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GOP senators now try to repeal ACA, could spell trouble for Chelan medicaid recipients

CHELAN - After two failed attempts it might still be a tough sell to Republicans, Democrats and the public, but Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY) is going to proceed any way in trying to repeal the Affordable Care Act, otherwise known as Obamacare.

With the GOP's replacement bill falling flat amongst their own party over the past few weeks, Republican senators are scrambling to secure the 50 votes needed to repeal Obama-

In a report released Wednesday, July 19, the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office (CBO) scored the bill and stated that a "repeal only" bill would leave 32 million more people uninsured and double premiums over the next decade. In the first year, the CBO indicated that around 17 million people would lose their insurance as a result of the bill, which of repeals most of the taxes (including the individual mandate) and ends medicaid expansion.

Lake Chelan Community Hospital CEO Kevin Abel responded by saying, "I think Medicaid expansion is important to people of this region," Abel said. "But there are some aspects in the Affordable Care Act (ACA) that need some improvements as well. For instance, the number of insurers in Chelan County. We are down to just one on the exchange, so it would be good to make some improvements there and see some additional insurers."

Although the bill wouldn't go into effect until 2019, the CBO predicts that insurers and consumers will bolt, leaving older and sicker individuals to pay higher premiums in an unstable market.

There are whispers in Washington, D.C., that Senator Mc-

Connell doesn't have near the 50 Republican votes required to pass, but President Trump and GOP leaders are making last ditch efforts to convince wavering senators.

Just before the CBO released their report on Wednesday, President Trump gathered GOP senators to the White House and directed them to place a repeal bill on his desk before leaving for the August

Senators Shelley Moore (R-WV) and Lisa Murkowski (R-AK) have already said they would oppose any repeal bill without a replacement in motion. Susan Collins (R-ME) also announced she would vote no on the bill, effectively killing any chance of repealing the legislation in the Senate. Senator Lamar Alexander (R-TN)

For seven years the GOP has consistently placed repealing Obamacare at the top of their agenda, but if they fail to muster any legislation out of the Senate for a third time, they might have to move on from healthcare, at least until after the 2018 midterm elections.

Planning Commission trudges through Comp Plan: set to make recommendation to Council on Aug. 8

CHELAN - The Chelan Comprehensive Plan is finally out of the hands of Planning Commission. Well, almost.

After a month of debate, the commission voted and approved a final version of the Comp Plan at their regular meeting on Wednesday, July 19. Planning Director Craig Gildroy said they will now compile everything into one report - they hope to have on their website by Aug. 2 - and present it to the Chelan City Council on Tuesday, Aug. 8.

"It has been a long process, but we (now) get to do it all over with the council," Gilroy said after commission took their final vote on Wednesday. "We're gearing up for that and

making sure we cover everything adequately, but it is nice to get done."

Although the commission

passed through the plan, there was not a consensus among commissioners on future land use and zoning. Unlike the rest

of staff, Commissioner Myrt Griffith was not on board with

CHELAN VALLEY - Num-

For people that work for a veterans affair system, that number hits home.

"We know that 22 veterans commit suicide daily," Veterans Service Coordinator for Chelan County Tony Sandoval said after a meeting at Apple Cup Cafe on Thursday, July 13. "There are two demographics, the younger generation coming back from war, and also veterans on the tail end of the Korean and Vietnam war. They all have a lot of pain and (are) not getting much help, but if vets get plugged into a VA system, that number goes down to 10."

Around 48,000, or about 8 percent of the homeless population nationwide are veterans.

Although that number is a 35 percent decrease since

2009, homeless populations are so many services there," you get whatever else you in Wenatchee have spiked in recent years.

'Wenatchee is becoming a hub for a growing number of homeless because there Veterans Outreach Coordinator Shea Morgan said. "So we just want to make our selves available. If we can help you get into housing, that will help need. If we can get you off the street then you are more likely help yourself."

Two rodeos coming to Lake Chelan Valley over next two weeks

CHELAN - With August less than a week away, amateur and professional cowboys from across the PNW will be herding into the Chelan Valley for both the Lake Chelan Junior Rodeo and the Lake Chelan Rodeo over the next two weeks at the Chelan Rustlers Arena.

The kids kick off the fun this weekend, July 29 and 30, with over 20 events including: saddle bronc, roping, barrel racing and steer roping.

Former Chelan FFA Advisor Rod Cool has been the chairman for the Junior Rodeo for years, but after he announced his intention

to leave Chelan for Quincy, Bernice Bernatz - who has volunteered for the big rodeo - formed a committee and worked with a stock contractor out of Moses Lake to put together the show."

"Unlike large rodeos, the junior rodeo is broken into age groups with the same events for all age groups," Bernatz said. "Age groups are split from the little people (5u), peewee (8u) juniors (9-15) intermediates (12-14) and junior intermediate (15-

Both Saturday and Sunday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m,, over 100 kids will compete for prizes in all age groups.

"When you get a tiny boy going around barrels, it can be pretty slow. They are allowed to do all the things as the big kids, but with some help," Bernatz said. "If a kid belongs to the Caribou Trail Association, the points they earn in the rodeo will go toward the state competition at the end of the year."

"Mr. Cool has done a really good job and we really appreciate what he has done over the years," Bernatz said.

Chelan FFA Alumni will be running a cook shack and the Chelan Rustlers will have a couple booths as well. Admission to the Junior Rodeo is free.

The following week, the adult cowboys and cowgirls will take over the Chelan Rustlers Arena. Performances on Friday and Saturday, Aug. 4, 5 begin at 7:30 p.m.

Gates open at 5 p.m. Admission is \$11 for adults, \$7 for students and seniors and free for ages six and under. Tickets in advance are available at the Chelan Shell Food Mart.

Three candidates vie for Entiat City Council seat

ENTIAT - With August less than a week away, voters in Entiat only have a few days left to cast their ballot for position one on the Entiat City Council Position 1.

Robert Anderson is the incumbent, with Richard Crump and Norman Stenberg vying for a seat on the council.

Robert Anderson

Anderson, 76, has been a resident of Entiat for the past 12 years and is the incumbent for Entiat City Council Position 1. He is a retired Boeing employee with facilities experience in computing installation and relocations. Before joining the council, Anderson

Norman Stenberg

Stenberg, 55, has been a resident of Entiat for the past 20 years and serves on a number of boards including: Entiat Planning Commission (since 2009) and president of the Entiat Valley Chamber of Commerce (since 2014).

Stenberg holds a Bachelors of Science in Business Administration and is the CEO/ President of Stormin' Towing & Transport, Inc and is married to current councilwoman Marie Stenberg. They have three children: Jeremy, Jessie and Sarah. "With a push towards the

new waterfront project, I am thrilled to see such excitement and commitment from our citizens and the re-established Chamber Committee," Stenberg said. "My goal is to see the growth of our beautiful

community bring our town together and provide a safe and exciting future for our youth."

Richard Crump

Crump, 48, is an electrical engineer who used to drive drill trucks for water wells in Georgia before serving as an engineer from 1995 to 2000.

If he gets elected, one of the key issues Crump wants to tackle is water quality.

"My biggest complaint is the quality of water," Crump told the Mirror. "With the exception of Malvern, Arkansas this is the worst water I have tasted. The City would have us believe we are meeting or exceeding state standards, but when you sit there and grayish-black sludge hangs from the faucet, and when you turn on the water and it smells like chlorine and fish, there is a problem. Just in my house we triple filter the water."

Crump also believes the City is wasting its time trying to put together a waterfront marina, when there is no industry to support it.

"Entiat is a small town and they have plans for growth and trying to become this tourist town," Crump said. "I mean Chelan is just right up the road, we are just a spot for beer, cigarettes and gas. So I think rather than searching for this tourist activity, we need industry in here to put local people to work.'

Despite those two issues, Crump said he is ultimately running because he is "not currently happy with the way the city government is being run."

"There are issues that have to change, and it is not a matter of wanting to, they have to change," Crump said. "I believe that we have to start with new city officials, bringing in new blood, getting things changed and shedding ourselves of this investigation for miss-spending funds."

For clarity, Crump is referring to a state Auditor's investigation in 2015 which uncovered mistakes in Entiat's accounting system, leading to the city's then-assistant deputy clerk pocketing residents utility payments.

The primary election for Entiat City Council is Tuesday, Aug. 1. Ballots were mailed our Friday, July 14.

Ballots can be dropped off in the ballot drop off box at Entiat City Hall on 14070 Kinzel St. Ballots must be in the drop box by Tuesday, Aug. 1 by 8 p.m. Ballots can also be mailed and must be postmarked no later than

CHELAN - It was an emotional event, the celebration of Gabriela and Alejandra Ruiz's college graduation on June 17. A June 25 reception hosted by Chelan Valley Hope recognized their successes while remembering difficulties they had overcome. Listening to their story brought tears to just about everyone's eyes.

Not all immigrants are driven to get an education, but Antonio Ruiz wanted his children to go to college. He wanted that because he wanted them to have a better life than his. An orchard worker, he wanted to learn too; he had his children teach him what they were learning in school and would ask them, "How can I use this?" He taught them to put all their efforts into their schoolwork. The girls worked with him occasionally in the orchard, and Ale remembers thinking, "I don't want to do this for the rest of my life!"

Sadly, Antonio wasn't at the Cheney graduation to see his daughters graduate because he died suddenly from a heart attack in 2014 at age 51. Nor was the eldest Ruiz child, Maria-she was killed in an auto accident in 2015. But, despite the deaths of those two people who were their main encouragers, the girls decided to figure out how to get their college degrees.

Many people stepped forward to assist; some had already helped, beginning when the girls started elementary school in Chelan, after moving here from Morelia, Mexico. Their first year at MOE was

difficult because, as Alejandra said, they felt lost. But teachers, neighbors, and Mr. Ruiz's employers all helped the family, in several ways. After Antonio died, Chelan Valley Hope provided guidance, What else? Part of Chelan Valley Hope's mission is "empowering people to improve their lives," and the Ruiz girls needed help in achieving their

Through Chelan Valley Hope, a community volunteer gave the girls a short course on finances and budgets. He taught them the differ-

ences between needs, wants and wishes and how to use an envelope system as a budget tool. They used it and say that it really helped. "So

many people helped," they said repeatedly. And it wasn't just Chelan Valley Hope.

Dad was their strongest advocate, their encourager. When he died, and then Maria, the sisters wondered who would help their mother. Mom doesn't drive. But they told themselves, "We have to do this [go to college], to show that it is possible." So they worked, sometimes two jobs each, to pay the bills. They started at Wenatchee Valley College. They worked and went to classes. Then when they got home at night, they did their homework, wrote papers, and read the assignments. There was no Wi-Fi or Internet connection at their house, so sometimes they

would work at the library, and then go to Starbucks till closing.

The girls were awarded scholarships to Eastern, and Chelan Valley Hope, along with some Christian community members helped pay their $housing\ costs.\ They\ graduated$ with degrees in Children's Studies, an interdisciplinary degree. Both have new jobs; Ale is working at Lake Chelan Community Hospital in the billing department, and Gabi is a human resource associate at Blue Bird Inc. in Wenatchee. They are

grateful and humble for all the many different people who helped them. "Our degree is your degree," is

what Gabi said. "All the people who believed in us mean a lot.'

The sisters brought their decorated graduation caps to a small reception in their honor at Chelan Valley Hope. Gabi's cap says "As Promised," reflecting her promise to her dad, her sister and herself. Ale's says, "Born to Make History" because they are the first in their family to graduate from college.

As stated on its webpage, Chelan Valley Hope "provides assistance, advocacy and referrals to under-resourced families and individuals throughout the greater Chelan Valley." That is exactly what CVH did for the Ruiz family, and isn't it wonderful to be able to cel-

Valdes located in Arizona

ARIZONA - On July 18, 2017 Sheriff Brian Burnett reports Sergio I. Valdes was located and arrested in Phoenix, Arizona.

On May 29, 2017, Valdes was involved in a physical altercation at Slide Waters in Chelan, Wash. When Valdes left the scene he took his two young children, a 6-month old and an 18-month old, and fled the area. The Chelan County Sheriff's Office notified our local community and sent out a

nationwide alert attempting to locate Valdes and the two children. The Sheriff's Office Detective Unit also worked with the National Center for missing and exploited children and Washington's Most Wanted to try to locate Valdes and the children. All involved agencies were working diligently to locate Valdes.

On July 17, 2017 the Chelan County Sheriff's Office developed a possible location for Valdes in Phoenix, Arizona. Our Detective Unit notified the U.S. Marshal's Service, specifically the Pacific Northwest Violent Offender Task Force. The Pacific Northwest Offender Task Force than worked with another Marshal's Task Force in Phoenix and were able to successfully locate and arrest Valdes. Both children were located in good health and were taken into protective custody. Our local Child Protective Services is working with the children's mother and Phoenix agencies for the children's safe return.

Arrangements are being made to transport Valdes back to Chelan County when he will be charged with Custodial Interference 1st degree, a felony, and other crimes. Valdes is also awaiting his sentencing in Douglas County for crimes he was convicted of prior to fleeing the Slide Waters incident.

the multi-family zoning along Golf Course Road.

'She was concerned for the traffic it would generate in the (adjoining) single-family neighborhood, the (loss of) views from downtown and the height limit," Gildroy said.

Griffith was the only commissioner to vote nay on the zoning. The rest of the regulations were passed unanimously.

In what initially started last November, the Comp Plan is nearing the finish line after being discussed at considerable length by the Planning Commission, staff and hundreds of public comment. "We've never had this much public participation," Gildroy gleaned from the public comment matrix.

The reason for this, in some part, can likely be attributed to the residents disdain for the current zoning of Three Fingers and their desire for them to become a public park.

There inlies the rub.

Community members Steve Kline and John Olson have been in the forefront of the debate since March, when they asked council to consider using eminent domain to acquire and purchase the Three Fingers from construction mogul, Goodfellow Brothers Inc (GBI). Mayor Mike Cooney, and the council have repeated numerous times they are in favor of parks, but will not take away private property from a landowner.

Of course, this all might not even matter if Judge Lesley Allan rules in favor of the Chelan Basin Conservancy, mandating their removal.

The City has remained neutral on the issue, but Gildroy is confident a few changes to the Commercial Waterfront zone, including scaling the height limit down from 35 feet to 25 feet will help protect against large buildings on the Three Fingers. Developers still have the ability to go back up to 35 feet though, provided they give the Planning Commission a criteria and 3D Model to show view impacts.

Kline and Olson discovered through a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) that GBI initially filled out an application of a planned development for approximately 24 condos on the Three Fingers back in 2010, but the application was rescinded before being presented to the Planning Commission and public.

Should Judge Allan rule in favor of GBI (despite ruling for CBC previously in 2012) Kline and Olson are nervous the plan could re-surface.

"I haven't thought about that," Gildroy said. "But the changes in the Comp Plan may not allow them to do what they initially proposed. There is always the potential, but the new code keeps the density and planned development district from increasing."

Another change, Gildroy said, is that for residential use GBI would have to show a water dependency as it's primary use. In other words, a marina / dock, which is certainly attainable and an allowed use in the zone.

Part of GBI's initial plan includes the bench (on the south side of 97A) above the Three Fingers, which they also own as well, zoned under the new plan as Tourist Accommodation (TA). So even if the Three Fingers come out, GBI still has the ability to construct a hotel, condos, or single family residences above.

GBI would still have to submit a plan, but either way, development along the Three Fingers area could be on the horizon.

Sunset Marina: Floating through construction

CHELAN -Just a few short months after breaking ground on Sunset Marina, Scott McKellar and crew are approaching the completion of the first phase in the newest Lake Chelan attraction. The year-round marina offers floating slips, adjusting with the seasonal water level changes and allowing the ability to moor a water vessel throughout the seasons. The marina portion of the phase has been completed and was celebrated with a grand opening over the Fourth of July weekend.

The \$14 million project broke ground in April, and has progressed rapidly. The 168-slip marina has been completed and nearly 70 percent of the 24, 30, and 40-foot slips offered have already been sold. The environmentally conscious marina offers convenient amenities such as water and power stations, solar lighting at each slip, and LED lit ramps, as well as oversized cleats and pilings to ensure sustainability and security.

The 168-slip, year-round, marina offers a variety of amenities to members, however, what separates Sunset Marina from other marinas are the amenities and features that will be available to the public. An 80-foot long gangway stretches over the lake, and offers fishing areas and a cleaning station, seating benches, and a sewer pump out for boats, all of which are free to access and open to the community. McKellar stated that restrooms and a general convenience store, accessible by way of a walk-up window, will also be available for public use.

McKellar, along with HOA Manager Boosinger, and Dockmaster Evans, have put forth a tremendous effort in ensuring that Sunset Marina is environmentally conscious and will aid in preserving the quality of water that Lake Chelan currently offers. All moored boats will be required to have and use bilge socks (used to soak up excess gas or oil within the bilge compartment), as well as environmentally friendly dye tablets inside the sewage tank (used to identify any leaks within the sewage holding tank). The Dockmaster, Evans, will be responsible for enforcing the use and annual replacement of bilge socks and dye tablets throughout the marina. In addition to preventative requirements for the watercrafts, Boosinger stated that in early July, they applied for a Clean Marina Certification through Puget Soundkeeper Alliance (PSA) of Seattle. After a final visit from PSA in September, it's anticipated that they will not only receive the five-star Clean Marina Certification, but will also be the first marina in Washington State to obtain one. Sunset Marina is also working with Phil Long, of the Lake Chelan Research Institute, and has purchased water metering equipment from Long. "He is going to put a multi-parameter probe off our dock ... and it will be the first multi-parameter probe, in a marina, in the world," said Boosinger of Long's equipment, then added "it studies the water for many different

pollutants and natural elements in the water." The probe will be collecting key water quality data, and will aid in monitoring and maintaining the quality and purity of water in the lake.

Community & Business

The last item on the list of the first phase in the marina's build is the clubhouse. Although completion is not expected until October, the "Sunset Club" is well on its way. Once the build has been concluded, the structure will hold offices for the Dockmaster and HOA Manager, as well as a bar and lounge, game room, on-site and overflow member parking, and other attractive amenities to its members.

Phase two of the Sunset project will include 23 condominiums, with a choice of two or three-bedroom units, underground parking, and a yearround pool. The units will be for long-term, residential dwelling only, stated McKellar. The build on the condominium structure is not a certainty, however. McKellar is working on establishing the customer demand for the residential build before ascertaining its construction. "It is highly likely that we will be building condos," said McKellar, "and if we do that, it will start toward the end of 2018".

Kalvin Kay **Kelley**

Kalvin Kay Kelley flew from this life on the morning of July 23, 2017 while at Regency Wenatchee Nursing Center. Also known as KK. Kal. or Kay he was born in the wild western country of Camas Hot Springs, Montana on August 26, 1924 to Harris and Mabel Kellev. His older brother Marvin was fond of relating his first memory of Kay as his being in a shoe box sitting on the open door of the wood burning oven of their home. Born prematurely, he weighed only 2.5 pounds and was kept warm in this manner as there were no incubators at that time and place. Kay was six years old when

he had the first of what would



was in a Ford Tri-motor that landed in a wheat field outside Wilbur, Washington. From this early flight, his future was cast. Flying was in his blood and it became his life's passion. He graduated from William Winlock Miller High School, Olympia, Washington in 1942.

World War II was raging

when he graduated so he enlisted United States Navy and earned his flight wings on April 24, 1945. He flew a wide assortment of military aircraft but mostly flew twin engine transport aircraft such as the C-47. It was during such a flight from Pensacola to Cleveland, Ohio that he met his wife to be, Jeanne Ellen Pearson. He married Jeanne on May 9, 1947 at the Pensacola Naval Air Station in Florida. They were married for 58 years and had be thousands of flights. It two sons Kimm and Randy.

He was stationed stateside until the end of the war. He became a weekend warrior with the U.S. Naval Reserve where he first flew a helicopter at the Seattle Naval Air Station located at Sandpoint on Lake Union in Seattle. During the post WWII period, he taught flying in Ellensburg, WA, then became a crop duster for Comb's West Air out of Ya-

kima. Within a short number of years, he was flying helicopter as a crop duster and charter pilot for Economy Helicopters in Yakima. While with Economy Helicopters he had the great fortune and adventure of flying geologists for Humble Oil Company throughout Alaska including the North Slope IIOM1956 to 1960.

It was in 1961 that he and several associates started their own helicopter business in Yakima and called it Cascade Helicopters. The business relocated to the Chelan/Manson and Cashmere areas in 1964. He retired from the company in 1985 but he did not retire from flying still owning and operating his own helicopter until he was 88. Kalvin was a gifted pilot who logged well over 26,000 flying hours in airplanes and helicopters. He owned and flew many planes and helicopters throughout

his life including the Cessna 190 he affectionately called the "Bomber". Additionally, he was thrilled when he had the opportunity to get checked out and pilot Wally Peterson's WWII P-51D Mustang fighter plane in Chelan. During his flying career he survived three crashes, one biplane while crop-dusting and two while flying a helicopter (one while crop spraying and the other when he got caught in a white-out flying in the mountains near

His love for the beautiful Lake Chelan Valley and the people residing there fulfilled him. He was active in the community being a member of the Masonic Lodge, Rotary, the Lions and the Lake Chelan Eagles. He was also an active member of the Chelan County Weed Board for many years. His love for hunting, fishing, bowling, golf and trap shooting was only exceeded by his love of flying. Probably his favorite activity was giving helicopter rides to most everyone possible. During the 1980's he and his helicopter flew Santa Claus (Jerry Isenhart) between Chelan and Manson surprising children by landing in their yards.

Kal was very friendly and happy guy always liking a good joke or prank, like when he placed a two-year-old frozen Canada goose from our home freezer (that he had not had time to clean following a hunt) in the unlocked car of Jerry Isenhart just before a Thanksgiving. He signed it, "a Thanksgiving goose from the Green Hornet". Sad part is rumor has it Jerry cooked and ate it!

Kalvin is survived by his loving friend and companion of many years Bernadette "Bab's" Caley of Chelan. He is also survived by his son's Kimm Kelley (Lorrie) of Manson and Randy Kelley (Rae Jean) of Okanogan; and by his four grandchildren Kris Kelley, Amber Corrigan (Todd), Sarah Kelley, and Tanner Kelley; and two great granddaughters (Denali and Maycee Corrigan). He was preceded in death by his parents Harris and Mable, his wife Jeanne, his daughterin-law Cindy Crawford Kelley, and his brother Marvin.



Hirst failure jeopardizes revenue needed for state collective bargaining contracts

OLYMPIA—Democrats' failure to prioritize a fix to the state Supreme Court's Hirst decision on water rights is jeopardizing revenue needed for state collective bargaining contracts. The Hirst decision radically departed from decades of past precedent and practice in establishing permitting rules for rural properties to drill wells. The decision makes rural development prohibitively expensive in some areas. The result of the confusion and red tape created by Hirst is that properties impacted lose value—and local and the state

governments lose property tax revenue.

In Skagit County, where Hirst-like water restrictions have been in place a few years, water restrictions have devalued more than 780 parcels and lost more than \$22 million in

I've expressed my support for the state collective bargaining contracts several times. But Democrats can't go around avoiding a clearly needed Hirst fix with a high fiscal impact, and then claim what's needed for revenue is tax increases. Their failure to get serious about Hirst jeopardizes money needed for state contracts and basic services. State workers should

be as irate as rural property owners because it's going to hit us all.

The fiscal impact of Hirst on local property taxes is up to \$200 million over four years as the economy improves. In addition, Hirst is expected to cost the state revenue from reduced real estate excise tax collections and cost jobs and revenue due to foregone construction projects.

Democrats are dismissing Hirst as a rural problem that they don't need to care about instead of seeing it as a key fix that's simply restoring fairness to rural property owners, construction workers, local governments and every state employee who would like to

see their wages improve.

Failing to fix Hirst is throwing hundreds of millions of dollars away. We can't afford that, so the question boils down to this: Do the Democrats want to solve this problem that's been cruelly unfair to rural people and reduced needed revenue for state contracts, or do they want to please Seattle activist groups? As for me. I side with fairness for rural people and fully funding the state contracts. I hope state workers see this and start speaking up for a Hirst fix as well.

Though always sold as a targeted tax on the rich, income tax rates inevitably grow "to infinity and beyond!" Don't believe me? Let's take a look at the income tax rate experience across the country.

U.S. income tax rate 1913: 1% to 7% Today: 10% to 39.6% Note: Top rate grew as

Today: 5% to 9.9% Now you may say that Washington is different and "surely you can't be serious" that type of income tax rate creep would happen here. "I am serious and don't call me

little more proof, let's look at income tax advantage? Yes, the last state to be seduced by the income tax salesman. In 1991 Connecticut decided to take the income tax plunge. How is that working for them? You could say they are "mad as hell" and "not going to take this anymore!" According to the Wall Street

Journal: "The wealthiest state in the U.S. is having trouble collecting enough money to pay its bills, and the Democratic governor doesn't think taxing the rich is the answer anymore...Gov. Dannel Malloy has twice before bet that taxing the wealthy would help solve the state's fiscal problems. Washington's lack of an income tax is one of the state's main recruiting advantages over California. Enacting an income tax in Seattle, Ballmer said, would lead to fewer jobs."

Aside from the economics of an income tax the City of Seattle appears to be responding to concerns about the legality of its proposal by saying "I am the law!"

Currently, our national debt is about \$20 trillion. If you find it difficult to grasp that number that is approximately \$160,000 for every household in America.

Congress is currently debating about when and if they should raise the "debt ceiling." The debt ceiling is an artificial limit on how much the government can borrow to support its profligate spending. If the government cannot borrow any more money then it has to start defaulting on paying its bills.

What bills will it stop pay-

Let's look at this another way. Suppose we all agreed to assume our share of the national debt - \$160,000 and to pay it off over the next 30 years at zero interest. The monthly payments for every household in America would be \$666.67 per month for 30

of interest - say 4 percent to that note and the payments are \$969.57 per month.

That would not solve the problem though because the government is still spending more than it is receiving in revenue. In fact, Social Security will be paying out more in benefits than it receives in taxes as the baby boom generation starts collecting their retirement payments.

When originally passed in 1935 the average life span was 61 years, which meant few Americans would actually receive benefits from Social Security. Today life expectancy is around 84 years. The result is a perfect storm of a large surge in beneficiaries and a longer life span that results in a program that will continue the foreseeable future.

It is time for all of us to start acting like responsible adults and demand our government come up with a plan to balance the budget and get over the emotional appeals, lies and fear mongering.

We cannot expect the rich to bail us out. They don't have enough money.

Numbers may cause our eyes to glaze over but ignoring them dooms our children and grandchildren to a world where issues like individual freedom, clean air and water, health care and retirement planning are beyond the realm of possibilities.

We all become slaves to a government that promises to take care of us from cradle to grave.


