Back after two-year hiatus

Colville Tribes host First Salmon ceremony at **Chief Joseph Hatchery**

BRIDGEPORT - A large crowd gathered at the Chief Joseph Hatchery administration building early Thursday morning, May 26, to experience the First Salmon Ceremony hosted by the Colville Confederated Tribes Fish and Wildlife (CTFW) Department. The popular spring observance was not held the past two years owing to COVID pandemic restrictions.



Colville Confederated Tribes chairman Andy Joseph Jr. welcomed guests to First Salmon activities.

The program began at 6 a.m. at the catch pen located on the riverbank below the headquarters where CTFW personnel caught the first ceremonial salmon followed by a prayer and song by tribal elders marking the occasion. A shuttle was on hand to transport those who needed a ride down and back on the paved access to the water.

Outside the east end of the admin building a pit dug in the

salmon on the smoking pit.

earth held smoldering apple wood. Tribal members Rick Disautel and Richard Whitney impaled filets of salmon on long cooking sticks and anchored the filets with skewers before propping the orange slabs over the cooking fire.

At 7 a.m. guests enjoyed a breakfast of scrambled eggs and biscuits before the day's slide and lecture presentations got underway at 8 a.m. Colville Confederated Tribes Chairman Andy Joseph Jr. welcomed the assembled listeners who heard biologists. research scientists, and hatchery staff speak about the future of salmon stocks in the Columbia River.

Senior harvest biologist Isaiah Martin spoke about anticipated salmon returns this year. Phase 2 salmon reintroduction efforts above and below Chief Joseph and Grand Coulee dams were the topic of CTFW Senior Research Scientist Casey Baldwin, Spokane Tribe Anadromous Program Manager Conor Giorgi, Coeur d'Alene Tribes Fish and Wildlife Program Manager Ralph Allan Jr., and Upper Columbia United Tribes Executive Director D. R. Michel.

William Gale, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Project Leader for the Mid-Columbia concluded the speaker series before hatchery staff conducted a tour of the hatchery facilities.

During the roughly fourplus hours between the start of breakfast and the end of the hatchery tour the salmon slabs were finishing off in time for the 11:30 a.m. lunch that concluded with a song and closing prayer by tribal elders.

The pair started early so all the small white crosses made by the Brewster High School shop

class would be in place for the the volunteers and then gave next part of the Memorial Day preparations.

About a dozen Brewster High School sophomore and junior student volunteers with teacher Jake Johansen arrived on the scene at 9 a.m. to complete the process of setting the crosses into the ground and inserting miniature American flags into holes drilled into the tops of the crosses. Patterson explained the step-by-step process to

With the requisite tools iron bars to punch holes in the ground and stout hammers to tap the crosses in place – the students dispersed in teams to complete the morning's assignment. The crosses and flags remain through Memorial Day ceremonies and are then removed and stored for use again the following year.

BREWSTER - The Tuskegee Airmen, World War I Flanders Fields, the origin of National Poppy Day - these are just a few of the topics researched, written, and spoken by Shan Miller's fifth and sixth grade students at the Log Church Christian School learned leading up to the observance of both days.

"We buddied up and one of the buddies did a Poppy Day report and the other did Memorial Day," said Miller. "I really worked at the children trying to dig a little bit deeper to find some different things about Memorial Day and National Poppy Day."

Two of those students, Addie Boesel and Grace Isenhart,

studies. Others explained that one of the factors that caused the poppies to flourish on the French and Belgium

battlefields of Passchendaele and Ypres - the Flanders Fields – was the bombing and ordnance that worked up the earth and added nutrients such as nitrogen to the soil.

Later that day the class went into the community to distribute poppies firsthand.

"We talked about it, we studied about it, we made sure all of our teachers had poppies," said Miller said adding that the class would be at Brewster Marketplace and Triangle Exxon mini mart giving out poppies there as well.

Miller said a future class project will get the class more involved with the Brewster-Bridgeport-Pateros Senior Center. She has spoken with Center President Charlene Knox about regular class visits.

"I want the kids to have a regular day that we go over and play games and do board games," said Miller.

Guests enjoyed breakfast on the outdoor benches while salmon baked over the fire pit nearby.

Down 6-1 after six innings

Bears battle back from the brink to win state baseball title

RIDGEFIELD - With a flourish and finish more suitable for a fairy tale ending, the Brewster varsity baseball team - for the second time over two days - snatched victory from the closing jaws of defeat by staging a final inning rally to claim the 2022 state 2B championship in a fashion that fans will be talking about for years to come.

The Bears entered post season play with a 20-2 record and the best RPI ranking of any other state 2B team.

"Our schedule has been very beneficial this year," said head coach Todd Phillips of the solid competition Brewster faced during its regular season schedule. "Seven games versus teams in their divisions' top ten, nine more against teams in their divisions' top 20, That is going to pay off down the road."


The prediction was spot-on when the Bears had to dig deep against strong Final Four rivals.

Toutle Lake drained

The Toutle Lake Ducks had the game all but in the bag with a 6-1 lead heading into the top of the seventh inning and just three Brewster outs standing between them and the state title.

The late sportscaster Don Meredith might have sung: "Turn out the lights, the party's over" but Brewster fans know by now that you should never count the Bears out.

The Bears rallied to score six runs in the top of the seventh to take a 7-6 lead and kept the lid on any Toutle Lake response. The previous day in semifinal play Brewster recovered from a 5-0 fourth inning Chewelah lead to post five runs through the fifth and sixth innings, take a 6-5 advantage into the top of the seventh and shut down the Cougars to preserve the win.

"This was the type of game that we expected a dog fight to get to the title game," said head coach Todd Phillips

Chewelah took the early lead, but Brewster cut that by two runs when Woodward tripled and scored on an error. immediately after Woodward and scored on a Brady Wulf one-out single.

"Despite all the mistakes we made, we just did the little things right and it was a game changer," said Phillips. "Everyone stepped up in different ways, everyone reconciled their mistakes by coming through, our two seniors really stepped up and big ways. That is how a state semi-final should be."

Good grows here: A year in review

Last month the Community Foundation of North Central Washington published its annual report for fiscal year 2021. It was an extraordinary year – full of challenges and aweinspiring generosity. We witnessed this community pulling together to help those in need both through quiet acts of anonymous giving and big community-wide campaigns. Below are some highlights of how your Community Foundation made an impact in FY2021:

In numbers:
• \$1,083,393 was raised by you—members of the general public—who contributed to NCW nonprofit organizations through both Give Methow and Give NCW. Thank you.

• \$1,061,700 was awarded in scholarships to 228 students throughout NCW to help them accomplish their academic goals and get closer to the life and career they envision for themselves. CFNCW manages 133 scholarship funds and works with over 200 volunteers who carefully review and select deserving students every year.

• \$5,000,000 in grants to nonprofit organizations was made through our Community Grants Program as well as Individual Donor Funds. This includes \$450,000 for crisis relief efforts: the 'Back to Basics' campaign supported students with immediate needs, the NCW Fire Relief Fund helped survivors of wildfires, and the 'Hugs

for Healthcare Heroes' acknowledged the tireless work of our healthcare providers during the height of the pandemic.

In stories:

 Serve Wenatchee, a nonprofit that helps individuals and families in need of support, purchased freezers to store fresh, healthy perishable food options donated from local grocery stores. When food insecurity spiked during the pandemic, families were able to 'shop' the Fresh HOPE Market and choose items they need and want rather than receive a premade box of goods.

Dennise Aguilar Cano, now a student at the University of Washington, received five scholarship awards from CFNCW in 2021. She states: "Since age seven, I have translated for my parents at stores, doctors' offices, hospitals, and parent-teacher conferences. My parents, brother and I slept in a single bedroom. From my parents, I learned to be diligent and responsible. I will be the first person in my family to graduate from high school and go to college. My going to university is a dream come true for my family and me.

Our furry friends in Okanogan County received food, medicine, emergency care and spay and neuter services through the Okanogan Regional Humane Society when resources dried up during the pandemic. Most of the animals they serve have never been to a vet as many of their owners cannot afford this care. With grant funding from CFNCW, the humane society was able to continue their important work during a difficult time.

As required under the Wells Habitat Conservation Plan, this agreement will not exceed \$70,286 and will conclude June 30, 2023.
