Wenatchee-Entiat Beaver Project 4th Season Overview

'Ecosystem Engineers' become tools for habitat restoration

Wrapping up their 4th season in October, the Wenatchee-Entiat Beaver Project summarizes some of their recent beaver developments after receiving \$30k from the Salmon Recovery Board.

Kodi Jo Jaspers is the Program Manager for Beaver-Powered Restoration through Trout Unlimited, a national nonprofit that is partnered with U.S Fish and Wildlife service and Leavenworth Fish Hatchery.

The program has been in operation since 2018, utilizing beavers' innate building ability to restore the Wenatchee-Entiat ecosystem and sustainably managing the beaver population with the assistance of neighboring land-owners.

A recent development of the project has been the implementation of a lowtech process-based restoration called "beaver dam analogs" or BDAs, which is essentially a man-made beaver

"Some of these streams where we want to put beavers [in] aren't quite ready for beavers, they need ponds or some more deciduous vegetation for the beavers," Kodi Jo Jaspers explained. "We'll go in with these BDAs and install them along stretches of streams to kind of help kickstart that restoration with hope that either beavers come back naturally on their own or it could be a future relocation

Jaspers dubbed the beavers as "ecosystem engineers" for their natural ability to transform a habitat in a matter of weeks.

"We relocated some beavers this summer and within a month they have built three dams already."

Jaspers and her team hope that the influx of beavers in the new relocation sites will help with neighboring fish populations by stabilizing water temperature, adding complexity to streams, and pool larger bodies of water for wildfire season.

"Beaver engineered habitats are really green, lush, riparian areas, so they help act in providing some resiliency on our landscape and fire breaks against those wildfires as

Jasper later explains how the ponded

water goes into the groundwater, a beneficial safety measure during the increasingly dry summers.

"It's retaining that water and it's released slower so that we have water in our streams later into the season."

The project oversees the coexistence between the beaver population and their human landowning neighbors, making sure that both parties maintain a beneficial cohabitation.

'That's like tree wrapping with wire to keep beavers from chewing trees down or putting flow devices in beaver dams to keep them from flooding out property," Jaspers explained. "Sometimes that doesn't work, sometimes we have a bigger problem going on.'

When a bigger problem does arise, the beavers are non-lethally trapped and relocated to the Leavenworth Fish Hatchery where they are kept for a week and then released as a family unit higher into the watershed.

"For a long time, and still, the number one way that we deal with beavers as a society and as a community has always been lethal removal, you call a trapper and they take care of it.," Jaspers said, recounting previous fur trading rings in the 19th century.


"I think that what we're really trying to focus on in this project is shifting that mentality and showing people the importance of beavers and why we need to have them in our system."

Although they initially requested \$125k from the Salmon Recovery Board, the awarded \$30k will be used to build up to 80 BDAs over the next two years. If funds can be matched to meet their \$125k goal, they hope to continue coexistence measures with landowners and further develop relocation efforts.

That's alright, some is better than none," Jaspers said. "We're happy to keep doing what we're doing and finding funds where we can find it."

The Beaver Project team hope to work more on their community engagement and outreach and to connect the community with restoration and wildlife within the valley.



The Power and Flexibility of a **Donor Advised Fund**

I have been working with clients for over 25 years and I have found that Donor Advised Funds (DAFs) like those managed by the Community Foundation of NCW offer some of the best opportunities for not only substantial tax savings but also the ability to carry out your charitable intentions.

Some time ago, I was talking with a client who had worked at a publicly traded technology company for many years. The appreciation in some of the stock he held was about 100%. On the verge of retirement, we discussed his future goals as well as estate planning and charitable giving. The client said that he and his wife gave consistently every year, about \$15,000 to their favorite organizations, and did not see this changing. These gifts had always been in cash. Since he did not have a mortgage and they were capped at \$10,000 for deducting state and local taxes, he was receiving very little benefit from their annual charitable giving since his total itemized deductions were around the standard deduction for a

appreciated stock. Instead of giving his cash to charity, why not give multiple years' worth of highly appreciated stock to a DAF? Since he had held the company stock for more than a year, a gift to a qualified

married couple (\$25,100

leveraging his highly

I suggested

charitable organization would result in a tax deduction of the fair market value of the stock. By gifting the stock, he could avoid the long-term capital gains tax at 20% as well as the Net Investment Income Tax at 3.8%. In addition, his charitable contribution could offset his ordinary income which was currently being taxed at 37%. The potential tax benefit was therefore 61.9% on his \$100,000 gift. While this example is extreme, given the client's tax brackets and stock appreciation, it highlights the power of giving appreciated assets to charity. Further, by using the DAF specifically as his charitable vehicle, he can continue his regular annual giving to his favorite charities every year.

Another client of mine left a substantial amount in his will to a specific charity in which he was very involved throughout his life. After his passing, the charity headed in a new direction which the donor's family felt was not in line with his intentions. However, there was nothing that could be done because that specific bequest was made in his will. Had he instead established a DAF with his family as the advisors, the family would have had more latitude in advising as to which organizations the client's generous donations went. This option might have allowed them to pause gifting to a specific organization or redirected to other causes that were important to the him. A charitable bequest at death to a DAF with family or friends listed as advisors allows the donor to better support his or her passions long past their lifetime.

Using the Community Foundation of NCW's DAF gives you the opportunity to maximize the benefits of charitable giving. I encourage you to consult with your professional advisor (CPA, lawyer, or financial planner) in supporting the causes you care about most.



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Can Probiotics and Prebiotics Help You?

Two months ago, Sally was diagnosed with a bladder infection. When the first antibiotic didn't fix the problem, her doctor gave her a different one. Within 3 days of starting the second antibiotic, she developed diarrhea. After a week of misery, she called, asking for help.

"I'm trapped in my own home," she wailed. "I can't walk past my bathroom without having to go."

I suggested she start taking a probiotic, and she called back a week later to report that her bowels were back to normal.

Probiotics are "friendly" microorganisms that live in our intestines and vagina. They include more than 400 separate bacteria, yeast, and parasites strains that help us absorb nutrients and metabolize our food.

Probiotics have another important job: they discourage the growth of "unfriendly" bacteria and other organisms that can make us sick. Probiotics can "crowd out"

other organisms by using up available space and nutrients. Some probiotics secrete antibacterial compounds like hydrogen peroxide, lactic acid, or acetic acid.

Sally's second antibiotic killed off the bacteria responsible for her infection but attacked her "good" intestinal bacteria as well. Eliminating her "friendly" bacteria left room for some "bad" bacteria to multiply and cause a condition called antibiotic-associated diarrhea.

Taking probiotics can decrease the risk of antibioticassociated diarrhea by over 50%. Unfortunately, it isn't clear how protective they are against a common cause of antibiotic-associated diarrhea, a bacteria called Clostridium difficile or C. diff.

The 3 most common probiotics shown to help keep our intestines in balance are Lactobacillus, Bifidobacteria, and a fungus called Saccharomyces.

Lactobacillus makes lactic

acid, which increases the acidity of vaginal tissue. This helps protect you from both bacterial and yeast vaginal infections. The bacteria Gardnerella is an organism that typically lives in your vagina. Some antibiotics can disrupt that balance and allow the overgrowth of certain bacteria, causing inflammation and an infection called bacterial vaginosis. Along with lactic acid, Lactobacillus secretes hydrogen peroxide, which is deadly to Gardnerella bacteria, helping to prevent bacterial vaginosis.

NEIGHBORS

The fungus Saccharomyces, available as Florastor®, has been shown to help prevent antibiotic-associated diarrhea. There is also evidence that taking both Lactobacillus and Bifidobacteria bacteria is more effective at treating antibioticassociated diarrhea than either organism by itself.

Lactobacillus has more than one strain. Some strains are good at adhering to the lining of your intestine. In contrast,

others can overcome or push out "bad bacteria" that already have established themselves. One of the best ones for adhering to your gut lining is Lactobacillus GG, available as the product Culturelle®.

There is now a lot of interest in using prebiotics instead of probiotics to help your intestines and vaginal tissue stay healthy. Prebiotics are different than probiotics because probiotics are actually living organisms, while prebiotics are carbohydrates. Prebiotics work as support staff to your probiotics, feeding them and encouraging their growth by the way they change your intestinal environment.

Prebiotics work "Miracle Grow®" to help certain bacteria and fungi grow and multiply. They are less expensive than probiotics because they don't have to be protected from excess heat and preservatives.

6 Tips for Maintaining Healthy Intestinal **Environment:**

1. Eat live yogurt.

Eating yogurt with live cultures can be an excellent way to get Lactobacillus into your intestine. Beware: most commercial yogurt brands are processed and do NOT contain live bacteria. Check the label.

2. Avoid acid-blocking medicines.

Stomach acid is an effective defense against the overgrowth of unfriendly bacteria in your intestine. Powerful acid-blocking medicines like omeprazole (Prilosec®), lansoprazole (Prevacid®), and pantoprazole (Protonix®) tame heartburn by decreasing the amount of acid that is pumped into your stomach. Unfortunately, the decrease in stomach acid puts you at an increased risk of getting antibiotic-associated diarrhea. **Choose probiotics** containing more than one organism.

There is good evidence that taking both Lactobacillus and Bifidobacteria bacteria together to treat antibioticassociated diarrhea works better than either organism by itself.

probiotics Store 4. properly.

Probiotics are living organisms and need controlled conditions to stay viable. Whether at room temperature or in the refrigerator, be sure to observe any storage recommendations and avoid extreme heat like in a parked car in the summer on the way home from the store.

5. Try fermented foods. Fermented foods some of the best and least expensive prebiotics. If you like sauerkraut or kimchee, eating



The Camping Crunch

By John Kruse

Crowded Camping

The Center for Western Priorities released a study this month titled, "The Camping Crunch". The study looked at camping at reservable public lands such as national parks, national forest service campgrounds, Bureau of Land Management campgrounds and other lodging you can reserve online thru the website Recreation.gov. The study showed a 39 percent increase in reservations in the lower 48 states between 2014 and 2020 with reservations skyrocketing during the coronavirus pandemic in 2020.

In Washington State, the most popular camping areas

- 1. Kalaloch (Olympic National Park on the coast)
- 2. Willaby Campground (Olympic National Forest at Lake Quinault)
- 3. Colonial Creek Campground (North Cascades National Park)
- 4. Charbonneau Park (Army Corps of Engineers Park on the Snake River near Burbank)
- 5. Eight Mile Campground (Wenatchee-Okanogan National Forest near Leavenworth)

If you are looking for uncrowded camping options the campgrounds with the least number of reserved sites through Recreation.gov were:

- 1. Cayuse Horse Camp (Wenatchee-Okanogan National Forest near Ronald)
- 2. Gillette Campground (Colville National Forest near Lake Gillette)
- 3. Lakeview Campground Stehekin (North Cascades National Park) 4. Lake Creek Campground
- Entiat River (Wenatchee-Okanogan National Forest) 5. Lake Gillette Campground (Colville National Forest on

Lake Gillette) To give you an idea of difference between these reservable sites the campground at Kalaloch had

96 percent of its campsites reserved while the Cayuse Horse Camp, which is only open for campers with horses or other stock, was reserved 15 percent of the time. Overall, the number of campsites reserved thru Recreation.gov in Washington State increased 20 percent between 2018 and

Aaron Weiss, Deputy Director for the Center of Western Priorities, says the study found in some cases campers are, "Loving our public lands to death". Weiss explained that when reservable campgrounds fill up, as they often have in recent years, campers will gravitate towards nearby campgrounds with fewer facilities or dispersed camping areas with no facilities at all. Couple this with the fact many campers are new at this and don't understand the ethics of "pack it out" or "leave no trace" and damage is definitely being done to our public lands. Weiss believes not only educating new campers, but increasing camping opportunities with more campgrounds and infrastructure are important goals for the federal government to address.

Tumwater Campground Update

Earlier this year we addressed the continuing closure of the Tumwater Campground near Leavenworth which has 86 campsites as well as a group site for 55 people and a picnic area. The campground closed in 2014 due to wildfires in the area. Three attempts since the middle of August for information about plans to reopen the campground (or not) have gone unanswered by officials at the Wenatchee-Okanogan National Forest.

State Parks Free Days

There are two more free days to recreate in Washington's State Parks this year where no Discover Pass is required for day-use activities. Those days are Veterans Day, November



and Black Friday, November 26th. Entry is not only free at state parks, but also at Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife Areas and Department of Natural Resource lands where a pass is required.

However, instead of waiting for free days to recreate on our state public lands, you should consider investing in an annual Discover Pass which only costs \$35. You can purchase one online when you renew your vehicle registration tabs or buy one at a local sporting goods store. They also make great Christmas gifts too for anyone who loves to recreate outdoors.

State Parks Director Update

Joseph O'Sullivan, writing for the Seattle Times, found out a lot more information regarding the resignation of Washington State Parks Director Peter Mayer in October after just

seven months on the job. It turns out multiple employees, to include six regional park managers, filed complaints about Mayer's leadership style. Mayer allegedly used coarse language and belittled employees in public. Another complaint alleged Mayer tried to steer the agency towards a particular firm he had worked with previously for a \$29,000 contract in violation established bidding procedures.

Mayer denied the allegations to the Seattle Times about this but through a spokesperson, apologized for any offensive language. Although he has announced his resignation, Mayer remains on home assignment and will continued to be paid until the end of the

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Border Sheriff Says State Threatened to Pull Resources If He Didn't Stop Militia

BRACKETTVILLE, Texas—Days after a militia made its presence known in a rural Texas town, the county sheriff said he received a call from a Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) official who threatened to pull all its resources from the county.

Kinney County Sheriff Brad Coe said that during the call, the official said they "didn't know who these people were" who were wanting to come help on the border.

"He basically said, 'I'll pull all my resources out," Coe said.

Coe said he understood the call to mean that all state troopers assigned to the county would be relocated, and other resources including jail space could be made unavailable to Kinney County if militia personnel were operating in the county, even on private

"I said, 'They're not working for me. They're not deputized. They're just here on their own accord. And they have that right to be here," Coe told The Epoch Times.

Sam Hall, leader of the militia Patriots for America, said the group planned to operate as a deterrent in areas of high traffic.

"As a militia, we can't detain or arrest people. We can disrupt and frustrate until the county or DPS can get there," Hall told The Epoch Times.


Border Patrol agents recorded almost 4,000 illegal aliens who evaded capture in the Del Rio Sector in the seven days from Oct. 18, according to provisional Customs and Border Protection numbers provided to The Epoch Times. Most have to pass through Kinney County to get from the border cities of Del Rio and Eagle Pass to San Antonio.

"What we've seen is an invasion of this county," Hall said during a county commissioner's meeting on Oct. 18. "What we've seen is residents that are scared to death right now, and they don't feel like they have support from the state."

Coe said he had spoken to Hall and requested to know where they'd be operating, for safety purposes. The sheriff said he understood the concerns DPS might have of a "friendly fire" incident if they don't know where people are working.

DPS has had a significant impact in Kinney County since the governor's Operation Lone Star border enforcement effort began in March, especially with the extra state troopers on the roads arresting human smugglers and on the ranches apprehending illegal aliens for trespassing.

DPS didn't respond to requests for

comment.

Possible Kidnapping Charge It's not the first time DPS has threatened to pull back.

Rancher Cole Hill figured he was being proactive when he invited four men onto his ranch to help guard the property against trespassers one night in September. He was fed up with the constant illegal alien traffic, damage to his property, and slow (or no) response from overwhelmed law enforcement agencies.

The men ended up detaining a group of seven illegal alien men for DPS to subsequently pick up and charge with trespassing.

The next day, Hill told The Epoch Times, he received a phone call from

"Almost verbatim it was, 'Look, you can't do that. That's not even legal what you guys did. That's technically kidnapping. You cannot do anything to impede the travel of any other human being. And if you do so, if you try to detain somebody against their will, that is kidnapping, and you can be charged with kidnap for that," he

Hill said the DPS officer told him that they will no longer come to his ranch to pick up detained illegal aliens because it would reflect badly on the agency to transport illegal aliens that had been "technically kidnapped."

Hill's ranch sits about 35 miles from the U.S.-Mexico border on a main thoroughfare for illegal immigrants who have evaded Border Patrol and are traversing his land on foot to skirt a highway checkpoint. The usual plan is to then be picked up by a smuggler who will drive them to a big city, often San Antonio.

Hill said he's dealt with illegal aliens traversing his land for years, but only about 25 people a year, on average; sometimes months would go by with no activity.

Until January.

Since then, he's had men in full camouflage clothing on his front porch; a group surrounding his house, banging on the walls and peering in the windows; his ranch worker house broken into; and his truck ignition destroyed during a theft attempt.

The damage to his property is also increasing. In the past few months, he's had his perimeter fence cut seven times, most of the time from top to bottom, and in three cases, an entire section was pulled out.

"Sure, there's probably some good apples in there as well. But I don't think the good apples are 35 miles off the river trying to evade every law enforcement they can as aggressively as they are," Hill said.

He said he's lost count of the number of confrontations he's had with groups of five or six men while working alone on his ranch. The idea of having a group of men out on security one night seemed appealing.

"All they were doing was giving me a better night's sleep," he said.

He was shocked to get the call from

Kinney County Attorney Brent Smith said ranchers have been detaining illegal aliens for years for Border Patrol and the sheriff's office to pick up.

"No one's ever brought this issue up until now with DPS," Smith told The Epoch Times. "Any citizen can arrest someone, or

detain them, for breach of peace or a felony committed in their presence. And trespassing has been found to be a breach of peace before." Smith said that most of the time

when a group of illegal aliens is walking through a ranch, one of them is the guide, or coyote, which consti-

"So one of those guys is committing a felony. Can you detain all 10 of them until you find out who that one is? How do you know which one the guide is unless you detain them? he said.

DPS didn't respond to multiple requests for comment by The Epoch Times about this incident and about whether the agency has warned other ranchers in Texas that they could be charged with kidnapping.

5 Percent of Unvaccinated Workers Have Left Jobs Over Vaccine Mandates: Survey

Five percent of unvaccinated workers have left their jobs over workplace vaccine mandates, while 37 percent say they plan to do so if their employers impose such requirements, according to a new poll, which provides an early indication of labor market impacts of mandates.

The survey, carried out by the Kaiser Family Foundation on a nationwide representative sample of 1,519 adults and published on Oct. 28, showed that 1 in 4 workers said their employer has required them to get the COVID-19 vaccine—up 16 percentage points from June. And while 25 percent of all adults polled said they know someone who has left their job due to a vaccine mandate, 5 percent of unvaccinated workers—or 1 percent of all adults—have done so themselves.

At the same time, around 50 percent of workers said they're against their employer imposing a vaccine requirement and 37 percent of unvaccinated workers—5 percent of adults overall—said they would leave their job if a vaccine mandate were imposed even if it included a weekly testing opt-out. That proportion rose to 70 percent of unvaccinated workers (9 percent of all adults) in the absence of a testing option.

Meanwhile, 60 percent of unvaccinated workers (8 percent of all adults) said they would seek an exemption if their employer imposed a COVID-19 vaccine mandate.

While the question remains hypothetical for the 75 percent of workers whose employers haven't imposed a vaccine mandate, the findings of the

survey are an early gauge of the impact of requirements on the labor market.

In September, President Joe Biden announced a vaccine mandate with a weekly testing option for businesses with 100 or more employees. It's estimated that the mandate, which remains under review, would cover about two-thirds of the private-sector

A number of business groups have asked Biden to rescind the rule or postpone it until the end of the busy Christmas shopping season, citing concerns that the mandate might prompt workers to quit, exacerbating the labor shortage and worsening the supply chain crunch.

Neither OSHA nor the White House has provided a firm timeline on when the emergency rule on private businesses would go into effect.

















