Manson Fire delivers for Season of Hope

Grocery, Manger Mall certificates provided

CHELAN – Manson Fire was out knocking on doors once again, Monday, Dec. 4.

However, there was no fire emergency. Firefighters were delivering stockings to 15 less fortunate families within the Manson community. The stockings, containing over \$6,000 in grocery gift certificates to Manson Red Apple and shopping vouchers to

Lake Chelan hospital board members, staff travel to west side

Hold introductory meeting with architect, contractor

CHELAN – Lake Chelan Community Hospital and Clinics (LCCHC) board members and staff traveled to Elma, Wash. to tour the new rural hospital which was built using USDA funds, and Seattle, to hold an introductory meeting at the office of Architect Collins Woerman, Wednesday, Nov. 15, for a preliminary meeting with board members, Bouten Construction and Architect Collins Woerman according to LCCHC CEO Kevin Abel.

The first of many meetings to come served as an introductory meeting between the hospital board members and staff, contractor and architect. During the meeting, all initial surveys and information were distributed and reviewed, including environmental and traffic surveys.

One other important topic discussed between those involved in the design and construction of the new hospital was the master facilities strategic plan. This plan

anticipates the volumes in various areas within the care facility such as the ER rooms, lab and radiology visits, and the number of patient rooms needed between now and the year 2030. Once established, this plan will advise what is needed, and ensure that the design is within the parameters that LCCHC had set forth and will be compared to the initial schematic design devel-

oped in 2016 by the healthcare facilities planning and development department.

Permitting requirements through the City of Chelan and Department of Health Construction Review Services, among others, were also covered as well as a brief discussion on the budget for the build.

“Our budget is still looking reasonable,” explained Abel

in an interview, “and it will be the next step, but our overall budget is still within reasonable expectations.”

Part of the funding toward the construction of the new building is \$2 million that Lake Chelan Health and Wellness Foundation is in the process of raising through various fundraisers, sponsorships,

Manson Jazz Band earns acceptance to Monterey Next Generation Jazz Festival

Funds being raised to cover expenses

MANSON – The honors jazz band at Manson High School has been accepted to perform at the 48th Annual Monterey Next Generation Jazz Festival in Monterey, Calif. The festival is free to the public audience, and student performers from throughout the country will perform in the downtown city streets during the three-day festival taking place March 9 through 11.

“(It’s) going to be a new and fresh opportunity for the kids,” said Manson Band Instructor Matt Brown, “we’re going to see some of the best jazz bands in the nation performing.”

The Next Generation Jazz Festival (NGJF) is held every spring and over 1,300 of the nation’s top student musicians are selected to perform and compete downtown Monterey, Calif. in front of a street-field audience. According to Monterey Jazz Festival staff, the festival is one of the most inclusive festivals in the United States, and invites performances by middle and high school, as well as col-

legiate level groups of every kind including big bands, vocal ensembles and soloists and conglomerate bands.

The three-day educational performance and workshop allows students to hear and play with some of the most successful student performers from around the United States, utilize techniques, tips, and critiques gathered through workshops led by pro-

fessional performers, and play amongst each other and for others all around downtown Monterey.

At the beginning of the school year, Brown submitted a video for application to the Jazz Festival at the behest of Superintendent Matt Charlton. Every other year, the honors group travels to Moscow, Idaho to participate in the Lionel Hampton Jazz Festival

held at the University of Idaho, explained Brown.

“We’ve had a great time at that one,” he stated, “it’s just a wonderful festival.”

But, this year Superintendent Charlton expressed his desire to see the group go somewhere a little further. After a bit of searching and

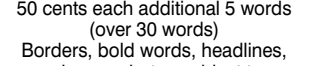

and activities. The current hospital's construction began in the late 1960s and was completed in 1972. While the design and instrumental electrical components were a success at the time, as time has gone by the cost to repair, upgrade, and expand as needed due to increased visits has far surpassed the value of the property itself.

Abel explained that currently, there are a lot of the infrastructure issues, including the plumbing, the electric/wiring, and elevator issues to only name a few, "there's a significant cost to having to upgrade all of that as well," he said.

During a hospital board meeting in 2014, Dr. Charles Waszkewitz was quoted stating his opinion on the current facility, "For '72, it was probably a good hospital," Waszkewitz said, "that is not the case

anymore." Other issues Waszkewitz vocalized with the new facility included the confidentiality issues that double occupancy rooms raise, forcing a transfer to Wenatchee because of those particular privacy rules and the lack of space for functionality in the lab and surgical areas.

Ground breaking for construction of the building is anticipated for either September 2018 or March 2019, depending on design and construction elements, and weather, however it is still too early in the development stage to say definitely when ground will be broke. Grand opening is still anticipated for mid-year of 2020, though.

CHELAN - In an effort to create meaningful connections with the business community, the Chelan School District (CHS) invites business mentors to be a part of our students' educational goals. A class called Career Connections, provides hands-on opportunities for students to try a career before they devote hundreds of dollars into their post-secondary education.

Terrie Carleton, CHS College and Career Coordinator, has been teaching and guiding this effort as a way to introduce her students to various career paths. She does this with the help of several Chelan community partners and mentors. Each year, after students enroll in her class, Mrs. Carleton helps the students discover their career interest and then matches that interest with a business mentor in town. Over the years this partnership with area businesses has paid off handsomely for both the students and the businesses. These internships are a way for students to get out of the classroom and into programs that are meaningful and practical for the student. There is nothing quite as powerful as having the opportunity to determine first hand if a career pathway is the right one for a student's future.

"Our community is stronger because of the connections students are experiencing because of the program," says Carleton. "When students build a relationship with mentors and learn work habits from these local professionals, our entire community benefits from the networking that both the student and the business person

Flu season beginning – time to get your flu shot

EAST WENATCHEE - Influenza (flu) activity is picking up in Washington State. Public health officials suggest the best time for the flu shot is now.

The latest flu surveillance report from Washington State Department of Health indicates there are four (4) lab confirmed deaths in Washington and seven (7) flu outbreaks in long-term care facilities. A few local flu cases have been reported, making this a great time to get your flu shot.

Immunization Coordinator for Chelan-Douglas Health District, Cari Hammond in-

dicates, "It can take at least two weeks from the date of vaccination for most people to generate vaccine induced immunity".

With Christmas approaching, traveling, and family gatherings, getting the flu shot now is perfect timing.

The flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza (flu) viruses. People who have the flu often feel some or all of the following symptoms:

- Fever (not everyone with the flu will have a fever) or feeling feverish/chills
- Cough
- Sore throat
- Runny or stuffy nose
- Muscle or body aches

- Headaches
- Fatigue (tiredness)
- Vomiting and diarrhea (this is more common in children than adults)

Feeling that wonderful winter scratchy throat?

More and more people are reaching for natural remedies instead of heading out to purchase over-the-counter drugs or treatments. While some homeopathic solutions are commonly known and used, the use of pineapples may not have been one of those that immediately crossed your mind.

Researchers throughout many different affiliations, including 'Natural Society', have concluded that using fresh pineapple juice to soothe that pesky scratchy throat and cough is up to five times, or 500 percent, more effective than any cough remedy found on store shelves. But why pineapple juice? Pineapples contain an abundance of vitamins that aid in well-being including vitamin C and manganese, but the key enzyme that eases that wintery cough is known as bromelain. According to an article published on the 'Natural Society' website, this enzyme fights inflammation which soothes irritated airways, prevents unhealthy blood clots and "has antiviral, anti-inflammatory, and antibacterial properties," which all work together in successfully soothing a cough by relaxing the airways and

combats infection.

What's the trick to this home remedy? Stay away from processed pineapple juice. Studies have shown that bromelain is destroyed by heat created during processing the juice for distribution. To reap the benefits the pineapple offers, try a juicer instead, or simply eat the fruit whole.

Ready to give it a try? Natural Society staff have created this 'Pineapple Cough Suppressant Recipe' based off research done in a 2010 issue of Der Pharma Chemica.

- Pineapple Cough Suppressant Recipe**
- 1 Cup fresh (unprocessed) pineapple juice
 - ¼ Cup of fresh lemon juice

- 1 Piece of ginger (about three inches)
 - 1 Tbsp. raw honey
 - ½ Tsp. cayenne pepper
