## Criddlebaugh hired as new Chelan County economic services director

**WENATCHEE** - Chelan County commissioners announce the hiring of Ron Criddlebaugh of Quincy, who will fill a newly created administrator position titled economic services director.

Criddlebaugh currently serves as the director of economic and business development for the Chelan Douglas Regional Port Authority. He has served nine years with the port district, first with the Port of Douglas and then the regional port district when it was reorganized in 2019. In his role, Criddlebaugh has led the regional port's efforts in attracting new businesses to the region.

"The board of commissioners is excited to have Ron join our county team," said Commissioner Tiffany Gering, chairwoman of the Board of County Commissioners. "We look forward to the role he will play in shaping the economic future of Chelan County."

Criddlebaugh will begin working in the Commissioner's Office on April 3. He brings to the county more than 20 years of experience in economic development, personnel and grant management, small business development, strategic planning, and tourism promotion. In his overall career, Criddlebaugh has worked with hundreds of businesses, helping them become more successful.

"I'm looking forward to taking my past experience and knowledge and working with the Board of County Commissioners and staff to make positive changes for the residents of Chelan County and our region," Criddlebaugh said. "We will be looking at what we can do as a governmental agency to enhance our business environment and attract business to the county. We will also be assessing our county-owned visitor facilities to find ways to give our residents and visitors the best recreational experience we can."

The economic services director is in a new position at Chelan County and replaces the economic development director position previously held by Blake Baldwin and interim director Sasha Sleiman. In October 2021, commissioners hired BERK Consulting of Seattle to assess the structure of those appointed offices under the Board of County Commissioners. Commissioners cited a need to re-evaluate the structure because of the expanding role a variety of departments were undertaking, including housing, homelessness, lands management and infrastructure development. Among BERK's recommendations was to reconfigure the role of the county administrator position. At the time, more than a dozen unrelated

**Wenatchee** - Mission Ridge Ski & Board Resort is excited to announce the addition of eight days of operations for the current 2023 season. ## Hawkins issues statement on passage of Senate's drug possession bill

**OLYMPIA** - The Washington State Senate today approved Senate Bill 5536 sponsored by Sen. June Robinson, D-Everett. It represents the first major step in this legislative session to address a temporary drug possession law that sunsets this July. In 2021, the State Supreme Court's Blake Decision struck down Washington's felony drug possession statute as unconstitutional.

Legislators approved a temporary measure later that year to classify drug possession as a misdemeanor while working toward a more comprehensive solution. The proposal that was approved today by a vote of 28 to 21 includes a classification of possession offenses, steps to pretrial diversion, prosecution, and resources. Hawkins voted in favor of the proposal, which now moves to the House of Representatives for further consideration.

### State Sen. Brad Hawkins issued the following statement:

"Many of my legislative colleagues have characterized drug abuse as a 'personal healthcare issue.' I don't necessarily disagree, but our state needs to maintain options in our criminal justice system to protect people from themselves and others. I would have preferred something much stronger, but this is a bipartisan compromise.

"This is one of the most important issues of this session. The Senate's approach isn't a perfect solution, but I believe it strikes the right balance between having a helping hand of compassion and a heavier hand of punishment. One way or another, we need to get people the help they need to get healthy, but we also don't want them endangering themselves or others."

## Humpies, Lawsuits and Trout

### PINK SALMON NUMBERS ARE LOOKING GOOD

Odd numbered years are pink salmon years here in Washington State and 2023 is lining up to be a good one for anglers fishing for them in Puget Sound and its tributary streams. The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife is forecasting a return of nearly four million of these smaller salmon, nicknamed “humpies”, for the hump the males develop on their back after entering fresh water to spawn.

The pinks show up in the Strait of Juan De Fuca as early as June and can be caught by both boat and shore anglers in Puget Sound throughout the month of August. By September, most of the pink salmon are entering tributary streams like the Skagit, Snohomish, Skykomish, Green and Puyallup Rivers, providing additional opportunities for anglers who target them with Buzz Bomb lures, jigs with squid bodies and spoons, the key to all of them is that they must be pink in color if you want to catch pinks with them. Humpies are a fun fish to cut your teeth on as a first-time salmon angler and it's not uncommon to catch a good number of them in a day of fishing. While many anglers save them for the smoker, they do taste very good when fresh, especially when grilled over a BBQ or pellet smoker.

### LAWSUIT FILED AGAINST WDFW COMMISSIONER

On March 6 the Sportsmen's

Alliance Foundation, which is a pro-hunting and fishing organization, filed a lawsuit in Thurston County to prohibit WDFW Commissioner Lorna Smith from participating as a member of the Commission. The basis for the lawsuit is that state law prohibits anyone from holding an additional elected or appointed office while serving on the commission. Smith currently serves on the Jefferson County Planning Commission which the Sportsman's Alliance says is in direct violation of Washington Law.

Todd Adkins with the Sportsman's Alliance says, "We view this lawsuit as the initial step of a long but important process to bring sanity and decency back to wildlife decision-making in Washington. It all starts here, but trust me, it won't end here. The animal extremists are going to see a lot of the same in the coming weeks and months."

Lorna Smith is a controversial appointee to the Fish and Wildlife Commission. Since being appointed in 2021 by Governor Jay Inslee she was an instrumental voice in shutting down Washington's long running spring bear hunt, despite the recommendation of WDFW staff members that it be allowed to take place.

When the Blue Mountain elk herd declined (primarily due to cougar predation), Smith suggested managing the herd as a smaller one instead of addressing the predation issues. She has also introduced the framework of a plan that would limit hunting as a management tool by the agency.

It is worth noting that Smith is not the only commissioner serving in another appointed or elected position. Commissioner Molly Linville (who generally sides with hunters in her decision making), serves on her local school board in Douglas County.

Eli Francovich, writing for the Spokesman Review, contacted both commissioners. Linville told Francovich that she was advised by legal counsel that serving on the school board was not a conflict of interest. Commissioner Smith told

Francovich she was serving on the Jefferson County Planning Commission on a volunteer basis and in an advisory role when appointed to the Fish and Wildlife Commission. Smith continued stating she does not believe the statute does not preclude

individuals serving in a volunteer position like she has been in Jefferson County.

### LAKE LENORE FISHING TRIP

Last but not least, I made it up to Lake Lenore this past week after WDFW fisheries biologist Mike Schmuck told me the fishing there was very good last year, and he expected similar results this season. I picked a cold, cloudy day to visit the north end of the lake which is where many of the Lahontan cutthroat trout tend to mill around in the spring prior to spawning.

Unfortunately, the trout were not yet in this part of the lake in good numbers. Two anglers who were leaving as I arrived said they each only caught one fish that day. While fishing, I did see one angler catch one trout and while I did get one good strike, I was unable to hook up and didn't have any more bites that afternoon.

Lake Lenore is a selective regulation fishery and is primarily a catch and release destination where the trout average two to three pounds and can get up to six pounds in size. Fly anglers in pontoon boats favor fishing chironomids under strike indicators while spin anglers can do well fishing spoons with single, barbless hooks.

The fishing at this scenic, desert lake north of Soap Lake should get better towards the end of March and peak in April. I plan to return to try again and will let you know how I do.

Q My doctor put me on a statin medicine to lower my “bad” cholesterol, but it made me tired, so I stopped it. I walk 3 miles a day. Can taking psyllium help lower my “bad” cholesterol?

If you have heart disease or diabetes in addition to elevated “bad” cholesterol, taking a “statin” medicine, like atorvastatin or simvastatin, can reduce your risk of a heart attack or stroke.

Although the first “statin” medication you were prescribed made you tired, there is no guarantee that you will experience the same issue with other “statin” medicines. With 5 “statin” medications available, many people do fine after switching to a different “statin” drug.

If you don't have heart disease or diabetes, “statin” drugs are not your only option for reducing your “bad” cholesterol or LDL. Increasing the amount of fiber you eat can help lower LDL by eating foods with more fiber or taking a fiber-rich supplement like psyllium seed.

The typical American diet has very little fiber in it. Changing to a Mediterranean

diet has been shown to lower LDL cholesterol. One of the main differences between a Mediterranean diet and a typical American diet is the Mediterranean diet has more fiber and encourages using olive oil instead of most other types of fat.

In addition to olive oil, the diet includes much more fiber. A Mediterranean diet consists of beans, peas, whole grains, and more vegetables, with limited amounts of low-fiber foods like dairy, eggs, and red meat.

Taking a fiber supplement like psyllium can help you lower your LDL cholesterol. Psyllium is the outer coating or husk of the Plantago plant, also called plantain.

When plantain or psyllium husks are added to water, they turn gummy and gluey. Instead of being digested, they form a gelatinous mass moving through your intestine. This can help symptoms of constipation,

which is why psyllium is sold in the laxative section of your grocery or pharmacy.

Psyllium lowers LDL cholesterol by about 10%. One study paid for by Procter & Gamble, the makers of Metamucil®, a psyllium product, showed that taking 10 grams daily of psyllium decreased LDL by 6.7 points.

Another study using cookies fortified with 5 grams of psyllium showed that postmenopausal women who ate 3 cookies daily had a 10% decrease in their LDL cholesterol.

Although Metamucil® is the brand of psyllium most recommended by pharmacists, it's not the only psyllium product you can buy. Another form of psyllium called hydrophilic mucilloid is available as Konsyl® or Hydrocil®.

All psyllium forms have the same beneficial effect on LDL, and most of their forms require mixing with at least 12 ounces

of water or drinking 12 ounces of water immediately afterward to avoid causing intestinal blockage.

To improve its gritty texture and to help it mix better with water, Metamucil® also contains a small amount of maltodextrin, a carbohydrate derived from cornstarch.

Psyllium is available in several forms: a loose powder that you scoop out and add to a glass of water, premeasured packets added to a glass of water, sweetened powder, wafers, and even cookies.

Because psyllium is marketed as a laxative, you will find it next to other laxatives on your grocery or pharmacy shelf. Be careful. Different fiber types are also sold as laxatives, like methylcellulose and polycarbophil. Unlike psyllium, they won't have any beneficial effect on your LDL.

**Here are 5 Tips on Lowering Your LDL Cholesterol with Fiber:**

#### 1. Take with plenty of water or other fluid.

All psyllium products need to be taken with water to prevent intestinal blockage. If you can't drink 12 ounces of water with each dose, psyllium is not for you. A psyllium product will not be a good choice if you have a fluid restriction because of heart disease or kidney disease.

#### 2. Start with a lower dose at first.

Psyllium works as a bulk laxative. If you don't have constipation, it should not give you diarrhea. Still, starting slowly is a good idea to avoid getting uncomfortable cramping or gas.

#### 3. Read the label.

When choosing a psyllium product to lower your cholesterol, look for Metamucil®, Konsyl®, or Hydrocil®, all of which contain psyllium.

Other laxatives with similar packaging include Citracel®,

which contains methylcellulose, and FiberCon®, which has polycarbophil as its main ingredient. These all work to ease constipation but will not affect your LDL.

#### 5. Eat fiber-rich foods.

To further help lower your LDL, try eating a Mediterranean-like diet, which has much more fiber than a typical American diet.

## Middle School Girls Invited to Learn about Tech at new event, Tech & Tiaras

The Apple STEM Network and the North Central Educational Service District (NCESD), are proud to announce five upcoming events across the region this spring called, “Tech & Tiaras”, for 8th grade students who identify as female or non-binary, to explore technology and computer science:

- March 28 | 9:00 AM - 12:30 PM | Omak Middle School | Omak, WA
- March 30 | 9:00 AM - 12:30 PM | WV Tech Skills Center | Wenatchee, WA

- April 25 | 8:30 AM - NOON | Manson High School | Manson, WA

SBH 5088 was passed in 2019, which requires all comprehensive high schools to offer elective computer science courses for high school students by 2022-2023 school year. This means that for the first time across the region, middle school students have the option to take computer science and technology courses beginning in high school.

Despite this expanded access to computer science, young women are significantly underrepresented in these

classes. In 2022, approximately 792 students across North Central Washington took a high school computer science course and only 26% of those enrollments were students who identify as female.

This gender gap translates to the regional workforce; women are significantly underrepresented in technology roles. Labor market data shows that in 2022 there was an average of 21,414 open computing positions across the state each month. These positions posted an average salary of \$112,623 yearly. Hispanic women comprise 26% of the population in North

Central Washington but comprise just 2.7% of the local technology workforce.

To encourage more young women to consider taking courses and exploring future career paths in technology, the regional events were designed to inspire middle school girls and teens who identify as female, through a fun and engaging, hands-on experience with technology alongside women in the technology industry.

To further the message, the girls will watch a video featuring local parents, peers and teachers who share their thoughts on the

benefits of STEM education and possible career pathways for all students. In this short compilation video produced by NCESD, voices include a Quincy High School graduate who attends the University of Washington, an Othello High School graduate who attended DigiPen Institute of Technology, and other students from Manson High School and Almira Coulee-Hartline High School.

Middle school is a perfect time for students to begin preparing for future careers through experiences that introduce them to new skills and professionals who can

help students to identify with potential careers on a personal level. Each event will give students opportunities to code, explore robotics, engineer an LED light up tiara and connect in small groups with local women in technology. All Tech and Tiaras events are free for students to attend but space is limited. Educators are encouraged to register for their classes soon.

programs or functions were reporting to the position. The consultant recommended an administrator position be created that focused on economic services.

Under the reorganization, Criddlebaugh will lead economic development efforts at the county level while overseeing the directors and managers of external programs, including Housing, Ohme Gardens, Wenatchee River Park, the Chelan County Fair and Expo Center, the Cashmere Airport and the Fire Marshal's Office.

The county administrator will focus on overseeing internal services and their directors and managers, including Facilities, Human Resources, IT, the clerk of the board, the budget director, and the public information officer.

"This reorganization will

create efficiencies in the way the county delivers services to our citizens while also reducing the span of control for the commissioners from 15 directors and managers down to six," Gering said. "It will also allow us to explore how to better fund some county programs. Several programs, for example, are funded heavily by grants. Part of the economic services director's job will be to identify additional revenue opportunities to save taxpayers money and build upon our local economy for the future."

Criddlebaugh added that he is excited to be undertaking the new position. "Chelan County is a wonderful place and I'm looking forward to building a new department that will have a positive impact on the people we serve," he said. "Building something new is exciting and allows you to look at things with a different lens and think outside of the box."

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the garden, and they changed his bed linen every morning, rain, or shine. They healed him, then the two aunts returned back east.”

### Egg Noodles

- 2 cups flour
  - 2 eggs
  - 1 tsp. salt (optional)
- Mix all together in a mixing bowl. When the flour is sticking together pour onto the table and knead the flour into the dough. To knead, use the heels of your hands to push the dough away from you until you have a flattish piece of dough in front of you. Once it is flat, fold the dough in half a couple of times. Repeat, repeat, repeat.

Once the flour is all incorporated and you have a stiff pliable dough, roll it out thinly with a rolling pin. The dough will be hard to roll out. The easiest way to work with it is to make walnut sized (or smaller) balls and roll them out to the thickness wanted.

Dust both sides of the thin dough with flour. Roll the thin dough up as if you were making Lilliputian cinnamon rolls then cut the long log into disks. Once unrolled the disks become noodles. Put the cut disks in a bowl of flour and toss them about until they lose the disk shape and become strings of dough. Wala noodles.

To dry for winter use lay in a single layer on a dehydrator rack, put in the food dehydrator and follow the manufacturer's directions for dehydrating. Store in a

mason jar or other waterproof containers then check once a week or a month to make sure they are not molding. If the noodles are not completely dried, they WILL mold (voice of experience here). Check for mold once a month until used up.

To cook treat like any other pasta. Bring a pan full of water to a boil, add the noodles, bring the water back to a boil and cook until the noodles are a consistency you like. For me that's about 8 to 10 minutes but it will vary depending on how thick the noodles are made.

## LETTER TO THE EDITOR

**Dear Editor,**

Re: Christ Center annexation I ask that the City Council deny the annexation petition by Christ Center and Marc Spears. I urge the council to keep the City of Cashmere from unsustainable growth and keep the City from losing its safe, friendly small town (i.e., low population) character. We fear that Spears, after annexation, will petition the City to change the parcel to multi-family zoning.

Growth is being dictated by developers for financial gain, but at what cost to the citizens of Cashmere? The City is struggling to provide the necessary services within the current City limits. Additional homes and/or apartment complexes equate to additional services and will add to the burden already placed on the City. Can the City really sustain this kind of growth?

The annexation and the possible addition of 30 homes, apartment complexes or condos (as stated by Spears in his letter to the City) is significant. Additional housing means more demand for services. Law enforcement and the City's fire department are stretched thin, and first responder services are costly. The City would have to pay extra to maintain the newly annexed streets when the city is already struggling financially. The City would have to hire additional staff at the new minimum wage of \$15.74/hour...which keeps increasing under the current state of Washington

regulations. Recent housing additions have included the 48-unit Pioneer Apartments and the new Freedom Hills subdivision with 27 homes. I worry about the financial costs' taxpayers will have to bear with the additional growth such as road maintenance, snow plowing, utilities (the price of my sewer bill is now at \$110/month and keeps climbing), emergency services, law enforcement services and infrastructure such as sidewalks, road maintenance, etc. The City is already seeking other means for funding our pools and parks, but it shouldn't be at the cost of additional homes and apartments due to annexation. The City does not have the budget for this unsustainable growth. We are being dictated by Gov. Inslee's demand to provide more housing for the increased population growth in the state of Washington. The new 48-unit Pioneer Apartments, as of today, has 36 units that sit empty. Who can afford a 1-bedroom apartment at \$1700/month, a 2-bedroom unit at \$1825-1925/month or a 3-bedroom at \$2200/month? Freedom Hills Subdivision Phase 1 lots are \$150,000 to \$250,000 per lot. The prices are out of range for a typical 2 parent, 2 child family. I don't want to lose our identity as a quaint, safe, friendly, small-town community. This annexation and eventual growth is unsustainable for the citizens of Cashmere.

Our oldest child keeps chickens, and she brought a dozen home to Grandma and me. Grandma has been having a bit of a time eating lately so I decided to make a batch of chicken and noodles for dinner. While I was busy making homemade noodles. I remembered making noodles for my grandpa's mother, Grandma Kay. She was too busy to make homemade noodles, but she told me about some aunts of hers who did. Grandma Kay said the two ladies of the house lived with the man of the house, an accountant, who had tuberculosis. The doctors back east sent him to the Rocky Mountains for clean dry air. The two women, one his wife, the other his sister, were very regimented, kept a very clean house, and were very careful with their noodle production.

They made noodles for winter, and they wouldn't

let Grandma Kay, then a little girl, help because they were so particular about their noodles. As Grandma Kay watched me making noodles, I could tell she was disappointed by my lack of respect towards the food forms I was creating. (I wasn't very particular because we were eating those noodles for dinner that night.)

I got to thinking about the two aunts. Considering the man of the house was ill, he wouldn't have been able to hunt or plow so winter food would have been worth getting over. The protein from the egg preserved in the flour would have been very welcome in that household. Grandma Kay didn't say the aunts kept chickens I bet they did. She did tell me they moved back where they came from. I asked if it was because the man of the house died. In a shocked tone she told me, "Oh, no. He lived. Totally healed. He took walks every day, ate healthy food from

## Statewide 'Move Over, Slow Down' campaign

**OLYMPIA** - The Washington State Patrol (WSP) is partnering with the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT), the Towing and Recovery Association of Washington (TRAW), and the Washington Traffic Safety Commission (WTSC) to conduct a "Move Over, Slow Down" campaign through April. Emphasis patrols will be conducted throughout the state during the next two months focused on educating drivers on the importance of RCW 46.61.212 - a law which requires motorists to move over or slow down when approaching emergency or work zones.

"Our emergency responders and highway workers need your help to keep them safe," said WSP Chief John Batiste.

"Choosing to move over or slow down allows them to do their job of helping others in need and continuing their work ensuring our roadways are safe for the great people of our state."

Per state law, motorists approaching an emergency zone, or a work zone are required to move over one lane, if possible, or slow down by at least 10 miles per hour (mph) below the posted speed limit. An emergency or work zone includes the 200 feet of roadway prior to and after the incident or area of work.

"All of our emergency responders, from those who assist disabled vehicles to those who provide life-saving care to crash victims, risk their lives on the side of our roads every day," said WTSC Director Shelly Baldwin. "They deserve to

be protected, too. It's easy for drivers to move over or slow down when approaching people or flashing lights on the road ahead. You can prevent another tragedy when you do."

The majority of drivers understand the law requires motorists to move over or slow down for police, fire, and ambulance crews, but the law also includes tow trucks and work crews who have vehicles with audible or visual signals - such as a tow truck's flashing red lights.

"As tow truck operators, we have dedicated our life to serving the public and motorists in need of assistance, and the unfortunate truth is that can cost us our life," said TRAW Administrative Director Emily Wade. "When your office is roadside with drivers

## Did you check your smoke alarm?

**Olympia** - Daylight Savings Time began March 12. The Washington State Fire Marshal's Office wants to remind everyone that when changing your clocks, remember to test your smoke

alarm at the same time. Working smoke alarms are a critical element of home fire safety by giving you and your family an early warning in the event of a fire.

From 2018 to 2021, Washington State fire agencies reported 5,856 building fires that had no working smoke

alarms, and 5,014 where the status of alarms were unknown. During that same time period in our state, 267 people died in fires where no working smoke alarm was indicated or the presence and operation were unknown.

The following safety tips are recommended:

- Install smoke alarms in every sleeping area and test

them at least once a month.

- It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms so that if one alarm sounds, they all sound.
- Alarms with strobe lights and bed shakers should be utilized for those with hearing disabilities.
- Smoke alarms with non-replaceable 10-year batteries are designed to remain
