Cashmere's Founders' Day Festival began in 1979 as a celebration of our city's 75th Anniversary. In addition to enjoying all the activities we encourage you to explore the shops, restaurants, and services available in and around town.

Mission Creek Community Club kicks off the day with a car show on Cottage Avenue beginning at 8 a.m. on Saturday, June 24. The Kids' activities begin at 10 a.m. at Riverside Park where our Librarians and Cascade Fisheries will have crafts and activities teaching about the salmon life cycle. Salmon story time will be at Noon followed by a salmon release parade to the river at 1 p.m. at Riverside Park.

This is the fourth year that the Cashmere Library has raised baby salmon for release into the Wenatchee River. Children will have an opportunity to name their baby salmon before releasing it. They will also have a chance to attend a Bike Rally where they can have their bikes serviced and then decorate them for the parade later in the day.

Also at Riverside Park, come practice your golf shots at the Tap



and Putt, it's fun for all ages. Be sure to stop by the book sale at the library on your way to the park.

Back in town, the car show ends by 3 p.m. so that's when you can walk back to Riverside Park to enjoy the Ping Pong Ball drop. Ping Pong balls are released from a helicopter and children scramble to collect them and turn them in for prizes. There are 3 drops, each for a different age group and each with one grand prize of a bike or scooter for the lucky child who turns in the winning ball.

Cashmere City Council meeting

CASHMERE — In the June 12 Cashmere City Council meeting, the Council discussed the possibility of refitting the HVAC (Heating, ventilation, and air conditioning) unit at Cashmere Riverside Center. The center's unit stopped working leaving the facility without air conditioning during warm summer months. Of the local contractors contacted by the City, only Salcido Connect provided a quote. They estimated a pre-tax cost of \$47,690 to repair the existing system. The estimated cost to replace the entire unit is \$150,000 to \$200,000. Though AC is handy in the heavily used facility, Mayor Jim Fletcher and the Council wanted to be responsible with the City's finances.

"It's kind of one of those dilemmas," Fletcher said. "Do we just bite the bullet and get this thing fixed so we can move forward with using it, or do we want to reengineer the whole thing and do it right, but spend a heck of a lot more money?"

Steve Croci, Director of Operations for Cashmere, concurred with Fletcher's conundrum. The City could fix the HVAC system at a lower cost which would ideally work for awhile. If they replaced the entire unit it would last longer, but the expense would increase and structural work might be needed on the building.

Councilman Derrick Pratt discussed the possibility of using mini split air conditioners with the help of the Chelan County Public Utility District. He mentioned that the PUD would be willing to help the City without financial interests.

A motion was made, seconded and passed to table the matter until the City could consult with the PUD.

After that, the Council discussed the selection of a contractor to make remote monitoring and SCADA (Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition) improvements to all of Cashmere's water and wastewater facilities. Two companies submitted bids. Farmers Electric of Othello offered the lowest bid at \$525,328.64. Croci said the system would prove expensive but efficient.

"That's all the water, all the wastewater," he said. "It would be programmed by water current so they would have people to help if there was a problem with SCADA programming."

Right now, workers take chlorine samples by hand, but this system would replace that. Manually, one sample is taken per day, but the new system would produce 100 daily samples. Right now reports are taken on paper and then entered into a spreadsheet. With the upgrade, reports would be easy to access and problems easier to diagnose.

"It's super expensive. It provides you with a lot of good data, particularly with compliance," Croci said. "In theory it should help with reporting because at the end of the month you say, 'Hit monthly reports' and it grabs the data from the SCADA and puts it in the report."

Councilman John Perry made a motion to approve the selection of Farmers Election for the project. The motion passed unanimously.

Mayor Fletcher and the Council then talked about Task Authorization No. 4 - Emergency Generator Improvements. This comes after Cashmere awarded a grant to buy a trailer-mounted generator and install connections at five of the city's water/wastewater facilities. This project would involve RH2 designing the electrical hookups that it would take to plug in the generation at various locales around the city. If that were to happen, then there would be another bid on an actual generator. The locations include the Museum Lift Station, Sherman Booster Pump Station (BPS), Well No. 4, Well No. 10, Vista Heights BPS and the domestic wastewater treatment plant (WWTP). All these facilities have lost power recently. In case of a power outage, the project would allow for a quick connection. RH2 Engineering, Cashmere's engineer, generated the authorization to provide services related to the emergency generator

Wenatchee - On June 7, 2023, WAEF and Corteva Agriscience representatives announced the grand prize winner at Cashmere High School with Mr. Allan Pace, the art teacher, and art class peers in attendance. Cashmere High School junior Mykla Smith is the Grand Prize winner in the 28th Annual Washington Apple Education Foundation (WAEF) Year of the Apple (YOTA) Art Contest sponsored by Corteva Agriscience.

Mykla received a check for \$1,000 for her watercolor painting titled Apples at Sunset. Her artwork will be published on the 2023 Corteva Agriscience calendar poster. Dan Snipes of Corteva Agriscience, shared, "Every year, these students submit amazing artwork that fully represents our tree fruit industry. We at Corteva are proud to sponsor and publish the grand prize winner." Forty-four artwork pieces

created with colored pencils, acrylic paint, watercolors, colored chalk, painted wool, and oil paint were submitted this year. Grandma's Deviled Eggs

We just had sandwiches for lunch. Grandpa was back down at the shop and Grandma, and I were watching TV in the living room. The conversation turned to sauces for sandwiches. I'll just say this up front, mustard isn't a favorite sauce around here. "Mustard is good on liver." Grandpa said, "Grandpa

doesn't like mustard at all." She paused, thinking for a moment then continued, "he didn't know I always use mustard with egg yolks." She grinned. "Remember when I worked downtown? Your Dad made me dinner and decided to make deviled eggs to go with it. I came home after work to a nice dinner. He even had my wine poured for me." She smiled, "it was so sweet of him. Except he told me the deviled eggs didn't taste

right." Her eyes started to sparkle, "and he couldn't get them to set up-right. He didn't cut them right."

"What do you mean?" I asked, I didn't know there was a wrong way to cut eggs. "You know? The eggs didn't lay flat with the yolk filling on top, they just flopped over on their side." Then I understood. He'd cut the egg crosswise instead of lengthwise. It is hard for an egg to stay upright on its pointy end when cut across the round middle, but it lays naturally on its side when cut across the oval from pointy end back. I chuckled, imagining my dad trying to balance those boiled and peeled eggs filled with yolk-mayo sauce on a saucer for his sweet-heart. And to top it all off, those deviled eggs didn't taste right. "That's when I had to tell him I used mustard to make the eggs taste so good." she said. "He started to like mustard?" I asked. She shrugged, "kind of. With eggs. He still prefers ketchup. And you know, his special sauce."

Grandma's Deviled Eggs

- 4 (or more) boiled eggs, peeled
- Dusting of paprika (optional)
- Yolk sauce made from boiled eggs.
- Basic Yolk Sauce:
- 4 (or more) yolks from boiled eggs
- 4 (or more) level teaspoons mayonnaise
- pinch of dried powder (or squirt of liquid prepared) mustard
- Salt & Pepper to taste
- Dribble of pickle juice or vinegar (optional)

Cut peeled boiled eggs lengthwise so the two halves are oval and lay flat when opened up and laid on their un-cut surfaces. Carefully, to keep the egg white intact, scoop out the yolk and put it into a small (cereal) bowl. Set the boiled egg whites aside on a pretty serving plate then make Basic Yolk Sauce. To the boiled egg yolks add 1 level teaspoon of mayonnaise per

yolk and the mustard. Smash the yolks together with the mustard and mayonnaise until it is smooth. If the sauce is too thick add a dribble of pickle juice or vinegar or more mayo or even water (these are your deviled eggs-make them how you want to make them). Taste; add salt & pepper; taste again; when you are satisfied spoon the sauce into the waiting egg whites on the pretty serving plate. Garnish with a sprinkle of paprika and serve to Grandpa.

Note: This basic yolk sauce can be used as a dressing for almost any starch salad like potato salad, pasta salad, cold grain salads. I even use it on lettuce salad when I have it available. Egg yolk contains huge nutritional benefits especially if the hens are allowed to eat yard bugs. For paprika substitutes I like ground achiote powder, dried ranch dressing herbs, a pinch of dried parsley. Almost every herb & spice goes with eggs.

Note 2: Grandpa Truman's

Sauce = 1 part ketchup + 1 part mayonnaise

Local nonprofits awarded \$65,000 in consulting grants

The Community Foundation of NCW in partnership with Iceicle Fund, Thriving Together NCW, and Methow Valley Fund, has awarded \$65,000 in Strategic Consulting Grants to 13 nonprofits across the NCW region. The grants provide nonprofits with a consultant to help guide them through their organizational strategies and planning goals for long-term growth and sustainability. "We know how challenging it can be as nonprofits to find the time, money, and human resources to work with a consultant on strategy and planning work" said Claire Oatey, director of community

grants for the Community Foundation. "Organizations are working hard to keep up with the needs of our communities. This funder collaborative gives local nonprofits an opportunity to invest in themselves, including their resiliency and effectiveness, which we know will ultimately benefit all of us and make our region stronger."

Since 2008, the Community Foundation of NCW has been partnering with the Iceicle

Fund through the Nonprofit Practices Institute (NPI) - a collaborative effort to offer affordable and accessible capacity-building and training opportunities. Last year, NPI piloted the Strategic Consulting Grant, which was a success for those organizations who received direct consulting. "We have seen the prior recipients of this grant take great leaps in growth and sustainability as a result of this program" said Christine Morgan, executive director of the Iceicle Fund. "The

improvements at an estimated cost of \$48,660.

The generator can power one site at a time. When not in use, it would be stored at the WWTP. Considering the complicated logistical and financial factors, the Council unanimously passed a motion to table the matter to gather more information and discuss the issue further.

The last business item was discussing a policy for placing donations and memorials in City parks and open spaces. The issue proved timely as Bob and Gail Spurrell spoke during the citizens’ comments section of placing a memorial bench alongside the Wenatchee

River to honor their son Mike Spurrell, of Cashmere, who died in a rafting incident last month. The Spurrells offered to pay for the bench.

Previously, Fletcher had written a rough draft on the policy based on those used in other cities. His draft stated, “Because public open space is a precious commodity, and the integrity of the City’s natural and recreational areas must be protected, the design, installation, and maintenance of donated park improvements requires standardized policies.”

Fletcher and the Council agreed to accommodate the Spurrells’ request and began discussing the exact location and look of the bench. The Council also agreed to finalize Fletcher’s policy draft over the coming months.

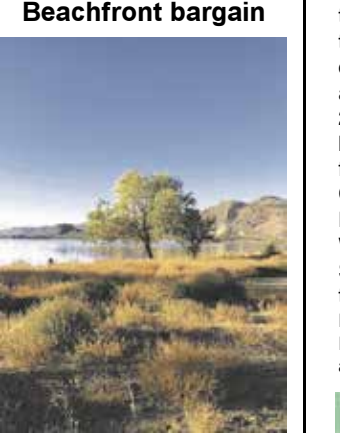

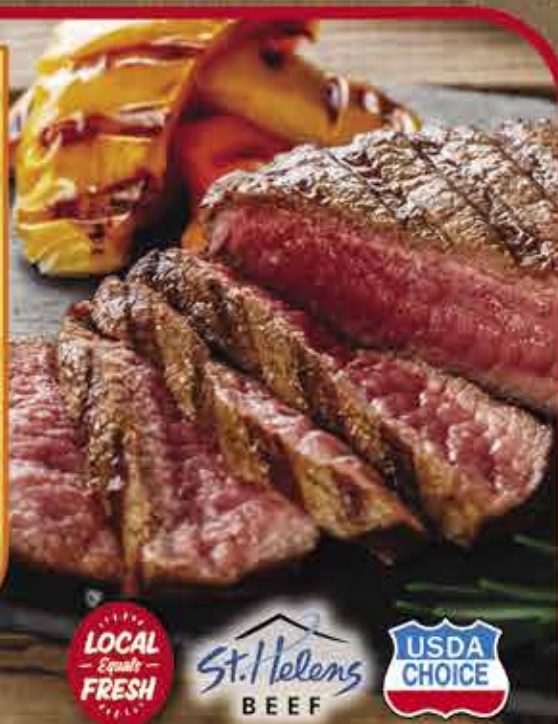
