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Entiat City Council receives updates on community projects and grants

Recognizes City Clerk Linda Countryman

ENTIAT - A presentation by Kara Raftery of Pacific Engineering began the regular council meeting, Thursday, Jan. 25 held at Council Chambers. The presentation spoke on updates on grants and the Community Center Feasibility Study. With the City heading into a transitional period due to the retirement of City Clerk Linda Countryman at the end of January, Raftery addressed the City's concern that some projects may have to be put on hold. "What I did was create two different scenarios to present to you guys and moving forward you guys can pick which one of the scenarios you want to use," she explained. Option one included a heavy grant year with funds used

for the proposed community center, marina trail head and city-wide chip sealing with funding coming from the

Lake Chelan Community Hospital's research committee divulges CEO replacement process

Commissioners receive USDA funding update

CHELAN - The Lake Chelan Community Hospital and Clinic (LCCHC) CEO Transition Research Committee provided a proposal to hospital leadership staff and commissioners during the monthly board meeting, Tuesday, Jan. 23 at the hospital. The committee, responsible for finding an interim replacement, have advertised the open position and set a target closing date for the CEO interim position of Friday, Feb. 2, they said. "I think we've put together a good plan on moving forward," stated Hospital Commissioner Phyllis Gleasman. After collecting the submitted applications, the research team will begin narrowing down the candidates based on qualifications and will present the top three selections to the hospital board to begin the interview process. The interim CEO, however, will not be eligible for the permanent position. The rationale behind disallowing eligibility, explained Medical Director Ty Witt, was "mainly because other applicants may look at that person as having a leg up, and maybe we would lose some very applicants and very

qualified CEOs because somebody else basically already had their foot in the door." The search for the interim will take place locally through advertising and the community, however the board approved a separate search technique for the permanent position, contracting B.E. Smith's professional search services in the discovery and selection of

Chelan City Council hears Citizens **Against Smart Meters' presentation**

Introduces newest city employee

CHELAN - In the less than full meeting room at City Hall that serves as Council Chambers, Mayor Mike Cooney began the regularly scheduled council meeting, Tuesday, Jan. 23. With Councilwomen Erin McCardle, Wendy Isenhart and Kelly Allen excused, the four remaining councilmen were present and actively participating in the night's agenda.

John Olson, with the Friends of Lake Chelan, took position at the podium during the citizen comment segment of

the agenda. The purpose of Olson's speech was to express his concern with the unclarity of the focus from the Town Hall meeting held, Tuesday, Jan. 16. "While the forum topic was affordable housing," he began, "the focus from the mayor seemed to me ... to be focused on the building and purchasing of lower priced homes." Olson proceeded to explain that home ownership and the pursuit of that ownership has many obstacles and stated that he would "vigorously encourage you to pursue partnering with the Columbia Valley Housing Association. Because of all the obstacles attached with home ownership, he reminded council of the presentation provided in

November on "the creation of affordable rental housing," which was intended to aim the focus of the housing crisis on rental housing before home ownership. In concluding his commentary time, Olson added a suggestion for future town hall meetings. The topic would include concerns arising with the lake water, including the possibility of the transference of invasive species, particularly the Zebra Mussel, which has been discovered in surrounding areas and has an unprecedented reproduction/growth rate. In addressing Olson's subject on the town hall meetings, Mayor Cooney explained "we're going to have town halls more than once a quarter," he said,

"we're looking at one every two months (or so), and Mike

qualified individuals.

Out of six letters sent to search firms, five responded and were scored based on a scoring matrix system, explained Gleasman. Based upon the scoring on the qualifications of each search team, the committee finalized their selection with an offer from B.E. Smith, who specializes in management position placements in healthcare. The cost of the services is 30 percent of the estimated CEO salary, explained current CEO Kevin Abel, which equates to approximately \$60,000 and will be paid in three installments. Once final selections for both the interim and permanent positions are made, the research team, board of commissioners and hospital senior management staff will conduct interviews and ultimately make the decision based on scoring from the criteria matrix system to be used.

In an update on the new

hospital funding provided by United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), Kelly Arduino of WIPFLi CPAs and Consultants stated that the application is still in queue and waiting to be processed, according to information she had received from the state office as well as local representatives. "so, we're waiting for a few applications to be reviewed that were in the queue before us, and are continuing to keep in contact with the

USDA and gently nudge them, and remind them that we are at the ready for whatever information they may need." Although waiting on the USDA's approval for funding assistance, the hospital currently has approximately \$175,000 from Bouten Construction and \$300,000 from the Department of Commerce's capital budget that can be used to begin moving forward on some items while in wait for the USDA. Commissioner Mary Murphy raised the question as to whether or not there would be any impact (on the USDA funding or process) due to Abel's scheduled departure in April. "We have let Rick Rose know at USDA, and there is precedent for this," explained Abel, "it's not ideal, but it's also business as usual. What they're going to want to see is that we have a plan moving forward." He continued by explaining that the nature of his departure, being a "planned,

structured piece" has no adverse effect moving forward, and expressed, "I just think from our standpoint, what we need to do is make sure that we're putting together a solid process that involves the interim and perhaps a process for the executive search."

The LCCHC Board of Commissioners meets every fourth Tuesday, beginning at 1:30 p.m. in the hospital's board room. The next meeting will take place Tuesday, Feb. 27.

Kaputa (Director of Chelan County Natural Resources Department) contacted me and we do have it scheduled." So, in upcoming meetings the topic of the invasive species could quite possibly be on the agenda.

Following the Olson's comment segment, Laura Folsom, with the Citizen's Against Smart Meters, began an informational presentation on the concerns the group has on the placement of the smart meters by Chelan County PUD. The smart meters will replace current analog meters placed on residences and are able to electronically communicate with the main servers at the PUD's stations. This increased energy waves that will be constantly sending information back and forth from the main servers is the primary concern of the group. "We felt like when we came to you last August," began Folsom, "that you really did listen to what we had to say, we felt like the information we sent to you was looked and studied, and we were heard." She began explaining that the attention of the group was turned toward the decision from the PUD to proceed with the placement of the smart meters. "Our local representative, Ann Congdon was able to confidently say that they were a safety hazard and that she had some concerns," Folsom explained, "she was the one commissioner that voted no, the rest voted yes ... we're really not activists and we're really trying not to cause a problem here, but we do believe that these meters and this type of implementing this grid and this technological type of meters is detrimental to our environment, to our bees, to our own personal health." The group requests a temporary city-wide opt out, to allow more time to gather information on the safety concerns perceived with the newest generation of smart meters. "What are the City's options in terms of opting out?" asked Councilman Tim Hollingsworth. "The city can provide input to the PUD." explained City Administrator Mike Jackson, "I don't know that there's any way we can

prevent them from coming into the city." He then explained the contracts that the PUD have are with individual customers, not one contract for the city as a whole, so individuals can opt out, but it is unclear as to whether the entire city itself can opt out. "There's conflicting data," suggested Folsom who explained that some of the studies that the PUD were referring to on the safety of the RF frequencies go as far back as 1998. "If you really get out there and talk ... most people don't know what these meters are and that they (the meters) are going in." Nick Pascoe, co-owner of Bear Foods, stepped up to the podium to supply his input on the smart meter placement as well. He began by explaining that, although their business is located here in Chelan, they only just became citizens of Chelan within the past couple weeks. "A few years

ago, when my wife was first diagnosed with cancer the PIID was very receptive to the concept of removing the original smart meter," he began, "when I explained to him that that was my motivation for wanting to retrofit to the old analog meter, he was very understanding and immediately put in an old machine ... our newest home fortunately has an analog meter too, and I'm hoping they're going to leave that intact. My choice is opting out," Pascoe concluded, "and we are opting out of all three of our accounts from the smart meters, and we will pay any penalty that is associated with that. I hope that's some way to keep the jobs for the meter-readers as well," he joked, "but for health concerns primarily." Mayor Cooney requests that group resubmit informational pieces to council, to allow the members to review the information, data and any statistics. "Here's what I'll pledge," expressed Cooney, "all seven councilmembers will

tion, the PUD information, your information, and we'll have a discussion on this." If Council sees any information that can be of concern, the topic of the smart-meter placement will reemerge on the agenda at a later meeting date. Following the presentation, Mayor Cooney took a brief

moment to introduce Patty Michajla, the newest member of the City of Chelan staff. Michajla was awarded the position of receptionist/clerical assistant and will be assistant to City Clerk Peri Gallucci. "It is not an easy thing to do in finding quality people," stated Cooney, "or this high of a quality of person to join our team, and we are fortunate that Patty has joined us in the front office ... welcome to Chelan."

City Engineer Jake Youngren presented a motion consideration for Council's consideration, an agreement with the Transportation Improvement Board (TIB), which is required in order to have access to the \$250,000 grant for the Woodin Avenue Project. "TIB is funded by a portion of the Washington State Fuel Tax," Youngren

began, "they require recipients of their funding to enter into an agreement with TIB, a fuel tax agreement, before funds can be accessed by the recipients." The money from this agreement, he explained, will contribute to virtually every aspect of the project, "except for maybe the waterline being installed and the bridge restoration." The funds can be applied toward the streets, sidewalks ... "really it's anything that has to do with transportation for the most part ... it's hard to pin exactly what this money will be used toward because it's kind of a drop in the puddle of the overall project," he expressed. Approximately \$750,000 in state and federal grants have already been approved for use toward the project, which is a majority of the project cost. Councilmembers approved the agreement with TIB, allowing access to the funds for the upcoming improvements.

Chelan City Council meets every second and fourth Tuesday in Council Chambers at City Hall, beginning at 6 p.m. The next scheduled council meeting will take place Tuesday,

Transportation Improvement Board (TIB), and the second option showing a less ambitious grant for this year as far as applications. "Basically, instead of applying this year, we would just focus on doing design and construction of our current grants, and then go after grants next year and in 2020," explained Raftery. Upcoming projects include:

Entiat Fire Station Park -With design anticipated to begin in June, the City has already received over \$500,000 in grants for this project.

Lakeshore Drive Trail "The project grew over the course of the design," explained Raftery, "so we will be looking to TIB for an increase in project funds, so it would only increase the City's match by about \$3,000." If everything is approved, bidding is expected to go out in February with construction starting in the early spring.

Marina - Permit is in for review and anticipated to come through in early spring. Raftery stated she will be reapplying for funds through Recreation and Conservation Office (RCO) in May.

City-wide chip seal - This project was applied for last year, but were beat out by larger projects. The grant will be reapplied for this year, and if approved, will get the City approximately \$120,000 for chip sealing in the city streets.

Cammack and Owen - The "biggest street project going on," Raftery expressed. The project has increased due to some requests from the City to include a water line, and to increase the roadway width. "So, we're also going to go to TIB to request an increase for that project," she added, "we have already done 90 percent, so we'll have a couple weeks out to do that design revision and resubmit for review, and hopefully still go out to bid in February with an early spring construction and get that road paved."


"As far as some outgoing writing and things like that," Councilman John Alt stated, "we got some fiduciary challenges ahead of us ... some of these projects, for instance if we needed to ask for a grant or look for a grant and it's only every two years and it has to be done by like the end of February or March, that would be





considered a time critical type of situation, or an essential service," he explained, adding, "we've got a transition obviously with Linda retiring and some other moving pieces to come together (still) in our administrative and finance department over the next couple months, so there may some consideration on setting some non-essential projects on freeze for the next 30 days or so. Just until the dust settles." Raftery expressed her understanding on the situation, suggesting that Entiat Fire Station Park, Lakeshore Drive Trail, Cammack Street and the Entiat Way Well projects remain in motion. "These are the projects that I have determined that you should not put on hold, that we should focus on," she emphasized, "if everything else had to be put on hold, even for a year, that would be okay, but I would recommend continuing with those projects just because of where we are at in the grant application or the design phase, that it would be beneficial for the City to just continue with those."

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) award for the community center feasibility study will be closed out in February, explained Raftery, "this is the first step toward planning the community center," she explained, "this is a stepping stone which shows the city's costs and options ... it's not set in stone." The feasibility study will help in producing "realize our vision for what we can expect with the community center," she stated, "(this) will be used as a supporting document in our construction grant that we are planning to go after in June as well." The proposed community center building was set as a priority in the 2009 comprehensive plan, according to the executive summary within the report, "City of Entiat leadership has established that many of the City's buildings are functionally inadequate and justify the need to improve, upgrade or replace the City-owned facilities," the report stated. Studies on the current functionality of four of the City's primary buildings (City Administrative Services, Senior Citizen Center, Library and Public Works buildings) showed that well the Public Works building is "close to meeting their functional needs" and has no immediate need for relocation, the remaining three buildings are in dire need of restructuring. Due to the overlap in shared customers and similar need in facilities, it was determined that the City Administrative Services, Senior Citizen Center and Library would be most functional and efficiently in a shared building. "With shared facilities, common location and a collaborative approach to providing services, it also creates a synergy, economies of scale and a focal point for the community," as explained feasibility study report. Cost for the new infrastructure is

lion, but there are many grant and loan options explained Raftery.

Prior to concluding the meeting, councilmembers held a public hearing on the proposed change to the City of Entiat Zoning Use Chart in regard to the allowance of mini-storage facilities in the Highway Commercial Zone. The change would eliminate the allowance of the ministorages which were permitted via a Conditional Use Permit (CUP), and would not

be permitted in the Highway Commercial Zone at all, as well as the redefinition of mini-storage. The motion was passed with no comment from the public, effectively changing the code to disallow ministorage facilities in that zone.

The councilmembers also approved an agreement with Reserve America for park reservations. The software allows an individual from anywhere to select and reserve a site Entiat City Park.

Concluding the night

agenda, Mayor Keith Vradenburg took the opportunity to present a plaque to City Clerk Linda Countryman in appreciation for all her hard work in her time with the City of Entiat. Countryman will be retiring the end of January.







After retiring he and Joy enjoyed traveling the U.S., Canada and Mexico in their RV. He also built a home for



them in the Sierra foothills, which they sold so they could continue living in San Jose after the onset of Alzheimer's.

He was a gentle man who will be missed by his family, neighbors and friends.

He is survived by his wife Joy of the home; his daughter Vicki (Bob) Carr, son John Olson and grandson Steven Olson Shaw, all of Chelan Wash.: and many nieces and nephews. He was predeceased by his parents, four sisters and two brothers.



I love living in snow country. It is sometimes an exceedingly beautiful time of year. Especially when the snow is fresh, white and clean. Last Friday night in Leavenworth was picture postcard perfect. We all woke up Saturday morning to a beautiful fresh new coat of snow.

I especially want to thank our Chelan County Commissioners on how well they handled the snow removal. Like most of our locally elected politicians they all subscribe to the belief that it is fine to simply push the stuff off the road and onto citizens private property.


