Ocampo arrested for murder in Manson Friday

MANSON - Deputies responded to a death investigation on Harris Avenue in Manson on Friday, June 30 at approximately 5:54 p.m., according to a press release from Chelan County Sheriff Brian Burnett.

Deputies arrived on the scene and located 56-year old Maria Ocampo, a Manson resident, who was deceased.

A male subject identified as the woman's 25-year old son Rafael Ocampo was also on the scene and was detained and interviewed. He was later booked into the Chelan County Regional Jail on a count of first degree murder and for violating a no contact order.

Washington State Patrol Crime Lab and the Chelan County Sheriff's Office Detective Unit processed the scene. The investigation is ongoing and more information will be released at a later date. Per Chief Deputy Coroner Earl Crowe, an autopsy is scheduled for Wednesday, July 5 in the afternoon.

Overdue aircraft found at Windsor Hill, both pilots deceased

CHELAN - On Saturday, July 1 around 7:30 p.m., the Chelan County Sheriff's Office (CCSO) received a report of an overdue aircraft which had left the Chelan Airport at approximately 6:30 a.m.

The aircraft, which had two occupants on board, was thought to be heading toward Douglas County or Okanogan County. The CCSO deployed their helicopter to try and search for the aircraft, but were unsuccessful recovering the airplane or missing people.

CCSO continued their search on Sunday, July 2 using coordinates from one of the occupants last cell phone signals. At 10:30 a.m., CCSO located the wreckage on Windsor Hill about one mile down river from Wells Dam in Douglas County.

Douglas County Sheriff Harvey Gjesdal reported Monday morning that both pilots, identified as 48 year old Eric Sarchet of Everett and 70 year old Bonnie Wallace of Central Point, Oregon, were found deceased at the scene of the crash. Next of kin have been notified and the National Transportation Safety Board is investigating the cause of the crash.

The aircraft was a Northwing ultra-light tandem (two seat) model with a 80 hp engine (northwing.com).

Body of 23-year UW student from Korea still not recovered

CHELAN - The search continues for 23-year old Donghoon Lee after another week of not recovering the missing University of Washington student who is presumed to have drowned in the early afternoon of Tuesday, June 20.

Over the past two weeks, the Chelan County Sheriff's Department have used all the tools that their disposal including: marine vessels from Chelan and Douglas County, rescue swimmers, volunteer divers, underwater camera equipment and a helicopter, but they have yet to recover Lee.

CrossFit paves way for Community Health in and outside the classroom

What about Cross-Fit?

For the past three years, Manson High School has been holding a Cross-Fit gym class, taught by Spanish and language arts teacher Heather Teague, and it has become one of the most sought after electives.

Teague attributes the popularity of the class to an upgrade in equipment, the teamwork atmosphere and a structure that holds everyone account-

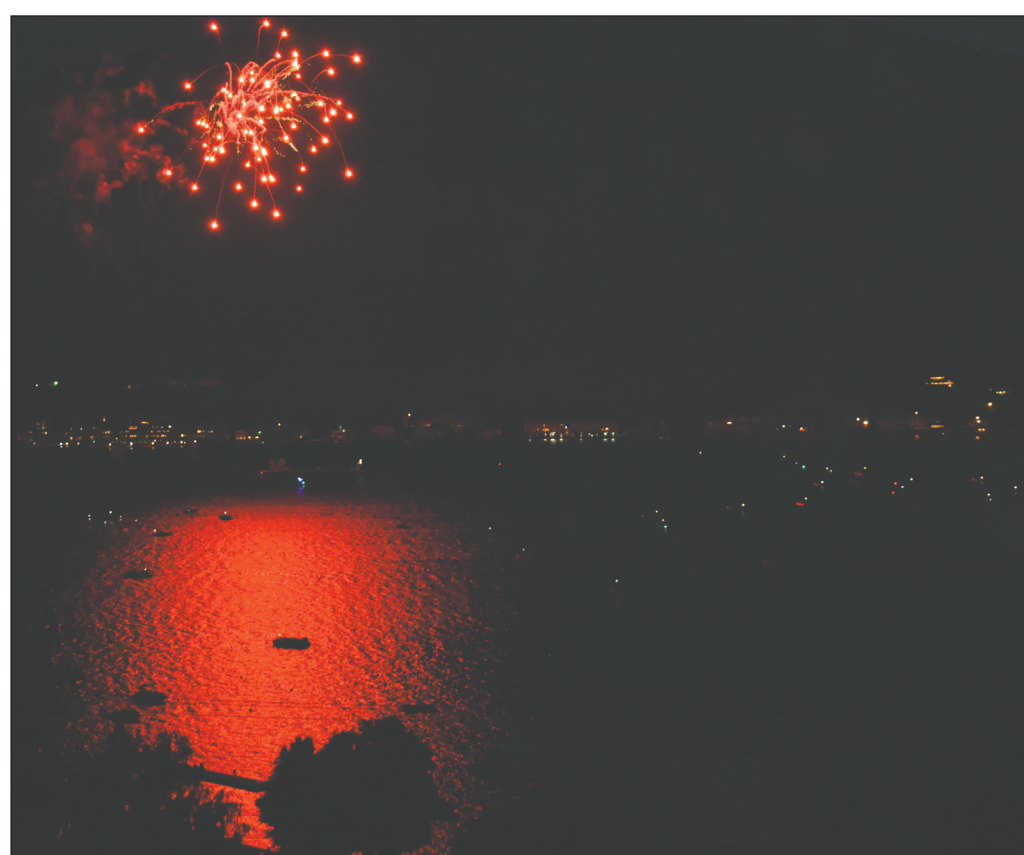
SUP event raises money for fire district

able during workouts.

"For a long time (the gym) was just metals and one pull up bar. Just the boys used it because it was too high, so the girls in my P.E. class couldn't even do a hang or pull up," Teague said. "The gym hadn't been updated since the 80's and the rest of the equipment was made by the shop teacher, which was great, but it was nice to get new stuff."

New equipment is one thing, the structure is what Teague believes as the main selling point for the course.

"I am strict in the sense that this is what we are doing, and if you are not apart of the team then you will have consequences or a burpee penalty, so no one gets away with it," Teague said. "Everyday is teamwork and I think that is why people like it so much, got get up there and are expected to be a participating member of the team and if you don't hold up your end, then every-one notices, so it's difference from other classes. You can't just slide away and hide."

If the grades of her students were slipping, Teague would post them up on the wall where everyone could see to hold them accountable.

"Some kids don't have the family that I grew up with, so they need someone to care for them like that. Even if their family or they think they are losers, they will be pushed to their very limit (in my class)," Teague stated.

This past spring the Manson Cross-Fit gym class (52 kids) and 53 teachers, parents and community members took a 78-day community health challenge partnered with the Lake Chelan Community Hospital Foundation and Colville Tribes

Diabetes Program. On March 29, all 105 participants took a pre weigh-in on a InBody scale - courtesy of Colville Tribes - which measures the weight of bones, water, fat and muscle in addition to the normal gross body weight on a regular scale.

The LCCH Foundation also bought 52 journals for the students to record their goals, log results from each workout and serve as a reference for future workouts. The Foundation also brought in Registered Dietician Abby Pattinson to give a couple nutrition presentations to the students, advocating for things like water with fruit in it instead of juice, soda or drinks with sugar.

"These are things that I see adult women and men doing and they are simple things you learn along the way, but kids are having a lot of decisions made for them so paying attention to nutrition isn't big," Teague said. "We (also) had InBody come and that was cool to see where they are. You want to lose weight, but you're also lifting so it's transforming fat into muscle. And at some things, girls are better than boys, for instance with overhead squats the girls were lifting more and the boys were amazed."

After the 78-day's, just about everyone saw positive improvement, lost weight and gained muscle mass. One female student gained 24 percent muscle tone.

Now, almost three weeks after the final weigh-in, some of the students are continuing to use the weight room in the high school and a few have even signed up for one of Teague's CrossFit classes at her gym Chelan Valley CrossFit.

"Students love having the

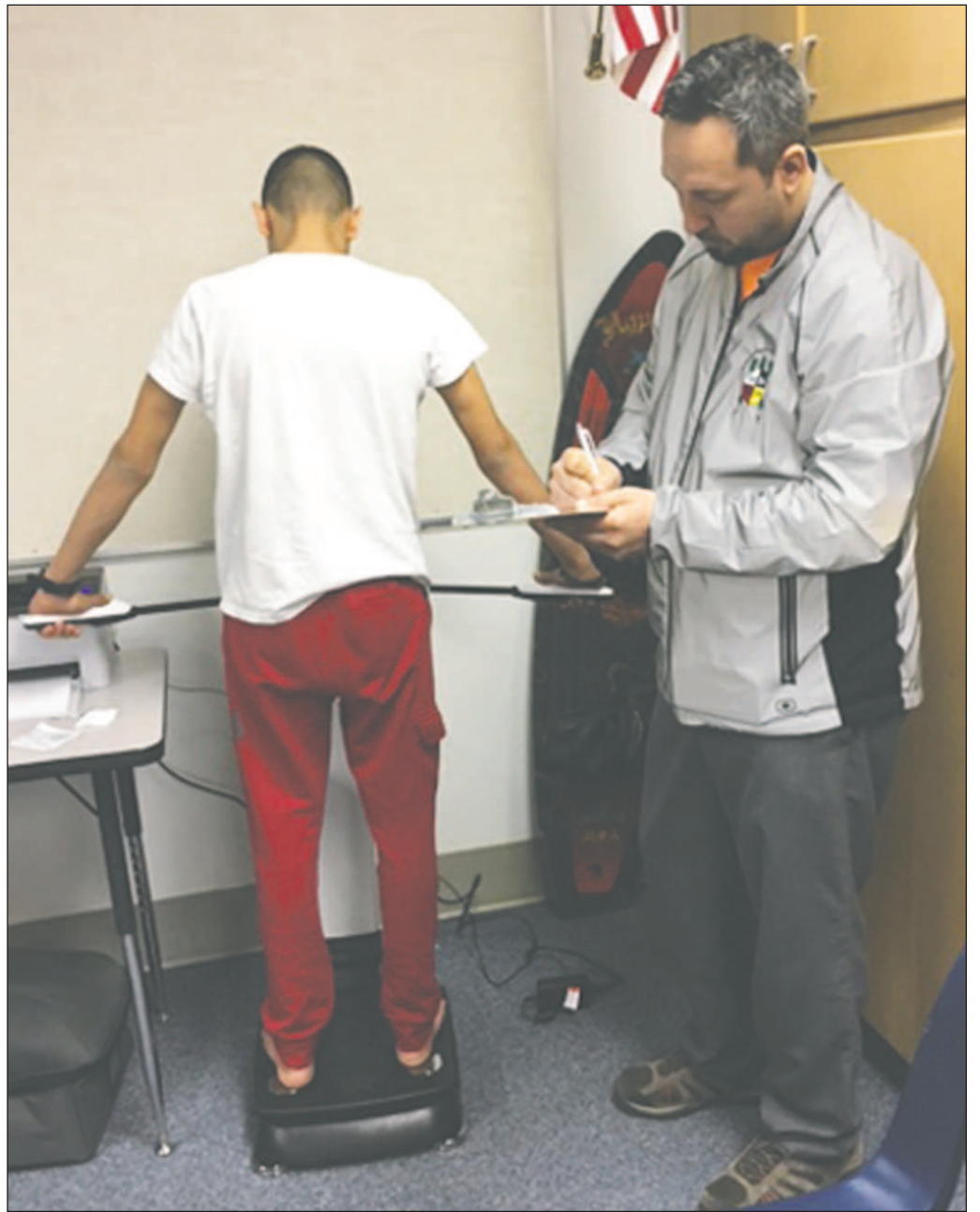

workout already planned for them and someone making sure they are doing it correctly," Teague said. "It is all about technique, it has to be perfect on a PVC pipe before you earn your bar. It doesn't matter if

you do olympic lifting or are a beginner, you have to hit the positions along the way which is humbling for a lot of people."

LCCH Foundation Executive Director Arlene Abbott is planning on writing a grant to

acquire a InBody scale, which can be transferred between the hospital and schools.

Dina Peterson Friedman passed away beautifully and peacefully on May 17, 2017, in her home overlooking her cherished lake and mountains after a valiant battle with cancer. Born on January 29, 1945, Dina graduated from Manson High School in 1963 as Salutatorian of her class, an Apple Blossom Princess, and a cheerleader. She spent most of her childhood summers adventuring in Stehekin where she attended the Stehekin school for fifth grade. She had the Chelan valley deeply rooted in her soul and was happiest in the hills of her apple orchard or on the waters of the lake.



Dina graduated in 1967 from Mills College in California with a BA in English Literature. During her senior year at Mills, she met her future husband of almost 50 years, Richard (Dick) Friedman, with whom she had two sons who always brought her immense joy. A devoted mother, Dina delighted in raising her sons

in the close-knit community of Bainbridge Island where she took part in volunteering, cooking and baking co-ops, book club, and other activities with friends and family. She also loved the arts and all creative pursuits, to include playing the hammered dulcimer and Irish harp, collecting African and Native American handicrafts, and making beautiful hand-crafted jewelry with exotic beads or sculpted into designs of her own making.

After sending both boys off to college back east, Dina and Dick moved into their newly-built home of her design on the shores of Green's Landing where she loved entertaining anyone who crossed her threshold. Once their sons returned to Washington State to raise their own families,

Dina and Dick traveled back and forth over the mountains to spend time with and cheer on their five grandchildren as they competed in water polo, swimming, and soccer, and performed in concerts and choir shows. Dina was an enthusiastic grandmother who spent hours baking blackberry pies for family gatherings or making her much-loved raspberry freezer jam, and joining any and all family events with a beautiful smile on her face and joy in her heart.

Along with Dick, Dina is survived by her son Jason, his wife Janet, and their three children, Emma, Garrett and Troy (of University Place), as well as her son Jordan, his wife Elizabeth, and their two children, Matthew and Katie (of Mercer Island).

Additionally, she is survived by a large extended family as well as numerous dear friends, all of whom she cherished beyond measure. Dina was pre-deceased by her father, Art Peterson, her mother, Dorothy Peterson, and her brother, Dale Peterson, all of Manson.

Dina's greatest joy in life was her family, and she treasured each one of them, always collecting and saving special trinkets or stories or photos that she thought would make them feel special. As the family historian, she collected years of photographs, memorabilia and stories and was able to remember and share minute details of every encounter she had with family and friends. She was most gifted in loving

unconditionally and being her family's greatest fan and cheerleader.

Dina was dearly loved by her family and friends who were blessed by her immensely kind and gracious soul and her boundless devotion. They wish to express their gratitude for the outpouring of kindness and support from the Lake Chelan community during her courageous battle with cancer.

Unions don't want balance, they want to preserve their monopoly

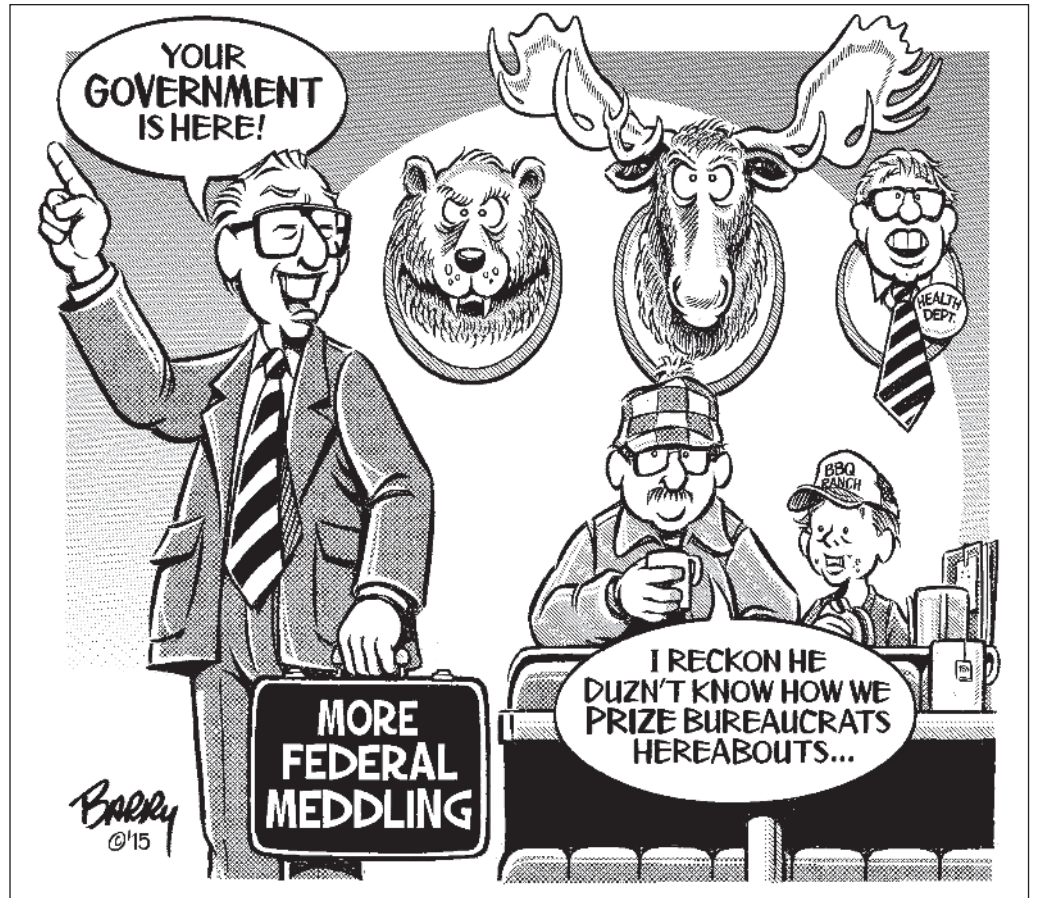
Paul Parmley president of the NCW Labor Council, has some peculiar ideas about

what constitutes a "balanced political process."

In his June 8 response ("Teachers' Unions Not Broken") to Jami Lund's May 17 guest opinion ("21st Century Unionism Starting in Central Washington"), Parmley accuses Lund and the organization he and I work for of wanting to "dismantl(e) a balance of political thought that has been the cornerstone of what makes our democratic institutions a beacon to the rest of the world."

In fact, just the opposite true. Absent right-to-work protections like those found in the majority of states, the playing field in Washington is nowhere close to being level because conservatives are forced to rely on voluntary campaign donations while liberal candidates can count on massive support from unions whose revenue is extorted from people compelled to give it.

On paper, teachers and other public-sector workers have the right to opt out of full union dues and pay only an agency fee that doesn't include what the union spends on politics. But in practice, the unions make this process so painful and complicated that few actually take advantage



of it. When workers are given a fair chance to opt out, they do so in droves. And the unions know it. That's why the prospect of their members exercising - or even knowing about - their constitutional rights is so terrifying to them and the leftist politicians who benefit

from this unfair monopoly. Notwithstanding his laughably stated concerns, the last thing Mr. Parmley and the union leaders for whom he shills have in mind is fairness and balance. What they desperately want is to preserve a status quo under which the campaigns of candidates

he doesn't like can only be funded by people using their own money while his friends have almost unlimited access to someone else's.

Health care on life support

American's can sense a bad deal when they see it. Obamacare is a bad deal. American's have been calling for repeal for the last three elections. They have not been calling for a repeal and replace.

Politicians keep saying they can cut health care costs by eliminating the profit motive. Well, they've had eight years to prove their theory and look what has happened - insurance costs and deductibles have escalated beyond reason. It is not sustainable.

Here are some undeniable, uncomfortable economic truths that we continue to ignore on this issue:

First, removing consumers from all responsibility for verifying the accuracy of the cost of services is a formula for disaster. We all know we are more careful when it is our money. When the government or an insurance company is paying the bill we are simply not as vigilant.

Second, when the government mandates minimum coverage we are forced to pay for service we don't need or want.

Third, when insurance companies are negotiating with the government or large employer groups, individuals and small employers end up at a competitive disadvantage. They simply don't have the same buying power and often end up subsidizing the coverage of the larger buyers.

Finally, when the government is the payer they control costs by limiting reimbursements to providers. This is an economic fact of today's health care economy. It has two very nasty outcomes. The first is that health care

providers inflate their bills because they know they are only going to get 40-50 cents on the dollar from Medicare or Medicaid. The second is that many doctors refuse to accept Medicare patients because they know they won't be reimbursed for the full cost of care.

The Colorado Springs Gazette had an opinion piece last week that addressed the problem of health care costs better than any I have read in a long time. It was titled, GOP proposes another stupid health care bill. Their point was it was just "...another stupid health care bill that does nothing to lower prices and ease access to medical care."

I have provided a link to it on my website.

The Gazette got it right.

The problem is Washington is focused on insurance. Insurance is not health care. Insurance is simply a way to pay for health care. Do you really believe that the Federal Government can reduce the cost of health care by establishing what insurance policies have to cover, who has to be covered and how it will be paid?

None of the "Health Care" bills proposed so far does anything to address fraud or frivolous lawsuits. In fact, having insurance nearly guarantees more lawsuits by lawyers who have no medical background but can convince a jury that the doctors were

negligent in your treatment. The unfortunate result is frivolous lawsuits drive up the cost of health care to all of us.

The Gazette points out that none of the bills proposed to date does anything to give Americans more doctors, nurses, nurse practitioners, physicians assistants, hospitals, clinics, low priced drugs or neighborhood wellness centers. In other words, none of these bills do anything to increase competition.

The United States has 2.56 doctors per 1000 population. Compare that to Austria 4.99, Norway 4.31, Sweden 4.12, Germany and Switzerland at 4.04.

With an aging baby boomer generation now increasing the demand for health care, none of the health care initiatives coming out of Washington does anything to increase the supply of medical providers.

Access to good affordable health care is a basic human need. It is time that we recognized focusing on a big government mandated solution is not what made America great. And copying the failed solutions of the European socialists will not work.

It is time Congress repealed Obamacare and began focusing on real solutions like health savings accounts, tort reform, increasing the supply of medical providers, building incentives for private insurance companies to diversify their product offerings, and innovative private industry solutions that create low cost service options.

Anything else just moves us further down the road to an unsustainable government program that limits our freedom.

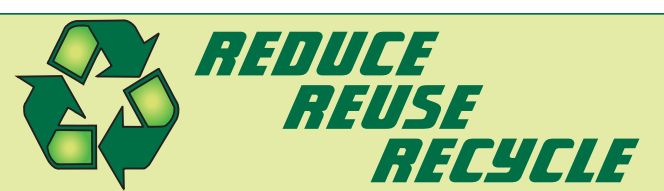
