Walter named permanent director of **Chelan County Community Development**

WENATCHEE Walter, Chelan County assessor and interim director of Chelan County Community Development, is the new permanent director of the county's planning and building department.

Walter, who was appointed as interim director of Community Development in March 2022, will step down from her elected position on March 31 and take over the role as the department's director on April 1.

Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) signed a contract for employment with Walter on Monday. "This past year, Deanna has brought stability and efficiencies Community Development. She has filled six positions while prioritizing cross-training and better customer service at all levels," said Commissioner Tiffany Gering, BOCC chairwoman. "The board has called upon her twice now to step in and lead that department at times when it needed her leadership style the most – all while also serving as an elected official. In a time when it is difficult to hire planning professionals, much less directors, the board is fortunate that Deanna agreed to take on this position in a permanent capacity."

Serving in both capacities was not a long-term solution for Chelan County or its citizens, Walter said. "This was a very hard decision, one I did not take lightly. I loved being assessor, but I also recognize I can help Community Development, knowing the Assessor's Office is healthy," Walter said. "The Assessor's Office

driven and the employees there are a cohesive team. My decision to leave is based on my confidence that my team will thrive without me. I will work to bring these same qualities to Community Development to benefit the public we serve.'

Walter's background includes:

- · Born and raised in Wenatchee, she has more than 27 years of land use experience. She holds two bachelor's degrees, one in actuarial science from Central Washington University and another in urban and regional from Eastern planning Washington University.
- Walter started her land use career as a planner, first working in Kootenai County and later Spokane County. In 2002 she was hired by Chelan County Community Development as its assistant director. She left Community Development in 2005, moving to the private development sector.
- · In 2009, Walter was recruited by former Assessor Russ Griffith to be the chief appraiser in the Chelan County Assessor's Office. Upon Griffith's retirement in 2010, Walter was promoted to chief deputy of the Assessor's Office. In September 2011, she was appointed county assessor. She first won election to office in 2012; she was most recently reelected to office last year.
- Walter served two terms as president of the Washington State Association of County Assessor. In that role, she

worked with legislators and the Washington Department of Revenue on legislation and best practices for appraisal and program administration across the state. Over the years, she has developed an expertise in levies, which require a special analytical

Commissioners first appointed Walter as interim director of Community Development in February 2020 to reorganize and stabilize the department before new Director Jim Brown was hired later that year. She continued as interim assistant director until September 2020 to support the new director and onboard the new assistant director. Then, when former interim director Chris Young stepped down in March 2022, Walter was again asked to serve as interim director.

Development has had six directors or interim directors, not including Walter's two stints as interim director. This is a fact not lost on commissioners, Gering said. "These positions are difficult to fill. It's a difficult department to manage because of the many moving parts, both internal and external," Gering said. "But Community Development is not the same department it was just two years ago. The board is confident that under Deanna's continued guidance, this department is only going to continue to grow while meeting the needs of our community."

Next, the BOCC will appoint someone as a temporary interim county assessor by April 1. The Republican Central Committee will then provide the names of three candidates to the BOCC, which will appoint an interim assessor from the recommendation to serve until the 2023 election is certified. People interested in running for the position can file for election May 15-19. The new assessor then will serve the remaining three years of the vacated

As for Walter, she sees herself in the director's position until she retires in about eight years. "I was born and raised in this valley, and I've been a part of the county family since 2002. I'm committed to the county; I've devoted many years to serving its citizens," she said. "To the community, I'd add that cultural change in an office doesn't happen overnight, but we are hoping the public sees we are a work in progress and getting better every day."

ceived property tax statements your local county treasurers, which usually leads to many questions of my office. You should know that the state's operating budget relies primarily on sales and business taxes for its revenues. Most

property taxes are approved by your local officials or subject to a local vote. Locally approved school levies, school bonds, fire district levies, port district taxes, library district taxes, and others - along with the value of your property and your surrounding area - all affect what you pay in property taxes.

Local, state, and federal taxes

Taxes are applied at all levels of government (local, state, and federal). The level of government originating the taxes is an important consideration. For example, as your state senator, I do not determine "city" or "county" taxes within your communities except for authorities the state may grant local governments for taxation. Local taxes are decided by your city councils, county officials, or by community votes. I also have no impact on "federal" taxes determined by the United States Congress. As a state legislator, I am involved in "state" level taxes. The primary taxes in Washington state include sales and business taxes, although a portion of the sales tax is decided by local

Understanding the property tax system

Property taxes vary depending on where you live

The property tax bill that you receive is a collection of different property taxes and assessments. If you think of your property tax bill as one round-shaped pie, various entities receive their revenue from slices of the pie. Since the state relies primarily on sales and business taxes to fund its programs, only a slice of what you pay in property taxes is the state portion. The remaining slices (some larger than others) are comprised of taxes from local governments for such things as school levies, school bonds, fire response, library, and other local services. Some of these property taxes, such as local school district levies and bonds or fire district taxes, are subject to the approval of local voters. Residents of one jurisdiction can pay more or less than others depending on

all levels of government, the one I receive the most questions and complaints about is the property tax. Understanding the property tax system can be quite challenging, so please contact your county assessor for more detailed information. It is important to note that assessors determine the value of the property in a county. The county treasurers collect property tax revenues. Neither the assessors nor the treasurers determine the taxes approved. Those decisions are the responsibility of other local governments, officials and voters within each jurisdiction.

The legislative session is more than halfway complete. Last week was the "house of origin" cutoff. That means bills that have not passed out of the chamber where they originated are dead for the session, unless some extraordinary steps are taken or they are deemed necessary to implement the budget (NTIB). In the House, we are now holding public hearings

on the Senate bills sent to us. We have until March 29, to vote them out of the policy committees and April 4 to take action on bills in the fiscal committees. The last five weeks of session will go very quickly. If you have any questions, concerns, or comments about issues before us this session, please do not hesitate to contact me.

With so much to talk about after the long days and nights of House floor action, my seatmate Rep. Mike Steele, R-Chelan, and I want to give you the opportunity to discuss any of the legislative or state issues before us this session.

Successes in stopping bad legislation

Being in the minority, much of our work consists of amending bad legislation or stopping bills from passing. We have had some successes this session. Bills that are dead for the session include:

• House Bill 1025 would have allowed police officers to be sued personally.

• House Bill 1333 would have created a controversial Domestic Violent Extremism Commission; and

· House Bill 1670 would have allowed cities and counties to triple the 1% annual revenue growth on property taxes.

Vehicle pursuit legislation update

Last week, I joined with my House Republican colleagues in attempting a parliamentary maneuver that would have pulled the bipartisan House Bill 1363 to the floor for a vote. Our efforts were voted down on a party-line vote.

While the Senate did pass their version of the pursuit bill, it is watered down and much weaker than the original bill. However, it does keep the issue alive and potentially provide us with another opportunity to amend

Prioritizing criminals over victims

We have seen legislation this session that prioritizes criminals over • House Bill 1513 would have victims, while passing bills that would prevented law enforcement make it more difficult for citizens to from pulling people over for exercise their constitutional rights.

> crimes committed in protected zones, like schools and bus stops.

House Bill 1324, which would reduce sentences for juvenile criminal reoffenders: and

House Bill 1169, which would shift the cost of crime from criminals to law-abiding citizens.

We need to hold criminals accountable for their actions, not go easier on crime. While the majority party is pushing these bills, they are also moving legislation that may not be constitutional and punishes lawabiding citizens.

House Bill 1240 would ban the sale, production or transfer most semiauto firearms aka "assault weapons". It contains an emergency clause that goes into effect immediately after the governor signs it. HB 1240 does not require confiscation of currently This legislation goes against the recent U.S. Supreme Court Bruen decision and the upcoming federal district court ruling on the California "assault weapons ban," which most believe will be overturned. This ban will have a greater impact on lawabiding citizens than the individuals who commit crimes.

House Bill 1143 would impair your right to buy, sell or keep arms. The measure would impose various training and testing requirements on law-abiding gun owners and retailers before they can exercise their constitutional rights.

Our state must prioritize victims over criminals and allow law-abiding • House Bill 1268, which would reduce citizens to protect themselves and their penalties for gang, drug, and firearm families from the rise in violent crime. Washington state has the fewest law enforcement officers per capita, and we desperately need to recruit and train more law enforcement officers to protect our communities.

Link Transit making minor service adjustment changes effective April 3

As of April 3, Link Transit will improve frequency to 30 minutes on several routes and make some minor changes to other routes to improve reliability.

Routes that will be improved to arrive every 30 minutes:

- Route 3 (8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays) • Route 7 (8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
- weekdays) Route 9 (7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. weekdays)

*Note that these routes will operate every 60 minutes outside of these timeframes.

Routes that will have minor timing changes to improve reliability:

- Route 1N, 1S, 4, 5, 9, 12 and 21 Additional changes include:
- · Route 1S: This route will serve a new bus stop on S. Wenatchee Ave. near Beuzer Street. The bus stop on Terminal & Mission will no longer be served.
- Route 3: The Saddle Rock trailhead bus stop will be "oncall" for all trips. The bus will loop around Central Washington Hospital unless there is a call to serve Saddle Rock trailhead.
- Route 8: The 5:30 p.m. departure from Columbia Station will

continue as Route 18. -Route 18: A new trip will be added

- from Olds Station though East Wenatchee to Wenatchee Valley College at 5:47 p.m.
- Route 22: Route 22 will again provide through access Leavenworth. On a temporary basis, Route 22 will use Ski Hill Dr. and Evans St. to turn around until a proposed new roundabout is constructed at US 2 & Icicle Rd. During this time, two bus stops on US 2 west of Ski Hill Dr. will be closed, and two new bus stops will be added (Ski Hill Dr. & US 2 and Evans & Central Ave.)

Electric vehicles are being tested on this route and will operate on approximately six roundtrips per weekday, adding five minutes of charging time at Wilkommen Park & Ride before returning to Wenatchee. On trips heading toward Wenatchee, bus stops through Leavenworth will be served five minutes earlier than previously.

- · Route 22S: The shuttle service through Leavenworth discontinued.
- Route 24: This route will provide better access to downtown

Payment of property taxes

Some residents pay their annual property taxes twice a year with half payments by April 30 and October 31. Others choose to pay the full year's tax by April 30. Many property owners have their property taxes included with their monthly mortgage payments. While that is certainly a convenient option, it may somewhat disguise what you are paying in property taxes. Current law provides a variety of authorized reductions, exemptions, deferrals, and other assistance to property taxpayers.







Creating more exemptions can cause complications, however, because as more properties are exempted, the overall tax burden is applied to the remaining taxable properties. This results in a "tax shift" with all other properties paying

Assessed value and community valuation

The assessed value of property in addition to the tax rates is a contributor to what property owners pay. If a tax rate remains the same but a property's value increases, a property owner likely pays more. When the total value of assets throughout an area increases, often due to enhanced residential and commercial development, the tax-requesting entity enjoys the benefit of that total dollar amount being spread over more paying and valued properties, helping to keep the tax manageable. New businesses constructed or additional homes development within a community help increase the overall valuation of an area's property. This mitigates an individual's property tax by spreading the overall fixed burden to more taxpayers.

■ LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor,

I attended a public hearing on March 13 at the City Council meeting with 25-30 people in attendance. While I presented my concerns during the public comment period for the Christ Center/Spears annexation, Council member Derrick Pratt implied that I own a multi-family complex. In his hand, he held a parcel search of a property I own in Wenatchee and held it up and showed it to me as I was presenting my comments. He asked me to define multifamily zoning and I replied, "You tell me what multifamily zoning means." He had no response. He also accused me of parking my trailer on the road which had nothing to do with the annexation. I remained calm and composed during his questioning and accusations. After the conclusion of

the meeting, as I attempted to leave, Pratt tried to give me the parcel search on my Wenatchee property. I refused to accept it. He became visibly angry and threw it on my chair. I picked it up and handed it back to him, and in a loud voice I said, "I don't want this." I handed it back to him. Again, he threw it on my chair. I took it off my chair, and in a louder voice, as I wanted to make sure people were aware of the aggressive interaction, I again said, "I DO NOT WANT THIS!" I placed it on his bag that was on the floor by his feet. As I attempted to leave the chambers, he approached me and came close to my ear. He stated in a low voice, near my ear, "I know where you work, at LNI."

None of the council stood up for me during this interaction. It could be that they did not

witness his rude conduct or were oblivious to it. I do appreciate Mayor Fletcher, stating quietly to Pratt, that his behavior is inappropriate and does not belong in the city chambers. However, it was too quiet. What prevents Pratt from doing this to me once he leaves City Hall?

Because of Pratt's outburst, I felt threatened and became worried about my safety. I asked a male attendee to accompany me to my car. I grasped my keys between each finger and readied myself for the walk out to my car.

Public servants are expected to conduct themselves in a manner that justifies the confidence placed in them by the people; maintaining integrity and ethically discharging the high responsibilities of public service. Pratt demonstrated inappropriate, condescending and threatening behavior towards me.

I request that he be reprimanded by the City Council. I request the following:

- 1. A verbal public apology to me from Pratt at the next City Council meeting.
- 2. A written apology from Pratt to me in the next issue of the Cashmere Valley Record and the Wenatchee World.
- 3. That Pratt be removed from City Council for his remaining 9 months. His term expires 12/31/23.
- 4. That the City Council develop and adopt a Code of Conduct for the council members to prevent this from occurring again to another civically engaged resident like myself.



Common side effects of medications are stomach irritation or gastritis

Q: My medicine is upsetting my stomach. What can I do about that?

You are not alone. The most common side effects of medications are stomach irritation or gastritis. Gastritis describes any of these symptoms: queasiness, stomach pain, stomach cramping, stomach burning, loose stools, or nausea. Every single medication has been reported to cause stomach upset. That means every medicine has caused an upset stomach in someone. with some medications causing more stomach irritation than others.

Antibiotic medications are one of the most common causes of stomach irritation. Some antibiotics are gentle to your stomach and intestines, while others have well-earned reputations for creating havoc. The antibiotic I just finished is the third one I've been on for the same infection, each more potent than before and causing more stomach upset and intestinal distress than the previous one.

My dentist gave me the antibiotic penicillin when my tooth first became infected. Even after decades of use, it's still the go-to antibiotic for dental infections unless you are allergic to it. I took it three times a day, feeling queasy for several hours after each dose. Unfortunately, it didn't help the infected tooth.

I returned to the dentist's office for a root canal one week later. Despite the procedure, my tooth still hurt. I was given antibiotic number two, a more powerful version of penicillin:



amoxicillin plus clavulanate. The clavulanate part of that particular antibiotic is infamous for causing stomach distress. I took it three times daily, fighting nausea for several hours after each dose. It also made my food taste weird.

Unfortunately, antibiotic number two didn't fix the problem. In a last-ditch attempt to save the tooth, my dentist switched me to antibiotic number three: clindamycin. Clindamycin is usually taken four times daily and is not gentle on your stomach. Those reasons make it option number three instead of option one or

Not only did clindamycin made me queasy, but my stomach also actually hurt after each dose.

I got to experience stomach pain and nausea four times every day, with every meal and at bedtime. Just thinking about food made my stomach cramp. About the time my tummy started feeling better, it was time to take the next dose.

If that wasn't bad enough, it also created a weird taste in my mouth. My morning coffee tasted rancid, and I couldn't look at food without cringing.

What causes a drug to make your food taste bad? Antibiotics are designed spread throughout your tissues. Designed to attack tooth infections, an antibiotic is present in small amounts in your saliva. The

sour and metallic taste in my mouth was my tasting the antibiotic itself.

The most important way to minimize stomach upset from medicines is to take $them\,with\,food\,and\,additional$ fluids whenever possible. Nearly all medication can be taken with food, but some exceptions exist.

Thyroid supplements like levothyroxine (Synthroid®, Levothroid®) are more consistently absorbed when taken on an empty stomach 30 minutes before a meal or two-three hours afterward. Bone-building drugs like alendronate (Fosamax®) and risedronate (Actonel®) should be taken on an empty stomach, with a full glass of water.

Here are four ways to reduce stomach upset from your medicines:

1.Finish your meal FIRST.

Take irritating medicines at or near the end of your meal, not as you sit down to eat. You'll be able to dilute the effects of the drug much better if vour stomach already has food in it instead of taking your pill with the first few bites of your meal or snack.

2. Dilute them.

Taking medicine with a full glass of fluid often reduces stomach irritation. Milk is best, and water is fine, but avoid carbonated drinks like pop or soda. They are highly acidic and can aggravate your stomach distress instead of ease it.

3. Don't double up. If you take more than

one medicine that causes stomach irritation, separate the troublemakers. Take them at least two to three hours apart.

4. Try again.

If you end up vomiting after taking your medicine, don't panic. If it's been at least 45 minutes since you swallowed it, most of it has already reached your system, and you don't need to re-dose. If it has been less than 30 minutes, you should try again, ensuring you have food and some fluid in your stomach. If you have been prescribed an antibiotic, if you vomit the second dose within 45 minutes despite taking it with food or milk, inform your doctor immediately to get another medicine.


