WCOG sues the Washington State Redistricting Commission

WA Redistricting Board Ordered to Pay Over \$137k in **Legal Fees and Fines**

The Washington Coalition for Open Government (WashCOG) today agreed to settle its lawsuit with the state of Washington and its Redistricting Commission for violating the state Open Public Meetings Act. The Commission today voted to accept the settlement, as well.

The parties reached an agreement on a consent decree to present to the Thurston County Superior Court for approval. That agreement includes open government principles that ensures future Commissions will not continue to act secretly, which was WashCOG's goal.

Elements of the agreement include: The Open Public Meetings Act (OPMA) applies to the Commission and its Commissioners.

The Commission and commissioners violated OPMA and the Commission's corresponding rules regarding transparency.

A commitment to implement rules so that commissioners no longer negotiate in private.

A stipulation that all future commissioners and staff shall complete open government training within thirty days of hiring or appointment.

Before the Commission considers any motion to approve a final redistricting plan, the Commission shall make that plan publicly available, including any proposed Congressional or legislative district maps.

The Commission shall open for public comment any motion to approve a final plan prior to voting on the motion.

Penalties of \$500 per commissioner and payment of legal costs and fees for the plaintiffs.

Under the settlement, the Superior Court would deny WashCOG's request to invalidate the redistricting plan and district maps the Commission transmitted to the state Supreme Court on Nov. 16.

The Supreme Court's had already issued an order December 3, 2021, affirming that plan. The Supreme Court's decision said that "the

primary purpose of achieving a timely redistricting plan would be impeded, not advanced, by rejecting the Commission's completed work."

Subsequently, the Supreme Courts declined original jurisdiction to hear WashCOG's complaint and the Legislature adopted of the Redistricting Plan as amended on February 8, 2022.

WashCOG President Mike Fancher said, "We concluded the Supreme Court and Legislature had no interest in invalidating the plan and maps so close to the 2022 elections. We took no position on maps, but pursued an outcome that ensures this Commission and future Commission will not repeat the same mistakes. We feel this outcome achieved that aim."

The Commission has agreed to clarify its rules and never again vote on a "framework" rather than a redistricting plan in final form with actual maps in recordable form made public prior to its vote. The Commission agreed to forgo private negotiations and bring its working conversations or deliberations into the public forum moving forward.

"The Commission has taken these matters seriously as shown by their stipulation to individual penalties and covering the costs and attorney's fees incurred in enforcing open government protections," he said.

Washington's Open Public Meetings Act requires "All meetings of the governing body of a public agency shall be open and public and all persons shall be permitted to attend any meeting of the governing of a public agency, except as otherwise provided in this chapter." RCW 42.30.030

Cashmere City Council Meeting seemed like he was being

A heated and lengthy discussion followed a public comment at the Feb 28th Cashmere City Council meeting. Dean Hills told the Council that he had begun drilling a well but was forced by the city to stop drilling. He stated that an emergency meeting was then held and the Council passed an illegal ordinance that prohibited him from drilling the well. According to Hills he had completed all of the required paper work. He accused the city of acting unlawfully and had no legal right to stop him from drilling the well, that he wanted to use to irrigate his property. Mayor Jim Fletcher responded that the city had thought that there was an ordinance that would prohibit the well, but then they could not find it in the city code. He admitted that there had been communication issues. Council members Jayne Stephenson and Chris Carlson both expressed concern that Hills had originally told the city that he was drilling a hole for a flagpole, Carlson told Hills that it seemed deceitful. Stephenson said to Hills that

dishonest. Council member Derrick Pratt argued emphatically that the city had made a mistake and that Hills should be allowed to drill his well. He added that Hills did everything right and that the city did not. Fletcher explained that the topic was not on the agenda and procedurally the Council could not discuss or act on the issue until it was added to the agenda. Pratt made a motion, which was seconded by Carlson to add the topic to the meeting's business items. After some discussion about how best to modify the ordinance to allow Hills to drill the well, John Perry made a motion, seconded by Shela Pistoresi, to table the discussion and seek legal advice. Pistoresi explained that before the Council changes the ordinance to make things right for Hills, legal advice was needed to make sure the changes are best for everyone. After Carlson received clarification that Hills had completed all of the required paper work he expressed his desire to resolve Hills' complaint at the evening's meeting. In a 3 to 2

split vote, the discussion about the ordinance was tabled, with Pratt and Carlson voting against the motion.

However, Pratt continued to argue that the Council still needed to do something to allow Hills to finish drilling his well. He made a motion, seconded by Carlson, that Hills be allowed to finish drilling his well. This motion passed 3 to 2 with Perry and Pistoresi voting against.

The meeting continued with a joint session of the Council and the City Planning Commission. Fletcher started the discussion by explaining that there is little room left inside of the town for additional growth. As a result, future development will primarily need to occur in the Urban Growth Area (UGA), which is mostly to the southwest of the city. He suggested to the two groups that they consider and decide where the UGA should be in 30 years. Rather than the future growth being dictated by the county and by developers, Fletcher said that with a plan, the city can approach the county for how best to manage the UGAs. He added that there is a wide variety of lot sizes within the city and he asked the Councilors and Commissioners to consider what lot sizes should be allowed within the UGA. Director of Operations, Steve Croci, recommended thinking in terms of high,

medium and low density. Director of Operations, Steve Croci, further explained that the city cannot add more UGA until the current areas are developed and he said that the city is not close to doing that. But according to Fletcher growth is happening at a much faster rate than what has been seen before. Croci asked the members of the Council and Commission to consider options for how to make it easier to infill the UGA.

The expansion of sewer and water into areas being developed is necessary for the city to serve those areas. But lot sizes impact the affordability of extending those lines. Higher density development provides more homeowners to help pay for the expansion. Larger lots results in fewer people paying to be connected to the lines. Christine Wolman, a planning consultant with Perteet, Inc., described a problem with expanding beyond the UGA. She said that the area surrounding the UGA is primarily comprised of small lots with wells and septic systems. According to Wolman those homeowners will unlikely want to pay to be connected to city services.

Based on the discussion, the Cashmere Planning Commission was directed to investigate options for multi-family zones along transportation routes, how to encourage infill and how to best manage lot sizes.

Kay Jones, City Clerk/ Treasurer announced that an experienced pool manager is interested in managing the city pool. They are currently get re-certified as a life guard and instructor. Jones said that once the certification is complete the person can be hire and begin working on finding and training life guards.

The Council approved a \$17,143.89 contract with Farmers Electric to install electrical components to monitor water treatment processes.

Private Ranch Pheasants

As far as I'm concerned, there are few things more enjoyable in life than watching a dog catch the scent of a pheasant, track that bird down and then watching that rooster explode out of the brush into the air in front of you. As for knocking the bird down? That's a big bonus too, though I struggled in that regard during my recent trip to the Cooke Canyon Hunt Club near Ellensburg.

I went to this hunting club at the invitation of member Mike Carey, the man behind Northwest Fishing Reports TV and the NWFR Reel Life magazine. Also with us was well known writer and editor Jason Brooks. He spent the morning following the two of us and Mike's springer spaniel, Duke, with his camera from flush to flush, laughing merrily every time I shot holes into the sky.

The Cooke Canyon Hunt Club is a non-profit club

north of Ellensburg with 1,000 acres to hunt. Doug and Alice Burnett are the affable owners and they are assisted by several friendly employees who will plant pheasant or chukar you pay for in a designated 80 to 100 acre-plot you and your party will exclusively hunt. This is nice because you are not competing with other hunters like you often do hunting on public land or state pheasant release sites. The birds come in packages of either five roosters, seven hens or seven chukar though you can add on to those packages with more birds if you choose too.

A dog is required and many of the hunters here, including Mike, use the hunting club as a way of training their dogs to be better hunters before taking them to places where they'll hunt wild pheasants during the regular season. Steel shot is also required and if you don't have a dog, you can hire a guide with a dog so that you can hone your shooting and hunting skills.

There are real advantages to private ranch pheasant hunting, especially in Washington State where wild pheasant populations cratered due to habitat loss and changing farming practices. Whereas you might walk several miles with your dog and maybe flush a pheasant on public land, here you are assured of several flushes at close range during a hunt that usually lasts two or three hours. The terrain at Cooke Canyon is good too. It's not a big open flat field. Instead, where we hunted, there was a of different types of brush for the birds to hide in and for you to navigate through as well as a creek and two draws separated by a ridgeline. Much to my surprise, we actually covered close to three miles hunting back and forth behind the dog.

Another big advantage to private ranch hunting in Washington is that you can go after pheasants both before and after the regular hunting season which runs from mid-October thru mid-January in Eastern Washington. At the private hunting preserves, the season starts September 1st

and continues until March 31st. I am happy to report that despite my shooting woes we did end up hitting a couple of birds during our morning hunt. I had to leave after that but Jason and Mike went out for an afternoon shoot after lunch where there was a lot more hitting than missing and several tasty pheasant ended up going home for supper.

Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month

My first colonoscopy was 11 years ago, at age 55. I was due for another one 10 years later, in early 2021. Due to the COVID pandemic, the clinic doing colonoscopies in my community was forced to cancel all but the most urgent procedures. When I saw my family doctor last month, he mentioned I was overdue for my next colonoscopy.

"They called me last week to schedule it, but I haven't called them back.'

He reminded me that by avoiding getting tested, I was gambling with my life.

March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month. Colon and rectal cancers are the second leading cause of

death from cancer in the United States, behind lung cancer. According to the National Cancer Institute, nearly 150.000 new colon or rectal cancer cases were discovered last year. That's one out of 23 men and one out of 25 women. Colon and rectal cancers are often lumped together and called colorectal cancer or CRC. CRC is the cause of 10% of all cancer deaths. Colorectal cancer was rare in 1950 but is now the fourth most commonly diagnosed cancer in the United States. You are more likely to develop CRC if you are older, smoke cigarettes, are obese, get minimal exercise, or eat a diet high in meat and refined carbohydrates and low in fiber.

Colon cancer is more common among women, but rectal cancer is more common in men. The incidence of CRC increases starting at age 40 and peaks between 60 and 75 years of age. 20% of CRC cases are related to genetic factors. Having ulcerative colitis and Crohn's disease increases your risk of developing CRC. Polyps are clusters

of cells that grow on the inside lining of your colon. Colorectal cancer can occur when the tissue clump called a polyp turns normal cells into cancer. Without polyps to change into cancer cells, there's no colorectal cancer.

When should screening for colorectal cancer start? It depends on estimating your risk of developing this reasonably common cancer. If you have an average chance of getting CRC, screening tests should begin at age 50 and continue until age 75.

What type of screening is best?

colonoscopy is А



considered the "gold standard" for screening for colorectal cancer. If no polyps are found, it should be repeated in 10 years, sooner if you have other characteristics

that increase your risk of developing CRC.

During a colonoscopy, your surgeon looks for polyps by inserting a tiny camera mounted to the end of a long, narrow, flexible tube. This tube snakes through your rectum and up and around your colon and intestines, inspecting the tissues as it goes by. For a successful colonoscopy, enough fecal material must be flushed out so that the lighted scope can see the inside of your intestines clearly. Small and medium-sized polyps are removed during the procedure by the surgeon.

Larger polyps can require additional surgery Another option

for CRC screening is a sigmoidoscopy. Less invasive than a colonoscopy, it checks just the lower part of your colon

instead of its entire length. The third CRC screening option doesn't require a

procedure. Called a fecal immunochemical test or FIT test, it involves testing a sample of your feces for blood. Since no polyps were found at my last colonoscopy, my doctor said I could do a FIT test at home instead of waiting for another procedure.

"I don't have to chug a gallon of weird-tasting liquid? Count me IN!"

Smiling, I carried home my FIT test packet: a small squeeze bottle with tape wrapped around it. Following the instructions, I dropped off my sample last week. Whoohoo!

Here are 4 Final Facts about Colorectal Cancer Screening:

1. Don't put it off.

Despite advances in the treatment of colorectal cancer, the rate of survival and percentage of people cured has remained the same. This is why screening is so essential to detect cancer at the most curable stage.

2. Watch for bleeding from your rectum.

Rectal bleeding when going Number 2 is the most common initial symptom of colorectal cancer. Don't assume it's from

your hemorrhoids. 3. Chill out.

Mix up your gallon of colonoscopy preparation fluid the day before, and chill it overnight. Drinking it cold reduces the "soapy" taste reducing the "yuk" factor.

4. Don't fall behind.

Keep to the schedule of drinking your liquid colonoscopy preparation. I fell asleep, then tried to catch up by drinking a double dose. If I thought it tasted weird going down, it tasted even worse, coming back up!

The Washington State Patrol will be shutting down their Communication Center site in Wenatchee and consolidating their services to their Spokane site. WSP Director of Communications Chris Loftis cites the cause of their move to be a result of low staffing numbers.

The Communication Center's staffing rates have been steadily declining since 2019, with 83% staffing drastically dropping to 70% the following year. Loftis disclosed that staffing had already dropped near 50% in 2022.

Although residents have not seen a difference in service, Loftis states their operation grew to be more expensive and unsustainable.

"We're paying a lot of overtime for the folks that are there. We're also already farming out calls to the Spokane call center, but from

in such a highly-skilled and highly important job."

The District 6 counties that fall under this change include Chelan, Douglas, Grant, Kittitas, and Okanogan counties. This move will not affect the patrolling sector in which WSP Officers John Bryant and Jeremy Weber operate within.

Approximately 16 - 17communication officers have been given the choice to relocate near the Spokane site or to neighboring sites such as Yakima or Marysville, allexpense paid by the WSP. Remote work is not an option due to employees needing to operate on high-tech equipment and working with 17 other law enforcement agencies.

"This is highly advanced. You're assisting the public not only through phone with answering 911 calls, but there's computer-aid dispatches as well," Loftis explained. "So,
