## Chelan City Council members hear almost unanimous opinion from community concerning Comp Plan

*"We will listen and we will hear."*

CHELAN – Chelan City Council members commenced the final public hearing on the city's Comprehensive Plan amendments and updates, Tuesday, August 22 at the Chelan High School Performing Art Center. Over 200 members of the community, filled the PAC as Council began reviewing the standard agenda items prior to hearing public comment.

After nearly a year, and now 24 public meetings on the Comprehensive Plan, the community outreach and opinion segment of the process will reach completion. Mayor Mike Cooney began explaining the procedure and the expected etiquette to the attendees, "The purpose of a public hearing is to receive public comment, and we're serious about that, we want to listen tonight," he explained then continued explaining that there will be no discussions at this time, the Council may ask questions or for clarification, but, "The hearing is not meant to be a discussion."

One by one individuals began taking place in line to be heard at the podium. First at the

podium was Clint Campbell of No See Um Orchard, "before we get too far into the discussion tonight," he said, "we wanted to make sure that the council understood that No See Um Orchard has withdrawn its request for a rezone from a single family to a multi-family residential." Campbell continued by explaining the reasoning behind the withdrawn request, providing more time to listen to the neighborhood and gather more project support. "As a point of clarification," he concluded to ensure understanding, "our withdrawal doesn't affect the current status of our Tourist Accommodation request in the Comp Plan amendment draft."

After a couple brief statements from members of the community, Steve Kline, took the podium with one of the most impactful speeches of the night, judging by the reaction of fellow community members in the crowd.

"I represent the Friends of Lake Chelan and the hundreds of people who have signed petitions, and who have come before you and spoken at the Comp Plans and public forums over the year regarding public access to the lake and a park at the location." Kline began. He continued by stating concerns with the Goodfellow Brothers' 2010 project plan for the Three Fingers, which was on display in the

lobby. "Being complete at 170 boat slips that will generate the 54 condominiums on the fingers will service approximately 400 people. Those people won't live here, and those people won't be part of the community." He stated, then began describing another alternative, "A

beautiful lake access park at this location will generate that hometown feeling of a village by the lake, and it will remind you of the quality of

## Chelan County Commissioners destroy marijuana farmers with strict new regulations

*Growers vow to fight back with lawsuit*

WENATCHEE -- After hearing much public testimony, Chelan County Commissioners passed new regulations regarding the growing and processing of marijuana at the August 22 Chelan Commissioner's meeting. After the vote was tallied, some of the 30 or so audience members cried "jackass!" and "shame!" to no avail.

The winners in this skirmish were the handful of complaining homeowners who live near marijuana growers including newly elected Commissioner Kevin Overbay, who has a marijuana grower for a neighbor in Malaga. Despite that fact, he did not recuse himself from voting against the growers who are concerned the new regulations will put nearly all of them out of business.

"It's crazy. We've been in business since 2013. We followed all the rules and regulations. We built accordingly and got permitted. Now, we're just done. We have 20 full-time employees that no longer have jobs," said Josh Bitterman of Evergreen Production in Monitor. "They zoned us out. We got the building. We went into the zoning they told us we could build in. Now, we're zoned out."

## Manson School District returns to class Tuesday, Sept. 5

*Secondary school remodels art, shop, and band rooms*

MANSON – Manson schools commence the 2017-18 school year Tuesday, Sept. 5, at the normal start time of 8:30 a.m.

Manson Middle School has three new additions to their teaching staff, Ms. Ann Goodrich in Mathematics, Ms. Amy Davis in Science, and Mr. Joey Johanson in Special Education, as well as Varsity Head Football Coach. In the high school, Ms. Kate Sorenson will be teaching Mathematics.

All fall sports practices for the high school have started, and middle school fall sports will begin on the first day of class, Sept. 5.

In addition to new teaching staff, students in the secondary school building will be seeing remodeled art, band, and shop rooms, as well as new roofing, retrofitting lighting on both the middle school and high school sides, and new paint in the gymnasium according to Manson School's Superinten-

dent Matt Charlton. Funding for the upgrades and remodels are provided through the

2013 Capital Facilities levy, as well as state matching funds.

## NCWEDD welcomes 'creative' guests at monthly meeting

CHELAN – The North Central Washington Economic Development District (NCWEDD) convened for a regular monthly meeting, Wednesday, August 9, at Chelan City Hall. The meeting covered several subjects including finances, upcoming meetings, and a brief

mentioning without update on Plug-In NCW, and Route 97 Tourism projects.

Joining the NCWEDD committee were special guests, Karen Dawn Dean, Scott Bailey, and Smoker Marchand. Dean, with the support of Bailey and Marchand, brought a presentation focusing on promoting creative industries, and nurturing a creative atmosphere in the

valley. "Creative workers in creative enterprises promotes wealth," said Dean, then added "collectively, what we're missing is an economic and cultural development agency." The intent of the presentation was to bring an awareness to the need for a common area for creative minds to gather, purchase supplies, and sell products.

Following the presenta-

tion, the regular agenda began. A majority of time was spent discussing various financial information and concerns regarding the NCWEDD's status and stability. While still waiting on responses from three grants applied for between May and July, the Ameriprise, EDA, and USDA grants, it's anticipated that the results will be returned within the

month. Executive Director Karen Francis-McWhite continued through the lists of expenses and revenues before briefly stopping at membership dues. "There are several towns that have not yet paid the 2017 dues," said Francis-McWhite, then proceeded to explain that these towns were waiting to ascertain the stability of the development district.

In a short interview with the Lake Chelan Mirror, Francis-McWhite clarified this situation stating "the EDD was going through a bit of a transition, I'm not too worried about it though," and reassured that the withholding of membership dues is solely a temporary situation until the towns begin to feel secure in their investment again.

Chair Doug England said he would have liked to keep the ban in place prohibiting new marijuana growing operations.

"Even though I'm not a proponent of the use of marijuana, that has not been our intent or our purpose. This regulation in no way affects the retail sale of marijuana in Chelan County. I would like to have left it just as it is, however, that is not an option," England said. "I will take only partial blame for that. The three commissioners, none of us has ever been involved in the production of marijuana. We were assured by the industry that odor would not be a problem. In fact, a comment was made they would not even know we were there."

Not every existing grow in Chelan County is going to fit these new regulations, England said.

"It would be nice to simply say we are going to ban jerks in Chelan County and anybody that is nice and respectful of neighbors can continue," England said. "That's not the way code can be written. That's not the way code can be enforced. It's also definitely a concern, but not an overriding consideration that production could be more expensive than it has been in the past, but that is a fact of business."

When this process began, the commission made no assurances, said Commissioner Keith Goehner. Chelan County did not have regulations nor had permitted any cannabis activities before. The regulations do set parameters for what is acceptable for growing marijuana in Chelan County, he said.

"Code is put in place, but it is also amendable. As time lapses, we should be revisiting it to see if it is working," Goehner said. He said it was not an easy task to come up with regulations. There were people on both sides of the issue expressing their concerns,

both for the industry and against it.

"As our resolution states, it really covers a lot of the areas that was uncertainties for us as counties, not just Chelan County, but counties statewide. When we talk with our fellow commissioners, they are finding some of the same issues," Goehner said. "Dealing with Chelan County is somewhat unique because of the topography. We've made the commitment to try and do our best to come up with standards that allow for some production in appropriate places."

Overbay stated, "It's very unfortunate. It's unfortunate we had to get to a place where these regulations had to be put into place in order to conduct the businesses and make sure the quality of life in Chelan County is maintained. The whole purpose of I-502 was to decriminalize the possession and growing of marijuana. The other was to provide a tax base for services. The third was to try and diminish a black market effect that we have. I don't know if any or all of that has been achieved."

"... it's never been my intent to agree to something that would diminish an industry. It would be easy for this commission to adopt nothing, but that is nothing any of the three of us wanted to do. We wanted to see an industry be able to be here in Chelan County. Unfortunately, finding middle

ground. You have very little space," Overbay said.

"My hope is, as we work through this ... rules and regulations can change," Overbay concluded.

Bitterman said they have over \$1 million invested into their business. At this point, a lawsuit is their only option.

"What else can we do? There's no way to get your money back. It's not good for any of us. There's not going to be any grows left," Bitterman said.

Nick Paton is the head grower for Double Delicious in Malaga. He felt like the commission decided to listen to the small group of residential complainers.

"We're in an agricultural community. We may not be considered agriculture, but we are regulated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. I have to have a pesticide license to use any type of chemicals at the facility," Paton said. "If they were to regulate this business the same way they do a microbrewery, what are they going to do because they smell? Neighbors don't like them, but they are still going to allow revenue on the retail side. They are still going to allow the stores."

Not a single business would be able to continue to operate under the new regulations, Paton said. He calls it spot zoning, which would put the existing 44 operations out of business. The Central Washington Grower's Association is planning to get back what's been lost, Paton said.

I-502 passed in 2012, including carrying a majority in Chelan County, Paton pointed out.

"The county commissioners said they would allow businesses to operate. They said they would add no extra hindrances or extra regulation. They would simply follow state law. These businesses came in and dumped fortunes, took outside investments," Paton said. "This is under a 20-year plan or longer to recoup some of these investments. A few years later, they completely flip flopped. They banned until they could figure out extensive regulation, which is what they just put forth. They will no longer allow any new businesses to come in or expansion of businesses."

Paton said the commissioners make it sound like all you have to do is follow the regulations, but it's not that simple.

"Maybe they are in the wrong zoning or they are too close to their neighbors. Maybe their building doesn't have a 35-foot setback. Our building was built in 1907 right next to the train tracks. We can't just pick up and move to meet their criteria," Paton said. "You go through the list of each producer/processors and why they would fail. There is not a single one that meets the criteria. There might be helpful who would have to do extensive renovations that most can't afford."

Caitlein Ryan of Seven Hills Farm, president of the Central Washington Grower's Association, said she was not surprised at the commission's decision. She said this is what

they wanted from the outset.

"A few made comments about it not being okay to let the ban lapse. Essentially they've just written code that has the exact same affect in the end," Ryan said. "My feeling is they get to pat themselves on the back, but this has just brought us to the exact same end. All of us have put in quite a lot of work. We've been here hours and hours on end for the last two years, right along side of them, giving them lots of information to come up with a real sensible code. It all fell on deaf ears, for the most part."

A lot of other counties have grandfathered this in, she said, Snohomish, Grant, Douglas, Okanogan, counties that look very similar to Chelan County. Those counties are in a similar position, but have not decided to take similar action, Ryan noted.

Moving forward, Ryan said they have a lawsuit on the books that they have been holding off on until this new code was created. During that "holding off period" were months of meetings between the opposing sides meant to mediate the issues, but the growers feel like they got the short end of the stick.

"This code is written with lots of crazy exceptions. It will make our life easy once we get to court. That is where we are headed," Ryan said.

Lee Duncan, owner of Manna Productions, a tier one indoor grow in Malaga and vice-president of the CWGA, said the new regulations amount to a little more than spot zoning, and more or less, a ban. Out of the 44 farms in Chelan County, only one, he figures, can meet the regulations.

One farm does not amount to an industry, Duncan said.

"I meet the zoning, but I don't meet the setback on one side. I am probably one of two farms that could get a variance. I just feel like they'll pull the rug out from under us some other way. 'Suzie' said you smell, so you're done," Duncan said. "I'll stay in the lawsuit as long as I can. We're going to move forward with it asap. It has affected me greatly over the past year-and-a-half because we do the legwork for all this."

Duncan said they've come to 90 percent of the meetings. He feels like Overbay is trying to root the industry out of the county.

"Not even the two people that spoke against us at the last meeting like the resolution. No one has said shut all the farms down, but that's exactly what they've done," Duncan said. "A dereliction of duty by all three commissioners. They are going to use taxpayer dollars to fight a fight that easily could have been resolved through cooperation, but they never allowed it. They strategically divided this community."

The hope, Duncan says, is to be able to continue operating while the lawsuit is taking place.

life that you either moved here for or stayed here for. This is where barbecues, birthday parties, water activities, and best of all this is where unaware and unwilling buddies are tossed in to the lake. Lifetime friendships are forged here, and hundreds of thousands of memories are made here for locals and visitors alike, not just 400 people." Kline began describing actions taken by the Friends of Lake Chelan, in an effort to bring awareness to the "dire need for public water access." "The city Attorney ... summed it up the best 'the process to acquire the property is legal, and it can be done' the city attorney goes on to say the City Council, in order to make this happen, must exercise just two words 'political will.'"

Kline then tells of the seven parcels that were used to create the No See Um roundabout. "The Department of Transportation, with the help of the City of Chelan, used imminent domain on seven parcels to make the No See Um roundabout. The council has said this has to do with what the community wants, and if they fall short, two other words will be used on this property, and they're

going to be these," Kline then held up a "No Trespassing" sign and displays it throughout the room, then concluded "and our opportunity for open lake access will be lost forever." As Kline left the podium to return to his seat, the audience of community members produced an exuberant round of applause in support and appreciation.

As the evening continued with more opinions and speeches, Lynette Grandy, of Chelan, took a moment at the podium. "The Comp Plan includes the city's housing plan and housing vision statement," she began, "it includes the recommendation that they city provide regulatory guidance and incentives to actively encourage the development of working class housing." Grandy continued by explaining concerns with the minimal presence of affordable housing in the community, and the hardships it is causing families and employers alike. "Even the city park's department could not fill all their slots, and at times had to have workers work overtime to get the job done because of all the tourists," Grandy stated, then concluded with "everyone knows that affordable housing is needed by no one wants it in their backyard."

With the line of community members dwindling down, and the evening drawing to a close,

Jody Reid, of Chelan, stepped up to the podium. Reid, a caretaker of the elderly, expressed her concern and the concerns of her clients in regard to the rezoning recommendations. She began by stating that a majority of the single-family residences are owned or being occupied by the elderly. "The unintended consequences of the property taxes rising when the multi-family units come in next door and across the street is going to put these people out of their homes, it's already causing a great deal of fear," she said, then added, "I just want to know ... that you really have considered everyone who lives

here. People who we don't see here in this room tonight, people who are already struggling to stay in their homes or to find homes. We have a homelessness issue," stated Reid, then concluded, "I want to see us address that first, the needs of the committed residences of this town, before we begin putting our energy into how to pack in more tourist bodies."

Chelan City Council will meet again, at City Hall, Tuesday Sept. 12 and 26 at 6 p.m.

There will be no more public comments taken in regard to the Comprehensive Plan, however the next meetings are scheduled for deliberation.
