Chelan City Council welcomes new code enforcement officer

Approves proposed property tax levy increase

CHELAN – City Council members convened Tuesday, Nov. 14, at Council Chambers for a regular meeting. The full agenda included a variety of standardized topics under consent, public hearing, motion considerations, and administrative reports. However, the public comment segment of the session was particularly noteworthy as additional time was allowed for a presentation by the Friends of Lake Chelan. (see separate story)

First to the podium for public comment was Historic Downtown Chelan Association (HDCA) President Linda Van Lunsen.

“I’d like to just take a moment to talk to councilmembers about ... the allocation of lodging tax, the 3 percent tax,” she began, “I’m here for HDCA, but really, I’m also representing all non-profit businesses in Chelan ... there’s a lot of organizations out here that have events and incredibly successful events.” Van Lunsen began describing how the town and community benefit from the events hosted by local non-profit organizations. The attraction and visitors the events bring and how the events also promote tourism which stimulates the financial vitality

of Chelan. “As you know,” she explained, “non-profits have a very limited and tight budget, we have experienced that all the time with HDCA ... tonight I just want you to consider the allocation that, to my understanding has always been, presented to the chamber,” she began, referring to the 3 percent lodging tax distributed by the city.

“This year, to my understanding,” she continued, “is going to be somewhere around \$590,000 to \$600,000 ... I’d like for you to consider maybe entertaining the thought of setting maybe it be 10 percent, \$59,000, or whether it be a fixed price, that when we go to the chamber (if that’s going to be who allocates and supports these non-profits) that there’s a little more there that can be beneficial to build up our marketing piece.”

After conclusion of the public comment segment, Code Enforcement Officer Casey Tjeerdsma, the newest member to the City of Chelan’s Planning Department, was introduced. Tjeerdsma will be focusing on business code compliance, and is a certified code inspector.

“Casey started as the City’s code enforcement officer in mid-August,” explained Planning Director Craig Gildroy, “he comes to us after serving as a City of Burlington firefighter. Part of his firefighting duties included business code compliance.”

Friends of Lake Chelan present proposed housing solution to councilmembers

“Affordable rents free up discretionary spending in the community,” explained Kline.

CHELAN – Steve Kline and John Olson of Friends of Lake Chelan presented a “Citizen Campaign to Promote Affordable Rental Housing in the City of Chelan” slideshow to City Council at the general meeting, Tuesday, Nov. 14 at City Hall. The presentation provided thorough and specific answers to the current dilemma for the lack of affordable housing.

“I know you have a full agenda,” began Steve Kline, “and I’ll try and speed through this for you, but it is a very important component and we’ve spent many months on this.”

He commenced the presentation by first explaining why the team had initiated a citizen campaign on affordable housing.

“The overriding premise of affordable housing is this,”

he explained, “affordable housing will never emerge in an open real estate marketplace because the marketplace will always promote the highest economic value ... affordable housing is done by the people and for the people to meet community needs ... the most important part of this whole thing is a partnership between developer, city, landowner, and community is essential.” Kline proceeded, explaining the necessity of affordable housing in the community, providing statistics including:

Sixty percent (3,000 employees) of Chelan’s work force commutes from the outside areas (Comprehensive Plan’s Economic Development Plan).

At an average of \$25,000 a year income, the result is a \$75,000,000 revenue loss to Chelan, “people tend to spend their money where they live,” he emphasized, “not where they work.”

The wide-spread job vacancies create further economic loss.

He then moved on to explaining some results discovered from an informal survey conducted on personnel at the city, schools, parks, and service industry workers in Chelan. The survey disclosed that average income in the City of Chelan is net \$20,500 or \$1,700 a month. At the standard 30 percent

Manson Parks talks budget, payroll, contracted services

MANSON – Manson Parks and Recreation Board Members held a special meeting Thursday, Nov. 16 at the Parks Office.

The 2018 budget was discussed at the special meeting, with coverage on proposed pay increases to parks employees. The proposed raises range from three percent to four and a half percent for the employees on the lower spectrum of the payroll. The pay raise, according to Parks Director Robin Pittman, will get employees ahead of the prevailing and rising minimum wage increase.

Parks members moved from the budget, into discussion for the renewal of contracted services with Blackwatch

Security. The parks are currently under the watch of the security service, and generally run two-year agreements. However, with the upcoming levy ending the end of 2018, the parks board has opted to sign a one-year agreement with an option for a second year, securing the monitoring services for the local parks.

Concluding the special meeting was a discussion on the request for authorization of Resolution 2017-03, an authorization for 2018 Tax Levy increase, in which the board members approved the ordinance for the annual one-percent property tax levy increase.

The next regular monthly meeting will be held Tuesday, Dec. 19 at 6 p.m. in the Parks and Recreation office.

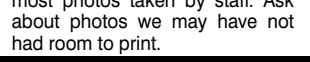

Tjeerdsma thanked the City and Council members for the opportunity to be working in Chelan, and began telling of the accomplishments and goals he already has for the city, beginning with the removal of broken down or abandoned vehicles along the city streets.

"Such a great addition to our community," added Mayor Mike Cooney, "and while I'm Mayor I'd like to see more additions to our staff like Casey." Before conclusion of the introduction, Mayor Cooney requested that the community come forward "with anything in neighborhood that is bothersome or code infringement, they may not be code yet, but we're looking for those things ... we just want the city to be cleaned up."

After the special introduction of the new code enforcement officer, a public hearing was opened and City Finance Director Cheryl Grant began the request for an ordinance increasing the current property tax levy by one percent. The 2018 Property Tax Levy would increase the current rate of \$1.42 by one percent to applicable

tax payers. Property taxes are the primary fund of revenue for the street fund, and partial revenue fund for the City's revenue fund. She began by explaining the current standing of the City's funds after previous budget workshops on the street and general funds, stating the City's current assessed value is just under \$1 billion for 2018, the one percent increase would bring an additional \$13,125 to the ditional property taxes of nearly \$52,000 from new construction, and \$1,500 from refunds. After property taxes and refunds, the street fund would receive just under \$50,000 said Grant. The increase "does not mean that everybody that pays taxes is going to pay more to the City of Chelan," she explained, "what it means is we're allowed to increase our revenue and property taxes by that amount,

and then it's parceled out by what the levy rate is, which is reset each year based on the assessed values of the properties in the city." Councilmembers approved the request for the preparation of the new ordinance, which will be presented for approval and adoption at a later meeting date. Mayor Cooney described the property tax levy increase as "an aggregate on the total property tax and the valuation."

Other topics discussed in the council meeting were:

- Hearing Examiner Services Agreement, retaining Hearing Examiner Andrew Kottkamp's services through the year 2020.
Proposed Wastewater Connection Agreement with Chelan Fruit.
Gordon Thomas Honeywell 2018 Legislative Agenda.

2017 Comprehensive Plan Update Package Adopting Ordinance No. 2017-1533/2017-003J. The update included changes to the Warehouse Industrial District (W-I) permitting 18 density units per acre (du/ac) in the Apple Blossom Center as an overlay on the current 8.7 du/ac.

The next regular city council meeting will be held Tuesday, Nov. 28 at City Hall, beginning at 6 p.m.

of net wages segregated for housing budget, at the given standard income, this would allow \$587 for rent, he explained then stated, "obviously there is nothing here for that ... this could create a model for Chelan Valley and the State of Washington," he said, continuing by pointing out the work force housing zoning that is currently included in the city planning process, and the lifetime opportunity to become "community heroes."

Models provided as examples of the low-cost, lower perceived density, and aesthetically pleasing "Missing Middle Housing" were varying styles of bungalow courts, side-by-side duplexes, and carriage housing.

"The floor area ratio does not meet Single-Family Residential (RM) and Multi-Family Residential (RM) zoning standards," he said, but rather used a form-based coding that allows up to 35 units per acre. This design, as described on the Missing Middle Housing website, creates "a moderate density that can support public transit and services and amenities," and because of the smaller footprint of the designs, and typical placement of the housing, "the perceived density of these types is usually quite low ... but one of the primary benefits of Missing Middle

is that the neighborhood densities are often higher than 16 dwelling units per acre (du/ac) - the threshold needed to create a supportive environment for transit and neighborhood-serving main streets." The missing middle plan, or fused grid, creates modular layouts similar to Savannah, Georgia; Austin, Texas, and even San Francisco, Calif., "that incorporate all the desirable elements - livability, safety, security, sociability, and delight," as detailed on the website as well. The "attractive and homogenous feel will blend into a residential neighborhood without creating a 'cell block' or 'not in my backyard' feel," Kline stressed.

He described the "tenant criteria" for rental of the units, and referred to advice given by a past Sunnyside mayor stating to "stay away from government controlled plans." The criteria would mandate tenants:

- Must work in Chelan
Have income below \$50,000
Rents are indexed to state minimum wage
Must conform with city work-force housing regulations
1-year minimum rental contract
local police background checks (to establish crime-free housing)
Maximum of two people per bedroom

"Very good," commented Mayor Mike Cooney, "I will ask the council to consider taking this subject up with John (Olson) and Steve (Kline)... and maybe more to the point ... we will discuss as far as a workshop discussion and have Steve and John come and elaborate, that way we can have back and forth discussions," he then added, "but we applaud you. Way to get this thing started."

Jim Hemberry, passed the IRIS baton to the current hosting city’s mayor, Chelan Mayor Mike Cooney. As Cooney accepted the baton, he expressed his gratitude for the opportunity to hold the summit in Chelan, then introduced who he vocalized as the man that made hosting the event possible, Lake Chelan School District Superintendent Barry DePaoli. “Today is about amplifying the spirit of the community,” started DePaoli, emphasizing “the real beauty of the valley is in the people.”

With initial introductions out of the way, Chelan High School Actors and Chelan School of Innovation Artists performed an expedited informational skit, on “The Story of Chelan,” reenacting the creation of and ultimately the settlement in Chelan. The play began approximately 40,000

– 10,000 BC, as enormous glaciers carved through the valley and eventually settling, creating what we see now as Lake Chelan. Following acts displayed settlers from as early as 8,000 BC to the presence of power to the new town in 1928. Each act displayed accurately themed wardrobe, props, and action – making the play an action-filled historical education piece. The play was produced, written, and narrated by Wendy Isenhardt, with direction and fact-checking by

Jane Lloyd, and production by Erik Peterson of Chelan School of Innovation, and Aiden Peterson of Chelan High School.

In a “Beyond Chelan Success Sampler,” Colville Tribe Member Douglas Marconi spoke about current water sheds programs and the struggles and successes he’s encountered with each. He then concluded his speech by playing a tribal song, and asked the audience to not photograph or record the music, but to simply listen, eyes closed, and remember it in your heart. The tune was about the mind, heart, and soul, and to take care of these essential parts of your being.

Next year’s summit has been proposed to be held in Pateros. Mayor of Pateros Carlene Anders, said she would be honored to host the event, given approval by council.
