#### Pateros revisits development agreement with Rock Garden Holdings

PATEROS – In a special meeting convened on Monday, Oct. 31, a quorum of Pateros City Council members addressed a new proposed timeline from a client in default of development of a block of commercial property that is entering its third year of delays from its original 2019 projected completion date.

In September 2017 the city received an offer from Rock Garden Holdings, LLC, to purchase seven vacant lots in the downtown core that the city had wanted to see developed for many years. The property involved is described as Lots 56-63 of Block 7, Pateros replat #3 located along Commercial Avenue. The purchaser, Chris Anderson, advised council members the development called for three bottom floor commercial units and eight top floor residential rental apartments.

Each council member reviewed and commented on the conceptual design plan and the agreement was referred to the city attorney to draft a Real Estate Purchase and Sale Agreement with recommended changes.

In February 2020 Anderson appeared before the council regarding delayed development of property originally scheduled for completion by November 2019. Anderson requested a two-year extension to the agreement and offered to negotiate a penalty fee that was originally set at \$1,000 a month during the default period. At that meeting council member George Brady expressed a past problem where purchasers of city property simply held the undeveloped parcels while the land value increased for a profitable

Last August 1, city attorney Scott DeTro with council approval sent a letter to Rock Garden Holdings' attorney

with the following stipula-

- 1. The lien amount plus interest and costs accrued to date will be paid to the city by the end of October 2022.
- 2. Client will provide a development timeline or sched-
- 3. The structure will be completed by October 31, 2023, unless construction is delayed through no fault of the client.
- 4. Submission of monthly progress reports to city clerk advising project status.
- 5. Another default and the property will be conveyed back to the city.

Anderson submitted a letter to Mayor Kelly Hook together with his proposed timeline on Oct. 26, requesting a revised development agreement. Among the 23 new deadlines in Anderson's timeline are:

- Good faith payment delivered by Dec. 15, 2022.
- Construction drawings
- submitted by May 22. 2023. Foundation completed by
- · Building framing com-

July 3, 2023.

- pleted by July 24, 2023 • Rough in plumbing/HVAC
- completed by Oct. 4, 2023. · Rough in electrical com-
- pleted by Oct. 25, 2023. Insulation completed by Nov. 1, 2023.
- Drywall completed by Nov. 22, 2023.
- · Painting completed by Nov.
- 29, 2023. Site work completed by Nov. 22, 2023.

On the heels of the completed building, tenant leases are projected to begin on Jan.

1, 2024. The council authorized the city attorney to continue working on the development agreement making necessary changes to conditions in the original August 1 letter. When completed by the attorney the amended development agreement will once again come before the council at its monthly November meeting for review and approval.

#### Friday, Nov. 11 – Community Lunch







#### November duck hunting

If you are a duck hunter, it's hard to beat November. The local ducks are joined this month by northern migrants who show up in big numbers. Usually the green-winged teal arrive first, followed by wigeon and gadwall, and after that, the big northern mallards and

One of the advantages of unting ducks in November is the relatively mild weather. Marshes, ponds and other waterways favored by ducks are still ice-free for much of the month and hunters wearing a pair of hip boots or chest waders with one or two dozen decoys can put themselves into a good position to harvest a limit of seven ducks in a morning of shooting.

If you are looking for some November hunting tips here are a few for you:

SCOUT FIRST – Use your binoculars and hit the rural roadways to find out where the ducks are feeding and where they are loafing on the water. If you can put yourself in either place or in between these areas you'll increase your chances for success. Using Google Maps is another way to scout potential hunting locations before you even leave your home.

BE WILLING TO WALK -Most duck hunters don't wander too far from their vehicles but they should because the places that are harder to get to, maybe a half-mile to two miles away from where you park, often offer good hunting with very little competition.

TRAVEL LIGHT – If you are going to be hoofing it you are not going to be able to haul three or four dozen decoys. That's okay because you can get by just fine with anywhere from as little as six to 18 decoys.

THE RIGHT DECOYS - Many hunters just throw out a mix of plastic hen and drake mallard decoys with heads in a forward facing, upright position. However, the ducks quickly get educated to the look of these spreads and will avoid them. Consider mixing in a few decoys of other species (pintails, wigeon and teal) and sprinkle in some feeder decoys that just show the bottom half of a duck in an upright position. Confi-

dence decoys are also used by some hunters, one of the more common ones being a great blue heron decoy at the edge of a spread near the shoreline.

GIVE THOSE DECOYS SOME LIFE - A still decoy spread on a calm bluebird day is not going to attract many ducks. While electronic motion decoys are not legal in Washington State you can use decoys with wings that spin in the wind or attach a string to a decoy and jerk on it, creating disturbance in the water when you do. Another option if you are hunting in a blind that is in the water is to use your feet to create a disturbance so that will make your decoys seem more lifelike.

time to construct a good blind will pay off. Hunters who don't take the time to do this are often spotted by the ducks which will flare away before coming in range. Be sure to use fresh foliage that matches the surrounding brush on your blind and whatever you do, don't look up at the ducks as they circle above your decoy spread because they will see your face and once again, flare off before you can get a good shot.

DON'T OVER CALL-Far too many hunters use their duck calls too much and instead of luring in the ducks, drive them away. Ducks get educated not only about decoy spreads but also about excessive calling so be judicious in the amount of

self to a few lone hen calls and feeding calls will likely work much better than a barrage of hail or come back calls. HUNT DURING THE WORK

WEEK - Our state wildlife areas get pretty crowded during the weekend so if you can, schedule your duck hunt during the work week. In much of Eastern Washington, you can only hunt geese on Saturdays, Sundays and Wednesdays so if you want a crack at a mixed bag of waterfowl without too much competition, shoot for a Wednesday hunt.

CLEAN YOUR BIRDS IN THE FIELD AND COOK THEM FRESH – By cleaning your birds in the field, even if just removing the entrails and organs, you'll improve the taste of the meat and reduce spoilage. Likewise, freshly cooked duck makes for a great meal and will not have the gamey taste previously frozen birds tend to have.

By using these tips, you will put yourself in a great position to harvest some ducks this month. Good luck!



### Super easy autumn casserole

With the time change upon us, the holidays are nearly here. I want to share with you one of my very favorite recipes. I started making it over 25 years ago and have never seen this particular combination of flavors in any cookbook

It's super easy to make. with only 5 ingredients for the casserole part plus mashed potatoes to serve it with. I often prepare it in the morning before we leave for the day. When I return, my home is filled with an aroma that says to me, "Autumn is here!".

Autumn Casserole is a sauerkraut/onion/apple/sausage combo that you simmer in a crock-pot and serve with mashed potatoes. My husband likes to eat his with mashed potatoes on the side of his plate. I prefer putting a big scoop of mashed potatoes on my plate, making a "well" in it, and pouring this into



the well like it was gravy. Mmmmm...

For variety, I vary the ingredients in several ways, using different types of onions, apples, and sausage. The only disappointment I've ever had was when using a heavily smoked sausage. My family was vocal in asking me not to repeat that particular combination. However, you may prefer using a smoky sausage. Go ahead, be creative.

Serves: 6-8 depending on the size of your cooker

Prep time: 15 minutes Cooking time: 6-8 hours in

a slow cooker Best with: Mashed pota-

The key to this recipe is the endless possible varia-

tions of the ingredients. particularly the sausage and apples. We enjoy trying new combinations,

The amount of each ingredient should be about the same, with the total amount needed depending on how big your slow cooker is. Mine is tall and round, holding 3 lavers each of sauerkraut. onion, apple, and sausage.

You can vary the proportions of sauerkraut to the rest of the ingredients by how thick you make your layers. This is my favorite combination, but I encourage you to use your own preferences to guide you.

**Ingredients:** 

64 ounces Sauerkraut, drained

2 medium onions, sliced into 1/3-1/2- inch slices (like onion rings)


2 medium apples, sliced into eighths

4 individual bratwurst/ knockwurst/kielbasa, cut

into ½ inch medallions

Layer ½ inch of drained sauerkraut on the bottom of a slow cooker. Make sure that you cover the bottom evenly. Follow that initial layer with a layer of sliced onion, then a layer of apples, then a layer of sausage. Repeat this 1-2 more times, depending on the depth of your slow cooker, finishing with a thin layer of sauerkraut on top. Cook for 4-6 hours on low or 2-3 hours on high. Serve with mashed potatoes.




