Crystal Chevelle mounts her golden steed. Frid, a 28-year-old Norwegian Fjord, gently accepts his rider. They know each other. Atop her horse, Chevelle transforms. She raises her head. Her back straightens. A broad smile spreads across her face. She owns this arena.

Usually, Chevelle looks up at everyone else. After suffering a severe Jet Ski collision at age 17, she's been wheelchair bound. A former rodeo queen, Chevelle slips back in the saddle every Monday. For a few fleeting moments, she sits atop the world. "Miracles (happen) every day and I like to use not only miracles but magic," says Susan Wall, who has volunteered at Wenatchee's Alatheia Therapeutic Riding Center for about six years. "Nobody comes here and sense of gratitude and joy. I and feeling a sense of being goodbye and let them go, or do opened Alatheia's gates, from a summer vacation with her

don't know who gets more out of it, the riders, or the volunteers." The staff and volunteers of Alatheia match Chevelle's smile inside the arena. She dons a black helmet and a pink brace while grasping a makeshift steering apparatus made of PVC pipe and old tennis balls. Chevelle has been a regular Alatheia rider for half a decade and has arrived today for her weekly dose of freedom. Perched upon a postcard worthy hillside above the Lower Sunnyslope area, Alatheia is a nonprofit organization that provides therapeutic equine care for children and adults with disabilities. Chevelle represents the many riders who have found hope and healing through the physical, emotional and mental benefits of saddling horses. "When they get on the horse, they just glow. Even if they don't improve, just seeing them doesn't walk away feeling a out in nature and fresh air that just can be done and say

in control, there's a lot of physical and emotional benefits," Wall said. "Some are hard to articulate because they just happen and you don't even necessarily realize

#### A forgotten prayer

During the winter of 2010, Nancy Grette shivered as she chipped ice from a water trough at her home on Sleepy Hollow Heights. Her adult children had all flown from the nest leaving Grette and her husband Glenn with the horses. She needed some direction.

"I had these amazing horses that as a family we had enjoyed and loved them, but I got to the point where I was breaking frozen manure and breaking ice out of the water through," she said, recalling offering a prayer that day. "Lord, give me either a heart

something else with my life or give me a vision."

Months went by and memory of that prayer dissipated in Grette's heart. About six months later, some family friends, the McPhersons, asked if their five-year-old daughter Ella could ride a horse for her fifth birthday. Living with spina bifida since birth, Ella transformed. Grette's prayer had been answered. "When she got on the horse after being with her little walker, the empowerment that we saw and the possibility that we saw with her was just mind blowing," Grette recalled. "We knew that we needed to pursue it."

Not working at the time, she could research equine care and visit other facilities. Grette already had the infrastructure and the horses. What started as a favor to a friend became a mission.

In June of 2011, the Grettes One day, Chevelle shared

their home on Sleepy Hollow Heights, to 12 riders. Used by the apostle Paul in Ephesians 4:15, alatheia is a Greek word meaning "disclosed truth." The Grettes have been horse people for years, but are also people people with a heart for special needs riders. "So, Alatheia then was born," she said. "The name came after we knew that we were going to do this, and had thought

about it, prayed about it."

As she prepared for life after high school, Chevelle viewed a horizon of hope. She had been named Miss USA and competed for high honors in barrel racing. A young woman of many talents, she had applied for a vocal scholarship at a Nashville college. Bright colors painted her future. Yet dark clouds would shroud that horizon.

family on Moses Lake. She mounted a vehicular steed: a Jet Ski. While skipping across the water, she collided with another Jet Ski. She spent seven minutes facedown under water and was airlifted to Sacred Heart Medical Center in Spokane. The impact tore her brain from her skull. She suffered a bruised heart, several brain injuries, a broken sternum, a collapsed lung and she broke her jaw in seven places.

Her family's hearts were also bruised. Doctors told them she would be forever brain dead. She would never smile again. They suggested the family withdraw life support, but her parents refused. Their daughter lay in a coma for 96 days without signs of improvement. On the 97th day, Chevelle's mother tickled her foot inducing a smile. Three days later, her family brought home on her 18th birthday.

Since the accident, Chevelle has been involved in intense speech, occupational and physical therapy. Her time at Alatheia has helped her regain physical strength and confidence.

"When we started with her, we had six people helping her. Now we're down to three, and that just shows the growth and improvement and strength," Wall said. "It's a lot of core strength, which for somebody like her in a wheelchair is just necessary."

#### Horses of hope

So, how do horses help? Grette says that their walking gait closely simulates that of humans.

"As the horse is swinging the pelvis of a human, it simulates walking for those people who have never walked before," Grette says. "For every minute a person is on the back of a horse that's moving, there are 100 balance accommodations that occur in the body. And each of those balance accommodations, the switching of the small and the larger fibers, end up developing strength."

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### Goehner leads delegation to South Korea to discuss economic development, further international relations

Washington State House Republicans

12th District Representative Keith Goehner recently led a delegation of legislators to South Korea to strengthen international relations and get a firsthand look at economic development occurring in the country.

As part of his legislative duties, Goehner sits on the Legislative Committee on Economic Development and International Relations (LCEDIR).

"With the global pandemic limiting international travel the last few years, we have not had an opportunity to visit other countries and get a close look at some of the successful economic development other countries are experiencing and how we could possibly work together," said Goehner, R-Dryden. "The South Korea trip was truly unique. We toured a carbon fiber facility that ties to their aerospace industry. Obviously, that is a focus for us here in Washington state. We also learned more about their bio pharmaceuticals, medical grade supplements, and we were able to check out Saemangeum, the largest seawall in the world. It was very impressive."

The LCEDIR studies and reviews economic development issues with an emphasis on international trade, tourism, investment and industrial development. It also assists the Legislature in developing comprehensive economic development policy.

"The carbon fiber facility supplies Boeing with wing parts and they would like to expand the use of carbon products produced by the facility in our region. There was also a facility producing hydrogen tanks, which fits with what we are working on here," added Goehner. "We also learned South Korea is very interested in Washington state growing crops for them,

which would be a big boost for our agricultural industry.'

There are approximately 60,000 Koreans living in Washington. Goehner the only one of the LCEDIR members who made the trip to South Korea. However, he was accompanied by 25th Legislative District Sen. Chris Gildon and 28th Legislative District Rep. Mari Leavitt, who have many Koreans residing in their districts.

"Korea showed a lot of interest in working with us on economic-related issues. Anything we can do to promote our state and work with other countries can only benefit us. This committee gives us an opportunity to promote our competitive advantages and industries," said Goehner.

By law, Lieutenant Gov. Denny Heck chairs the LCEDIR. The 13-member panel is comprised of an evenly split membership of House and the Senate members, appointed by



# The Washington Outdoors Report

### **Summertime bass**

fishing By John Kruse

Catching bass in the shallows during the spawn is a fun thing to do in the spring but when it comes to summertime fishing, few things are more enjoyable than catching aggressive largemouth and smallmouth bass. Here are a few of my favorite ways to hook them:

#### TOPWATER FUN

There are a lot of ways to skin a cat as they say, and there are also a lot of ways to catch a bass during the summer months. However, nothing is more enjoyable than watching a bass erupt out of the water to smash a topwater lure. The best time to fish topwater lures is early in the morning or in the evening (even after dark on a moonlit night). However, if the waters are calm, you can also have success with topwater lures anytime, especially in shaded areas or on cloudy days.

What kind of topwater lures should you use? If you are fishing an area full of hydrilla, milfoil or lily pads it's hard to beat a weedless frog. Tournament angler Jeremy LeCaire favors frog lures with a white belly since that mimics an actual frog belly. Others swear by frogs that are black in color while others believe in using a frog with, well, a frog pattern. No matter what color you use, twitching it over pads into small open areas of water can trigger many strikes.

If you are not fishing in cover, you have lots of other options. The biggest bass I ever caught (8+pounds) was caught on a Berkley Bullet Pop popper in a frog pattern, fishing the

lure near wood stick ups. Similar poppers or lures like a Zara Spook can be fished at a slow pace or a faster pace in a "walk the dog" fashion, popping left, then right, while you retrieve the lure. As an old friend once told me when it comes to speed, "Let the fish tell you what they want".

Are there other topwater lures that work? You bet. A fairly new offering is the Whopper

Plopper, which is can be cast and reeled in with a slow, steady retrieve as it gurgles along the surface. Buzzbaits retrieved at a fast pace can trigger violent strikes and don't forget classic lures like the Arbogast Hula Popper or Jitterbug. They have both been around for over 80 years but they both still work.

#### **SPINNERBAITS**

Spinnerbaits are always a good summertime bet for bass. I personally favor a white spinnerbait for most conditions but will go with a chartreuse color if there is low visibility in the water. A ¼ or 3/8-ounce spinnerbait can be retrieved rapidly, just under the surface of the water, creating a wake. Heavier spinnerbaits between ½ to one ounce in weight can be slowly retrieved near the bottom. Both methods can be effective. Again, let the fish tell you what they want.

#### **CRANKBAITS**

Crankbaits are a big favorite of mine for both summer and fall bass. Many anglers mistakenly believe these lures should be fished without hitting any structure. That is a mistake. Shallow water crankbaits should bang off of wood and deeper


diving crankbaits should be ticking the bottom because that contact is what triggers reaction strikes from bass. One of my favorite lures is the Berkley Digger which runs at a depth of 8 to 11 feet. If I need to go deeper, the Berkley Dredger will get down to a depth of 20 feet. As for colors, try to match the forage base. For example, a perch or bluegill pattern if that's what the bass are eating, a reddish color if crawfish are in the lake or blue and chrome if the bass are feeding on trout.

RECREATION/COMMUNITY

#### LIPLESS CRANKBAITS

Another confidence bait for me is the lipless crankbait. The original Bill Lewis Rat-L-Trap has caught countless bass since it was introduced in 1971. Rattle trap style lures have no bill (hence the word, lipless). They create a sharp vibration when retrieved and thanks to BB sized shot inside the lure it creates a rattling noise as well. The combination of the vibration and sound triggers bass hanging out in ambush points along weed lines or other structure such as log lay downs, beaver huts, boulders or rocky riprap. The lure excels in depths of two to eight feet. You can rapidly retrieve the lure and draw strikes but I prefer to pause several times when I retrieve a rattle trap, just for a quick second. I do this because following fish will often strike it when it stops in their face or as the lure begins to fall like a wounded fish.

Another method is to use a Yo-Yo retrieve, fishing the lure off the bottom. This technique works best when the fish are deep. As for what lure to use? There are a lot of lipless crankbaits out there in various sizes but my hands down favorite is the



½ ounce, Berkley Warpig, which I've used to catch not only bass, but also walleye and other species since it was introduced a few years

There's so much more to talk about when it comes to catching summer time bass (soft plastic baits for example) but we'll have to leave that for another time. Until then, use crankbaits, spinnerbaits and topwater lures to reel in some hard-hitting bass during these hot weather months.

horses' personalities, as it were, also make a difference. Norwegian Fjords typically calm, mild animals and not easily spooked. This combination makes them apt companions for Alatheia's riders. "Here, it's a beautiful outdoor setting, fresh air, horses that are so in tune with the rider," Wall said. "They will respond to if the rider's happy or sad, scared, comfortable." Alatheia ministers to 105 riders ages three to 93. Its clients have a range of conditions including, cerebral palsy, Down syndrome, Rett syndrome, multiple sclerosis autism and epilepsy. Additionally, Alatheia has a program called Warriors & Horses, which helps veterans suffering from Post Traumatic Stress

Disorder. The staff consists of five part-time instructors and a volunteer base which has grown from 25 to nearly 100 who share the workload along with a dozen Norwegian Fjords.

While Grette is well versed in equine matters, learning about the various disabilities of her clients has provided unique hurdles. She feels grateful to be affiliated with national organizations Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship (PATH) and the Norwegian Fjord Horse Registry (NFHR). This has helped to educate Alatheia's staff on the conditions of their clients and to receive advice from professionals. She said that PATH helps, "sets codes and standards, also provides us with precaution and indication particular disabilities that we might need to take more care on. Much of what

we learned is by experience, experimenting a lot with what works and does not work."

Alatheia's success has seen it outgrow its facility. With a wait list of 60 people, the center expects to have around 150 riders eventually. Alatheia's current location is limited by acreage and parking availability. Looking for arena and barn expansion, the Grettes recently purchased 12 acres off of Easy Street which will become Alatheia's new home in 2025.

"You don't just come for 10 weeks and then you're done," Grette said. "The repeated exposure is what provides the most benefit. Once we get to the new location, we'll be able to serve so many more people and veterans."

#### **Trotting Forward**

Chevelle is running out of time. Just a few more

seconds. While country music emanates from a smart phone, the team gathers around her as she navigates the final two barrels. Engaging in her favorite competition, barrel racing, she leads Frid around the last barrier. A volunteer states the time: "40.48 seconds." "Chevelle celebrates with everyone. It's a personal record. Her session now completed, she dismounts Frid with help and eases back into her wheelchair after riding high. Chevelle's future, and her present, are still bright. The hues of her horizon are simply different shades than the colors of years ago, but the view remains breathtaking. Here in a dusty arena upon a hillside, the former rodeo queen reigns again.



#### **Buckled** Breezeway

Over the winter in the high snow, we lost half the breeze way roof on the little shop. The half-roof dangled like an apron making Grandpa anxious so he and Sonny took a few two by sixes and braced

After each piece of the metal slid down, the man-lift bucket would move back, Uncle Larry would take the time to look over the disaster in front of him; he'd let us know it was safe then we'd wade in and move the tin to a waiting trailer. After all the tin was taken off, Uncle Larry and Kat took a break. We took time to ask for safety, to slow down and respect God enough to ask for guidance.

Kat started to give Uncle Larry some advice. I gave her 'the look' followed by a sharp negative twist of my head. Her lips closed. Uncle Larry tipped his head considering the sheets of wood, twisted two by fours and two by sixes, then he asked her, "What do you think, Kat?" She told him, he nodded his head. Then the two of them got back to busy on the Second Phase by unscrewing the sheets of wood from the two by sixes.

There was no rushing through this job. Uncle Larry studied and considered every step before it was made. There was a dangling two by four held in place by a steal post that concerned me. "Lar? You see that? I'm concerned when you cut that two by four the weight on the other side will twist wild." I didn't tell him how to solve the problem. I wasn't the

one in the man-lift bucket. He nodded, "I see it," he said and got back in the man-lift bucket. He moved the bucket into a position so that if the shelf of twisted wood moved unexpectedly, he wouldn't be in the way, then he cut the two by four to finish dropping the last of the dangling wood to the ground with a crash. Standing tall in the man-lift bucket he grinned down at us, "Demolition," he hollered, "got'a admit this is kind'a fun."

We were all grinning. Phase Three (clean up) kept us all busy for a bit then Kat and Uncle Larry took the man-lift back to the rental place visiting the whole while getting home just in time for some of Aunt Cece's Heart Attack Chicken for lunch.

#### **Aunt Cece's Heart Attack Chicken**

· 1 smallish chicken cut up or

- some chicken wings
- ¼ cup Parmesan cheese
- 4-5 slices of bread ¼ teaspoon each salt and
- pepper 1 teaspoon garlic powder ¼ to ½ cup butter (or other

Preheat oven to 375°. Make breading by adding bread, Parmesan, salt and pepper to a blender. Blend until the bread is all fine crumbs. Melt butter in a bowl large enough to accommodate one chicken piece at a time; add garlic powder; mix. Put a Tablespoon of butter in with the bread crumbs and mix (to make it stickier) then pour bread crumbs into a second bowl for rolling chicken in. Dip chicken parts, one piece at a time, into butter then into crumbs then lay in a cake pan or jelly roll pan (cookie sheet with 1/2 inch sides). Bake chicken until coating is crisp and the juices run clear when pierced with a knife to the bone, 45 minutes to an hour, maybe even an hour and a half depending on how large

the chicken parts are. Choices: Add a dash of

cayenne pepper. Mix parsley to the bread crumbs. Leave out the Parmesan cheese. Dip in milk (or buttermilk) instead of

arrived and the girl ended up in a Seattle hospital. After the delay, our girls ran 51.44 (just 0.1 seconds off their season best) to qualify for the finals.

400 dash - Freshman Isaac Zavala ran a time of 53.60 to finish with the 12th fastest time in the prelims. This was faster time than he ran at District. Isaac is the third fastest on the CHS Fantastic Freshman list.

**800 run** - Freshman Keenan Knoll ran a PR time of 2:05.07 which placed him 12th in the preliminaries. Keenan is now second on the Fantastic Freshman list.

800 run - Senior Maddie Hammond also ran a PR time in her race. Maddie was in a very fast heat, ran 2:33.35, and moved herself up on the All-Time list.

200 dash - Junior Molly Smith ran 27.64 in the prelims. The 200 dash had some very fast girls including the girl that set the state record for all classifications. Molly was 14th overall in the preliminaries. While not quite what she wanted, it was another chance for Molly to get into the blocks at the State meet.

4 x 400 relay - Junior Anthony Zavala set the tone with a PR split time of 54.7. Senior Genaro Reyna ran second leg and 52.3. Third leg Junior Kaden Miller had a split of 53.3 while Freshman Isaac Zavala anchored at 52.3. They ran a season best of 3:32.60 to qualify for the finals.

4 x 400 relay - Junior Molly Smith had a great lead off leg running 62.9 and handed off the baton to Sophomore Allyson Kitchel (65.9). It was tight at the exchange with some bumping and jostling going on. Third leg Junior Brianna Talley had a 400split time of 63.6. Senior Kaitlyn Bjorklund finished with a 63.2 split and it appeared the girls had qualified for finals. Soon after the race we were told that we had been disqualified during the bumping and jostling of the second exchange.

Vault Senior Pole Ava Courtney jumped a PR height of 9-6 to finish 7th in the competition. It was Ava's second medal at state in the pole vault. She finished 8th place last season. Ava's good attempts at 10 feet created some interest with a college coach that would like to have Ava on his team next year.

**Shot Put** - Junior Raquel Pedraza is a state veteran in the shot put. She earned a medal last season. This season, she had a very good series with four throws over 35-7. Her final throw of 36-8 earned her the 8th place medal and also set the new school record!

Saturday was another eventful day filled with finals for the Bulldogs.

Javelin - Raquel Pedraza earned the 8th place medal in the javelin. Her best throw of 108-3 was just off her PR of 110-3 set at the District meet. Her throw at state this season was within inches of her state throw that earned her secondplace last season. Raquel has now earned five state medals in two state meets.

Triple Jump - Sadie Smith competed and had a best jump of 32-5 which was good for 10th place. Sadie finished the season sixth on the CHS All Time list in the triple jump.

Triple Jump - Jumping at the same time as his cousin Sadie, Sophomore Colby Diaz jumped a PR distance of 41-8 to

earn third place for himself and six points for his team. Colby had three jumps that were farther than his previous PR set at the District meet. Colby is now seventh on the Super Sophomore list.

**Shot Put** - Sophomore Brody Larson finished 12th putting the shot 44-7.5 which was just shy of his PR set at District of 44-11.5. However, his state series was much better with all three of his throws being over 44 feet. Brody is third on the Super Sophomore list.

**High Jump** - Senior Lucas Rylaarsdam entered the meet with a PR height of 6-0 set at the League Championship. He won the District Championship jumping 5-10. He had some good attempts at 6-0 at state but had to settle for 5-10 and 9th place.

**4 x 200 relay** - Molly Smith, Sadie Smith, Allyson Kitchell and Kaitlyn Bjorklund ran well and finished 7th with a time of 1:48.68 which was quicker than their prelim time and just a few tenths off their season best winning the District Championship.

110 high hurdles - Levi McPherson and Kaden Miller went into the final seeded number 1 and 2 and racing side by side in the final. Kaden finished in 15.56 and finished second. Levi ran 15.47 to become the State Champion. The boys earned 18 points for their team.

4 x 100 relay - Anthony Zavala, Genaro Reyna, Isaac Zavala and Logan Collins ran a season best 44.97 to earn 4th place medals and 5 points for their team.

4 x 100 relay - Molly Smith, Erin Irelan, Allyson Kitchel and Kaitlyn Bjorklund were lined up on the track ready to run their race in the finals. This time the race was delayed two hours due to lighting in the area. After the delay, the girls sprinted 51.14 earning sixth place medals. It was the season's best time by 0.3 seconds and the fifth fastest time in school history!

300 hurdles - Kaden Miller entered the race with the fastest prelim time and finished the race with a State Championship! His time of 39.84 is third best on the All-Time list behind two other state champions!

3200 run - Senior Garrik Strong has had a very good season and has improved his time in nearly every race. He qualified for state by running 10:27.20 to win the District championship. His PR was 10:22.97 set on May 5th. Garrik told the coaches his goal time for the state meet and new exactly what he had to do to accomplish it. He wanted to break for 10 minutes. He ran the race just as he planned and chopped 26 seconds off his PR to run 9:56.22 and place 10th overall!

4 x 400 relay - Anthony Zavala again had a time of 54.7 on his part of the relay. Genaro Reyna ran a season best of 51.8. Kaden Miller ran 53.7. Isaac Zavala closed out with a 51.8 for his fastest split of the season. The boys ran faster than their prelim time finishing with a season of best 3:31.98 earning sixth place medals and three team points.

The girls scored 14 team points and finished tied for 18 place. The champion team was Kings with 52 points.

The boys scored 42 points to earn the second-place trophy. The champion team was Seattle Academy with 66 points. Thanks for supporting the track athletes this spring.
