Cashmere Planning Commission

The Cashmere Planning Commission (CPC) voted to approve recommendations for new codes that will regulate Accessory Dwelling Units (ADU) and Short-Term Rentals (STR). The draft codes will go to the City Council for their consideration and a public hearing will be held to receive citizen input prior to the adoption of any code changes. The CPC also voted to keep the city's code that does not allow chickens on lots less than 1 acre.

The new ADU code includes a requirement that the owner live onsite for more than 6 months out of the year, a requirement for two off-street parking spaces and that the ADU may not be rented for a term of less than 30 days. The CPC voted to remove a requirement for an annual certification for ADU owners. Prior to the unanimous vote approving the code recommendations, the CPC discussed at length if the owner should be required to live on site and if there should be an annual certification requirement. Council member Paul Nelson said that from a law enforcement stand point it is beneficial to have a land-use ordinance and when the owner is not living on-site there is no thought to the tapestry of the neighborhood, but the logistics of certification and enforcement are important. He added that ADUs may be an opportunity to help address the City's needs for affordable housing. Member Charlie Cruickshank said he is inclined to allow an owner to do what they want with their property but that he is weighing that against what can happen to neighboring properties. A Cashmere resident addressed the Commission and told them that his neighbors have had people living in multiple trailers on their property and that people are renting out their garages and doing crazy things with rentals right in the middle of town. Commission Chair Kirk Esmond said that if someone's neighbors rented out the main dwelling and their ADU to different people every 30 days, someone could potentially have 24 new neighbors in a year. Member Matthew Wahlgren said that he thinks that the owner should not have to live on site and that there should not be an annual certification. He said he has a home with an ADU but wants to buy another piece of property

on which to live and retire. He does not want to have to sell his current home, but would have to, based on the proposed new code. Cashmere's Director of Operations, Steve Croci, asked, what if someone buys up a bunch of properties with ADUs and turns them into rentals?

With very little discussion the CPC unanimously approved the new STR code so that it can be sent to the City Council for its review. Croci said it was straightforward and simple. STRs would only be allowed in the business district and would require 1 off-site parking spot for each STR, plus an additional parking spot for each bedroom over 2 bedrooms. At the Sept. meeting, Croci told the CPC that Cashmere currently does not have a code to address short term rentals (STR). Throughout the county there are problems with large numbers of STR in residential neighborhoods and with these STR's become party houses.

Public hearings to receive citizen input regarding ADUs and STRs have not yet been scheduled.

The CPC voted unanimously to not change the code regulating chickens. A Cashmere resident had previously approached the City Council about revising the city's code so that chickens would be allowed on lots smaller than 1 acre. The Council referred the matter to the CPC. At the previous meeting the Commission had said they would reach out to city residents to get the public's general feeling about the issue. At the Nov. 2 meeting, Esmond said he had talked to a few individuals. Overall he said people didn't seem to have much of a problem with them, but there was some concern about chickens attracting rodents and other animals. Cruickshank said, if chickens are allowed, there should be a limit on numbers and no roosters permitted. Wahlgren said he does like them and does not want chickens in town.

In other business, Christina Wollman, a planning consultant with Pertee Inc., explained to the Commission what their role will be in the process of updating the Shoreline Master Plan. She said that changes are part of the 7 year Periodic Review and that most changes will be based on state statutory changes. The CPC will need to approve a draft plan that will be presented at a public hearing, scheduled for Feb. 1, 2021. Commission members will listen and make changes based on the public comments.

Case counts on the rise again in Chelan & Douglas counties

Chelan-Douglas Health District East Wenatchee, WA - The COVID-19 case count for Chelan and Douglas counties this week climbed back to more than 200 cases per 100,000 people, a number the area has not seen since mid-September.

The current case count is at 240.4 cases per 100,000 people. In the last 14 days, the health district has reported 290 new cases of COVID-19 between the two counties and four new deaths related to COVID-19.

The last time the area was at over 200 cases per 100,000 people was during the week of Sept. 14.

The Washington State Department of Health last week warned that coronavirus activity was intensifying across the state, both on the western and eastern sides of the state. The increases seen locally mimic what is going on around the state, said Dr. Malcolm Butler, health officer for the Chelan-Douglas Health District.

"It is pretty clear now that here in Chelan and Douglas counties, we are rising up into our third wave," Butler said. "From our data, we also can see that locally the 20 to 39 age group is the main group spreading the virus in our community."

The health district reminds the community that it is more important than ever to not stray from masking, social distancing and other COVID-19 precautions.

"Responsible gathering will play a key factor in how our case numbers grow in the coming weeks," Butler said. "Our hospital is not overburdened with COVID patients. Let's work hard to keep it that way."

The health district recommends wearing a mask around people you don't live with (even close friends and family) and limiting the number, size and frequency of gatherings. Wash your hands frequently, get your flu shot and stay home if you're sick.

Outdoors News Round-Up

Wolf news, trout fishing, an update on razor clam closures and news from our state parks makes for an interesting round-up of outdoors news in Washington this week.

WOLVES: On Oct. 29 the U.S. Department of the Interior declared victory on the effort to recover Canadian gray wolves in the lower 48 states and removed them from the federal endangered species list. Nearly exterminated by the mid-20th century, there are now some 6,000 wolves distributed across states surrounding the Great Lakes, the Rocky Mountain West and the Pacific Northwest. The move puts management of wolves in the hands of individual states and while some conservation groups like the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation and Boone and Crockett Club have come out in support of this, a number of environmental organizations are (pun intended) howling mad and lawsuits are already being filed to keep federal endangered species protections in place for these animals.

In Washington State there are at least 145 wolves in 26 packs, the

majority of them located east of the Cascades and the highest density of them found in Northeast Washington. Asked about the implications of this federal delisting, Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife spokesperson Staci Lehman replied that wolves remain protected in Washington (as a state endangered species) so there will be no major changes right away. Lehman went on to say, "Our focus will stay the same - to continue recovery efforts of wolves

statewide and to reduce conflicts between wolves and livestock."

TROUT: With salmon opportunities waning in Eastern Washington, it's a good time to turn back to trout fishing and the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife is stocking several lakes around the state with catchable sized rainbow trout. East of the Cascades, Rowland Lake in Klickitat County will be stocked with a healthy number of jumbo-sized trout. In Chelan County, Fish Lake and

Roses Lake were stocked at the end of October with catchable rainbows. In Douglas County, Putters Pond in Rock Island and Jameson Lake were stocked with some 5,000 trout each. In Okanogan County, Alta, Pearygin, Rat and Patterson Lakes were also stocked at the end of October with several thousand rainbow trout each. Finally, in Grant County, Potholes Reservoir was stocked with 3,000 rainbows and Windmill Lake with 1500 in mid-October. There were no trout plants in Ferry or Stevens Counties in October and none scheduled for November. However, Lake Roosevelt historically provides excellent rainbow trout fishing in the fall.

RAZOR CLAMS - PART 2: Razor clam digs scheduled for Nov. 13 through 19 have been cancelled due to Covid-19 concerns but due to high levels of a marine toxin called domoic acid that makes them unsafe to eat. This toxin has now been found in clams on all four of Washington's razor clam beaches from the Olympic Peninsula to Long Beach. Larry Phillips, the Coastal Region Director for WDFW, says, "It is entirely possible that we will see higher than safe levels, even into December."

STATE PARK FREE DAYS AND A FAREWELL: If you are looking to visit one of Washington's State Parks on the cheap, you can do so for free two days this month. Veteran's Day (Nov. 11) and Black Friday (Nov. 27) are both days where no Discover Pass is needed for a day visit to any of Washington's 100 open State Parks. Having said that, if you are looking to increase your visits to our state park system in 2021 ask for a Discover Pass for Christmas. For \$35 you can visit any of our parks any day you want to as well as our Department of Fish and Wildlife Areas and access sites.

In other news from Washington State Parks, longtime Director Don Hoch will be retiring on March 2, 2021. Hoch has worked for Washington State Parks since 2004 and has been the Director of the agency for the last ten years. This well-respected leader plans to move to Georgia to spend more time with his family. A search for a new director will begin this month.

WENATCHEE -- Trent Mortensen, Veteran Navigator in the Chelan County Veteran Service Office, wants all veterans to know about a special Veterans Day tribute at The Bunker, aka NCW Vets Serving Vets, located at 1210 N. Wenatchee Ave.

"This Veterans Day we will set up a BBQ grill outside The Bunker in Wenatchee and starting around 11:30 a.m. any Veteran that wants to drive up and pass through we will give a hot dog and bottled water to thank them for their service. We hope to see everyone at The Bunker! We will go until the hotdogs run out!" Mortensen said.

The Bunker's main area of support: Veteran camaraderie (coffee, games, conversation), assistance with the Veterans Affairs system. According to Mark Harle, one of the founders 11 years ago and the current club secretary, "Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we no longer give out food or clothing, but we are still here for any vet who may need someone to talk to, a hot cup of coffee or to just enjoy the

camaraderie," said Harle.

Harle is especially interested in attracting younger vets from Desert Storm (Gulf War), Iraq and Afghanistan conflicts to the non-profit organization.

"All vets are welcomed here, you don't have to be a Vietnam, Korea or WWII veteran to visit and chat, play board games or just enjoy the company of others," Harle said.

"I understand most younger vets have families to support and so are busy with their jobs, but they always will have The Bunker as a safe retreat to relax, to unwind and to seek assistance with various Veterans Affairs programs. We specialize in referral services for whatever the need."

Longtime volunteer Kathy Honeycutt said, "The Bunker represents the finest volunteers in Wenatchee. It is a safe haven for vets and they always give of their time. You won't find a better group."

Honeycutt is the daughter and granddaughter and former wife of veterans.

This organization does not have any restrictions on where a veteran may currently live, what branch they were in or what they did in the military, according to Harle.

Consequently, the Mayor of Chelan, Bob Goede, a Vietnam vet as well as many residents of Cashmere and Leavenworth frequent the club.

Because of the club's non-profit status, Harle welcomes donations from private citizens, other non-governmental organizations (NGOs) as well as corporate sponsors.

"Some veterans service organizations like the Disabled American Veterans (DAV), the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) and the American Legion, have specific criteria in order to become a member, but this Veterans Hall will be open to all vets."

WENATCHEE, WA – Keith McLaughlin's training began in the engine room of a nuclear-powered destroyer as it travelled the Caribbean, Mediterranean and Libyan coast in the 1980s.

Then, McLaughlin served as an electrician in the U.S. Navy. Now, he's a senior systems operator who manages the electrical grid for Chelan County PUD.

"The military taught me a lot about personal accountability and to have personal pride in your job," McLaughlin said. "It got me going down a good path and gave me a trade."

After his service, he spent 22 years working for power companies in Arizona and Vancouver, Wash., He moved to the Wenatchee area last year to work for the PUD.

The PUD employs 119 men and women veterans who represent every branch of military service. About 15 percent of the PUD's workforce are veterans, including linemen, dispatch, mechanics, parks management and fish and wildlife staff.

The PUD is also a training site for veterans re-entering the civilian workforce. The PUD Human Resources department partners with WorkSource to develop and deliver programs, including job shadowing, mentoring and mock interviews.

"Veterans often have the experience from their service that we're looking for at the PUD," said Ruth Erwert, recruiting program manager for Chelan PUD. "We try to find a direct connection from their past experience to work at the PUD."

For Craig Bernhardt, his

journey to becoming an apprentice hydro mechanic at Chelan PUD began in 1997 as a combat engineer in the U.S. National Guard. Bernhardt helped infantry overcome obstacles by building bridges and sweeping minefields, and he learned how to operate heavy machinery.

"I like working with my hands," Bernhardt said. "It was the right job at the right time. I joined when I was still in high school, and it was a good way to learn

skills and it sent me in the right direction."

While working at the PUD, Bernhardt is also studying to become a journeyman hydro mechanic. He is on track to complete his apprenticeship in 2023.

"The best thing about being a hydro mechanic is the variety of work," he said. "One day I'll be working in a powerhouse, and the next day at a fish hatchery. The people I work with come from different backgrounds. There's a lot to learn."

2021 will bring more investment in PUD dams, grid, facilities

Chelan County PUD

WENATCHEE, WA – PUD commissioners reviewed a 2021 budget that marches forward with plans outlined in the utility's strategic plan. The budget includes significant investments at the dams, new substations to improve reliability, and new metering technology for better customer service.

Overall, the PUD's financial outlook remains strong. Staff

expect flat revenues and a 1 percent increase in net expenses compared to 2020, resulting in a forecasted \$55 million bottom line. The budget includes paying down debt, and reducing the debt ratio from 30 percent this year to under 25 percent in 2021.

The PUD plans to spend about \$195 million on key capital projects that support the strategic plan, including:

- Construction of a new

Service Center at Olds Station

- Remodels at the Discovery Center, and other facilities at Rocky Reach and Rock Island
- Maintenance and modernization of power-generating units at Rocky Reach and Rock Island dams
- Construction of distribution substations in Wenatchee, Leavenworth and Chelan
- Advanced metering roll-out for better reliability and customer service

The annual budget priorities are part of a five-year business plan, which commissioners reviewed Oct. 5.

The second public hearing for the 2021 budget will be Nov. 16, followed by a board vote on Dec. 7.

In other news, commissioners:

- Heard a report about the process to re-issue a special permit from the U.S. Forest Service for the McKenzie-

Beverly transmission line (1:51)

- A report about fish quality and hatchery operations by Fish & Wildlife staff (1:08)

- Heard a report about maintenance repairs at Tumwater Dam fishway in November and December. (03:04)

- Nov. 5, 2-6 p.m. – Wellness event with Parques Padrinos, Methow Park

- Nov. 16 -- Commission meeting, 10 a.m., virtual meeting

The black hole of refill requests

Q: My doctor's office won't refill my prescriptions over the phone. They always want me to contact my pharmacy instead. But when I went to pick up my refill yesterday, the pharmacy said it wasn't ready because they hadn't heard back from my doctor yet. But I requested it almost a week ago! When I called my doctor's office to complain, they said they'd already faxed the refill 3 days ago. My pharmacy insists they've never heard back from my doctor. Who's telling the truth?

These days, it's "don't call us, call your pharmacy" for any medication refills. You get caught in the middle when your pharmacy and doctor's office claim it's the OTHER party who's not responding. Trouble is, when you run out of medicine, it's now YOUR problem.

Doctor's offices want refill requests faxed directly from your pharmacy instead of from you for several reasons. First, a refill request from your pharmacy not only has the most current information about your medicine but also WHICH pharmacy to send it to. Ever use more than one pharmacy? Many people do, and sending a refill to the wrong pharmacy is a sure way to keep your refill from being done on time.

Second, faxing a refill request to the doctor doesn't interrupt the nurse or doctor's work. When you call, they have to stop what they're doing to answer the phone, listen to you state your request, write it down or type it, then send it on to the doctor for review. It may not seem like very much time, maybe 2-3 minutes per call, but multiply that times the number of medicines many people take, and it adds up fast.

Finally, suppose you saw a cardiologist for a heart problem or were seen in the ER or an urgent care center recently. The refill you're requesting today may not be the same medicine, dose, or directions as what your doctor currently has on file for you. As a pharmacist, I often see medications coming from 3 or more doctors on the list of prescriptions we fill for our customers.

In a perfect world, your pharmacy faxes the doctor's office with your requested medicine along with the date last filled and quantity you received. Your doctor reviews it, then responds with any

changes or additional refill instructions. The nurse faxes this back to your pharmacy, who fills it, puts it aside for pickup, or mails it out to you. How does your pharmacy and doctor's office get into the blame game of, "We've already faxed it" or, "The doctor's office hasn't responded yet." What goes wrong?

Today's medical charts are electronic files inside a computer instead of stacks of colored folders. Electronic faxing is more convenient because it can be done directly from your electronic chart by

just clicking a button. Years ago, refill requests were faxed back by walking up to a fax machine, sticking a piece of paper into it, then entering the number of the fax machine you're sending it to. When you hit the SEND button, you'd get almost instant confirmation that your fax was transmitted successfully.

Today's electronic faxes go to a central holding area and then wait in line to be transmitted to their final destination. Electronic faxes show that you've successfully SENT the fax. Unfortunately, they cannot confirm that it ARRIVED successfully at

its final destination. Sadly, electronic faxes go missing every day, sucked into some mysterious black hole in the universe, showing up days later or never arriving at all.

That's why there's finger-pointing between the pharmacy and your doctor's office, each claiming, "We've already faxed it!" when you ask why your refill isn't ready. Here's how to avoid that:

3 Tips to Getting Your Medication Refilled in a Timely Manner:

1. Ask for a 90-day supply.

You'll need fewer refills, which means fewer chances to

run out.

2. Call ahead of time.

Contact your pharmacy for a refill several days before you run out of medicine, so they have time to fax your doctor. If you deal with a mail-order pharmacy, allow at LEAST 1 week of lead time to enable additional mail delivery time.

3. Ask for a 90-day supply.

Don't assume your refill is ready. Call 1-2 days after requesting your refill to confirm your refill. If not, check to make sure they are faxing the correct doctor and ask them to re-fax. If a second fax is not responded to, call

your doctor's office and explain your situation.


