Kindness Counts North Central Washington

Charles Dickens published his classic A Christmas Carol in December 1943. The masterpiece's opening stave shows Fred exhorting his Uncle Scrooge to view Christmas as the only time in the long calendar of the year "when men and women seem by one consent to open their shut-up hearts freely, and to think of people below them as if they were really fellow-passengers to the grave, and not another race of creatures bound on other journeys."

Last Christmas, Gene Sharratt found himself pondering his fellow passengers. The educator grew

frustrated with the increasing social tension fissuring the nation. He observed that some New Year's resolutions soar for twelve months while most remain grounded after two weeks. An idea surfaced of a communal resolution: kindness.

These ruminations inspired Kindness Counts North Central Washington, a one-year campaign designed to inspire, recognize and contribute to acts of kindness. The organization is not a 501(c)(3) and does not accept donations. "We're just a group of people who want to make our community a better place to live," Sharratt said. "We have a lot more of common than we have differences, regardless of our political affiliation, our religious affiliation, or any other demographic. So why don't we try to raise a voice around commonalities and build bridges in community, state and nation rather than build barriers?"

Before fully fueling this notion, Sharratt desired to define his terms. What is kindness? The campaign described it as "the quality of being friendly, generous and considerate.'

His initial research found that February 17 is National Random Acts of Kindness Day. Using that date as a launching point, he gathered a kindness brain trust to gauge the idea's merits which included Margie Kerr, local Make a Difference Day founder, Dave

Herald, owner-partner of Sunny FM, Linda Haglund, Executive Director at Wenatchee Downtown Association, Rufus Woods, publisher emeritus of the Wenatchee World and Laurel Helton. The friends met twice monthly to refine goals. Sharratt contacted the mayors of Wenatchee, East Wenatchee, Chelan, Cashmere and Moses Lake. They all responded with official city proclamations.

"It's easy to get caught up in negative news and dwell on those stories. The ugly feeling of what is wrong in the world tends to take over your life, interrupting your thoughts, affecting your relationships, and

County unemployment numbers released

OLYMPIA - The BLS estimates Washington's preliminary seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for June 2023 is 3.8 percent. The revised estimated May 2023 unemployment rate is 4.1 percent. According to BLS estimates, the number of unemployed people fell by 10,500 in June 2023 compared to May 2023. At the same time, the number of employed people rose by an estimated 13,400. Overall, this amounted to an increase of 2,900 people in the labor force. The preliminary June 2023 unemployment rate is 0.1 percentage points lower than the June 2022 rate of 3.9 percent. June 2023 preliminary unemployment rates: U.S. (preliminary) 3.6%, Washington (preliminary) 3.8%, Chelan County (preliminary) 2.8%, Douglas County 3.1%, Okanogan County 3.5%.

Based on BLS estimates, Washington state nonfarm employment increased by 11,900 jobs from May 2023 to June

One-month employment change by industry

Based on a BLS survey of businesses and governments, Washington gained an estimated 11,900 jobs during the month, on a seasonally adjusted basis. Overall, employment increased in seven major industries and decreased

- in six in June. Private sector employment is estimated to have increased by 8,800 and government employment
- increased by 3,100. hospitality Leisure and employment increased by 8,900 overall, with 5,200 jobs added in
- food services and drinking places. The number of jobs in education and health services increased by 4,600 overall, with 3,100 jobs gained in social assistance.
- Professional and business services employment increased by 500 overall, with 800 jobs gained in professional, scientific,

Council Meeting

homes on S. Douglas St. was the topic of considerable discussion at the Cashmere City Council's July 24 meeting. Patty Howe addressed the Council and explained that the water pressure is so poor at her mom's house, on S. Douglas, that it is not possible to take a shower if a neighbor is watering their lawn. She explained that she had talked with 12 of the 21 residents who all also have low water pressure. According to Howe, two different plumbers told her that the service line needs to be replaced but that should not be done until the water main has been replaced. She said that she had been told by city staff that repair is not slated for 2024, but Howe requested that the water main be fixed sooner to solve the issue. She also expressed concern that her mom is not receiving a service that she is paying for.

Mayor Jim Fletcher asked if he could make copies of Howe's notes so that the city's engineers could look into the extent of the problem. Fletcher told Howe that he doesn't have answers right now, but he explained that he wants to find some short-term fixes to the lack of pressure until the water main can be completely replaced. Dorien McElroy, manager of Cashmere's water and wastewater facilities, said that Woodard and Curran have engineers who can also investigate solutions to the low pressure. He explained that the Council would have to have discussions about any potential options in terms of water rate charges.

In a 3:1 split vote, with John Perry voting against, and Jayne Stephenson absent, authorization was given to the Mayor to approve and sign the designation of an easement on the driveway to Simpson Park. The easement will officially allow access to a parking lot behind the manufacturing shop. According to Fletcher, mutual use of the driveway has existed since at least 1947. However due to the upcoming sale of the L.E. Wilson property, a formal easement is required to complete the sale. Perry voted against approval, saying he would like to see the actual language to know for sure what the city was agreeing to, in case at some point the city might want to make changes to the park or driveway. Fletcher told Perry and the other council members that even though approval was given, he would still let them see it before he actually signed the document.

The Council unanimously approved an amendment to the 2023 budget. City Clerk/Treasurer, Kay Jones explained that this was a normal midyear amendment based on changes in revenue and expenditures that were not anticipated.

Also unanimously approved was the migration of city servers to the cloud. Jones told the Council that the city's server was scheduled for replacement last year, but was not. Jones added. that it is recommended that the server and hardware be replaced every 5 years. The city's tech contractor. Vision IT, recommends migration to the cloud. Jones explained that the annual recurring costs will increase from \$2.384.00 to \$3.308.00, a difference of \$924.00, however this will eliminate the approximately \$17,000 cost of replacing the server and hardware every 5 years. There will be a total recurring annual cost of \$6,188.00. She explained that the cloud migration would eliminate the need for onsite maintenance and repairs, improve security and give some staff the ability to work from anywhere. Director of Operations, Steve Croci, said that it would be nice to be able to go on the cloud and grab some documents, to be more productive.

Council member Chris Carlson asked if this would mean that the city will be stuck with this IT company once city data is on their cloud. Jones explained that the company does all of the IT for the city and so does not know why they would want to switch, but Fletcher added that yes, the city could switch. Council member Derrick Pratt suggested that the IT company do the

Sockeye salmon madness and more

By John Kruse

LAKE WENATCHEE

experiencing a big sockeve boom this year. As of July 21, 67,354 sockeye salmon had nassed through Tumwater Dam enroute to Lake Wenatchee. This is well over the ten-year average for the entire run that typically ends in mid-September. This equates to many more sockeve in Lake Wenatchee than anglers have seen in

Nate Stull, the owner of Stully's Guide Service (www. stullysguideservice.com) has been fishing Lake Wenatchee and says the fishing is pretty good though the boat ramp at Lake Wenatchee State Park is so busy you may end up not getting on the water at first light for the best bite. Even though Stull didn't get on the water to fish until 6:30 a.m. on his most recent trip, several of his clients still caught limits of sockeve out of his boat during an abbreviated morning bite that saw lots of fish hooked. and several lost with the

barbless hooks required here. Stull is trolling a Mack's Lure 1.5 Smile Blade spinner in pink or green or glo-burst. Also being trolled are pink hoochies. Eight-inch green a day still entering and or chrome dodgers are tied about 8 to 12 inches in front River on a daily basis, there is August 1. You can find out americaoutdoorsradio.com

downriggers and trolling 45 feet deep in the early morning

and going as deep as 90 feet in the late morning. The entire upper end of the lake is fishing well since the sockeve are going up both the White and Little Wenatchee Rivers, Stull does have several openings for Lake Wenatchee. He expects the fishing should remain solid for quality fish until mid-August. You can book a trip with him through his Facebook page or through his website at https://stullvsguide-service.business.site/

WENATCHEE RIVER The large bounty of sockeve returning to Lake Wenatchee

this year has the Washington

Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) announcing a rare opening of the Wenatchee River from August 1st through September 30th for sockeye salmon with a limit of four sockeye a day, as well as two adult hatchery Chinook salmon per day. The river is open for fishing from the mouth to the Icicle Road Bridge in Leavenworth.

I checked in with Rick Graybill, the fishing guru at Hooked on Toys in Wenatchee and asked him about this new opportunity. Graybill told me the vast majority of the sockeye run has already made it to Lake Wenatchee but with several hundred sockeye traveling up the Wenatchee

of the lure. Stull is using the possibility of hooking into some fish here.

> Gravbill recommends plunking for the fish, casting out a pyramid sinker heavy enough to keep your bait in place without drifting. Twelve to 15 inches up from the sinker he'll tie on a three-way swivel. Connected to that swivel is a two-foot leader. At the end of the leader, rig up a Spin-N-Glo lure, pink and red being good color choices, along with a couple of beads and then two barbless hooks. On the top barbless hook rig up a canal shrimp for bait. Above that first offering tie on a second threeway swivel and add a second

> bait rig similar to the first. As for where to fish, Graybill recommends looking for a point and fishing three to six feet deep since the fish will be hugging the shoreline. especially during the early morning hours. As the day progresses you can still catch them at times but you will want to fish deeper water, like 10 to 12 feet deep.



Anglers have come to take sturgeon fishing on the Columbia River for granted but things are changing this summer as both WDFW and ODFW announced a closure to all sturgeon fishing between The Dalles Dam and Priest Rapids Dam until September


been found dead in this section of the river this summer, most of them being found in the John Day Pool. One reason why these sturgeon deaths are occurring is the warming temperature in this part of the Columbia River, which is running higher than normal. Just as catching trout

in warm water can be fatal for the fish, the same goes for sturgeon and WDFW biologists say, "High water temperatures and lower dissolved oxygen have been shown to stress and kill sturgeon. While only catchand-release fishing is allowed this time of year, closing all fishing will help reduce stress from capture and handling and give sturgeon some relief until water temperatures cool

off in September.'






