County's contractor to begin roadwork on Hay Canyon Road

The contractor on the West Cashmere Bridge project will begin roadwork on Hay Canyon Road as early as next week. The road will be torn up and a crew will begin building a roundabout just north of Vale Road. Neighbors and businesses in the area can expect to see more truck traffic related to the construction. Traffic will be shifted around the work area. Please plan for construction in the Hay Canyon area to continue through the year.

There are several reasons why a roundabout at Hay Canyon Road was the best option for the West Cashmere Bridge Replacement Project:

Increased Traffic at the US 2/97 Intersection: The old bridge was closed to truck traffic for several years. With its completion, the new bridge will be a primary route for trucks, with the goal of removing truck traffic from downtown Cashmere and around the area schools. The future bridge will see new commuters and more busses, reducing the congestion at both the Aplets Way and Cotlets Way

intersections with US 2/97 as well. Roundabouts inherently allow a higher vehicular capacity and nearly eliminate serious and fatal accidents.

Intersection Geometry: The existing Sunburst Lane and Vale Road intersection with Hay Canyon is too close to the higher density US 2/97 / Hay Canyon intersection. With increased traffic, the current frontage road intersection also would become more difficult to access.

Safer Access: Removing Sunburst Road from this intersection and permitting a "right turn only"

out of Vale Road, creates a more efficient and safer access. With the construction of a roundabout, we will be able to sweep Sunburst Lane up to the new intersection on Hay Canyon Road, where the bridge ramps down and create a five-legged intersection that allows continuous movement (instead of having a stopped condition on a hill) and eliminates a new left turn movement onto the new bridge.

NCACH funds regional youth suicide prevention programming for schools

The North Central Accountable Community of Health (NCACH) Governing Board approved a total of \$456,736 to address youth mental health, resiliency, and suicide prevention across Chelan, Douglas, Grant, and Okanogan Counties at their April 5 meeting. Using a regional, peer-to-peer, school-based program called Hope Squad, the funding provides curriculum and four years of programming for all middle and high schools (48) in the North Central region, as well as a coordinator to help schools adopt the program and train staff. The Hope Squad is a school-based suicide prevention program that uses advisors to choose youth in each grade to participate as Hope Squad peers and learn about inclusion, resiliency, noticing signs and symptoms of someone struggling and then alerting advisors which youth need someone to reach out to them. The goal of the program is to reach youth earlier in the process before a risk of attempted suicide.

The adoption of this program could not be more timely, according to Dr. Julie Rickard, founder of the

Suicide Prevention Coalition of North Central Washington. According to Dr. Rickard, Central Washington Hospital in Wenatchee has seen a 36% increase in emergency room visits for self-harm, suicide attempts, and suicide ideation in those under 18 over the last year. This trend is tragically on the rise throughout the region, including the recent suicide death of a high school student in the region last month. "This program is really a game changer for our region," said Dr. Rickard. "Having this program implemented in most schools in all four counties will allow students that move frequently to have the same experience, to be more readily accepted, and to be recognized earlier if they are struggling."

"That is the world I want to live in!" According to the Hope Squad, the regional adoption of across North Central Washington schools is the largest effort of its kind in the nation. The program is funded with support from Cambia Health Solutions, who gave \$2 million to Washington's nine Accountable Communities of Health (ACH) in early 2021. The investment from Cambia is part of a larger \$11.5

million commitment to address rural mental health needs across Idaho, Oregon, Utah and Washington.

"We are grateful to Cambia for their generous and timely investment in rural mental health," says NCACH Executive Director, Linda Evans Parlette. "We are especially excited for the opportunity to adopt this program and address these needs regionally, as that is what ACHs were designed to do." Efforts to launch the program have already begun, with the intention of scaling throughout the region in the beginning of the 2021-2022 school year. Schools will be notified of this funding opportunity and can be early adopters, mid-adopters, late-adopters, or to not adopt the program. Together for Youth, a local youth services organization, will be appointed the contract and will work with Dr. Rickard to hire a coordinator and bring on an AmeriCorps Volunteer to assist in the

roll out, sustainability, monitoring, and training for the program. Dr. Rickard stated, "I look forward to a region where we shape the future through long-term investments in our youth."

PUD commissioners consider expanding support of affordable housing

WENATCHEE - Chelan PUD commissioners are considering a proposal that would support affordable housing development by waiving connection fees for qualified homebuyers working with local housing trusts. (starts at 00:20:00 on the board audio)

The electrical connection fee waiver is currently \$1,900. Chelan PUD has offered waivers to nonprofit, affordable housing trusts since 1995. About one home per year has qualified. Working through the housing trusts, about 20-25 homes per year are expected to qualify under the expanded program.

Three community land trusts - Chelan Valley Affordable Housing Trust, Common Ground Housing Trust in Wenatchee, and Share Community Land Trust in Leavenworth - presented a summary of local affordable housing programs to PUD commissioners in February. A community land trust is a community-led development of individually owned buildings on community-owned land.

In North Central Washington, community housing trusts have developed 42 affordable homes. That number is expected to grow by about 10-20 homes per year over the next five years: Three homes in Leavenworth by 2022, five homes a year in Wenatchee starting in 2022 and five-10 homes a year in Chelan.

Commissioners asked staff to further develop eligibility criteria to keep administrative costs low and total costs for the program predictable.

In other news, commissioners:

- Heard an update about advanced two-way digital metering.

April 14 Knapp's Tunnel Closure Forces Link Transit Reroutes

Planned Washington Department of Transportation inspection results in Route 21 detour

Link Transit officials expect to reroute nine Route 21 trips between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. Wednesday, April 14 due to a planned inspection of the Knapp's Tunnel by the Washington State Department of Transportation.

Link is providing shuttle service between Olds Station and Entiat for impacted trips. During the closure, Route 21 will be rerouted via U.S. 97 through Orondo.

The rock scaling work that previously delayed and rerouted Route 21 (Chelan) and Route 26 (Ardenvoir) trips is complete and buses are on normal operating schedules. Link has buses on standby just in case schedules are impacted, said Link Planner Paul Heffernan.

How and Why to Build a Raised Garden Bed This Season

(StatePoint) Fairly easy to construct and even easier to maintain, raised garden beds are a great way to raise plants and vegetables in the comfort and convenience of your backyard. In a recent episode of the Exmark Original Series, “Done-in-A-Weekend-Extreme,” landscape designer and show host, Doug Scott, spoke to organic gardener Joe Lamp’l of “Growing a Greener World” about the ins and outs of raised garden beds. Here are some of the top insights and tips Lamp’l shared.

Why use raised garden beds? A raised garden bed can help facilitate the ideal growing environment, as most people don’t have that perfect soil naturally in their yard. Their accessibility makes them easier to work in and maintain. Plus, they’re a nice architectural design element in any landscape.

What’s the ideal size? The main rule of the thumb applies to width. The bed should be no wider than 4 feet, as you never want to compact the soil when working. Length however, is based on personal preference and needs. As far as height is concerned, you want the roots to be able to grow out and down as much as possible -- 6-inches at minimum. While 12-inches is common, anything higher is a bonus.

What materials work best? Treated lumber is the most readily available and economical material and will likely last the longest, however, being an organic gardener Lamp’l prefers untreated hardwood, as it lasts almost as long and doesn’t contain chemicals. Other materials you have around the home and yard, such as rocks, old tubs, etc., can work too.

Where’s the best location? Build your raised garden bed on level ground, in full sun exposure near a water supply.

DIY Instructions:

To build a 10-foot x 4-foot x 18-inch raised bed, you’ll need:

- Nine 6-inch x 6-inch x 12-foot cedar timbers
- Tape measure, t-square and marking pencil
- A saw and extension cord
- One box of 10-inch heavy-duty exterior wood screws
- Ten 24-inch x 1/2-inch rebar stakes
- Twenty 10-inch galvanized timber spikes
- Sledgehammer
- Impact drill and long drill bit
- Level

- Hammer
- Shovels
- Hardware cloth, wire cutters and fence staples
- Work gloves, safety glasses and ear plugs
- Wheelbarrow (to transport soil)

1. Begin by cutting six, 6 x 6 timbers, each measuring 10-feet 6-inches in length. And six, 6 x 6 timbers, each measuring 4-feet 6-inches in length. Drill rebar holes in each timber.
2. Once the first layer of bed has been placed, leveled and squared in your desired location, fasten the corners using 10-inch wood screws. Secure the entire layer to the ground with 10 pieces of rebar.

3. Place the second layer of timbers, staggering the corners and fastening them with wood screws. Secure this layer to the first with ten 10-inch galvanized spikes.
 4. Install galvanized cloth to prevent burrowing pests from eating earthworms and destroying plants.
 5. Place the third layer of timbers (following above directions.)
 6. Fill with soil and plants.

What is a "Go bag", you say?

A Go Bag is an evacuation backpack or laundry bag of essential items you can quickly grab at a moment's notice to help you safely and effectively evacuate your home in case of a natural disaster or a threat of fire. Including essential items such as water, food, and medicine to last a few days is a top priority. Other valuable items such as

passports, driver's licenses, the deed to your house, your will and or trust, proof of insurance, medical records, social security cards, birth certificates, immunization records, and pet medical records should also be included. Store these items in a waterproof bag for safekeeping.

Include one gallon of water per person per day, non-perishable food, a first-aid kit, keys, a flashlight, batteries, a few changes of clothing, diapers, pet food, cash, face masks and hand sanitizer.

Other important items to remember are things like a whistle, pocketknife, headlamp, radio, extra phone chargers,

matches, a favorite book, deck of cards, toys or games and snacks or candy bars.

Finally, plan an evacuation route and establish a family communication plan with phone numbers of loved ones who live out of state in case local cell towers go down and make sure everyone knows to meet up in the same place.

GET READY!

Disasters can happen anywhere and at any time. By taking the time to create an emergency supplies kit, your family will be prepared in the event of a disaster. The kit also helps children feel more secure knowing it is there in case of an emergency.

The supplies can be kept in a plastic tub, small suitcase, trash can, backpack or other container. To learn what else you need in an emergency supplies kit, go to www.ready.gov.

EMERGENCY SUPPLIES KIT:

- Water – one gallon per person per day for drinking and sanitation — store 3-day supply
- Ready-to-eat food, canned juices, comfort/stress foods — at least a 3-day supply
- Battery-powered or hand-cranked radio and a NOAA weather radio, and extra batteries for both
- Flashlights and extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Non-prescription drugs such as pain reliever, anti-diarrhea medication, antacid, laxative
- Prescription medications, contact lenses and supplies, denture needs
- Whistle to signal for help
- Infant formula and diapers, if you have an infant
- Water and pet food if you have pets
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Dust mask or cotton t-shirt to filter the air
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Can opener for food
- Aluminum foil
- A jacket or coat, hat and gloves
- A complete change of clothing including long pants, long sleeve shirt, and sturdy shoes stored in a waterproof container.
- Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person
- Rain gear
- Mess kits, paper cups, plates and plastic utensils
- Cash or traveler's checks, change
- Paper towels
- Tent
- Compass
- Matches in a waterproof container.
- Signal flare
- Paper, pencil
- Personal hygiene items
- Soap
- Disinfectant and household chlorine bleach
- Important family documents such as copies of insurance policies, identification and bank account records in a waterproof, portable container. Remember to include emergency contact numbers.
- Passport, bank account numbers, credit card account numbers and companies
- Books, games puzzles, portable music device

NOTE: Replace food every six months. Re-think your kit and family needs once a year. Replace batteries and update clothes, etc.

Have children create their personal pack. Have them include things like their favorite book or stuffed animal. These familiar things will help keep them comfortable during an emergency.

Recycling 101: What to know before you throw

(BPT) When it comes to recycling, do you know what to throw?

A plastic milk jug is recyclable, but an old plastic toy isn't. The cardboard box from your latest online order can go in your recycling container, but a greasy pizza box shouldn't. Aluminum cans, yes; aluminum foil, no.

It can seem confusing, but that's where Recycling Simplified comes in. Republic Services aims to simplify recycling with easy-to-follow tips for consumers.

Consumers are trying to do the right thing by recycling, but they don't always know what

or how - to recycle. In fact, about one-third of what gets tossed in curbside recycling containers doesn't belong there. That's one out of every three items!

Many items are placed in the recycling bin with the hope that they'll be recycled. This is known as "wish-cycling." But people sometimes confuse "reuse" with "recycle." Examples of this include old clothing and shoes, stuffed animals, tools and plastic toys. All of these items could be reused if donated, but they won't find a new home if you put them in your recycling bin. Take them to a donation box or thrift shop.

So, what does belong in the recycling bin? There are three main categories of recyclables: Paper and cardboard, metal cans including aluminum, and plastic bottles and jugs. With bottles and jugs, leave the caps on or throw them away - they're too small to recycle by themselves.

Also, recyclables should be empty, clean and dry. Even when an item is recyclable, like a soup can or plastic ketchup bottle, any remaining food or liquid becomes a problem. When those items come into contact with clean recyclables, that leftover chicken noodle soup will saturate otherwise good paper and cardboard. This is known as contamination, and once it happens, perfectly recyclable items become trash and wind up in the landfill -

which is what we're all trying to avoid by recycling.

And don't bag your recyclables. The sorting process at a recycling center happens quickly, and most of what is bagged or bundled ends up in the garbage because sorters cannot see the contents. Plastic bags also can get tangled in the machinery, causing delays or even damage.

"Many of us want to be better recyclers, but we aren't sure how or think we don't have the time," said Pete Keller, vice president of recycling and sustainability at Republic Services. "With a few simple steps, we can all do our part to make environmentally responsible choices and help make a positive impact in our community for generations to come."

Make sure you know how and what to recycle with these simple Do's and Don'ts from Republic Services:

DO recycle paper products. Clean, dry, flattened cardboard, newspapers and magazines, office paper and mail are accepted. Break down cardboard boxes before putting in your bin and remove any plastic such as the see-through windows in envelopes.

DO recycle empty soda or food cans. Be sure any remaining food or liquid is removed and the can is rinsed and dry.

DO recycle "Empty, Clean, Dry" plastic. You can leave the tops on bottles and jugs.

DO remember, when in doubt, throw it out. If you're unsure whether an item is recyclable, put it in the trash.

DON'T recycle wet or food-tainted items. A greasy pizza box should go in the trash.

DON'T recycle cans that held hazardous waste. Metal cans that contained paint, oil or any other potentially hazardous waste need special handling. Consult your city or county website for information on hazardous waste disposal.

DON'T recycle yard or food waste. Composting options for tree trimmings and other yard waste may be available in your community, but not via your recycling container.

DON'T bag it. Reuse plastic bags if you can, then return them to grocery stores for commercial processing.

Birds Attacking Your Windows? Here's How to Stop It

(StatePoint) If you've ever noticed a bird attack your windows, you may wonder why this strange behavior is occurring. Beyond the potential disruption it might cause your family, repeated attacks can be harmful to birds. Understanding the problem however, can help you put a stop to it, and better protect the birds nesting on your property.

Many birds will stake out a territory, perhaps by your home, and vigorously defend it. If a territorial bird discovers its reflection in your window, it may perceive this reflection to be another bird competing for its territory and mate, compelling

The Washington Outdoors Report

The Washington Outdoors Report

Spring turkey hunting, a reopened state park observatory and hot fishing for non-salmon species in the Columbia River dominate the news this week.

PUBLIC LAND TURKEY HUNTING OPTIONS

The general opener for the spring turkey season is April 15. Traditionally, the best region to hunt is in Northeast Washington but Southeast Washington around the Blue Mountains and Klickitat County in South Central Washington also offer good options. Some of the best turkey hunting in our state is found on private lands but if you haven't secured permission to hunt a gobbler on private property, you'll want to give public land hunting a try.

When it comes to public lands National Forests and Bureau of Land Management lands can be a good choice as well as Washington State Wildlife Areas. As far as wildlife areas go there are several good bets for turkey hunters. In Northeastern Washington the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife reports the "LeClerc Creek and Rustlers Gulch

Wildlife areas usually have a good number of gobblers as well as the Sherman Creek Wildlife Area, where winter closure gates on the Bisbee Mountain and Trout Lake roads on the Sherman Creek Wildlife Area re-opened April 1.

Heading to Southeast Washington the Chief Joseph

Wildlife Area in the corner of the state as well as the Asotin State and W.T. Wooten Wildlife Areas bordering the Blue Mountains are worth hunting as is the Soda Springs Unit of the Klickitat Wildlife Area west of Goldendale. Whatever public land you choose to hunt, try to get there a day or two prior to the opener to pattern

the birds and be in your spot to intercept them as they come down off their roosts in the morning.

GOLDENDALE OBSERVATORY REOPENS

Washington State Parks is reopening the Goldendale

Observatory, perhaps their most unique park, on April 24. Don't drop in on a whim expecting to see the night skies through the new Newtonian Telescope with a 24.5-inch mirror lens though. Covid pandemic restrictions mean reduced opportunities until we move out of Phase 3. For now, there are tours of the

newly upgraded facility and the chance to view the sun through the observatory's solar telescopes from 2 to 4 p.m. each weekend. You will have to register online through the park website for one of these visits and can do so at <https://parks.state.wa.us/512/Goldendale-Observatory>

MID-COLUMBIA FISHING HOT

The hottest fishing in the Pacific Northwest right now may well be in the John Day Pool of the Columbia River between Rufus and Umatilla where the walleye and bass bite is on. WDFW creel checkers recently interviewed anglers in 68 boats who had caught 246 walleye and some 25 percent of them were released. Anglers in 13 boats fishing with 25 rods did even better going after bass. They caught 166 bass (that's over 6.5 bass a rod), with some 90 percent of those fish, primarily smallmouth bass, turned back into the water. Suffice it to say it's definitely a good time to go fishing in this part of the Columbia but watch the wind, it does tend to kick up in the afternoons and makes boat fishing very tough.

Relieving Itchy Eyes

Q: When my allergies kick up, my antihistamine helps my sneezing and stuffy nose, but my eyes still feel "itchy". What else can I do?

Years ago, I bought my "dream" car, a classic jet-black 1985 Jeep CJ7 hardtop. I can still remember that Saturday afternoon in August when my husband Charlie and I took the top off my new Jeep and headed out to the backroads of central Ohio. It was so peaceful: I could smell the damp earth of the fields we cruised by, rows of tall cornstalks alternating with lush, bushy soybeans.

Saturday's afternoon was magic, but Sunday's morning was a nightmare. I woke up to a nose I couldn't breathe through and eyes that burned like fire.

"What set off my allergies? The only thing I'm allergic to is ragweed, and we drove past corn and soybeans."

"Honey, we definitely drove

past ragweed yesterday. I saw TONS of it, growing thick in the ditches on both sides of the road."

"Aaargh!"

If you need to soothe the discomfort of itchy eyes from allergies gone wild, you'll find several eyedrop products available without a prescription. How do you choose the best one to calm your allergies?

Lubricating eye drops can ease the burning and help relieve dryness. Systane®, GenTeal®, or Refresh® all help reduce the "sand in your eyes" feeling by flushing pesky pollens away, but they can't shut off an allergic reaction once it starts.

Decongestant eye drops help your eyes look less red or "bloodshot" by shrinking the blood vessels in the whites of your eyes. They can help reduce puffiness around your eyelids but don't help reduce

Antihistamine eye drops help reverse eye itching and swelling from allergies. Pheniramine maleate is an antihistamine available in both Visine-A® and Naphcon-A® eye drops. Because these eye drops also contain the decongestant naphazoline, they should only be used for 3-5 days at a time.

The most effective eye drop to use when allergies strike is either ketotifen or olopatadine. They help prevent allergic reactions AND calms it down once it starts.

When you encounter something you are allergic

Pataday was a popular prescription-only eye drop. It is available without a prescription, in two strengths: Pataday Once Daily 0.2% and Pataday Twice Daily 0.1%. Ketotifen is available as Zaditor® and Alaway® brand eye drops.

Here are 4 Tips on Using Eye Drops for Allergies:

- 1. Avoid naphazoline eye drops.** Decongestant eye drops don't address the allergic reaction and only reduce redness. Limit your use of naphazoline eye drops to three days at a time, and avoid it entirely if you have glaucoma.
- 2. Choose Pataday® Once Daily for best results.** Ketotifen and olopatadine

Cross Country team concludes short season

The Cashmere cross country team competed at the NCR Cross Country Championship meet on Thursday April 1. "NCR" is the North Central Region of the state and includes all the high schools in Chelan, Douglas, Grant and Okanogan counties. The race served as the culminating event of the spring 2021 cross country season. Normally a fall sport, cross country officially began on February 22nd this year. Many of the runners actually began the season on February 1st with optional practices. We had 33 runners compete in races during this shortened season.

The championship race was held at Walla Walla Point Park on Wenatchee's 5 km course. The meet itself was delayed one hour due to an accident on

Highway 97 that blocked the highway and kept the school buses from Okanogan County from arriving on time. The kids have been rolling with the punches since school began this year and so an hour delay wasn't a problem for them. The air temperature was in the 60's which was comfortable for racing. During the delay, the wind strengthened considerably and affected racing times.

Girls Results - For the first time all season, the girls raced first. Ninety-one girls from 17 schools competed in the race. Due to COVID restrictions the girls had to start in three waves each separated by one minute. The Cashmere girls had good races.

Boys Results - One hundred eighty-seven boys were spread out into two races with a total of seven waves.

Several boys had season bests or personal records. Rob McManus earned the champion's medal. He was undefeated this season and is one of the top runners in the state.

The kids accepted the way things were this season and I appreciate their efforts. Seniors Syd Smith and Rob McManus competed in three state championship meets during their high school careers each winning two medals for top 16 finishes. Seniors Oscar Orozco, Dyllion Taylor, Kyler Knoll, Kylee Foster, Ellie Martin and junior Tristan Hoffman have all competed at the state meet. With a regular season they would have had a very good chance to run at the state meet once again. CCOVID restrictions did not allow a state meet this spring. The

senior girls led their team to state the last three years. Each year the girls finished as one of the top 10 teams with a team finish of fifth place last year. The senior boys led two teams to state both with top 10 finishes including a sixth place finish last year. I admire the perseverance and loyalty to the cross country program shown by these veterans.

It was a very memorable season. The kids performed well and competed well. Younger athletes got a chance to be teammates with some of Cashmere High School's most successful cross country runners. The younger runners got some racing experience and now know what it will take to reach the level of success our group of seniors have had. Next season should be more normal and I hope as successful!

2021 CHS Track and Field Preview

Cashmere High School track athletes began their season on April 5. There are about 45 athletes on the track roster but with the start of practice coinciding with Spring Vacation the numbers are an approximate. Last year, track athletes turned out for two weeks in the COVID spring of 2020. The season ended unexpectedly on March 16 due to state of Washington COVID restrictions. For several weeks after that it was hoped that

the school year and the track season would resume but by May the track season was cancelled for good by the WIAA. The track team of spring 2020 had several state championship track meet veterans that were returning for their senior campaigns and the season looked to be a very successful season.

Spring 2021 is going to be more of a mystery. The majority of the track and field team roster has no high school track meet experience. One boy (Rob McManus) and two

girls (Syd Smith and Carley Diaz) are returners that have state track meet experience. Last fall the WIAA granted schools the opportunity to have some out-of-season practices. Cashmere High School decided to allow each sport season the chance to have three weeks of practices. Many athletes took part in the three-week daily practice sessions that culminated in a small intra-squad track meet on October 1. Judging by their performances at our intramural meet and early practice results, this season should be successful as well.

The 2021 track season will be six weeks in length and have five track meets. This is half of a regular track season. Most of our athletes competed in the shortened "fall" season earlier this spring so they are not starting from scratch getting into shape. We have two practices within each practice: one for athletes that have six weeks of fall sports under their belts and one type of practice for athletes that are just beginning their athletic year. All eligible athletes will participate in our first track meet on Wednesday April 14.

Be a Berean

Pastors say a lot of things. I say a lot of things. That is the nature of the vocation I suppose. However, what happens when what a pastor says doesn't quite match the Scriptures? Or, can we even recognize error or falsehood from the pulpit?

I find that many people when they attend a church service, sit passively in the pew and are inattentive to what is being said from the pulpit. It is a constant complaint from pastors that their congregants can't remember what was said in the sermon minutes after exiting the church. If people aren't listening actively to the truth, then we can assume that the truth is actually being spoken.

Another issue is people tend to take what a pastor says at face value without any further study. After all, pastors go

to school and are trained in gospel ministry therefore they should know what they are talking about and be experts in Biblical theology. Furthermore, there is an inherent trust placed in the pastorate. The Bible calls faithful men to shepherd the flock and naturally we should be able to trust them.

I remember a conversation I had with a dear friend recently. Unlike most, they actually pay attention to what is said from the pulpit and they quoted to me what the pastor had said during a sermon and how much they agreed with him. The statement, however, was erroneous and when it was pointed out, my dear friend replied, "This is what the pastor said and I agree with him."

As I said earlier, pastors say many things, but what a pastor says from the pulpit isn't authoritative unless it is backed by God's Word. In other words, everything that a pastor

says must agree with the Scriptures. If it doesn't, then it is just empty words, at best, which bear no weight on life or eternity or at worst, heresies that will damage the soul.

Sincere as my friend may be in trusting their pastor, the ultimate standard of truth in the Bible and that is the only authority that we should place our complete trust in. Men are fallible and often say the wrong things but when the Word of God speaks, it is without error because it is God-breathed and the only sufficient rule for faith and practice (2 Tim. 3:16).

The reason why I am writing this is to encourage all of you to be good Bereans and study the Scriptures for yourselves so that you will know the truth and not be led astray. In Acts 17:10-15, we read that the Apostle Paul and Silas are sent to the region called Berea. Stepping into the local synagogue to preach about the resurrected Messiah, they find Jews who eagerly accept the message. However, these Jews were commended as being nobler than the surrounding areas because of this one fact:

They examined the Apostle's words in light of Scripture. Remember, the Apostles were the leaders of the church. They were with Christ, heard his teachings with their own ears, and were witnesses of his resurrection. The Apostles carried an incredible amount of authority as their teachings were the foundation of the church (Eph. 2:20). Yet, for

these Bereans, regardless of the reputation of the Apostles, they insisted (rightly so), that even church leaders must fall under the scrutiny of God's Word.

Again, we can learn a lot from the Bereans and follow their example of knowing the text of Scripture and examining every word spoken.

My prayer for you is that

you go to church this coming Sunday, open up your Bible and actively listen to what is being said. Be a good Berean, read the Scriptures, and don't just take our word for it from the pulpit.

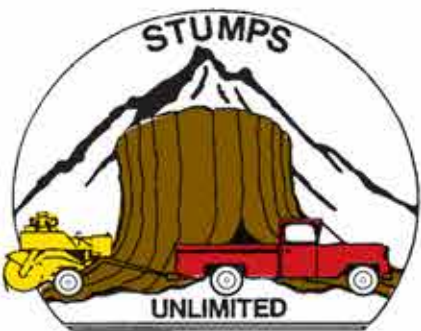
