Chelan County Commissioners keep watch on proposed Olympia Bills

WENATCHEE – The February 9 meeting of the Chelan County Commission was highlighted by the overview and commentary of several House and Senate bills that may affect the county and local cities in both positive and negative ways.

SB5368 is in regards to the annexation of unincorporated territory by state code cities currently under Urban Growth Area (UGA) boundaries. The annexation must be coordinated between the city and the county it lies within and includes safeguards for continued upkeep of infrastructure, fair evaluation of potential loss or gain to residential properties and potential for revenue sharing agreements. It requires the formation of interlocal agreements. If the bill passes, cities will become eligible for the annexation sales tax credit. The bill was referred to the Senate Ways & Means Committee February 12.

The Washington State Association of Counties (WSAC)*, representing 39 Washington counties, has issued pro or con advice on many of the bills. See the WSAC website for more information (WSAC.ORG).

Commissioner Keith Overbay went through some of the proposed bills and had comments regarding a few specified bills, admitting he would take an entire day to analyze and comment on all of them.

HB1412, said Overbay, "Would cause a revenue hit" on counties and is opposed by WSAC. The bill specifically allows non-payment of fines and/or restitution if "the offender does not have the current or likely future ability to make full or partial restitution."

Overbay, a retired Washington State Patrol officer, explained the proposal to the other two commissioners Tiffany Gering and Bob Bugert. If passed, "At any time, the court may determine that the offender is not required to pay, or may relieve the offender of the required fine to pay," thus causing an obvious loss of court revenues to be distributed to county and city entities from convicted

HB1099 is also opposed by WSAC as it mandates actions by counties cannot be approved unless within guidelines of greenhouse gas emissions regulations.

The bill demands future regulations be, "... supported by scientifically credible projections and scenarios that indicate their adoption is likely to result

City of Cashmere Refinances Bonds saves \$2.6 million

Cashmere -- On February 10, 2021, the City of Cashmere sold a total of \$11,315,000 refunding bonds, which will refinance existing water and sewer revenue bonds, to take advantage of lower market interest rates. The refinancing will save the City's utility system \$2.6 million of interest payments over the next 33

D.A. Davidson & Co. in Seattle is serving as bond underwriter for the refunding bond issue. The City has been monitoring bond market conditions over the past few months, and recent low interest rates allowed the City to exceed its savings target. Interest rates averaged 2.25% on the new bonds compared to 3.25% on the bonds being refinanced.

Mayor Jim Fletcher said, "It is gratifying to be able to take advantage of low market interest rates. The bonds we refinanced paid for our new Wastewater Treatment Plant in 2013. The savings we achieved today will help keep utility rates affordable for our community ratepayers."

S&P Global Ratings assigned its

rating of 'A+' to the City's 2021 bond issue, meaning the City's ability to meet its financial commitments is strong, in S&P's opinion.

S&P cited the following positive credit factors supporting the City's water and sewer system's rating:

· Good operational management practices and policies;

· Affordable rates, with discounts available to low-income seniors customers;

· Sufficient water supply and treatment capacity to meet continued

· Sound financial reserves;

· Extremely strong coverage of debt service by net system revenues; and

· Lack of additional debt plans. The strong credit rating on the City's water and sewer revenue refunding bonds can be credited with attracting investor interest in purchasing the bonds, contributing to the debt service savings. The City also enhanced savings by purchasing bond insurance on certain maturities of the bonds through Build America Mutual,

in reductions of greenhouse gas emissions or per capita vehicle miles traveled."

proposal The requires actions taken must "substantially reduce the adverse impacts of climate change on people, property, and ecological systems through goals, policies, and programs consistent with the best available science and scientifically credible climate projections and impact scenarios that moderate or avoid harm, enhance the resiliency of natural and human systems, and enhance beneficial opportunities."

Because of the rural nature of most of Washington state, the bill is considered to be mainly one for urban areas to consider and not practical for nonurban entities, where much greater mileage is incurred by necessary vehicular traffic, according to minority party (GOP) comments.

Another bill possibly causing angst in rural areas is the call for an addition to "community oversight" in HB1203.

"All local jurisdictions must establish a community oversight board by January 1, 2025. ... To receive complaints from community members regarding the conduct of law enforcement officers and civilian employees of the law enforcement agency." The bill is aimed at any city or county law enforcement agency with at least 15 members on staff.

Hawkins, Goehner: House 'Wealth Tax' bill 'punishment' for success

OLYMPIA – A rehash of an old Democrat Party idea has come back to the state capitol for a vote. So far it is only in the House, but Senator Brad Hawkins (R-East Wenatchee) is ready with an answer if it ever comes to the state Senate.

earnings, took gigantic risks, made big sacrifices throughout their business careers, and have employed a tremendous number of people in the process," continued Hawkins.

"They happen to also be very sincere in their efforts to support others with generous foundations and personal giving. This bill seems like an effort to extract money from a handful of very successful people to fund more growth in government. To me, that sends the wrong message," he said.

"While state revenues have taken a modest hit during the COVID pandemic, our state economy is holding steady despite efforts to keep our economy closed. Personally, rather than implementing creative new taxes to significantly grow the budget, I would favor using our \$2 billion budget stabilization account reserves and making modest adjustments to balance the budget rather than more tax increases and continued spending," said Hawkins.

"I'm not sure Washington State can keep this up if the economy and state revenues dip again due to COVID or if our state or country experiences a non-COVID recession in the future. So as much as I would like to keep an open mind about everything, I am concerned about the message this bill sends and the way it

Tom Olson, Washington resident and political commentator, stated on the USA Votes chat site that the Seattle Democrats' tax bill is: "(1) Confiscatory and punitive, (2) hasn't worked elsewhere, (3) expensive and difficult to administer, (4) will be easily circumvented by the 'rich' simply changing domiciles from Washington. Perhaps this should be retitled 'Texas-Florida stimulus act?"

In another exclusive interview with the Wenatchee Business Journal, State Representative Keith Goehner (R-Dryden) said about the "wealth Tax", "I am not in favor of a 'wealth tax.' It is important to have equity in taxation, but disproportionately taxing success does not encourage additional investment in the State."

Prepared for Persecution?

Coates, James Canadian pastor sits behind bars today. His crime? Gathering the church for consistent, regular worship on Sundays. Unable to see his family, he waits in prison as his totalitarian government decides his fate. However, being the benevolent tyrants they are, they did offer him a deal for an early release. All Pastor Coates has to

do is promise 1) that he won't return to church and 2) refrain from preaching. Do that, and he can walk out of jail a free man.

But he won't and nor would any faithful minister.

What has happened to Pastor Coates is just one of the many examples of what persecution could look like in this "Brave New World"where an unmasked, gathered church is a threat to public health and sermons about Biblical definitions regarding gender and sexuality are considered hate speech. I know of many brothers and sisters in America and Canada that have been jailed, fined, and threatened by the authorities for practicing their Biblical convictions. Even myself, have faced the frown of the State for speaking what the Bible says regarding life and the protection of the preborn.

My point: Persecution is here and it doesn't look like it's going to stop anytime soon.

Now that fact may disturb some of you because we have all enjoyed a relatively free and easy expression of Christianity. Our faith hardly costs us anything if we were honest. Yet, read what the Bible says, to follow Christ is a costly endeavor (Luke. 9:23), and "All who desire to live a godly life in Christ Jesus will be persecuted" (2 Tim. 3:12). It is not a matter of "if" but "when" persecution will occur in your life. It's going to happen to you in some way or some form if it hasn't already.

As I meditate on the of persecution happening here, I wonder what percentage of churches are worth persecuting? It's a strange question to ask, I admit, but how many churches in our nation have been and are willing to be counted as it says in Acts 5:41, "worthy to be shamed for the name?' For the most part, there has been a concerted effort to be as safe, comfortable, and

non-threatening possible. To be known as the church with the "friendly face" (covered now by a mask) and to be the nicest gathering in town is the ultimate goal for some. Don't get me wrong, churches shouldn't strive to be jerks or obnoxious but historically speaking, "nice" churches don't get persecuted, only the faithful ones do.

The second thought that comes to mind when talking about persecution is preparedness. Are we prepared to face it, practically? In my pastorate, I could easily find myself in jail for the sermons I have preached and the ministry that I am involved in. In fact, it is a constant theme and a running joke here at EBC that they may have to take up an offering to bail me out of jail because I got myself in trouble for preaching the gospel. But seriously, what if your pastor gets arrested and finds himself in the very same situation as Pastor Coates? Will his family be taken care of? What about other men in the church who will take the reins and lead in the pastor's absence? If things get really bad, where, when and will you even gather as a church? These are questions for generations, that brothers and sisters throughout the world have had to answer, in places where persecution is at its fiercest like China, the Middle East, and Communistcontrolled Russia. Now in 2021, that discussion comes to us here in the West.

Are you a church worth persecuting and are you ready to face it when it comes?

Pray for Pastor James Coates and for the saints that gather at Grace Life Church in Alberta Canada. Pray that we would all remain faithful when the fire of persecution comes and that we would stand, denying all before we ever deny our Lord.

April 2, 1937 - February 8, 2021

Jean Ann Barnhart, a longtime resident of Cashmere, died February 8, 2021 in her home. Jean was born April 2, 1937 to Jesse James Little of Cherokee Heritage and Elsie Josephine Marie Hanson of Norwegian Heritage in Sedro Wooley, WA. Jean's father, among many other things, was a Justice of the Peace and Jean remembered couples coming to her home to get married. Jean helped her mother serve tea and desserts in her home on many occasions. When World War II began in 1941, Jean remembered having sand buckets by the door and blackouts. During the Depression, she would go to the river with her parents to pick blackberries to sell at the feed store. The family pitched in and never went hungry. Jean's mother was a teacher and she occasionally found herself in a class her mother taught. By the age of ten, Jean worked in the strawberry fields and babysat. Movies were fifteen cents and ice cream cones were five cents. She often rode her bike across town to visit her grandmother who was unable to get around much.

In high school Jean was active in G.A.A., Pep Club. Kumtax as Faculty Editor, Language Club, Tri-H-Y, and F.H.A. She was also active in Rainbow S.W. Assembly 36 as pianist, secretary, and received the honorary degree: The Grand Cross of Color. Jean graduated from Sedro Wooley High in 1955 and enrolled at Western Washington College of Education in its School of Nursing. Jean met and became engaged to Roger Barnhart who was a student-athlete there. Roger graduated in 1956 and was in the Army until the spring of 1958. They were married August 3, 1958. Roger began

teaching in Cashmere that fall. Jean finished Nursing School the end of September that year and joined Roger in Cashmere. Her first job was at St. Anthony's Hospital in Wenatchee, WA. Later, St. Anthony's built Rosewood Hospital and moved to that location. Still later, it united with Deaconess Hospital and added on wings and became Central Washington Hospital. Jean was Hospital Nurse of the Year in 1986. In 1995 Jean retired from nursing after 36 and ½ years in the Obstetrics Department as a Labor and Delivery Nurse. Jean seemed to always be recognized by families who remembered that she delivered their baby or themselves who were

delivered by her. Jean loved the time she was able to spend with Roger and her children on their boat in the San Juan Islands. She loved to catch crab, gig for cod, dig for clams, and fish for salmon.



She and Roger even became Scuba Diving Certified. Jean spent countless hours in her garden and caring for her plants. She was also devoted to her Genealogy and spent hours and hours researching her ancestry. Most of the words in this obituary are her own. Jean is survived by her sons, Phil Barnhart of Portland, Mike Barnhart of Wenatchee, and Chris Barnhart of Scottsdale, AZ. She has seven grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren. 




