“Pink” tournament proceeds awarded

Check presented to Chelan Chase

CHELAN - The committee for the Pink Ribbon Classic presented a check from the annual golf tournament to Soroptimist President Joan Nolan, Nov.

1 at the Lake Chelan Golf Course. The proceeds are donated each year to Chelan Chase to help those who are underinsured or uninsured receive needed services such as mammography, as well as other preventative and medical care through the Wellness Place in Wenatchee.

While the Lake Chelan Golf Course has hosted a breast

cancer benefit tournament for years, proceeds had not always been distributed locally, nor has it been a consistent annual event. Prior to beginning the Pink Ribbon Classic in 2013, the proceeds earned through the “Race for the Cure” tournament were awarded to the Susan

Chelan City Council hears proposed Holiday Hills public concerns

CHELAN - City Council gathered Tuesday, Oct. 24 at City Hall for their regularly scheduled meeting. There was a wide array of topics discussed, however public comment directed attention to the topic most on the community’s mind - Holiday Hills. Mountain View Drive resident Debbie Mason was first to approach the podium and share her thoughts. “My house was built in 1900 ... many months ago we have received, at one of the meetings on February 21, 2017, the site plan for Holiday Hills that were distributed. So, we worked off these numbers from February 21 ... we now have documentation that shows increase on the density due to the change of the lot sizes up there.” Mason expressed her concern about the dust from placement off hundreds of homes and the impact it will have on the current residents, school, and downtown areas, as well as concern with the turning of the previous orchard soil and the hazards of arsenic and lead in soil. “The character of the existing neighborhood and Chelan will be greatly impacted. The

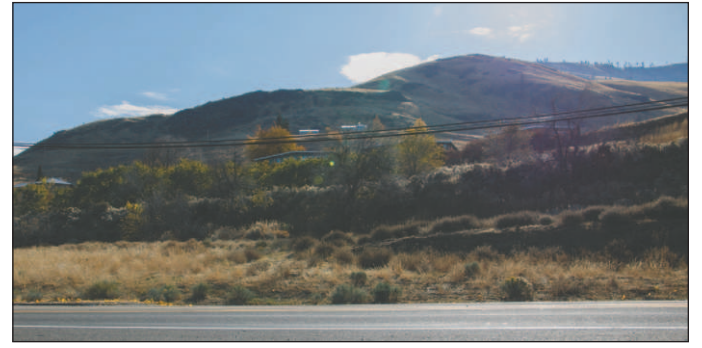

decision for the proposed project to be issued a determination of non-significance seems at odds with the issues we have raised, these are significant issues.”

Next to voice opinion on the Holiday Hills development was Betty Hirschberger, also of Mountain View Drive, “because they submitted their proposal and it was deemed complete on Sept. 18, 2017, will they still be held to all the new codes that we have updated, the building codes, the wildland interface, the streets ... I want to make sure that they have to hold to

everything we did,” she addressed the City Council and staff. She continued by explaining the discovery of discrepancies in SEPA, arsenic being one of them. “There is no clear precedent ingress or egress for this property,” she explained and asked for an Environmental Impact Study (EIS) to be done for this proposal to evaluate all potential impacts to the built and natural environment, “If this development doesn’t cry for an EIS, I don’t know what does,” she concluded. Hans

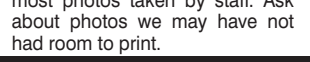
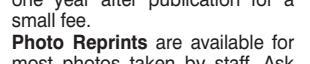

Hirschberger followed with his concerns on the proposed development, "Holiday Hills is going to be The Lookout on steroids," he began, "it's not going to be a good thing if it's built the way it is ... I want it done well, I want it done tastefully." He explained the trouble their group had finding a property for the new high school back in the 80's "We looked at Walmart, we looked at the ball fields ... and most of the sites were hot with lead arsenic, really really hot, the one thing you don't want to do with lead arsenic is stir up the dust," he said. He explained further on his concerns with the arsenic from the land that was previously orchard. Other public comments included:

Linda Van Lunsen – "Looking at the site plan, there's about 35,000 sq. ft. of proposed business usage – as a business owner, as well as I'm on the board of Historic Downtown Chelan Association (HDCA), I'm a bit concerned about that. As a business owner of nine years we've seen the highs and lows, and I think we can all agree that our downtown is doing really well, they're established, we've got a good downtown core of businesses. ... My concern is that by getting this other venue going of 35,000 sq ft, it's going to take away what we've worked so hard establishing in the historic downtown area."

Loni Rahm – "I've been involved in tourism promotion and destination marketing for nearly 30 years, including for over seven years when I served

as the Lake Chelan Chamber of Commerce Director. I implemented the first ever year-round tourism marketing program for this valley, created the first website and produced the first visitors guide. I'm telling you guys this because those of you who don't know me, I want you to understand that I am not opposed to tourism, and I'm certainly not opposed to economic development within our community. For eight years after I was the Chamber Director, I was the Tourism Economic Contractor for the Port of Chelan County ... we are not opposed reasonable common-sense growth, but I do want to express my disappointment on the apparent lack of caution and the adherence to public participation ... after a lengthy public participation ... there was inconsistencies

and outright contradictions between this notice of application, some of the other reports that have supported it, and your Comp Plan. The very first proposal out of the gate after the Comp Plan is completely contrary to the goals identified and adopted through the plan. The top priorities through the plan include very clearly, protection of the butte, view corridor, maintaining the integrity of the downtown retail, and enhancing the quality of life. And yes, I'm using quotes here, "single largest proposed development in the history of Chelan," and yet, according to city representation, this does not even qualify for an Environmental Impact Statement?"

Items on the agenda for the Oct. 24 meeting were a brief presentation from Chelan County PUD, allowing council meeting attendees the same overview that was being provided at the same time at Chelan Fire Hall. In the presentation, Customer Utilities Managing Director John Stoll explained the addition of underground lines at the proposed Henderson site, in response to public concern.

The next agenda item was a preview of the Airport Master Plan update. Port of Chelan County, District 3 Commissioner Rory Turner gave an overview

of why it's happening. "Design standards and grant assurances," answered Turner.

Last of the agenda items was an update on the Woodin Avenue Project, which includes the update and restructuring of the Woodin Avenue bridge from a two-way access to only one-way. Dan Ireland, with SCJ Alliance, began by explaining the aesthetics and functionality that will be available with the updated bridge. "The balanced solution now includes bridge preservation, walkability, economic opportunity, safety, traffic, and necessary infrastructure upgrades," he explained to the council. Greg Hess explained what to look for in design and maintainability. He has been on the Woodin Avenue bridge project on and off for around seven years, and was originally tasked with repairing cracks, structural concerns, and other items in a state of disrepair. Currently, there are four-foot sidewalks on both sides. Now, in the design plan, there is an eight-foot sidewalk on one side, with a five-foot sidewalk on the other, as well as a five-foot bike lane and 10-foot vehicle lane. Ireland concluded the presentation with a statement explaining the aesthetics that will be used in attempt to tie in the bridge aesthetically to the HDCA's downtown theme.

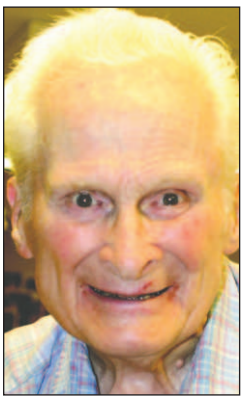

MANSON - By the end of his junior year, Joe Strecker had just finished fourth in the boys 4x100 meter relay at the WIAA State Track and Field Championships, and was a varsity member of both Manson HS football and basketball teams. Strecker, who is now a senior on the league-leading Trojan football team, would have never predicted these accomplishments when he entered high school three years ago.

"This is my first year being a pretty good athlete," Strecker said. "I came into high school kind of anything but an athlete, so it's been kind of a process to get where I am."

Even though Strecker came into high school not considering himself an athlete, he enjoyed playing so much that he decided to make athletics a part of his high school experience in a big way. Strecker is now the starting running back, football team captain, and basketball captain for the Trojans.

"This is the best sports season of my life, so far," he said. "I went from having one touchdown and maybe a couple hundred rushing yards last year, to close to 1,000 rushing yards and 10 touchdowns this year already."

His dedication to sports has not diminished, as he is involved in other leadership activities at his school. He serves as the ASB vice president, FBLA treasurer, and Honors Society member. His determination and perseverance transformed his abilities one year at a time.

"He made himself into an athlete," Manson Head Varsity Coach Joey Johanson said. "And that determination has carried over into other parts of his life such as school."

Coach Johanson is new this year as the Manson football head coach, but he has witnessed this transformation since joining the staff for during spring football. He speaks highly of Strecker and his natural leadership skills, as well as his adaptability, positive mindset and determination.

"Joe's emotions are always in check because he knows other players are watching to see how he reacts," Johanson said. "He will be the first teammate to pick someone up when they mess up. The Joe Strecker's of high school sports are the reason I love coaching."

Although Strecker has only been a varsity athlete for a couple years, his newfound joy has made him aware of the importance of participating in sports and extra-curricular activities.

"There's a lot to be learned from football and sports besides how to play," Strecker said. "So much to be learned from extra-curriculars, whether it be leadership skills, perseverance, dedication. You pick up life lessons you can use once you're out of school and done with sports."

Strecker's relationship with his first-year coach has been brief, but their values of teamwork are right in step with one another. Because of this, Johanson is confident that Strecker will find success after high school, regardless of what he decides to pursue.

"I believe sports and activities are the closest representation of life," Johanson said. "We lose, have bad games, and even disagree with each other, but we work through it. Sports showed me that it is possible to work through problems and that if groups are going to succeed, it takes the whole group buying in. If we as coaches show the importance of teamwork, our athletes will be more successful and hopefully selfless in life."

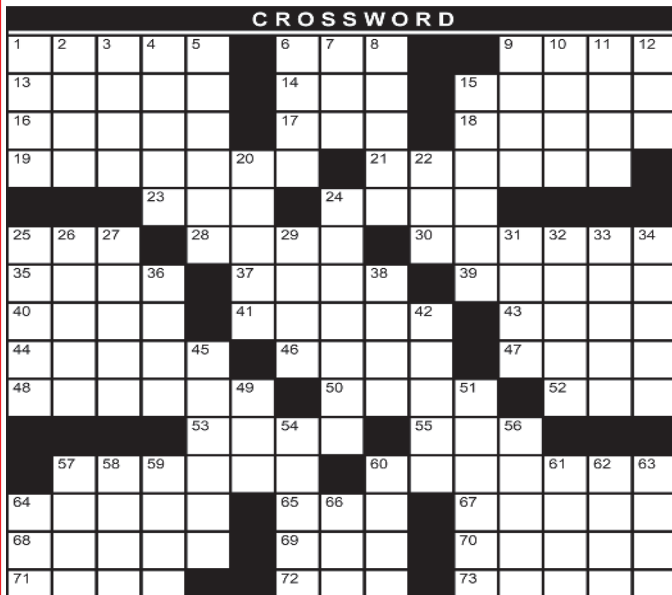
