously so far in my residency training.

"But his commitment to the doctors of tomorrow extends beyond formal training; when my basement apartment flooded, he and his family welcomed me into their home to finish out my time in Chelan. This openness to showing students not only what it is like to work in a rural setting, but also to make a life there, makes all the difference.

The memorial award Harberd received is in honor of John Anderson, MD of Cle Elum. Like Dr. Anderson, who stabilized his medical community with a commitment to excellent care for his patients, said McCarthy, Dr. Harberd is the kind of physician who

supports the future of health care in his community. "He manifests with the joy of the profession," he said, "and his ability to mentor others will lead to stabilize medical infrastructure and more rural physicians."

Harberd, who cares for nearly 2,000 patients in Chelan, says he was both surprised and honored to receive the award. Becoming a family physician in a rural area was his ultimate plan as a medical student, he said. He especially likes the autonomy and diversity of working as a rural family doctor. I like taking care of patients of all ages, he said, all the way from OB to pediatrics to geriatrics. "Chelan is a great community. It allows me to practice medicine the way I want, and it is also a wonderful place for my family."

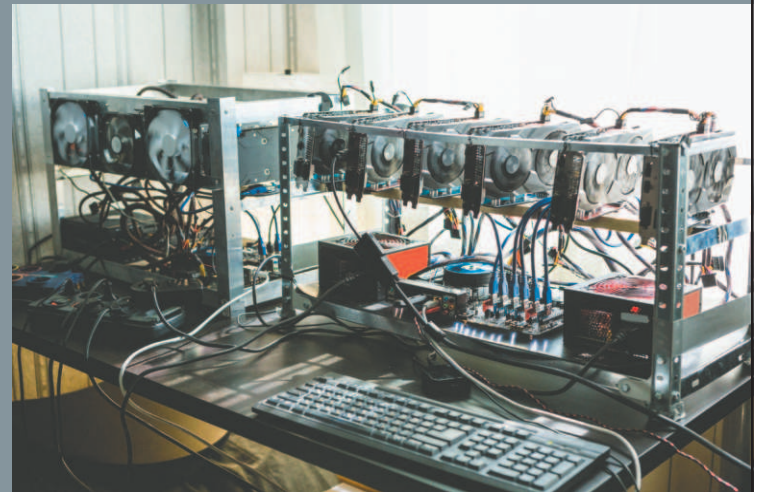


