Chelan Fire and Rescue welcomes new fighter

CHELAN - Fire and Rescue District 7 (CFR 7) welcomed a new face to the crew of firefighters. Austin Murdock, originally of Leavenworth, came to Chelan Fire after working part-time as firefighter and EMT at Marysville and Lake Stevens fire departments.

While baseball was originally the plan for his future, he said he found his passion while volunteering with Chelan County Fire District 3 out of Leavenworth. After graduating from Cascade High School in 2015, he got hired on through the Wenatchee River Ranger District.

"I spent the summer of 2015 fighting wildland fire," he explained, "to gain experience in

the field as well as help pay for my future education through Everett Community College (ECC)."

Once enrolled in the community college, he went straight into EMT courses, then on to the fire academy which gave him all the fire certifications needed for gainful employment through a district.

As Murdock completed the fire academy, he gained part-time employment as a firefighter and EMT through the Marysville Fire Department, then added Lake Stevens Fire Department to his employment, working as a part-time firefighter and EMT through them as well. He continued working both part-time jobs in conjunction with being a full-

time student working toward his degree in fire science, "it has been a grind to say the least," he laughingly added. "The biggest thing that I've gained from working at both of the departments (Marysville and Lake Stevens) have been my EMS skills," he said, "primarily being a part-timer I was on an aide car ... the busiest aide car in Snohomish County, it wouldn't be unusual to transport seven to 10 patients in a 24-hour time period."

Murdock chose ECC for his degree because of the Fire Science Associate's Degree they offer. While taking a quarter off to get settled in as a resident of Chelan and an employee at CFR 7, he anticipates the completion of his fire science degree by the end of the next quarter.

Since moving back to Leavenworth shortly after his employment with Marysville Fire, he had been commuting back and forth, until finally settling in Chelan with girlfriend Marina Williams, who had been hired on as a Physical Education Instructor

through Chelan High School.

At the time of interview, Murdock was on his second day of training at CFR 7, "two days here has been absolutely incredible," he stated, "what a huge support system that I've gotten this far." He will continue through two weeks of training on day shift, then will be placed on shift in December. "Being a probationary firefighter, there's a lot expected of you. And everybody's arms here have been wide open," he added, describing the offers to be shown or helped without have to request it, "what an amazing community this is."

Local surgeon among 1,827 initiated into American College of Surgeons

CHELAN - Dr. Tabetha Bradley was among 1,827 Initiates from around the world who became Fellows of the American College of Surgeons (FACS) during the Convocation ceremony at the College's 2017 annual Clinical Congress in San Diego, Calif., last month. This year's class of Initiates was among one of the largest ever admitted into the College.

Dr. Bradley received a medical doctorate in 2007 from the University of South Carolina and is currently practicing at Lake Chelan Community Hospital. In 2012 Dr. Bradley attained board certification from the American Board of Surgeon. She has a strong professional interest in general and minimally invasive surgery and holds membership in other professional societies, including the Society of American and Gastrointestinal Endoscopic Surgeons.

By meeting the College's stringent membership requirements, Fellows of the College have earned the distinguished right to use the designation of "FACS" (Fellow, American College of Surgeons) after their names. An applicant for Fellowship must be a graduate of an approved medical school; must have completed advanced training in one of the 14 surgical specialties recognized by the College; must

possess certification by an American surgical specialty board or appropriate certification by the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada; and must have been in practice for at least one year at the time of his or her application. Before admission into Fellowship, the surgeon must further demonstrate ethical fitness and professional proficiency, and his or her acceptance as a Fellow of the College must be approved by three-fourths of its Board of Regents.

The Convocation ceremony

was the highlight of the five-day Congress at which initiation into ACS Fellowship took place. The Congress also featured reports on research-in-progress, postgraduate courses, panel discussions, symposia, and scientific and industrial exhibits. Total estimated attendance at the Congress was 11,895, including 8,231 physicians. Allied health professionals and members of the scientific and consumer media also attended the meeting.

The American College of

Surgeons is a scientific and educational organization of surgeons that was founded in 1913 to raise the standards of surgical practice and to improve the quality of care for the surgical patient. The College is dedicated to the ethical and competent practice of surgery. Its achievements have established it as an important advocate for all surgical patients. Chelan Goats Boys’ Basketball: two key players return

An interview with Head Coach Jeff Pearl

CHELAN – Goats’ Boys Basketball prepares to kick off the 2017-18 season after finishing with an overall record of 16-6 last season.

Head Coach Jeff Pearl is entering his second season as head of the Goats’ Boys Varsity squad. “Last year was my first year as a head coach,” he explained, “but was assistant with Coach Harris for six years before that, so 2011 was my first year (coaching).” Pearl grew up in Wenatchee, but relocated to Chelan eight years ago with his wife. “My wife and I were both living in western Washington,” he said, “and were looking for an excuse to come home, and we both ended up get jobs around the same time.”

Key returning players this season include, Sophomore Connor Wilson at guard and Junior Quinn Stamps at post. Add Point Guard Bert Mendivil into the mix, and Pearl feels confident in the team’s abilities this year. “He (Mendivil) didn’t really play for us much last year, but he’s really come in to his own,” he explained his excitement for the sophomore, “over this

off-season, he put in a lot of time and a lot of work, and he has been playing great right out the gate.”

While he lost half of his team to graduation last year, the team has a majority of younger classmen this season. “These guys are young guys and it’s going to take them a while to get used to playing on the same floor as each other,” Pearl expressed, “and getting used to the speed and the intensity at which I want them to practice and play. Last year’s team, we were fortunate, we were able to win all league in my first year. We were senior driven and had a lot of leadership. I’m going to be really looking this year at who’s ready to step up into those leadership roles and it’s difficult to say sometimes with those young guys who’s ready to do that.”

Looking ahead in the season, the Goats’ may have some obstacles coming their way, but Pearl has a plan. “We’re not going to just come out and beat teams outright,” he said, “so we’re going to have to outwork teams, take advantage of the opportunities that we’re going to have to limit the turnovers and make sure we take good shots ... sometimes you have to give up a good shot for a great shot.”

“Honestly, they really like

An interview with Head Coach Steve Nygreen

CHELAN – The Lady Goats launch into the basketball season after concluding last season with a final overall record of 6-14. “We played the toughest schedule in the state of Washington for girls’ basketball at any level,” explained Head Coach Steve Nygreen, “and the toughest schedule of any boys at any level ... we were number one.” He referred to the team’s placing based on the Rating Percentage Index (RPI), taking into consideration other teams in the division’s win/loss record.

Nygreen, with a total of 13 years of coaching experience, is in his fifth-year coaching in Chelan, after taking a teaching opportunity at Chelan Middle School five years ago. With only one senior on the team, the Goat’s Girls’ Varsity will

be freshman heavy this year, but “they’re only freshman by age, they’re not real freshman ... they’ve probably played 300 games,” explained Nygreen. He has a lot of faith in the capabilities of his players, and boasts three key returning players, Junior Lexie Gleasman at guard, Junior Ashley Sams at Center, and Sophomore Molly Oswald at guard. Senior Ashley Oswald will be leading the team, he explained, “she’s a guard, she’s tough nosed, and absolutely goes after people.”

Key rookies to watch for this year, include Freshmen Hailee “Booh” Huddleston and Xitlali Cruz, “we’re going to be leaning on them this year,” explained Nygreen. The two freshmen may be new to the team, but are far from rookies on the court. “We’ll be strong defensively and we’ll shoot the ball well,” he added, “I think they’ll be a better shooting team then we’ve had in previous years.”

“Our goal this year is to try and slide in to the one, two, or three spots. Those three spots

have previously participated at state and are looking for a return visit this year.

Tiny project gaining big momentum in the form of a tiny home at MHS

MANSON -- Manson High School has a new tiny project that is gaining big momentum. Several years ago, one our innovative teachers—who was also a general contractor prior to becoming a teacher—proposed an idea to create a class that would design and construct a Tiny House.

However, as is often the case, funding was not available to purchase the equipment necessary to take on such a big task. The dream sat on the shelf for years, until we came across carryover dollars last school year from GEAR UP.

Our superintendent, Matt Charlton, approached the teacher and put together a proposal to renovate our vocational technology department and purchase the woodworking tools needed to construct the Tiny House. GEAR UP approved the plan and the high school additions took place over the summer. We proudly commissioned our Tiny House class on the first day of school. It is an elective that high school students can choose each

semester.

There are currently 16 students in the class. There are two student project managers that delegate the workflow on a daily basis. The students designed floor plans, sketched elevation plans, and built seven different prototypes of the Tiny House out of balsawood.

Then over the course of three days, community members, teachers, and students were invited to vote on their favorites. After the votes were tallied and the “winner” of the prototypes was chosen, the students went to work on the planning and construction of the house. The students will participate in every step: design, framing, plumbing, electrical, insulation, drywall, siding, roofing, finishes.

The Tiny House is not only a very timely and applicable class for our students in the valley because of the nature of the growing construction field in our area, but it is also very beneficial to our people group.

There are needs in our community for a commodity like this; with the rising prices of homes in the area and the lack of low-income housing, we are

continually struggling to find affordable housing. The complete Tiny House project will serve as a means to generate jobs and housing possibilities for our community.

There are local contractors that have expressed concern for the decreasing number of people entering the construction-field trades and have already vowed to hire students out of this class for summer jobs. In addition, there are currently seven people that have contacted our teacher to purchase one of our Tiny Houses. After the sale of our first Tiny House, we will be able to use the funds to purchase the materials for our second house and create a sustainable program.

Our partnership with CWU's GEAR UP has awarded us the opportunity to further develop our vocational department and expand the students' vision and possibilities through the hands-on experience of the vast areas involved in designing and constructing a house. The passion of teachers, and vision of a superintendent, and GEAR UP funds allowed us to jumpstart a promising program for Manson High School.
