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Volunteers all over Chelan **County help to remember** those lost on 9/11

20 years after the September 11th attacks on the World Trade Center, residents of Chelan County witness the beginning of an American milestone. With this in mind, volunteers of the 9/11 Spirit of America Memorial Foundation prepared a ceremony that honors those that have been lost.

"I think it's just a different feeling to keep remembering 9/11, remembering the implications and the lessons learned to whatever the person might think, it's a very important time to reflect and I think it's kind of a sacred time," states Tom Green, President of the Spirit of America Memorial Foundation. "Now that it's coming to a close and all the drama around it. No matter how you feel about it, it is a milestone time."

Tom Green has been serving on the board since 2014. Green, along with Vice President Doug Jones, who served in the military after 9/11. They share a similar need to educate the younger generation on the historical symbolism of the event.

"It unifies us under the common umbrella that when tragedy strikes, we are all Americans, regardless of our political beliefs," Jones states. "It takes us back to that core of we are all Americans, and we need to remember that.'

Fellow board member and former secret service agent George Wilson is compelled to continue the memorial's legacy within the Cashmere community. Wilson has served as both a police officer and fireman for over 50 years. Wilson connects to the loss of first responders on a deeply personal level.

"I kind of equate 9/11 with the bombings of our federal building in Oklahoma City in 1995. Everyone in our office was killed." Wilson pauses for a moment. "And some very good friends of mine, and I always feel the same abhorrence with the cowardly acts that these things are. The devastation it comes to families."

The principal speakers of the event include David and Peggy Beamer whose son Todd Beamer was aboard United Airlines Flight 93 the day of the attacks. Beamer diverted the plane away from hitting the U.S. Capitol building and died in the process.

"Their son probably was singularly one of the biggest heroes of the day to disrupt that flight and disrupt the terrorist plans," said Green.

Beamer's parents will be awarded with the honorary Spirit of America

award, something that the foundation awards those who have been significantly impacted by the events of 9/11.

The hour-long ceremony will have first responders of every sub-division in attendance. This will include the fire department raising the flag high atop of their ladders and the American Legion of Wenatchee's firing squad performing the 21-gun salute, along with the WSP Honor Guard providing a bugler to perform 'Taps.'

"The first responders really identify with what we've done, and they've been a big part of it along the way too," explained Green.

Over 412 first responders lost their lives during the September 11th attacks. 343 were firefighters and approximately 60 were police officers.

"Something just always spoke loudly to me as I watch the video of that horrible day," Wilson said. "All of these people pouring out of the World Trade Center running to safety, and the police officers and the firefighters are going in."

Cashmere County Commissioner Bob Bugert will give a short welcome. John Jackson who was the original founder of the memorial subsequent to 9/11 will be introduced by Tom Green during the ceremony.

The foundation presumes that hundreds of people will attend the memorial on September 11, 2021. The board highly recommends that everyone wear a mask to this outdoor event. The event starts at 11 a.m. at Riverside Park, 201 Riverside Dr. Cashmere, WA.

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West Cashmere Bridge construction will bring new traffic impacts

CASHMERE – A contractor for Chelan County on Sept. 7 will begin placing the girders – the large, steel beams that support a bridge – for the new West Cashmere Bridge.

The work will include some impacts - nighttime construction and traffic impacts on Highway 2 - to neighboring residents and businesses as well as motorists traveling through the work zone.

The beams will begin to be placed the first week of September. Girders will be placed from the Goodwin Road side of the project to over the Wenatchee River to across Highway 2, in that order.

On the Goodwin Road side of the project, girders placed over the BNSF railroad tracks will require a nighttime construction work window. A work window was established by BNSF railroad so the girders can be placed when it least disturbs train traffic. Chelan County code also allows for nighttime construction work that is related to public projects.

Night work also will be necessary when girders are set over Highway 2; the work will be done 9:30 p.m. to 5:30 a.m. During these hours, the highway will be closed at the project site and motorists will be directed onto a onelane bypass road off the shoulder of the highway. Those anticipated dates are: Sept. 16 and Sept. 20-22.

On those dates, motorists should plan for one-lane, flagger-controlled traffic with a reduced speed limit. Plan for up to 20-minute delays, depending on traffic levels. Troopers with the Washington State Patrol will serve as flaggers.

Businesses on Sunburst Highway and residents on Hay Canyon Road also should be aware that the stoplight at Hay Canyon Road will be turned off from 9:30 p.m. to 5:30 a.m. on Sept. 16 and then again Sept. 20-22. Motorists accessing Highway 2 from Hay Canyon Road will be directed by the flagger as well.

The county's contractor expects to be setting girders about 10 days in September at a pace of about two girders a night. The steel beams, which are arriving from a manufacturer in Vancouver, Wash., are a variety of lengths and weights, ranging from 65,000 pounds to 100,000 pounds. They will be set into place by a large crane.

Treatment of local citizens should give all cause for concern

Tonight, August 30, the Manson School board meeting at the Manson Elementary School should have given every parent and concerned citizen pause for the treatment of about 40 concerned citizens wanting to dialogue with them. A group of parents and concerned people attended the meeting with the intention of speaking to the board about concerns regarding masking in the district schools, and to encourage the board to not require children attending district schools to wear masks. It was never the intention of the group to shut the meeting down or treat the board with disrespect.

When the parents entered a school hallway to the room where the meeting was held, there were two men who instructed everyone to sign in and to take a mask. Everyone declined the offer to mask up. When the group was seated we were instructed by a board member to mask up, in a curt threatening manner. When everyone declined his two "chances" to comply, the gentleman presented a motion to adjourn the meeting and make it a Zoom meeting. Using his position to negate our concerns with rudeness and an authoritarian manner that was quite shocking and heavy handed to those present. It is the intention of the parents that the district not implement a mask rule in any form for the health and safety of our children.

The parents do not feel that the governor's mandate is anything but that, a mandate, not a Law. The decision to wear a mask, or not, should be made by every individual. This may be an unpopular stance for those who whole heartedly embraced the wearing of masks and who chose to take an injection for the virus. The dubious health benefits of masks, and a vaccine that still requires masking and social distancing and worse, that those who have had the injection are still likely to sicken and die from the injection and the virus, should be of great concern. Every year, in excess of 70,000 Americans die of seasonal flu and pneumonia, neither of which require the masking of the population.

The board voted quickly to adjourn, several board members made a few disparaging comments to members of the group at large and several parents. One board member looked at the group with disgust and shook his head before the board made their hurried exit. The district superintendent actually did engage with a parent who was presenting facts about the supposed

safety or value of masking and told her she would like to meet with her for further discussion of our concerns.

It appeared to the group that the board felt they had made certain we did not feel welcome and that those of the group who were scheduled for a three minute chance to speak, would now have to arrange a Zoom interaction. The rest of the group were not welcome apparently to sit in on a regular board meeting. The manner in which the group was treated did not give those attending confidence that the board has any concerns for any views but those of the board, the board, which is supposed to be responsive to parental concerns. It was painful to see the one unmasked child who attended observing first hand the strong arm manner in which she would be treated when she wanted to say how much she disliked wearing a mask. As a lesson in civics, any adult would be appalled at the smug manner the board exhibited to the taxpayers with an honest grievance and concern for their children's health. They exhibited the authoritarian manner many Americans have come too equate with those who are given a little bit of power and use it against voters and those who pay their salary.

To see the disregard for the concerns of parents and citizens was truly shocking and indicative of many these days that if you take an opposing stance about masks or vaccines you are demonized, dismissed or accused of disregarding the health of others. The idea of civil discourse, calm discussion and consensus has been traded for an authoritarian stance of "my way or the highway" mentality. The few comments that several board members yelled to the group indicated a real lack of information about the virus being smaller than a human hair, which easily passes through all masks in common use today. The fact that there has been such deception from the CDC and Mr. Fauci toward Americans did not seem anywhere on their radar. They were uninterested in listening to any opposing views. These, the people who will make decisions about masks for our children, may also attempt the implementation of programs very unpopular with parents, Critical Race Theory, and Gender and Identity agendas. School boards are meant to be responsive to the concerns of parents.

Besides being useless in preventing the virus from entering our systems, they give those wearing them a false sense of security that they are safe from the virus. Mr. Fauci made this point early on about masks not being useful in the prevention of contracting the virus. The group Monday night, and millions of others in the world, do not feel subject to a mandate regarding masks, It would send a mixed message to children to see us masking up to comply with a board not only not interested in our concerns, but in forcing our children to mask up every minute of their school day.

Never did I imagine that I would ever utter a slogan from a proabort let alone make a sign with those words on it. But we are living in strange days after all.

October 18th is rapidly approaching anditmarksthedaythat all Washington State employees, healthcare professionals, educators, and anyone who works with the public

must be vaccinated. If not, they are out of a job. It doesn't matter if you have been a faithful employee of 25 years, had an exemplary record, or have been a devoted public servant, all that counts now is whether or not you are going to roll up your sleeve and comply with tyranny.

Dealing with Lactose Intolerance

Q: *I* started having stomach upset and diarrhea, especially after eating meals. When my doctor suggested I stop drinking milk or eating any dairy products, I did, which completely fixed it. This is puzzling because I've drunk milk all my life without any trouble. What's going on?

Most dairy products from cows and goats, including milk, ice cream, yogurt, and cheese, contain lactose or milk sugar. We digest lactose in our small intestine with the help of a particular enzyme our body makes called lactase.

Without enough lactase enzyme available, the lactose in dairy products can create gas, triggering abdominal pain, flatulence, and diarrhea.

When we are very young, our bodies make plenty of lactase, but that ability drops off after age 5. With less lactase enzyme available, you may eventually lose the ability to digest lactose. At that point, eating dairy products can trigger stomach distress and diarrhea.

Not everyone loses the ability to make lactase as they mature. Some genetic adaptations occur in specific human populations that live closely with domesticated cows and other milkproducing animals. In those groups, adults who still consume milk products are likely to maintain lactase levels adequate to digest the lactose they get in their diet.

Only 7 to 20% of Caucasian adults are estimated to be lactase deficient. In contrast, nearly 90% of adults in both Native American and some Asian populations have lactase deficiency, 65 to 75% of

Obituary & Memorial Policies

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An Obituary is a way for family member(s) to commemorate a loved one's life and to notify the community of the passing of the loved one. Obituaries are also used for historical and ancestral data.

Memorials are another way to let the community know about the life and memories of the person who has passed. A Memorial is different from an Obituary. An Obituary is usually current, while a Memorial can be written later.

Obituaries and Memorials need to be typed and emailed as a Word Document. They can be placed in one or more papers - all publish weekly on Wednesday.

Please call for cost. *Payment is due at the time of placement. *Exception: Chapels, funeral homes who African-American adults and 50% of adult Hispanics.

Once you develop lactose intolerance, what can you do? Many people with a lactase deficiency can tolerate foods that contain lactose, just as long as they avoid getting too much at any one time. It helps to reduce the serving size of dairy products, space them out throughout the day, or both.

Foods with the highest concentrations lactose include milk, ice cream, ice milk, some commercial yogurts, and cottage cheese. A one-cup serving of cow milk contains between 9-14 grams of lactose, while goat milk is similar at 11-12 grams. A onehalf cup serving of cottage cheese contains less than half of that, and other cheeses have much less, with barely 1 gram lactase per serving.

Live-culture yogurt without additives is well tolerated by most lactose deficient people because it naturally contains lactase. Many commercial low-fat yogurts have milk added after the fermentation process and contain more lactose per serving than a glass of milk.

Lactose is used in the pharmaceutical and supplement industry as an inert powder to add volume to medicines and supplements packaged as gelatin capsules. Most capsules contain about 400 mg of lactose, the amount found in 2 teaspoonfuls of milk. Since most lactoseintolerant people can tolerate up to 12 grams of lactose if it's distributed throughout the day, the amount of lactose in a capsule is unlikely to cause most people problems.

lactase Commercial supplements produced from bacteria or yeast can also help you digest dairy products. Lactase tablets (Lact-Aid®) can be taken at meals. You can also add lactase drops directly to milk or drink milk with lactase already added.

Most groceries now offer lactase-supplemented milk as non-fat, skim, 2% fat, and whole milk. Along with the help of the supplemental lactase enzyme, Lact-Aid® milk has less than one-third the amount of lactose found in standard milk.

If decreasing lactose intake and using supplemental

lactase doesn't relieve intestinal distress when eating dairy products, the issue might not be lactose deficiency.

At least two studies have reported finding normal lactase levels in people experiencing severe intestinal upset after drinking milk. The problem could be trouble with digesting other carbohydrates like fructose or sorbitol or possibly a sensitivity to the protein in milk.

Here are 5 Tips on **Dealing with Intolerance** to Dairy Products:

1. Eat dairy in small amounts spread out over the day.

Minimize your intake of milk. Except for cottage cheese, cheeses have far less lactose than milk or commercial yogurts.

2. Try а lactase supplement.

Last-Aid® is available as tablets and drops. You can take pills at any meal containing dairy products or add drops directly to your milk.

3. Drink milk with supplemental lactase already added.

Warning: acidophilus milk is not the same as lactase fortified milk Acidophilus milk contains the same amount of lactose as standard milk.Look for "lactase added" on the label.

4. Use dairy substitutes.

Coconut, almond, or cashew milk can be used as non-dairy milk substitutes.

5. Consider goat milk.

If taking lactase doesn't help, you may be sensitive to the protein in cow-sourced milk. Goat milk is another alternative.

Outdoors Round Up

Fishing Reports:

Columbia River Gorge: At Gorge Outfitters Supply in Rufus, Megan Eshleman reports anglers are catching Chinook salmon off the mouth of the Deschutes River but winds have kept anglers off the water for several days during the past week. Walleye fishing remains consistently good above the John Day Dam to Roosevelt on the Columbia River. Purple and chrome colored spinner worm harnesses trolled behind bottom bouncers are what's working best to catch these fish. Meanwhile, green pumpkin colored tube jigs are also picking up smallmouth bass in both the The Dalles and John Day Pools of the Columbia right now.

As for steelhead fishing, the summer run return is looking grim. As of August 31, just over 39,300 summer steelhead had passed over Bonneville Dam, far below the tenyear average of 142,300 fish. Oregon has already closed several tributary rivers (the John Day, Umatilla and Lower Deschutes from Moody Rapids to Shearer Falls, for steelhead fishing. Washington State has already limited boat fishing for steelhead at Drano Lake and is also closing the Wind River above Shipherd Falls beginning September 16 to protect a fragile run there. Check the WDFW website's emergency fishing regulations in the coming days for what will likely be more closures and restrictions as we deal with what is being called the worst return of steelhead since 1938 up the Columbia River.

Potholes Reservoir: Pete Fisher at MarDon Resort reports water levels remain low at Potholes Reservoir presenting a number of potential hazards to boaters. While trout, walleye and smallmouth bass fishing has only been fair, angling for largemouth bass and panfish remains good. For bass, use topwater baits in shallow waters in the morning and evening. Mid-day, the bass will be found between 15 to 25 feet deep where jigs and deep diving crankbaits will be more effective. The panfish remain schooled at the face of the sand dunes and near the mouth of Crab Creek where they can be Shad plugs, cast to with small spinners, or reeled in using jigs below slip bobbers.

Lake Roosevelt: Freddie Giannecchini at Clark All Sports in Colville says anglers are doing well catching trout and triploid trout throughout the lower two-thirds of Lake Roosevelt. As for the walleye, anglers are catching some but they are deep (around 80 plus feet deep), and scattered throughout the lake. Giannecchini recommends using your electronics to find the fish.

In other news, the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife has expanded a catch and keep sturgeon fishery throughout Lake Roosevelt from Grand Coulee Dam to the border with Canada through September 30. Anglers can keep one sturgeon per day and two sturgeon per season measuring between 50 and 63 inches from the nose of the fish to the fork of the tail. This expanded fishery is taking place thanks to a hatchery sturgeon program started in 2001 in British Columbia and 2004 in Washington State that has proven very successful.

Dove And Turkey Hunting:

The hunting season for mourning doves opened September 1 and huntable numbers of these migratory birds should remain available throughout Central and Eastern Washington until cooler weather moves them south.

The fall turkey season also opened in many game management units September 1 and according to state game biologists in Northeast Washington hunters should enjoy a good harvest this season. As for finding the birds, they write, "In the fall, food remains critical for growth of poults (juvenile turkeys) and for adults adding fat reserves. Forest edges that offer seeds, nuts, and fruits, as well as some green vegetation, are used the most. At this time of year, turkeys are at their highest population and widest distribution within northeastern Washington."

Campground Openings And Continued Closures:

Washington State Parks announced they are adding

Steamboat Rock State Park at Banks Lake. The new "Cove Loop" in the park includes 29 full-hook up sites for RV campers and is open for reservations and for use.

Meanwhile, the once popular Tumwater Campground,

Okanogan National Forest west of Leavenworth, remains empty, seven years after it's closure due to flash flooding concerns from the Chiwaukum Creek wildfire in the summer of 2014. With secondary tree and shrub growth stabilizing

hillsides along with new federal funding available for deferred maintenance, it's unclear why the 86-site campground and picnic area remains closed during a time of unprecedented demand for campground accommodations.
