Milestone investment will infuse nearly \$30 million into local economy

WENATCHEE, WA – Cranes and crews will raise the steel frame of Chelan PUD's new Service Center this spring. The highly visible project is emblematic of major investments the utility is making to ensure long-term value, including hydropower modernization, fiber internet expansion and hardening the electrical grid for wildfire resiliency.

On Monday, Chelan PUD commissioners unanimously approved three resolutions authorizing the next phase of construction for the Service Center. With more than three-fourths of contracts awarded, the project is on track to stay within budget, \$139.5 million.

"This is an important moment in the district's history," Commissioner Randy Smith said after the Jan. 19 presentation to the board.

The PUD plans to award about \$26.7 million in construction bids to local contractors and suppliers – including electrical, asphalt paving, landscaping and concrete supply. The Service Center project will also provide about \$2.5 million in fees and taxes to the City of Wenatchee, Chelan County, and other junior taxing districts.

Staff also gave a progress report on the first construction phase –

excavation and site work – which is on time and on budget. Since August, crews have been busy laying the underground utility and electrical work, and preparing the grounds for concrete foundations on the 19-acre campus. The grand opening is tentatively scheduled for early 2023.

The Service Center as an important investment for several reasons:

- Building new is more cost-effective than remodeling the PUD's scattered, aging facilities
 - A consolidated service center provides one-stop convenience for customer-owners
 - The location is closer to the center of the PUD's service territory
 - Easier access means faster response times from utility crews
 - Service Center aside, most of Chelan PUD's capital budget this year will be dedicated to other initiatives outlined in the 2020-2024 strategic plan, including:
 - Expansion of fiber internet
 - Modernization of aging hydropower turbines
 - Hardening the electrical grid for wildfire resiliency
 - Construction of several substations to meet local demand
- In other news, commissioners:
- Heard a progress report on growth in Chelan County and substations in development.
 - Heard a report on the upcoming relicensing of Rock Island Hydro Project
 - Reviewed the status of several bills under legislative consideration

Cashmere Planning Commission

A combined Cashmere City Council and Planning Commission meeting will be held on Feb. 22 at 6 p.m. Steve Croci, the city's Director of Operations made the announcement at the Planning Commission's Feb. 1 meeting. The Zoom meeting is open to the public, specific topics to be discussed include: options for increasing the number of connections to the city's wastewater system. Possible options include annexation and/or relaxation of development standards. Additionally the joint meeting will include a discussion about the potential new city codes that would regulate short term rentals (STR). To receive meeting details and login information contact the mayor's office.

In preparation for the joint meeting, Croci explained that development and connection costs reduce the number of homes that choose to hook up to city services. He asked the Commission members to consider that the city's building standards such as requiring curbs, gutters and sidewalks make it too expensive for developers. He asked members to think about if those standards should be kept for all new developments. During the lengthy discussion, commission member Charlie Cruickshank said that a happy medium is important, the city wants to create something nice, but it does have to be affordable. Commission member, Maureen Lewison said that maybe in certain circumstances the standards could be relaxed. Possibly further from the downtown area curbs, gutters and sidewalks may not be as necessary.

Christine Wolman, a planning consultant with Pertee, Inc., told the Commission that there are creative ways that can be used inside of individual developments to reduce costs, such as sidewalks only on one side of the street.

In a follow-up to previous discussions about creating new city codes to regulate accessory dwelling units, the Commission voted unanimously to send their recommendations onto the city council for their consideration.

Due to concerns throughout the county about STR, and a recent proposal by the county that may impose new regulations on these properties, the Planning Commission has been considering new STR codes for the city. Initially they were considering limiting STR to the business district. However, after receiving a public comment from Paul and Megan Kinser, who proposed allowing the rentals within residential areas, as long as certain requirements were met, the Commission is

reconsidering its position. The Kinser's suggested that the owner must live on the premises, quite hours would be regulated, no more than two vehicles would be allowed and the permit could be revoked if noise or other disturbances occurred. Mr. Kinser, who is now a member of the planning commission, said he has a vested interest in rentals and would abstain if a vote is required. He said they did not want to rent out monthly because when family or friends come to town he can provide them with a place to stay. Croci and Kinser both said that bringing in tourists who stay in STR can help stimulate the local economy. Cruickshank said he did not want to limit people's ability to create income. The Commission decided that possible options for the proposed code be sent to the Council for discussion at the joint meeting. Specific discussion points will include: grandfathering in existing STR, business license

requirements, owner living on site, parking and quality control.

A public hearing was held at the Commission's Feb. 1 meeting, to receive input about the proposed updates to the city's Shoreline Master Plan, but no comments were given by the public. Wolman told the Commission that a joint state and local public hearing will be held at the Mar. 1 meeting at 5 p.m. She added that the state has reviewed the updates and has asked for a few minor changes which she has made. These were in regards to Critical Areas and docks built within Cashmere.

Croci, told commission members that over the past few weeks there has been a substantial increase in interests in property and development within the city. These include the development of a 48 unit apartment building, development of four lots near Bethlehem and Tree Top and interest in the port property.

The Washington Outdoors Report

February Is For The Birds!

Bird hunting season is over for the most part but bird watching season is in full swing with several opportunities and events taking place this month around Washington State.

No matter where you live you can participate in the annual Great Backyard Bird Count. Taking place between February 12 and February 15, it's easy to be part of this citizen science project. Simply spend 15 minutes or more on any one of these four days watching birds and report what you see at www.backyardbirdcount.org. As the name of the event implies, many of these observations take place in the backyard, watching birds come and go from bird feeders. However, you are not limited to your yard. You can participate in any place you choose to go to.

If you are looking for some ideas about where to go consider some of the

National Wildlife Refuges located in Eastern Washington. The Little Pend Oreille (near Colville), Turnbull (near Cheney), Columbia (near Othello) and Toppenish National Wildlife Refuges all offer outstanding bird habitat allowing you to see everything from waterfowl to shorebirds to song birds, upland birds and raptors.

With hunting season over, our state wildlife areas also afford excellent bird (and wildlife) watching opportunities this week. One of the best to visit is the Columbia Basin Wildlife Area. At 160,000 plus acres this state land covers a good portion of rural Grant and Adams Counties and offers everything from desert habitat to wetlands to creeks, rivers and lakes offering a wide variety of habitat for birds throughout the year. Numerous other state wildlife areas also offer uncrowded access to wildlife watchers this month. You can

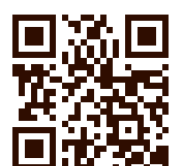

Hazardous Waste Disposal for Small Businesses

Chelan County businesses in need of hazardous waste disposal must pre-register to participate in the Chelan County Small Quantity Generator Event by February 24. The event, which will take place on March 3rd, is an opportunity for local businesses to dispose of hazardous wastes, often at reduced costs.

Businesses that accumulate up to 2,200 pounds of hazardous wastes per year at their place of business may qualify as a Small Quantity Generator. Those businesses must pre-register to be eligible to participate in the event. To pre-register for the event, contact Chelan County Public Works (509) 667-6415 by February 24. Is the shot in the arm ethical?

As the COVID-19 vaccine makes its way across the country at "warp speed", many are now breathing a sigh of relief. The "miracle" of this clinically untested, rushed concoction produced by Big-Pharma has the nation hopeful for the future that finally, we can put the pandemic behind us and return to our normal lives.

Yet, the forever pessimist and contrarian that I am, I do not share in the optimism. The roll-out of the vaccine is not something

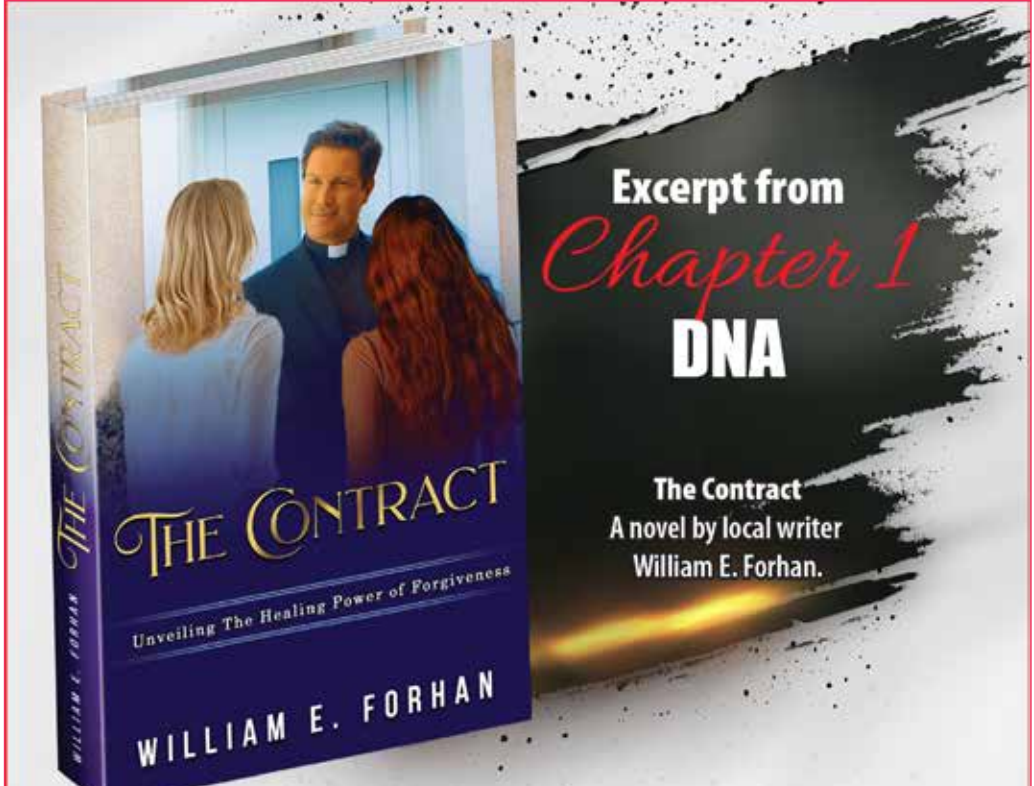
that I particularly rejoice in because it presents before Christians a host of ethical conundrums. To get this completely out of the way, I am not what you would consider an "Anti-Vaxxer". I do not despise medical science nor do I take for granted the grace of God that is modern medicine. I am thankful that due to modern discoveries and innovations in medicine, mothers can have their children with little to no risk and that polio and smallpox are a thing of the past.

With all that being said, the COVID-19 vaccines that have been developed and are being administered in your community aren't a wonder of modern medicine. Instead, they are a grotesque example of body harvesting, manipulation, and frankly, are far from a miraculous cure for COVID-19. For instance, the vaccines that are in play today, use fetal cell lines known as HEK-293. These cells trace their origin back to 1963 and were taken from an aborted Caucasian male child from the Netherlands. Also, vaccines use tissue (HeLa) taken from an African American woman named Henrietta Lacks, who

although was dying of cancer, her cells were used without her permission thus making it even more ethically problematic. Ask yourself, Christian, does taking tissue from an African American woman without her consent and using cells from an aborted fetus line up with a Biblical understanding of ethics and morality? However, I find that line of thinking reprehensible. There is not one justification in the Bible where it gives license to commit evil and then turn around and use that evil for the love of our neighbors. For example, how ethical would it be if someone murdered their neighbor, dismembered their body, and then donated the organs to charity? Sure, so-and-so received a new kidney or a new heart, but it was at the expense of an innocent life taken. Regardless of time or proximity, the vaccine wouldn't have happened without an innocent child being murdered and a black woman taken advantage of.

Or if we decide to take it, are we implicitly communicating that we are in favor of and justifying child sacrifice, of which God overtly condemns and considers abominable (Lev. 18:21, 20:1-5)? Despite all the hype, societal pressure, and the overwhelming propaganda surrounding the vaccines, Christians are to have a principled renunciation and resist every form of evil. We have to agree with what the Bible says regarding the ethical treatment of our neighbors and not give sanction for the harvesting of tissue by way of desecrating life and rejecting God-given human dignity. What was done to that child in 1963 and Henrietta Lacks was wrong and I hope that we are all in agreement. Furthermore, justifying their murder and exploitation to produce a vaccine that will not—and I repeat—will not solve or cure the pandemic is also unethical. In whatever decision you make about the vaccines, the Bible needs to inform your ethics, not other people's ideas regarding the "greater good."



Most mothers can tell you the moment their child was born. It's not the same for fathers. But I can tell you precisely the moment I met my daughters. It was 2:46 on a Sunday afternoon in October.

I had rushed back from church and just sat down to watch the game of the week. My Denver Broncos were playing their most despised of opponents – the Oakland Raiders. My game was interrupted by a knock on my front door. My wife had taken our two sons to help her with grocery shopping. So I had to get up from my game to respond to that irritating knock. I opened the door to two attractive young women. They seemed surprised. "You're a priest?" one queried.

In my rush to watch the game I had not removed my clerical collar. "Well, yes I am," I responded. Fully expecting they were a couple of young evangelists looking to tell me about the gospel.

There was a sudden and distinctly deafening pause. "Can I help you?" I finally said. They looked at each other. Then almost in unison burst out, "We think you're our father!" In an instant twenty-three years of guilt and remorse overcame me. I could not help it. Tears poured out like a river. My heart began to pound and I could not hear a sound. We looked at each other for what seemed like an eternity. None of us knowing what to say next, but I knew in my heart they were correct.

Betty's Big Heart "A True Miracle"

On Tuesday, Oct. 27, 2020, Andrya Dodson and Lester Stoltz had a routine ultrasound of their 33-week-old unborn baby, Betty Ann Stoltz. It was discovered she had an enlarged heart. Early the next day, Lester and Andrya arrived at the University of Washington Medical Center in Seattle to undergo further testing. The tests revealed that Betty had severe Cardiomyopathy, causing the left ventricle of her heart to expand and develop incorrectly. Betty would not be able to survive an immediate C-section at this time.

After consulting with the team of doctors from the University and a team from Children's Hospital in Seattle, the decision was made that Betty would be safest if she was left to grow to 37 weeks.

On Nov. 16, Andrya and Lester left their home in Leavenworth to settle in Seattle. Allowing them to be near the two medical centers, UW Medicine and Children's Hospital, to help with Betty's needs when she was born. Upon their arrival, the doctors recommended that Andrya maintain her pregnancy to 39 weeks, giving Betty the opportunity to grow and get stronger. Andrya and Betty were closely monitored for the

next two weeks.

On Dec. 3, Andrya started the labor process. After 2 days of labor, it was decided to deliver Betty through a C-section. Betty was born on Dec. 5 and weighed 6lb 10 oz. Betty required immediate life saving measures. She was intubated and then immediately moved to Seattle Children's Hospital where a team of doctors were waiting to see to her needs.

Lester accompanied Betty to the hospital while Andrya stayed behind to recuperate from the C-section. From the moment Betty was born, she required medical interventions to help her sustain life while waiting for a heart transplant. In the weeks that have followed Betty has had many medical procedures and surgeries done. Even with this, Betty remains strong and continues to fight for her life.

What is normally routine for a healthy baby causes undo stress on Betty and her heart. She fights through the diaper changes, bathing, feeding, being very susceptible to stress and reacts to it. Even with all this, she continues to fight and live. Andrya and Lester take turns being at Betty's side. They could not both be there due to the COVID virus. They continue to maintain their positive attitude and are juggling the many challenges still facing them. While we

continue to pray for Betty, the Stoltz family needs your help. Your generous donation to COTA (The Children's Organ Transplant Association) in honor of Betty, no matter how big or small, will allow COTA to help this wonderful family during this difficult and unprecedented time.

Republican senators announce formation of 'Freedom Caucus'

To speak for individual liberties, restrained, responsible government, will advocate lower taxes, greater freedom, rights guaranteed by Constitution, issue-oriented caucus will be voice for life, liberty and prosperity, and will ensure conservative voice is heard.

OLYMPIA – Freedom is the watchword for the new Senate Freedom Caucus, announced Thursday by lawmakers

to advocate for lower taxes, responsible state spending, individual liberties and a government that gets out of the people's way.

The Freedom Caucus will advocate for core conservative principles. Sen. Doug Ericksen, R-Ferndale, said the new caucus will tackle big-picture issues that often cannot be encompassed by broader political caucuses that must represent a wide variety of views.

"We need to take a stand for lower taxes, less government regulation and respect for people's constitutional rights," Ericksen said. "Some of us wish to speak more strongly about these issues than others. The people need a voice for freedom in Olympia, and that voice will be the Freedom Caucus."

The Freedom Caucus, announced at a news conference Thursday, will put its emphasis on the direction

and role of government. Key issues include the rights of the individual guaranteed by the Constitution, with a particular emphasis on the economic freedoms that underpin the free-market economy. Top concerns include the sweeping agenda being pushed by Gov. Jay Inslee and majority Democrats this year as the public is excluded from Olympia by COVID precautions. Also of concern are arbitrary edicts

from the governor's office regarding the shutdown of the Washington economy, and the lack of public input into decision-making.

Founding members of the Freedom Caucus are Ericksen, Sen. Phil Fortunato, R-Auburn, Sen. Mike Padden, R-Spokane Valley, and Sen. Jim McCune, R-Graham.

"Never has the need for a Freedom Caucus been so great," Fortunato said. "Legislative Democrats this year are pushing one of the most radical agendas in Washington history. While the public is forced to stay home, a narrow band of urban activists are pushing an income tax, measures to increase gas prices, and legislation to erode the people's rights under the Constitution. Rather than working to make these bad ideas somewhat better, we need to draw the line and make

ourselves heard. We don't want to throw a drowning person a life preserver. We want to pull people out of the water."

Padden said, "During these unprecedented times, it is more important than ever that we stand up for the people of this state. They want their right to petition their government, speak their mind, protect their families and communities, and make a living to be defended. They want their rights to initiative and referendum kept intact. They need relief from crushing taxes and stifling duplicative regulations. More than anything else, they want their elected officials to hear them and reflect their will.

"It is my hope that, through the Freedom Caucus, we will be able to focus like a laser on these issues and move the ball further down the field towards liberty and justice."

Republican state senators start 'Freedom Caucus'; 12th District's Brad Hawkins prefers 'general' focus
