William “Bill” Forhan March 20, 1947 - November 21, 2021 Leavenworth, Washington



William “Bill” Edward Forhan, age 74, passed away suddenly at his home in Leavenworth, WA. on Sunday, November 21, 2021.

Born on March 20, 1947, in Butte, Mont. to Rudi and Alice (Mehrens) Forhan. He attended and graduated in 1965 from Butte High School where he met his wife, Carol, as a freshman. Graduated from the University of Montana, Missoula, in 1969 with a degree in Business Administration. Bill served in the Army ROTC in college, then was stationed at the Field Artillery Training Command at Fort Sill, Okla. where he earned the rank of First Lieutenant. He was then deployed to West Germany as a battery commander with the 4th Missile Battalion, 41st Artillery Regiment during the Vietnam era.

After serving overseas, Bill became an Army Reserve Commissioned Officer at Fort Carson, Colo., while working as a CPA in Denver, Colo. From Colorado the family moved to Davenport, Iowa where he worked as Controller for FIT Company and Carlon Plastics. He then accepted a

job as the controller for The Billings Gazette in Billings, Mont. In 1992, Bill became the controller for the Antelope Valley Press in Palmdale, Calif. In 2000, he and Carol became the owners of Prairie Media - NCW Media, Inc. which currently publishes The Leavenworth Echo, Cashmere Valley Record, Lake Chelan Mirror, Wenatchee Business Journal, Quad City Herald, The Sonnenschein auf Leavenworth, and The Lake Chelan Visitor Guides

Also, previously owned and published the Okanogan Valley Gazette Tribune. Bill authored his first book, The Contract: Unveiling the Healing Power of Forgiveness, in 2021, a Christian fiction story about three families and their intertwined journeys. He had begun writing a second book before his sudden passing.

Bill was an active member of his community and volunteered with numerous local organizations including Leavenworth Rotary, former president; Leavenworth Chamber of Commerce, former president; Leavenworth Christmas Lighting Festival as the character St. Nicholas; Wash. State Autumn Leaf Festival Assoc., former president and former First Gentleman with Carol as the Royal Lady of The Autumn Leaves in 2016; The Wash. Newspaper Publishers Assoc., former president; St. James Episcopal Church, member and lead musician; and the Cashmere Chamber of Commerce as a current board member. Bill was a vocal and passionate conservative, he loved God and was a man of deep faith. He taught friends and family countless card games, including his favorite game, Bridge. He shared his love for camping, fishing, hunting, and golfing with his children and grandchildren. Bill will be remembered for many things,

but our favorite memories include his appreciation of good coffee, red wine, the Denver Broncos, and his famous afternoon power naps.

Bill is survived by his wife of 54 years, Carol (Johnson) Forhan; their sons David (Britney Nielson) Forhan of Olympia, Wash., and Michael (Amber) Forhan of Bremerton, Wash; his sister Gayle (Dale) Schendzielos of Casa Grande, Ariz., his sister Diane Forhan DuBose of Murfreesboro, Tenn., and brother Ed (Cami) Forhan of Clayton, Calif.; grandchildren Myla, Ronan, Lorelai, Aydin, and Zynnica, and many cousins, nieces and nephews. Bill was preceded in death by his father Rudi and his mother Alice.

There will be a memorial service at a date to be determined in Cashmere, Wash. A private family interment is being planned for next summer. State Supreme Court Will Decide New District Maps After Missed Deadline

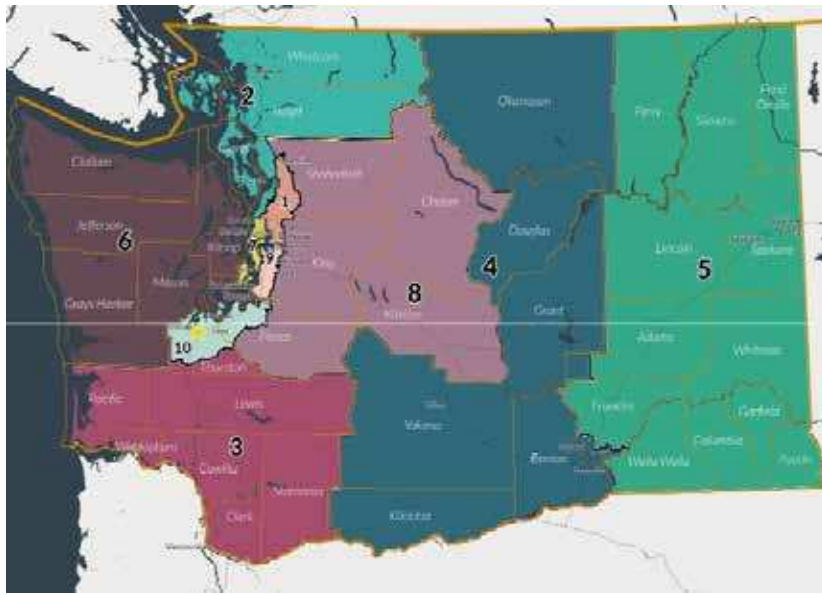

The Washington State Redistricting Commission failed to submit revised Legislative and Congressional District maps by their Nov. 15 deadline. Ultimately, the final decision now will be up to the State Supreme Court to redraw the districts by April 30, 2022.

The Bipartisan Redistricting Commission was established in 1990 and meets once every 10 years after the Federal census to redraw the legislative district boundaries. They are to map out and approve boundary lines for 10 congressional districts and 49 legislative districts. The commission consists of two democratic members and two republican members to ensure a bipartisan map. This is the first time that the nonpartisan board has missed the Nov. 15 deadline.

According to the Spokesman Review, the Commission seemed to have initially made a vote on the maps before the midnight deadline. However, a statement was released on Nov. 16 that they had missed the deadline, legally requiring them to hand over the decision to the State Supreme Court. The Monday meeting which was also held in private, may have also violated the Open Public Meetings Act.

Aside from these issues, the Commission garnered hefty criticisms from both Democratic and Republican



stakeholders, who find that the proposed map unnecessarily divides Chelan, Okanogan, and Douglas counties.

12th District Senator Brad Hawkins (R) feels uncertain about the process going forward.

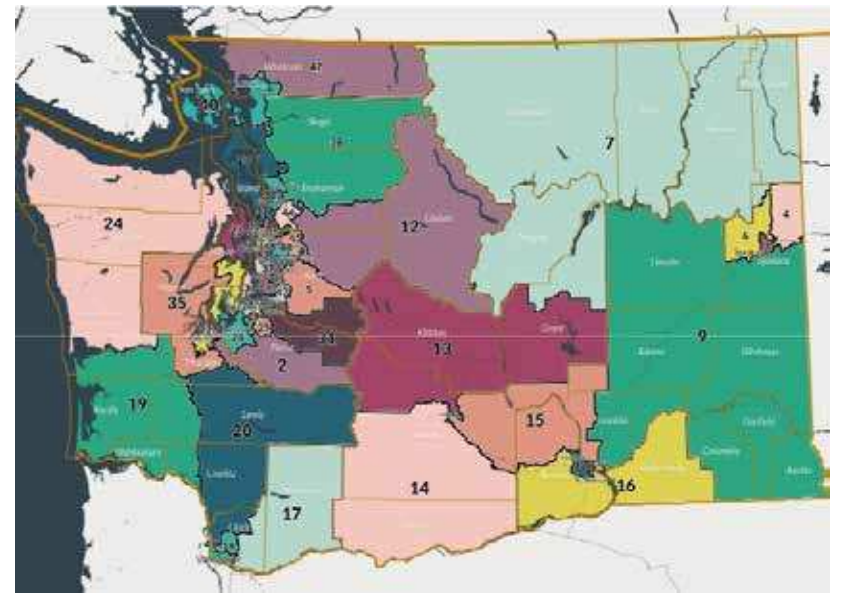
“No one really knows because this is kind of the first time that our bipartisan redistricting commission process went kind of sideways.”

Hawkins claimed that the 2020 census found that western Washington had increased in population and eastern Washington

had “underperformed,” resulting in the need to balance the districts.

“Some of the legislative districts east of the 12th districts needed to grow geographically and expand, to pick up population,” Sen. Hawkins explained. “That had the effect of nudging over a district like the 12th that is on the border of the Cascade mountains.”

Sen. Hawkins was left disappointed by the proposed Legislative District Map, which will now split the 12th district away from Okanogan and Douglas regions. The district will



be combined with western regions spanning all the way to Monroe and upper valley regions just below the Methow river.

“Traditionally, the 12th district has always been a north central Washington-based district. Chelan County, Douglas County, and part of Okanogan and some of Grant,” Sen. Hawkins explained. “Well now this shifts it over, but the map that's proposed includes all of Chelan County and a good portion of East Wenatchee, but the remaining amounts of Douglas County are proposed to be in another

district.”

Many organizations such as the Chelan-Douglas Transportation Council, the Wenatchee Valley Chamber of Commerce, the Methow Valley Citizens Council Action Fund, and Chelan County Board of Commissioners have voiced their own concerns to the Redistricting Commission regarding possible separation from Chelan and Douglas regions.”The map doesn't in any way reflect what the commission

Frazier Strutzel Presents His New Book "Anna Mehelich"

Read the story of Slovenian women pioneering their way through 19th century America

Frazier Strutzel is typing away on his keyboard in the middle of the night. All of a sudden, it feels as if a warm hand is tenderly placed on his shoulder. He smiles knowing that his grandmother is watching him give her story life again.

"I wanted to tell her story," Strutzel said. "She accomplished so much."

For over 13 years, Strutzel has been writing and rewriting

the story of his Slovenian grandmother Anna Mehelich (originally spelled Mihelich) and her sisters as they trek across the American west.

"She was held in high esteem by her daughter-in-laws and the rest of the community of Monitor in the 40s. I remember a lot of people had a lot of respect for her in Monitor and Wenatchee, and Cashmere."

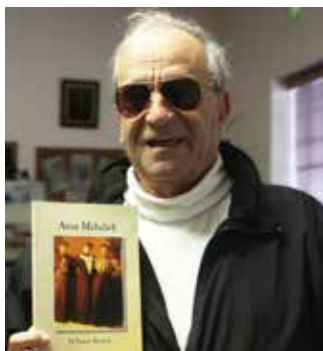
The Mehelich family first arrived in New York before subsequently leaving for Northern Minnesota, moving to Butte, Montana in 1890, and then settled in Monitor, Washington in 1907.

"All immigrants I think, no matter what area of the world they come here from, probably can associate with a lot of what went on in 1880s-90s, early 1900s, to become a part of what is now America."

His book also captures the early history of Minnesota iron-mining and Wenatchee orchard businesses in the early 20th century, with a particular focus on the Strutzel Orchard.

"Even though she was limited with her English, she ended up being the largest apple orchard owner from 1929-1939," Strutzel remarked. "The old saying was 'the men who won the west,' but in my opinion it was the women who won the west. They're the ones who did the work, the work that counted for the civilization."

Rod Molzahn – "What They Found"

Wenatchee-based storyteller and historian Rod Molzahn presents his new book "What They Found." His new book chronicles the North Central Washington region, spanning from the first discovery of people 13,000 years to the beginning of the 20th century.

Rod Molzahn has lived in the area for over 50 years and has been an avid historian for over 20 years.

"It's nice to be called a historian. I've always considered myself a storyteller, and I can tell some stories about all kinds of things and in this case it's about the history of this area," Molzahn said.

The book will cover regions running from the South Wenatchee Mountains all the way up to the Canadian border, across the western Cascade Crest, to the east of the Okanogan River. "What They Found" will encapsulate the geological landscape of

the region, the beginning of indigenous civilization, the fur trade, tribal wars, and gold-rush settlers.

"People say 'where do you get all this stuff,'" he jokes and says "I just make it up. That's not true, but it's an easy answer."

Initially, the book was meant to be based on Wenatchee Valley history. He concluded that that wasn't feasible after reading and note-taking for almost a decade.

"I'd be working on something and say 'oh, I've read something about that, now which of these 150 books

is it in?"

Molzahn hopes that his book will give better insight and respect to indigenous and first-nation history as he details pre-colonial history in North Central Washington.

"We're not alone, we all share a background and a history. All of the people, indigenous and white, who have and do live in North Central Washington. I thought it would be important to make that clear."

An Obituary is a way for family member(s) to commemorate a loved one's life and to notify the community of the passing of the loved one. Obituaries are also used for historical and ancestral data.

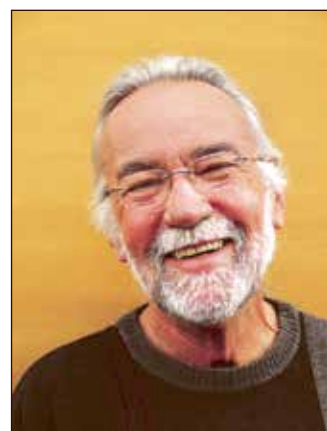

Obituaries and Memorials need to be typed and emailed as a Word Document. They can be placed in one or more papers - all publish weekly on Wednesday.

Obituaries are priced by the number of words and include one color photo and go online at no extra charge. Memorials are priced per column inch. Please call for cost. *Payment is due at the time of placement. *Exception: Chapels, funeral homes who have an account, can be billed. There is no charge for a Death Notice - information is limited.

Deadline is 4 p.m. on Friday - some exceptions may apply.

Integrated Resource Plan & Clean Energy Implementation Plan

Chelan County PUD is reviewing its 2021 draft Integrated Resource Plan (IRP) and Clean Energy Implementation Plan (CEIP) as required by state laws. The 10-year IRP outlines the sources of power needed to supply PUD customers. A new IRP must be developed every four years and updated every two years. The CEIP is a new requirement under Washington's Clean Energy Transformation Act (CETA). A CEIP is intended to identify a utility's plans over the following four years to meet CETA's 2030 greenhouse gas neutral standard and 2045 100% clean electricity standard.

Cashmere City Council Meeting

At the November 22nd Cashmere City Council meeting, Mayor Jim Fletcher updated the Council about Fire District #6 planning to end its contract with the city. Fletcher explained that the District is still planning to pull its services and equipment

out of the Cashmere Fire Station on Christmas Eve. Under the agreement, Cashmere Fire Dept. provided first responder services to rural areas around the City; including Brisky Cyn., Mission Ck., Nahahum Cyn. and Brender Cyn. Cashmere receives about \$40,000 in revenue from the District to support

the Fire Department. Fletcher added that city is talking to the District to provide emergency medical services for the rural areas. Cashmere Fire Chief Cy Sausley has been involved in the discussions with Fire District 6. Department volunteers who

received in public comments and that's disappointing," Sen. Hawkins said. "North Central Washington has a long, proud history of cooperative work across the two counties."

2020 Democratic candidate for 12th District State Representative Adrienne Moore shares Sen. Hawkins' disappointment over the proposed maps.

"I know it makes the district

slightly more competitive, but I think it is at the loss of keeping the communities together," Moore said.

Moore notes her own disappointment for how divided the map looks politically, especially in a supposedly nonpartisan redistricting process.

"I think one of the most disappointing things I heard in the press conference following the release of the maps was that there's basically been a trade where Republicans got to draw

Eastern Washington and the democratic commissioners got to draw Western Washington," Moore said.

"I think that really violates the spirit of a bipartisan commission in which politics should stay out of electoral politics, that we should stay out of districting/redistricting process."

One of the goals of the Commission was to keep the Yakama Nation intact and to retain what they call a minority/majority district

in Yakima. The Commission hoped to elevate the voting representation of People of Color (POC) in each district by drawing regions that are balanced in POC populace.

According to Crosscut, many have criticized this decision as inconsistent with the Voting Rights Act, failing to figure in the population of the voting-age Latino population rather than the total Latino population in Yakima. Republicans also raised questions as to whether racially motivated districting decisions violate the Equal Protection Act.

Moore feels that the new map does not agree with the Commission's own goals. "It didn't seem like it met those criteria and some of the information that has come out afterwards around the Yakima valley region seems to point to not meeting both the recommendations or the hope of having, districts of minority/majority districts and building better cohesion for tribal communities."

Moore added that the Colville Confederated tribe had advocated for their districts not to change and that they were okay with the split.

The State Supreme Court has three options. They can either approve the final map that redistricting commissioners tried to finalize; make adjustment to the proposed map; or open the process up for public comments and start all over again.

"I think not being able to develop communities that were in the best interest of the people rather than in the best interests of the parties is a loss for all of us," Moore concluded. "I think we could and should do better."

provide fire and emergency services want to continue service all our neighbors, but if FD 6 does leave, the city will no longer be a first responder to emergencies outside of the city and will respond as mutual aid.

Following a public hearing regarding the 2022 Cashmere city budget, Cashmere Clerk/Treasurer, Kay Jones, told council members that at their next meeting they would vote on the 2022 budget, which includes a 1% tax increase.

The Council unanimously approved a \$3000 payment to Pace Engineering to rebid the repairs to the city's pool. In an attempt to obtain more competitive bids, the work will be advertised through a full competitive bid process. Director of Operations, Steve Croci, explained that any contract will require that repairs occur so that the pool is able to be open during the summer. Council member Chris Carlson expressed concern that the original estimate provided by Pace was not accurate. He added that if the city is paying Pace to create an estimate, the company should provide one that is accurate. Croci told the Council that the goal is to get the bid request out as soon as possible to try and get work started before the summer pool season. Carlson felt that trying to get bids in over the holidays could be an issue and could result in high bids that the city could not afford. Croci and Carlson said they would work together to develop a good timeline.

Unanimous approval was given by the Council to extend a contract with Perreet, Inc. through Dec. 2022. The agreement is for project planning and management of the East

Cashmere Development Plan. Croci explained that this includes development of the lagoon area. Responding to a question from Carlson, he replied that obtaining community involvement and input will be part of the process.

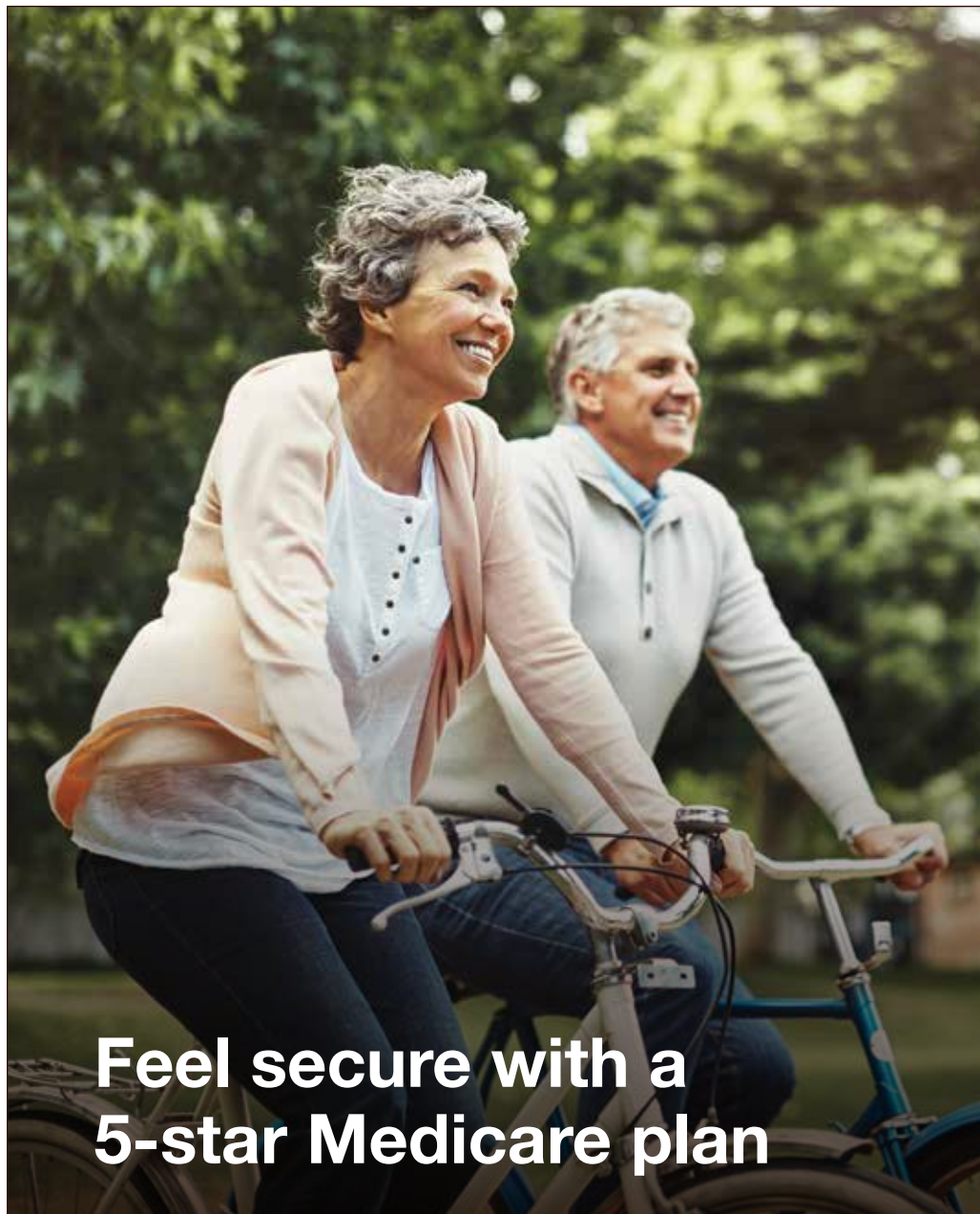
Approval was given by the Council to obtain engineering service's from PACE Engineering, with a cost of \$13,070, to extend water and sewer to the City's property at 205 Railroad. Bid documents will be based on the company's 2020 feasibility study for that property.

The contract with Wenatchee Valley Animal Care and Control (WVACC) was renewed, with a unanimous vote from the Council. WVACC will continue to furnish and maintain the present animal shelter, handle stray animals (except for feral cats), impound animals, and animals received by citizens of Cashmere.

The Council also approved a \$10,000 contract with Perreet for on-call engineering services. Croci said that this was for new tasks but a continuation of the prior contract.

Allan Walker, the Executive Director of the Chelan Douglas Community Action Council (CDCAC), presented the Council with an overview of the services provide by the private non-profit organization. He also described the current space and funding issues that are confronting the Action Council. Walker explained that the organization has been working to meet the needs of local low income populations since 1965. It assist with food distribution, home heating, energy conservation, housing, education, adult literacy, and financial literacy. However, Walker told the city council that they are short of space and have had to move out of some of the facilities where they were located. Currently they have a large cooler, but no place to store it. The nonprofit is seeking to build a new facility and that they are actively working to secure additional funding for a new building. Fletcher told Walker that the City of Cashmere will provide a letter of support for any grant applications that are submitted.

Walker added that CDCAC partners with many local organizations and has over 50 MOUs in place. The nonprofit is the food bank of the Chelan Douglas counties, providing over 90% of the food to the area's food banks. According to Walker, CDCAC distributed about 3 million pounds of food last year. The nonprofit group's housing program provides rent and utility payment assistance and is supported primarily with public funds. Walker underscored the point that payments are made to the landlord and utility company, not to the rentee or customer. Managing the Americorp program for the region is another of the CDCAC's programs. With the group coordinating the activities of about 25 Americorp volunteers each year.

The Washington Outdoors Report

LONG LAKE TROUT FISHING

I received a unique invitation last week to go trout fishing at a lake that doesn't get a whole lot of press. The body of water in question is Long Lake, also known as Spokane Lake, an 18-mile reservoir northwest of Spokane bordered by Long Lake Dam and Nine Mile Falls Dam.

The crew at Mack's Lure extended this invite to me and going on the trip was the President and CEO himself, Bob Schmidt. Our guide was going to be Steve Morris, the owner of SJM Guide Service. Also coming along was Mack's Pro-Staffer Eric Magnuson, who hails from Spokane and Justin Wolff, a fellow outdoors media professional who is the host and producer of Angler West TV.

We all met at the boat ramp at the south end of the reservoir at 8 AM on a morning that greeted us with a mix of snow and rain. Morris explained we'd be traveling ten miles up lake in his open boat to get to where the majority of the trout are located at this time of year and I was very glad I was wearing a thick jacket and sweater underneath my rain gear.

The lower part of the reservoir was lined with a mix of full-time residential homes and summer cabins but opened up to a more pastoral and wooded setting as we reached the fishing grounds. Morris explained the trout we were after were fast growing, sterile triploid rainbow trout that had been planted in the lake. Morris further explained we would be fishing close to the surface and he expected the fishing to be fast and furious, even with just three rods out.

Morris had two rods on downriggers on each side of the boat and the third was in the back of the boat going a little deeper with lead core line. Morris maintained a trolling speed of 1.8 to 2.2 MPH.

Our guide's prediction of hot fishing on this cold morning was spot on. The lures were being bit within minutes of being put into the water and several strikes occurred before we could even get the rods into the rod holders. Within 90 minutes we had 18 healthy rainbow trout in the boat and had probably ten more fish on that came off before we could net them. The fish were all bright and measured 13 to 17 inches.

We were exclusively using lures and tackle from Mack's Lure. The hot color? According to Morris, any color at all works this time of year here as long as its orange. Everything we used caught trout but what worked best was an orange Pee Wee Wiggle Hoochie with a plastic bill that gave it great action similar to a crankbait. This lure was fished behind a 4.4-inch dodger on a short two-foot leader. hooks were modified on the lure for a shorter strike distance and tipped with orange died shoe peg corn. A Mack's Lure Flashlight Troll, consisting of two large mylar blades and beads, was used as a lightweight attractor. This set up on the lead core line not only caught lots of trout but also the biggest trout of the day.

I was definitely impressed by the quality of this little-known trout fishery. Morris told me he'll be guiding on Long Lake into mid-December, at which point dropping water levels will prevent anyone from using the boat launches on the reservoir. After that SJM Guide Service will be offering winter trips for trout and kokanee on nearby

Lake Roosevelt, that huge impoundment of the Columbia River known for the large size and quantity of both species caught during the winter months.

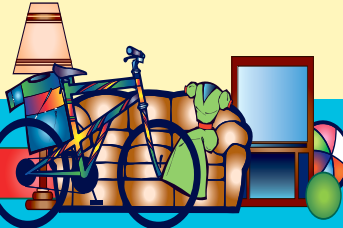
