

Suspect arrested for Nov. 2020 Brewster church fires

BREWSTER – City police officers have apprehended a suspect in a pair of church arson fires that were set in the fall of 2020. Chief Marcos Ruiz issued a media release on March 12 and reported to the city council of March 17 that results from evidence submitted to the Washington State Patrol Crime Lab came back on Feb. 17 and identified the suspect.

“On March 9, 2022, officers of the Brewster Police Department located the suspect. The 27-year-old male was taken to the Brewster Police Department where he was

interviewed and admitted to starting the fires,” said Ruiz. “After the interview, the suspect, Eduardo Martinez-Martinez was booked into the Okanogan County Jail on the charges of Arson two counts.”

The Brewster Fire Department was called out at about 2:30 a.m., Nov. 11, 2020, to a fire at the New Testament Baptist Church at 412 W. Hanson Avenue and found the building fully engulfed. Smoke was also seen coming from the Sacred Heart Catholic Church a block south at 214 Fifth St. S. The Catholic Church sustained minor damage. It was determined that both fires were intentionally set.

Brewster chamber sets the date for Culpepper & Merriweather Circus

BREWSTER – The date is set, and deposit made for this year’s Culpepper & Merriweather Circus that will roll into Brewster for two shows on June 4. The circus last appeared here in 2019 and was a huge hit with the locals and sold out shows for the performers. That was one among many topics on the agenda at the regular meeting of the Brewster Chamber of Commerce, Wednesday, March 16.

Chamber president Mike Mauk said the chamber sold 247 tickets and actually brought in \$1,000 more dollars than the Omak show.

The Brewster City Council approved the chamber’s application for July 4 festivities with a parade and vendors in the park as previously allowed. Parade and vendor ap-

plications are ready and available on the chamber website.

The annual Brewster Salmon Derby has also been approved for the first weekend in August. Tickets go on sale May 1, and Mauk said the salmon run reports are good, so the derby results look promising. Simple Derby is building a new WordPress website for the event. T-shirts have been ordered from an Omak business and will be on sale for \$15. Rick Miller’s Brewster High School graphics class will handle banner printing for derby sponsors.

A new topic on the table was a proposal discussed to set up a scholarship from salmon derby profits for a Brewster graduate continuing education in marine biology or fish and wildlife studies.

The next regular meeting of the chamber is 6 p.m., April 13, at the chamber office in the Senior Center at 109 Bridge St.

Mansfield school celebrates special math day, March 14

MANSFIELD – It was a celebration of all things round at Mansfield High School as teachers and students recognized Pi Day, March 14, a tradition that junior high and high school math teacher Ric Bayless has observed with his classes since 2012.

The date also represents the first three digits of Pi, 3.14. Pi, often represented by the lower-case Greek letter, is one of the most well-known mathematical constants: the ratio of a circle’s circumference to its diameter.

Bayless celebrates the date - which also happens to be the birthday of Albert Einstein - in a big way. Over the years he has challenged his students to a contest to determine who can memorize the most digits of Pi.

“Staci MacDonald won the first annual contest in 2012 reciting 23 digits,” said a school media release. “Austin Hessman, class of 2019, holds the school record after reciting 138 digits his senior year. This year’s winner was sophomore student Evalée Shafer who memorized and recited 50 digits.”

The Pi Day celebration is a tradition at the Mansfield School and many past graduates have fond memories of the yearly March 14 celebration.

Along with the mind, Bayless also enlists the stomach as another way to celebrate Pi Day. Every year he makes a variety of pies, cookies, and a cake in the shape of the Pi symbol. Even the ice keeping the punch cold replicates the Greek letter. Together with the treats there are Pi Day coloring sheets, Pi puzzles, Pi worksheets, a Pi Day computer challenge and even Pi Day songs.

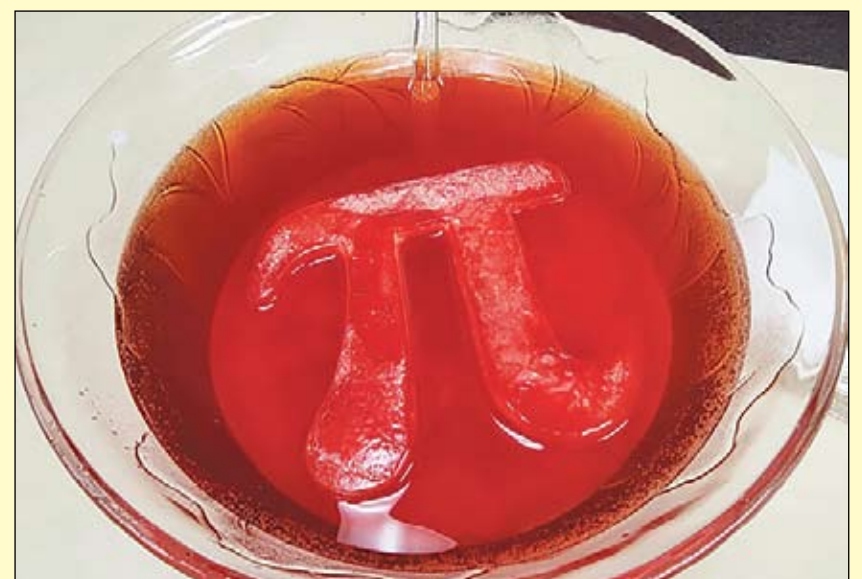
The word “pi” comes from the first letter of the Greek word “perimetros” for circumference. Its value was first calculated by the ancient mathematician Archimedes of Syracuse (287–212 BC). Pi Day itself was the 1988 brainchild of San Francisco physicist Larry Shaw. Congress declared it a national holiday on March 12, 2009.

Pi Day 2015 was special for the ratio’s fans. At 9:26:53 a.m., March 14, the numerical date and time together represented the first 10 digits of pi, 3.141592653. It has been extended to more than 50 trillion digits beyond its decimal point.

Canyon well bid approved

Brewster benefits from \$3 million-plus capital budget appropriations

BREWSTER – The state capital budget appropriation was the elephant in the room at the regular monthly GoTo Meeting of the city council last Thursday, March 17, and for the city it was a pachyderm of plenty.

Thanks to the efforts of 12th District Rep. Mike Steele (R-Chelan) who is the ranking member on the House Capital Budget Committee, Brewster will share a generous portion of the \$10.5 million that Steele negotiated for 12th district projects. Brewster’s allotment includes:

- \$2.8 million for sewer upgrades.
- \$480,000 for a new Canyon well house.

More good news for the city

is \$6 million from the state Department of Ecology (DOE) in the form of half grant, half loan and a \$900,000 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG). Combined the city will receive more than \$9 million in grants and loans of which all but \$3 million is grant money.

Canyon Well awarded

In other business the bids for the new Canyon Well came in higher than the city expected. City engineers J-U-B estimated the contract at \$1.3-1.5 million but the bids ranged from a low of \$1.6 million to a high of \$2.1 million. Then the lowest bidder withdrew leaving the second lowest of \$1.8 million and the one the city accepted.

City clerk/treasurer Misty Ruiz said the higher cost is acceptable provided USDA Rural Development will approve the

additional funding to cover the difference, a strong likelihood. Ruiz said construction can begin as soon as official RD approval is secured. The city has usable supplies for the Canyon site that were left over from the State Way Well where water quality did not meet city standards.

Bargain loader purchased

Following an inspection by public works personnel the city purchased a loader from the state for \$30,000 that new would have carried a price tag of around \$350,000. Council also approved the purchase of a new paint striping machine for \$25,000.

Installation of playground equipment at Columbia Cove Park is partially complete. Douglas County PUD personnel expect to finish the project in the next couple of weeks.

All but two of the varsity players – seniors Adaih Najera and Zane Madden – could return to the lineup next season. Michael Taylor guided the Bears to their ninth state championship in 2020 during his first year as head coach.

Financial institutions seeing sharp increase in scamming to get customers sensitive information

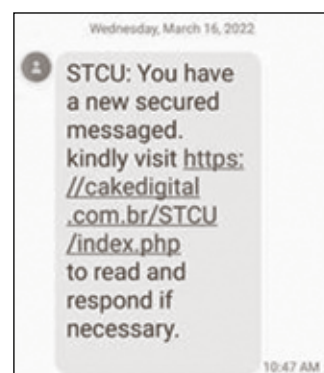
BREWSTER - Financial institutions, including STCU, are seeing a sharp increase in scammers trying to trick consumers into revealing account numbers and other sensitive information.

The attacks are taking the form of bogus emails and texts designed to look like they originate from your bank and credit union. In some cases, fraudsters have taken the additional step of linking to counterfeit websites that can look remarkably similar to a financial institution's website.

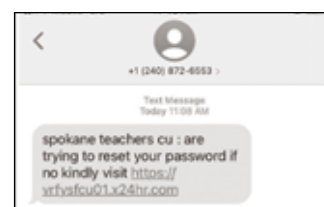
See three examples, with this story, of phishing texts that sharp-eyed STCU members have forwarded to us in recent days. Consumers who use other banks and credit unions are receiving similar attempts.

While many banks and credit unions communicate with their members and customers via text and email, there often are tipoffs that a communication is inauthentic. Consumers are cautioned to avoid unfamiliar web addresses, and beware of illogical word choices, or misspelled words. Most of all: remember that your financial institution will never contact you asking for sensitive information. If you already have an account, then your financial institution knows your account number.

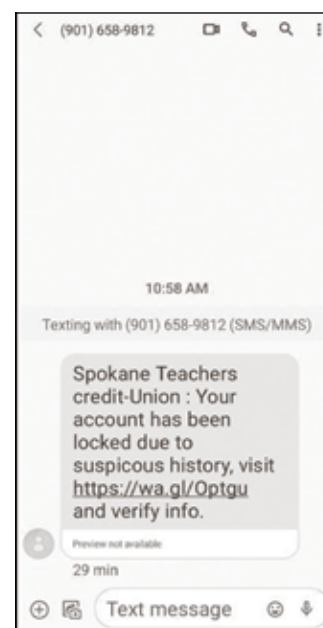
A text can be fraudulent even if it arrives from a phone

number with a local area code. Phone numbers can be masked to appear local.

Consumers who receive unexpected texts or emails that look suspicious should not click links or respond in any way. Rather, if they're concerned their account has been compromised, they should check with their bank or credit union using the contact information found on its website (not one that might have been provided in the suspicious communication). Many members have contacted STCU in recent days, and while it's resulted in longer than usual wait times to speak to an STCU representative, it has kept their accounts safe and secure.

If you've already responded to a text and provided sensitive information, contact your bank or credit union. They will likely suggest that you change the username and login for online banking, and may take other steps as necessary, such as issuing new accounts or debit cards.

EAST WENATCHEE - Douglas County PUD Commissioners Molly Simpson and Ronald E. Skagen executed the following actions during the March 14, Commission meeting held at the District's East Wenatchee office:

Reviewed bid opening results under bid document 22-23-D, Western Red Cedar Transmission Poles. All bids will be evaluated prior to

award recommendation.

Authorized renewal of contract 20-05-W, hatchery well and pump maintenance for an additional one-year period with H2O Well Services, Inc. as allowed by contract. The contract will not exceed \$205,000 and will expire March 31, 2023.

Approved amendment No. 4 of professional service agreement with Electrical Consultants, Inc. Necessary to cover the cost of doing business, this adjusts the rates of the contract as allowed.

Authorized amendment No. 1 to Land Use Agreement No. 20210234 with the Bonneville Power Administration. This adds detailed exhibits for clarification.

Rejected bids under bid document 22-02-D, supply and deliver 1272 ACSR and 1429 ACCC Overhead Conductor. All bids were determined to be non-responsive due to uncertainties in the proposals.

Authorized professional service agreements with Geosyntec Consultants, Inc (22-27-W) and Cyganiewicz Geotechnical LLC (22-30-W), for services related to the Wells Board of Consultants.

Approved execution of an Interlocal Cooperative Agreement for Road Improvements with Douglas County. District electrical and communication facilities will be included in the NW Empire Avenue roadway improvement project. The District's portion of the project is estimated to cost \$300,000.

Established a hearing for Vehicle and Other Charging Rates. The District has a limited supply of power from Wells Dam. Electric vehicles and other large charging loads are expected to use a significant amount of power. To allow for future load growth within Douglas County and moderate the impact of charging loads, the District is considering establishing a separate rate schedule for charging loads. The hearing is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. March 28, at the District's East Wenatchee Office.

Heard a report on the Douglas County Community Network. The network currently has 7,075 end users.

The next regular meeting of the Commission is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. March 28, at the District's East Wenatchee Office.

The Moses Lake Carp Classic

The common carp is considered a trash fish here in the United States and harmful to the lakes, ponds and reservoirs it inhabits but it hasn't always been that way. The carp is a prized catch in Europe and considered good table fare. In the 1800's, carp were brought from Europe to America for both recreational and commercial fishing purposes. According to the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife, they were introduced into the Pacific Northwest in 1880 when a sea captain living in Troutdale, Oregon received 35 German carp from California which he placed in his pond. The carp proliferated and within a year there were an estimated 7,000 carp in the captain's pond. In May of 1881 the carp nursery flooded and several thousand carp escaped into the Columbia River. Fast forward 12 years and commercial anglers were offering to supply carp as fertilizer to farmers for \$5 a ton.

Since that time carp have gotten into lakes and rivers all over the northwest. They are not classified as a game fish but instead as a food fish and no license is required to fish for them with either a rod and reel or a bow and arrow. There is also no limit on how many you can harvest.

Ty Swartout is a member of the Moses Lake Watershed Council and is also the Tournament Director for the annual Moses Lake Carp Classic, a bow fishing tournament that removes a good number of these fish from the lake.

I asked Ty why carp are bad for lakes and other game fish. Swartout replied, "The way they feed is to root through the vegetation on the bottom. The also spawn and thrash in shallow water." He went on to explain that in doing so they kick up the mud and sediment on the lake floor.

This releases chemicals like phosphorus and nitrogen that can contribute to algae blooms. Blue-green algae blooms have become an issue in Moses Lake in recent years and can be toxic to humans, wildlife and pets. The mud the carp kick up also covers eggs from desirable game fish like bass and panfish which have spawning beds in the same areas the carp congregate. This kills the eggs and the gamefish populations suffer.

Swartout says there are an estimated 400,000 to 500,000 carp in Moses Lake. These aren't small fish either. During the last two tournaments the biggest fish brought to the scales weighed between 25 and 26 pounds.

Swartout says he has four goals in mind when it comes to the Moses Lake Carp Classic.

1. To raise education and awareness for the community in regards to damage that carp cause to Moses Lake.
2. To take some carp out of the lake.
3. To work with the state to update laws on the mitigation of carp and the damage they inflict.
4. To provide a fun, safe,

exciting competition with awards provided by great sponsors.

This tournament is put on by the Washington Bowfishing Association. Last year 100 anglers shot out of 26 boats, making it the biggest carp fishing event in the state for 2021. They ended up harvesting 200 carp weighing some 2200 pounds. The tournament before that in 2019 saw fewer anglers but more carp harvested (500). Swartout explains the harvest could reach 1,000 carp if the sun is shining, the winds are light and the water is clear on tournament day.

This year the Moses Lake Carp Classic takes place May 21 out of Connelly Park in Moses Lake. The entry fee is \$60 for all prize categories. The biggest fish brought in will net the winning angler a thousand dollars plus a unique metal art plaque. There are also cash prizes for the Big 10 (the heaviest ten fish weighed in by each team) and for the most fish harvested. Finally, there is a bonus prize of \$300 for the biggest koi brought in. Yes, people have released goldfish into the lake and they have grown over the years.

Swartout says local busi-

nesses in the community are great about supporting this event and donate a number of items that are given away at a raffle at the end of the tournament. Every angler entering the tournament gets one raffle ticket and has a good chance of winning something.

As for the future? Ty Swartout says with the support of the Moses Lake Watershed Council and the Grant County Conservation District they plan on making this a two-day tournament next year which should put even more of a dent into the carp population.

Registration for the Moses Lake Carp Classic takes place between 6 and 6:30 a.m. on May 21 at Connelly Park. 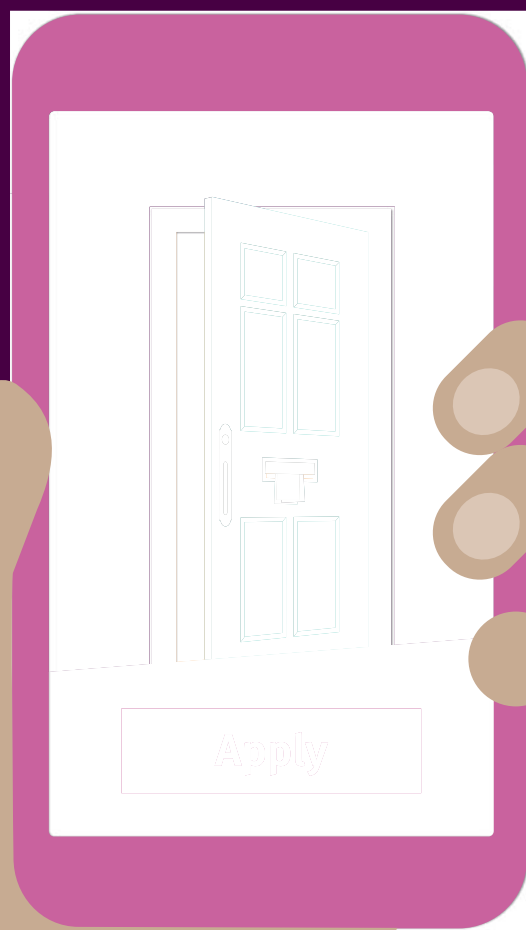
