New engineer welcomed, mapping error for The Lookout amended

CHELAN - For the second straight Chelan City Council meeting, the council wrapped up their regular business in under an hour, as they wait for a final recommendation from the Planning Commission regarding the Comprehensive Plan.

Before the council moved into their agenda on Tuesday, July 11 they introduced Jake Youngren, who was recently hired as the city engineer with the “intent purpose” of replacing Public Works Director Dwayne Van Epps when he eventually retires.

“Jake worked for Villa and Associates - who have done work for the city in the past - so we are very fortunate to have him on board,” Van Epps motioned toward Jake. “We have plenty of work to do and I think he’ll serve the city well into the future.”

The Council then shifted toward The Lookout development, as Planning Director Craig Gildroy requested an amendment to insert a barn and winery district in the zoning.

“The Lookout met with staff about proposed cottage housing and unfortunately a winery district doesn’t allow cottage housing,” Gildroy explained. “The area being adjusted is about six of the total 90 acres. Going from a winery to barn district will allow cottage housing.”

Gildroy stated the residences wouldn’t necessarily just be

single family, but overall density can not increase the number of dwellings with a change. Council approved the motion with councilmembers Erin McCadle and Servando Robledo both recusing themselves.

Parks and Recreation Director Karen Sargeant closed the meeting by proposing a new contract for the Sailing Association with the city that runs through December 2018.

“This is something that I have been working on since last year, and meeting with the Sailing Association has been productive,” Sargeant said. “We are going to allow them to have another sail boat slip (since) it is in an area that is not occupied by anything from the Parks Department. The other thing is to allow them to keep the sail boats on the bumper pads, so we’ll have a year and a half to come up with ideas and solutions to fix some of the issues. It also reduces the amount of storage to allow more storage for the Parks Department.”



Council approved and signed the agreement. The Planning Commission is still working through the comprehensive plan and have not yet made their recommendation to council. Once they do, council will begin debating the plan and schedule a public hearing. The next council meeting is on Tuesday, July 25 at 6 p.m.

Fire Department looks ahead: Searches for new boat, hires consultant for future planning

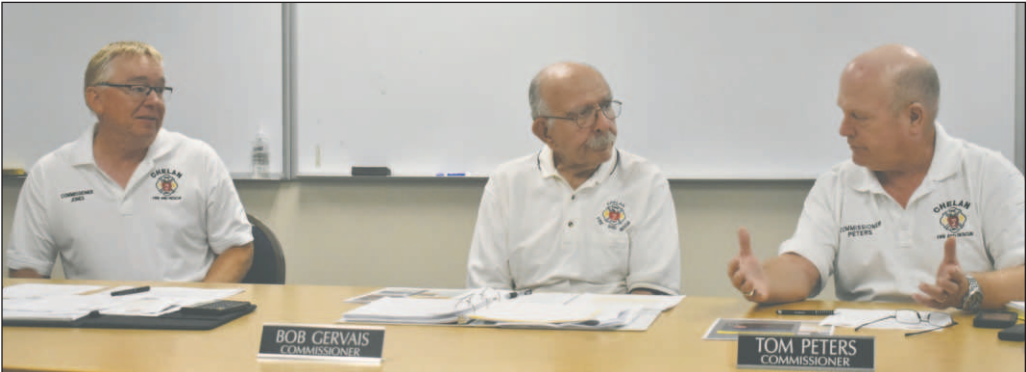

CHELAN - What good is a rescue swimmer program without a boat or proprietary surface to jump off of? That’s the question Fire District Commissioner Russ Jones posed to commissioners Bob Gervais and Tom Peters during their regular Chelan Fire District Commissioner meeting on Wednesday, July 12.

The original vessel, Marine 71, was abandoned during the search for 23-year old Donghoon Lee last month after experiencing difficulties. Jones discussed using boats that are already on

the water in the interim (including a couple volunteers, unused rentals that are available at Lakeshore Marina and his own), but they aren’t equipped with rescue gear. Jones and Fire Chief Tim Lemon suggested selling Marine 71 and using that money to recoup the costs for purchasing a new boat.

“If we see a boat that is available in Washington, it would fit our primary need to transport rescue swimmers and fill our gap in the interim if we decided we needed something more elaborate in the future,” Jones said. “Right now we have a rescue team without a proprietary platform.”

Commissioner Gervais said that he was hesitant in acquiring the boat without getting community input. “I’m just not convinced that we should go into it and start a fire rescue (swim) team,” commissioner Gervais stated.

“The thing we’re missing is that we (already) have a boat program, but the boat is useless since it had to be abandoned during the course of a search,” Jones said. “This isn’t something that is a budget increase, we’re just replacing what we have now with something that is safe to be on. I don’t think we are

Collision on Entiat River Road claims life of Entiat woman

ENTIAT - A 48-year old woman was killed in a head-on collision Wednesday afternoon, July 12 on Entiat River Road, approximately 4.5 miles up river from Highway 97 according to a press release from Chelan County Sheriff Brian Burnett.

Shortly after 4 p.m. Deborah Augustus was heading south-

bound when a truck driven by 29-year old Walter Wilson of Entiat crossed over the center line and collided with her.

Augustus died at the scene from her injuries with Wilson sustaining minor wounds.

Witnesses reported they saw Wilson appearing to toss beer cans out of the back of his truck and over the embankment before walking up the road.

A Deputy who was fairly

close located Wilson minutes later at a residence near by and arrested him. Burnett said they have probable cause to believe alcohol was a factor and obtained a search warrant to draw Wilson’s blood.

Wilson was arrested and booked into Chelan County Regional Justice Center for Vehicular Homicide. Wilson bailed himself out the next day and is now awaiting trial.

Volunteer program to help seniors starting in August

CHELAN - Senior care has certainly been on the minds of Chelan residents this past year with talk of a ‘campus of care’ and the Senior Living Initiative, and it looks like that notion will continue with the Tender Loving Care for Seniors (TLC) starting later next month.

With a mission of improving the care and support of seniors, TLC matches a senior with a volunteer, who will then help out around the house and spend time with the senior.

“Most seniors want to stay in their own home, but some things they may not be able

to do themselves without someone helping them,” TLC representative Kathy Miller said. “It is awful lonely if you have lost a spouse, or maybe your family is out of the area and you need help going shopping.”

Miller pointed out that since the seniors are low income, and don’t have a lot of extra money, there is no charge for the service. The one paid employee will serve as a coordinator who, Miller said, will recruit, train and supervise the volunteers on an ongoing basis. The coordinator will also help TLC volunteers connect with seniors and monitor senior satisfaction.

“Anyone who would like to

volunteer can volunteer. The requirement is two hours a month, but I’m hoping that people will spend more time, even if they are just visiting with them so they can brag about their grand kids.”

Volunteers will also ask the senior if they have any goals they would like to achieve (walking out to get the mail, lifting something, etc.) and help them work toward their goal.

“Do it because you want to do it and love helping someone, you get so much in return,” Miller said. “A simple hug from someone is worth a million bucks to me.”

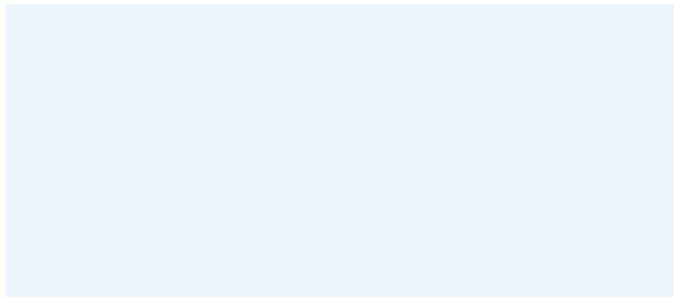

## Get off your phone: use of electronics while driving deemed illegal after July 23

WASHINGTON - Checking recent emails, facebook comments, tweets, or reviewing the latest sports or news updates on your phone will now have to wait until your car is in park. Because as of July 23, it is illegal in the state of Washington to use any handheld electronic devices such as phones, tablets, laptops or gaming devices - for any reason - while driving or sitting momentarily at a red light or stop sign. It was already illegal in Washington for drivers to text or hold a cell phone at their ear, though drivers have routinely defied the law to send a quick text or answer a call. Now, the only exception that

warrants the use of a phone while behind the wheel, is contacting emergency services or using a mounted phone for maps. Otherwise, drivers will have to pull off the roadway and stop in a location, where the car can “safely remain stationary” to use their device. The penalty for a first offense will result in a \$136 ticket and \$235 for a second citation. Despite the state legislature originally coming to a compromise in April, postponing enforcement of the Driving Under the Influence of Electronics (DUIE) Act until 2019 (mainly to give police and drivers time to prepare), Gov. Jay Inslee expedited enforcement in May to this Sunday, saying “public safety is better served by implementing this

bill this year” in his partial-veto statement. Governor Inslee then requested that local law enforcement agencies use the first six months to educate drivers

about the law and not necessarily enforce directly until Jan. 23, 2018. Advocates have praised the governors decision to ramp up enforcement as the

move comes after a slew of distracted drive deaths over the past year. According to the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) inattention/distracted driver involved in a crash about every 30 minutes. A DUIE is a primary offense, so a police officer can pull you over for using your handheld. Other distractions like putting on makeup, grooming or eating are considered secondary offenses; an officer could only issue a ticket after pulling you over for incurring another offense like speeding, running a stop sign or making an unsafe lane change. The penalty is

an extra \$30 added on to the ticket. Although enforcement could be tough considering how many people still text or talk on the phone while driving, the legislature is hoping a 16 percent salary increase for State Troopers will entice new recruits, and get more troopers on the road. Funding for the program has yet to be solved - likely as a result of the increase in the education budget - with only \$19,000 budgeted “solely for implementation of the chapter.” The state has had success in recent years reducing the amount of drunk driving and holding a 95 percent compliance rate for seat belt use and hope a similar affect on distracted drivers.

was recently confirmed in a press release on Thursday, July 13, which stated Chelan Valley Hope (the sponsor for the program) and Lake Chelan Lutheran Church (LCLC) will receive \$39,000 to help “implement innovative programs that deliver coordinated, whole-person care for seniors in rural Washington communities.” Chelan Valley Hope is receiving \$15,500 to initiate their TLC program while the LCLC is getting \$23,500 to fund a home visit program for adults with limited mobility. Miller said she fashioned

TLC on a similar program called Guardian Angels, which has had some success over the past decade and spread to various states around the country. Research has shown that home visits are associated with better health status and decreased use of emergency and hospital services. People that wish to donate to the program can do so by submitting a check to Chelan Valley Hope with TLC clearly written on the check. The price to support a senior for a year is \$700, or about \$60 a month. Although people won’t be able to see who they’re donating to, “we are encouraging

that senior that is getting help to write the organization or person a letter describing the goals they have and if they already met some,” Miller said. “It is confidential, but the senior can leave their name if they wish. It will help knowing your donation is going somewhere and not just in a random pot.” Now that funding is secured, TLC is currently looking for a Coordinator to oversee the volunteers and activities, before kicking off the program sometime late August. 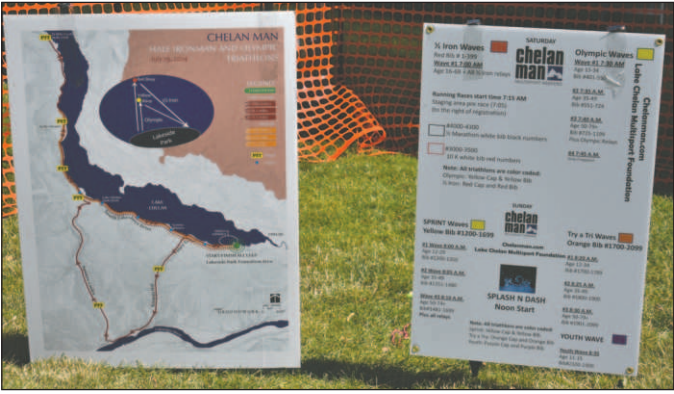

Neal was born April 30, 1921 in Edgemont, South Dakota and is preceded in death by his mother Helen and step-father Willis; his father, Harry; Neal's loving wife, Mary; five brothers: Lewis, Harold, Russell, John, Monte, Wayne; a sister, Eleanor; a son, Larry and 3 great-grandchildren: Rachael,

After moving with his family to Omak, Washington Neal met the love of his life, Mary

Neal was a driving force in the growth of the organization and is at least partially responsible for the opening of many dif-

She was also a prolific cook, inspired gardener, savvy bridge partner, avid reader, stylish shopper and occasional skinny dipper.

Jean eventually retired from teaching to help Dale with their growing orchard and the two enjoyed traveling across the globe on various agricultural expeditions and spending time with their grandchildren. Her family din-

ners involved multiple generations gathered in appreciation for one another and lively discussions on an unlimited range of topics. Her overall interest in life provided constant conditioning of her mental agility, which she would feistily evidence if deemed necessary. After Dale passed away, Jean continued to run the orchard until the very last of her days with the same tenacity and focus that powered her throughout her amazing life and drew us all to her.

Clyde W. Green

For a person who had worked hard all of his life, being 91 years of age was a challenge for Clyde W. Green. He was not accustomed to allowing others to help when he was not able enough. He has always been the strong one, the most responsible man. Clyde came to his final rest on July 9, 2017, in the Chelan Hospital.

Born on a cold winter day, February 25, 1926, Clyde was the fourth son, after Archie, Virgil, and Everett, born to Mina (Hampton) and Harry Green. Clyde was born in the home that Harry had built in Tonasket, Washington.

Harry was working in the woods, that day, logging, and the snow was deep. Harry asked the only person with a vehicle, if he could use it to go to town, as his wife was having a baby. The person refused, so Harry strapped on snowshoes and walked out of the woods, all the way back to Tonasket through the snow to be there. A sister, Hazel joined the fam-



ily a few years later.

Clyde's grandparents had settled in the Tunk Valley to homestead where they staked claims for timber and mining, and they also farmed. Harry and Mina farmed, and were involved with the logging business.

Clyde attended school in Tonasket and then Oroville, when the family moved. Clyde left high school to join the Navy during WWII, and completed his education after the war. Clyde attended boot camp at NTS Farragut, Idaho. He then sailed out of San Francisco Bay aboard his ship, a troop transport, the USS John

Land, bound for the Pacific Campaign. He quickly realized that one of the areas of the ship he wanted to be on was what he called "above deck". There was an open spot in the signal corp so he was given the study card deck for learning semaphore, visual morse code, and flaghoist signaling, and earned the position. He was a signalman for the duration of the war, attaining the rank of Signalman Third Class. Aboard the John Land, Clyde was involved in invasions of: Saipan, Tinian, Peleliu, Leyte, Luzon, and Iwo Jima. The John Land had the honor of carrying President Osmena of the Philippines who had been exiled for three years, and his Cabinet as they returned to the Philippines. Clyde was honorably discharged in Bremerton on May 23, 1946.

Clyde met Aletha Payne, of Okanogan, at a dance, and they were married on July 25, 1948 in Okanogan. They made their first home in Portland Oregon, where their daughter Resa was born, and then moved to Wenatchee, where Clyde owned a gas station on 5th and Wenatchee Avenue.

Randy and Roger were born in Wenatchee. An opportunity to operate a Shell Oil Distributorship arose and Clyde and Aletha, moved to Chelan in 1953 where they remained for the rest of their lives. Clyde and Aletha owned and operated the Shell business, as well as raising their children. Clyde sold the business to son Randy in 1982 when he and Aletha retired. It was a source of pride for Clyde that Randy and his two sons have continued his legacy, as Green Petroleum. Clyde was a founding member of the Lake Chelan Lutheran Church where he filled roles of leadership throughout his years of faithful participation.

He was a life long member of the Lake Chelan Lions, serving as President in 1974. Clyde also was elected to be a Lake Chelan School Board Member, and participated in the Lake Chelan Chamber of Commerce.

Retirement was something that Clyde was not accustomed to, as he was always so task and goal oriented. To help to ease him into retirement, Clyde became partners with his daughter, Resa, in

an apple orchard, where he returned to his early years of gardening and farming. Clyde and Aletha did enjoy traveling, and spent winters in Yuma, Arizona, also taking cruises, trips to Hawaii, Washington DC, historical sites, and North Carolina, and England. Always meticulous, Clyde discovered he possessed woodworking skills as he learned to be a wood carver, and has crafted beautifully carved figures to treasure. Clyde and Aletha Square danced, visited family and friends, and made new friends in their retirement years. With his Navy years in the past, Clyde did not often speak of his war experiences, as with many who had fought in WWII. After hearing of his shipmates having reunions, he contacted these men, and they were reunited.

Clyde always carried a smile on his face, and a good sense of humor, seeing the good in situations and people. He was chivalrous and gentlemanly and respectful. He truly enjoyed his family, friends, people he met, his meals, taking walks, and making a good financial or business decision.

The past year was one of deep sadness and loss for Clyde. Aletha passed in April 2016, followed soon after by his dear brother Everett, followed in April 2017 by Ev's wife Jessica. Son Roger also preceded Clyde in death, as well as brothers, Archie, and Virgil.
