## Chelan County projects get boost

#### \$2.5M: 'Cascade Fund' grants rural growth money

Commissioners last week approved the Cascade Public Infrastructure Fund (CPIF), a grant program for public facility projects serving economic development, unanimously.

Because these funds can only be spent for public facility projects, eligible applicants will be entities like city governments, the Chelan-Douglas Port Authority, water districts, and other junior taxing districts that can demonstrate a nexus between their proposed project and economic development.

Public facilities" includes bridges, roads, water, sewer, and other utility systems, port facilities, and more, according to strict interpretation of the rural counties tax laws.

The grant program does not impose a new tax on Chelan County citizens, but instead will be funded by existing revenues from the sales and use tax for public facilities in rural counties (Rural Counties Tax) which is a .09 percent remittance on the state's sales tax.

Over the next three years, the CPIF plans to invest nearly \$2.5 million into economic development projects in Chelan County.

"The CPIF grant program will be a critical resource in local economic development to grow the private sector in order to incentivize and attract new businesses to Chelan County, while at the same retain and expand current businesses," said Blake Baldwin, Director of Economic Development for Chelan County. "The county is eager to make investments that will strengthen our economy and create family wage jobs and opportunities available to county residents."

Baldwin spoke exclusively with NCW Media and added the following to his original news release:

"Public investment in these utilities is critical to economic development to help ensure a project site is equipped with infrastructure that will not only incentivize new industry to relocate to Chelan County, but will also help expand and grow existing businesses.

The CPIF Advisory Committee will be looking at several priorities to evaluate, score, and rank projects, including: How many jobs the project will attract to Chelan County, he said. Also included and highly prized as part of the incentive package are projects that significantly increase county revenues, such as sales tax, property tax, and personal property tax. "The increase in revenue benefits local governments and junior taxing districts, which in turn helps ease the tax burden upon Chelan County citizens" will be a major criteria in the selection process, according to Baldwin.

quality of life for Chelan County citizens as well as how projects can demonstrate a partnership between the applicant and another public entity and/or private sector business or organization

This often means the project has secured matching funds which helps stretch the CPIF grant program further allowing for more public investment in economic development.

The Chelan County Board of Commissioners will assemble the CPIF Advisory will also be a major consideration, according to Baldwin.

A committee to help guide and inform the decision-making process for these public investments will be formed consisting of eleven members and the county, and will begin extending invitations to "desired participants."

Desired participants include representatives from city governments in Chelan County, community councils, the Hispanic Business Council, and the Chelan Douglas Regional Port Authority. These entities will be asked to send project details.

The committee will review, score, and rank all applications and submit their recommendations to the Chelan County Board of Commissioners for final decision making.

Chelan County will be accepting CPIF grant applications from March 29 to May 7 and awards will be announced in early June. Applications will be available at co.chelan.wa.us.

To receive a CPIF grant, the applicant must be a public entity and the public facility project must meet the definitions described in RCW 82.14.370. Furthermore, the project must be listed or referenced in the economic development element of the Chelan County Comprehensive Plan, or the comprehensive plan of a city or town located within the county.

"We look forward to bringing our local government and community partners together to advise and inform the commission's CPIF investments in Chelan County," said Chelan County Commissioner Kevin Overbay.

"The county plans to work with our public sector partners to prioritize investments that will increase county revenues, in turn helping to ease the tax burden to county citizens," Overbay concluded.

NCW Media reached out to Baldwin for more details regarding specific projects that might be receiving consideration from the projectranking committee. He said the list will be revealed after the application filing deadline. # State Libertarians hate new gun bills

#### Hawkins: 'Enforce existing gun laws'

**OLYMPIA** – The Libertarian Party of Washington (state) put out a news release decrying current gun rights bills in the state capital stating, "Olympia got a little bit right on police reform, but they're also pushing through a spate of new gun control bills that are as stupid and racist as they are unconstitutional. While Congress protects themselves with layers of weapons around the Capitol, they have no compunctions about taking away citizens' rights to do the same.

The headline for the news release was appropriately titled, "Washington Legislature's New Gun Control Bills: Stupid, Racist, and Unconstitutional.

It is the third largest of the state's three party's

and often offers something in between a hard "yes or no" on many issues.

East Wenatchee Republican Senator Brad Hawkins, representing the 8th State Senatorial District, in an exclusive NCW Media interview, stated, "Gun issues have long been a major focus of state and federal policy. Most gun proposals, like other ideas, do not actually pass. This particular session could be different

given the expanded Democratic majorities of recent years and the interest of many urban legislators in limiting gun use."

Below are the Libertarian opinions on these bills:

HB 1229 outlaws "militarystyle assault weapons," including AK-47s, AR-15s, and all semi-auto rifles under 30 inches. News flash, Olympia: The vast majority of gun killings are by handguns, not rifles, and the vast majority of those are gang-related. If you want to save the children, end the drug war.

HB 1283 bans carrying any weapon in a way that "warrants alarm for the safety of others," an amorphous term which means bearing arms is now a class C felony if someone else doesn't like seeing it.

HB 1164 is a doozy: the Big Gulp of gun bans, outlawing magazines holding over 10 rounds. This pointless law will do nothing to stop hardened criminals and only hurt the single mom whose life depends on reloading.

Hawkins, whose district includes Chelan, Douglas and parts of Okanogan and Grant counties, continued with his gun reform opinion: "For me, I have always believed that enforcing existing gun laws and upholding constitutional rights are key."

Libertarians seem to feel that some proposed gun laws may be inherently racist.

"Politicians in Olympia who claim to value "equity and diversity" conveniently ignore that half of all those busted for gun possession are black. The State makes felons out of our young people, wages war against them, and then jails them for trying to keep themselves alive," stated the news release.

Hawkins wants more focus on those deemed "mentally ill".

# Lake Wenatchee Fire announces Protection Class evaluation

The Lake Wenatchee and Plain communities have received their Fire Department Community Protection Class evaluation. The community maintained its previous rating of 6.

The Washington Surveying and Rating Bureau provides insurance grading to Fire Departments and communities throughout Washington State. The Bureau assigns ratings from 1-10, with 10 being "unprotected," 4 being the top residential grade, and 1 being the top commercial protection.

The report showed Department and community improvement in numerous areas. The report also offers information about where the Department can improve its service. Replacing aging equipment, upgrading the Hwy 2 staging area (station 95) into a formal station, adding education programs, and improving our local water systems will help us take some of the next steps to improve our insurance ratings and services in the District.

While a rating of 6 is a very good grade for a rural community, the Department believes that with continued advances, we can reasonably reach a protection class of 5 within the next few years.



Going into this game each team is 1 and 1 in the shortened season caused by the COVID Pandemic and shutdown of the schools. Practice time has been short so it is anybody's guess who will be most prepared.



graduation standards, and collective bargaining to levy reform, curriculum choices, and testing requirements. More recently, as a result of the COVID pandemic, school districts are focused on remote learning, technology needs, and safe reopening.

One of the things missing from the overall discussion, in my opinion, is whether the current school year model makes sense for a 21st century school. These are the questions Ι am attempting to answer in my Senate Bill 5147, a bill co-sponsored by many legislators, including committee chairs and leadership

members from both parties. The bill includes a financial incentive for any district that chooses to voluntarily apportion their existing 180 state-funded school days over a full year. This will likely require multiple three-week breaks throughout the year or a few one-month breaks. The bill was recently approved by the Senate's Early Learning and K-12 Education Committee. The bill has another hearing this afternoon before the Senate's Ways and Means Committee, which develops the Senate's budget proposal. Many stakeholders are expected to testify, including local educational leaders Michelle Price, superintendent of the North Central Educational Service District, Gene Sharratt former superintendent and Washington State cabinet member, and Tom Venable, superintendent of the Methow

Valley School District.

Both the Early Learning and K-12 Education Committee Means Ways and and Committee are working to address "learning loss" this legislative session. Learning loss is something that will, unfortunately, impact nearly every student across Washington state due to the COVID pandemic and the less-than-ideal circumstances associated with statewide remote learning. Some students could spend most of their remaining K-12 years just trying to catch up to their prepandemic academic learning trajectory. Sadly, many students will be burdened by COVID's educational impacts for many years to come.

The COVID educational impacts will burden most students for many years and likely will be compounded by the continual learning loss in future years, which occurs every summer as a result of outdated school calendars historically designed to accommodate our agricultural needs. Our current school calendar was created to allow students to have a three-month summer break to assist their families on their farms but became commonly accepted over time and now goes largely unquestioned. It's now time to

think about transformational changes that could help every student across Washington. With my bipartisan effort outlined in Senate Bill 5147. I'm calling on my colleagues in the Legislature to think differently about how to improve our educational delivery system. If we cannot do it now, as we prepare to pull ourselves out of this pandemic, when will we ever

be able to? Fortunately, my legislative colleagues and I are not alone. Our Superintendent of Public Instruction Chris Reykdal identifies "balancing the school calendar" as one of his "10 strategic changes" for our schools, and I agree. In a January 8 letter to the governor and legislators, Superintendent Revkdal urged us to explore options to help our schools "become

the highest performing public education system in the nation."

I do not think we get there by taking a long break every summer.





# **Rescue the Perishing**

JOHN

In the spring of 1912, John Harper and his young daughter, Annie, embarked on a oncein-a-lifetime journey to America. Harper, a Scottish Baptist pastor, and widower had received the invitation to preach in Chicago and boarded a vessel that would take them across the Atlantic. There is always a risk in traveling by sea,

but with a ship that is "unsinkable," the passage to America would sure to be a comfortable and uneventful one.

April 14, 1912, the Titanic struck an iceberg and as water flooded into the ship, it would only be a matter of time before the vessel would be lost. Harper rushed to the deck with his young daughter and after placing her in a lifeboat, he began to aid in the rescue effort, calling out to the frantic passengers "Women, children, and unsaved people to the lifeboats!" As the sounds of a ship in its death throes and the cry of frenzied, desperate people filled the night air, it was reported by survivors that the voice of John Harper was heard clearly and powerfully preaching the gospel. It was also said, that after a man refused Harper's appeal to "believe upon the Lord Jesus Christ and be saved!", John took off his own life jacket and gave it to the man saying, "you will need this more than me."

As the ship descended to the bottom of the Atlantic, the unfortunate souls who didn't make it to the lifeboats found themselves floating in frigid waters, clinging desperately to whatever piece of debris they could find. Harper was among them, and he swam to as many

to overwhelm Harper, he again shouted to Steve.

"No, I am not."


"Call upon the name of the Lord and you shall be saved!" And with that final appeal,

Harper slipped under the waves for the last time. Years later in a gathering of survivors in Canada, Steve Crain shared how Harper led him to Christ the night of the

I wonder, if faced with the disaster of the Titanic and the blackness of sea that is poised to swallow me into its abyss, how would I respond? I would like to think that I would be as bold as John Harper. However, that is easy to say in the comfort of a climatecontrolled church office. The fact is none of us truly know what we would do until we are in the situation. Yet, if we are faithful to Christ now, walking with Him in intimate fellowship, and reminded daily of His promises in the Bible, when faced with a crisis of any sort, we will not be overcome.

The Apostle John writes in Revelation 12:7-17, talking about the utter defeat and throwing down of Satan, who was responsible for

# **The Washington Outdoors Report**

**State Parks To Visit This Spring!** 

By JOHN KRUSE

Several parks east of the Cascades offer lots to do before summer arrives!

**Curlew Lake State** Park: Located north of Republic in Ferry County, this 87-acre State Park with a campground sits on Curlew Lake, a 5-1/2 mile long body of water known for good fishing. You can catch everything from trout and bass to perch and tiger muskies here. There's also plenty of wildlife around. Deer are abundant and during the springtime you can enjoy the sights of a heron rookery on one of the islands on the lake. If you are looking for something unique to do head to the Stonerose Interpretive Center in Republic, rent some tools, and dig for fossils (mainly

plants or insects) that are up to 49 million years old. Palouse Falls And

Lyons Ferry State Parks: There is no better time of year to visit Palouse Falls State Park in Southeast Washington than April and May. That's when the Palouse River is full of spring run-off and it makes for a spectacular sight as it drops and crashes 198 feet into a basalt basin. Better still, the area surrounding the falls is full of spring wildflowers and hawks and falcons frequent the area too. There is a small camping area at this park that is currently closed because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Once you are done taking in the sight and sounds of Palouse Falls, drive a short distance down a hill and check out Lyon's Ferry State Park. This day park sits at the confluence of the



There is a swimming area and beach here and there are also opportunities in the spring for anglers to go after channel catfish, some of which are quite large. Other fish to catch include bass and walleye. The Lyons Ferry KOA across the bridge from this park usually has good information on what's biting.

Daroga State Park: This one is a sleeper. Located on the Columbia River north of Orondo, this park boasts a great RV camping loop with views of the river as well as an expansive day use area featuring a swimming beach, playground, ballfield and even tennis courts. There is also a wide trail that takes you along a dike to a walk-in campground bordered by the Columbia River on one side and a lagoon on the other where you can fish for smallmouth bass, catfish and other species. If you go bring your golf clubs and reserve a tee time at the nearby Desert Canyon Golf Resort, one of the nicest courses in the region.

Maryhill State Park: If you head south of US Highway 97 make a left turn just before crossing the bridge

Oregon. When you do, you'll find yourself at MaryHill State Park. This park has a campground and day use area and sits on 4700 feet of prime, low-bank riverfront real estate. There's plenty to do here. If you like to fish you can launch a boat (or drive) a few miles upstream and fish below John Day Dam for walleye, sturgeon, smallmouth bass and starting in May, American shad. A replica of Stonehenge, built as a memorial by Sam Hill in the 1920's to local soldiers killed in World War I, is just a couple of miles east of the park. Speaking of Sam Hill, this famous entrepreneur and builder of the Columbia River Highway also built the Maryhill Museum of Art, a must visit destination just five miles away. Finally, not related to Sam Hill, but right by the museum above the Columbia River Gorge, is the Maryhill Winery.




