

Primary election indicates Dem’s may be vulnerable

Political perspective

It’s no surprise that the incumbent governor and District Congressional Representative captured the most votes in the primary election. The question is, how strong is their performance against a single Republican

challenger in the General election? Gov. Inslee won the statewide election with a narrow 50.3% of the voters who turned out. Other Democrats on the ballot drew 3% away from Inslee. It is unclear at this time if that is because they are disenchanted with Inslee and the Democrats. Schrier led the race in her bid for re-election, but she only drew

42.7% of the vote. Republican challengers collectively captured almost 50% of vote. With clear evidence that this is a house seat that may be up for grabs in November, there is likely to be a huge push by both parties. In the race for Lieutenant Governor the top two system will see two Democrats running against each other in the General.

Denny Heck will face off against Marko Lias. Heck essentially ran a campaign against President Trump. Heck decided not to run for re-election to the House of Representatives and run for Lt. Governor instead. At a time the Democrats are desperately trying to hold on to their majority in Congress it is certainly curious. Political operatives on the west side have surmised that Heck is expecting Biden to win and tap Inslee for a

cabinet position. Heck would then assume the role of Governor. At this point it looks like the election for Chelan County Commissioner is the only race that is still in contention. In this point Tiffany Gering leads Brandt Cappell by 132 votes with 337 ballots left to count for the second spot on the ticket for the general election. Voter turnout was 47% statewide and 59% in Chelan County. Detailed charts of the top election results can be found on page 5.

Primary gives Culp the nod in Republican gubernatorial race

OLYMPIA – As of Friday, August 7, two term Governor Jay Inslee easily won his party’s support for a third term. He will face Loren Culp, a surprise winner of the Republican primary, who defeated Tim Eyman and Joshua Freed among dozens of other rivals. Culp’s victory announcement was held in Plain, unbeknownst to local residents, but reported on by Seattle’s King 5 television news on

primary night. The tally was: Inslee with 1,074,988 votes for 50.33%. Loren Culp received 370,596 votes for 17.35% of the total. Chelan County gave a slight nod to incumbent Inslee and Attorney General candidate incumbent Bob Ferguson. Culp, Republic (Ferry County) police chief outpolled Inslee in Okanogan, Douglas and Grant counties. In Chelan County, Inslee received 5,095 votes to 4,527 for Culp. In the Eighth Congressional District, Democrat incumbent Rep. Dr. Kim Schrier easily defeated

all comers. The Republican challenger is Jesse Jensen who won over Keith Swank for a place on the November ballot. Jensen received 43,460 votes or 22.66%, Keith R. Swank got 38,556 votes or 19.74%. In other local races and referendums of note: Dale England and Tiffany Gering, both Republicans, will vie for the Chelan County Board of County Commissioners District 3 seat come November. Gering staged a come from behind victory over primary night rival Brandt Cappell, who, as of Tuesday night, had a slight lead, but when the

smoke cleared Friday night, Gering was victorious. England received 41.58% (3,753 votes) for the overall primary victory followed by Gering’s 29.94% (2,703 votes) for second place. Cappell tallied 28.48% (2,571 votes) for third place. The district includes Stehekin, Chelan, Manson, Entiat and parts of Olds Station in Wenatchee. The Lake Chelan Community Hospital EMS renewal levy easily passed with 3,120 votes for vice 1,242 against, equaling an approval rate of 71.53%. The passage secures funding for about half of the operational costs,

also allowing for replacement of outdated equipment. The new levy amount would be taxed at a rate of .39 cents per \$1,000 of assessed property value for the next 10 years. This is up from the current rate of .31 cents. The levy takes effect in 2021. *About Election Results Reporting: Results are updated when a county reports new tabulation results. Results are certified by each county on August 18. The Secretary of State certifies final results by August 21. The results posted before certification are unofficial.*

Fire Precaution Levels, Fire Danger Ratings Increase in Eastern Washington

OLYMPIA – Due to the extremely dry, hot weather, the Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announced today the following changes in campfire restrictions, industrial fire precaution levels (IFPL) and fire danger ratings on DNR-protected lands. These changes come on the heels of the statewide burn ban on all DNR-protected lands signed July 28 by Commissioner of Public Lands Hilary Franz. Effective Friday, August 7, 2020:

- Campfires in campgrounds are not allowed in Valley Fire Danger

Rating Area.

- Fire danger will increase from very high to extreme in the Lower Basin Fire Danger Rating Area.
- Fire danger will increase from high to very high in the Foothills, Highlands, Lower Yakima and Upper Yakima Fire Danger Rating Areas.
- Fire danger rating remains extreme in the Valley Fire Danger Rating Area.
- Fire danger rating remains very high in the Chelan, Methow and Upper Basin Fire Danger Rating Areas.
- Fire danger rating remains

high in the Kaniksu Fire Danger Rating Area. Effective Tuesday, August 11, 2020:

- IFPL will increase to Level 3 in zones 609W and 609E.
- IFPL will increase to a Level 2 in zone 680.
- IFPL will remain Level 1 in zones 678E, 685, 687 and 688.
- IFPL will remain Level 2 in zone 675 and 678W.
- IFPL will remain Level 3 in zone 678, 684 and 686.

Burn restrictions remain in place for the following:

- Campfires in campgrounds are

not allowed in Foothills, Kaniksu, Lower Basin and Upper Basin Fire Danger Rating areas.

- Small debris disposal fires (rule burning) are not allowed in Chelan, Foothills, Highlands, Kaniksu, Lower Basin, Lower Yakima, Methow, Upper Basin, Upper Yakima and Valley Fire Danger Rating Areas.
- No burning allowed (written burn permits issued by DNR are suspended) in Chelan, Foothills, Highlands, Kaniksu, Lower Basin, Lower Yakima, Methow, Upper Basin, Upper Yakima and Valley Fire Danger Rating Areas.

Campfires may be allowed in designated campgrounds. Always check with local campground hosts before lighting a campfire. Additionally, always make sure campfires are completely out before leaving them unattended – if it’s too hot to touch, it’s too hot to leave. Counties and local jurisdictions may have additional restrictions. Prime Time For Alpine Lakes Fishing

Looking for a way to cool off during the heat of the summer? Head to a mountain lake and be sure to bring a rod and reel because trout fishing can be fast and furious this time of year!

According to the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife there are some 2550 lakes sitting at an elevation of over 2500 feet in our state. Most are located in the Cascade Mountain Range and while not all of them have fish in them, many do. The primary fish you’ll find in these lakes are rainbow, cutthroat and brook trout.

If you are interested in finding high lakes to fish there are two great resources available. One is the high lakes fishing page at the

Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife website <https://wdfw.wa.gov/fishing/locations/high-lakes>. The other place to go is <http://northwestfishingreports.com>. This popular website is full of fishing reports and is the creation of Mike Carey, an avid alpine lakes angler who has contributed a sizeable body of high elevation lake reports over the years.

When it comes to mountain lakes in our state there are those you can drive to and those you hike to. As you might imagine, drive-in lakes get a good amount of pressure though frequent stockings often keeps the fishing good through the summer. The hike-in lakes are infrequently stocked or have self-sustaining populations of fish. Generally speaking, the further you hike, the better the fishing becomes and quite often, the bigger the fish get.

Assuming you hike in, resist the impulse to cast from the first place you reach where the trail hits the lake. This is the place that sees more angling pressure than anywhere else. Instead, size up the body of water. Look for sunken trees or large rocks that provide cover for trout that are looking to ambush an easy meal. The inlet and outlet streams of the lake are also good bets since both provide food sources for fish.

Lures and flies both work well for alpine trout. I strongly recommend staying away from bait. These lakes are pristine places and discarded jars of eggs, cartons of worms and colorful Powerbait takes away from the natural beauty found around these waters. I also suggest releasing most of the fish you catch. A shore lunch or dinner of trout wrapped in foil and cooked

over a campfire is delicious but if you are not going to eat your fish during your trip let them go. The meat never holds up well after a multi-mile hike and many of these self-sustaining populations of trout are fragile.

With that in mind consider using lures with single barbless hooks. Spinners work quite well (Mack’s Promise Keepers, Blue Fox, Mepps and Rooster Tails are all excellent choices) as are spoons such as Dardevles, small Krokodiles and what may well be the super weapon lure for this kind of fishing, the Acme Kastmaster.

As for fly fishing, if you brought a spinning rod use a casting bubble to get that fly out there into the lake. Dry flies like a Royal Wulff or a Parachute Adams are always good choices but so are streamers and nymphs. Just try to match the

hatch and if you are there when the fish are rising, you’ll likely be in business.

If you are using a fly rod look for a rock to stand on or shallow area you can wade out into so you’ve got enough room to cast for distance. Another way to really get at the fish that are in the deep part of the lake is to pack in a float tube. Several companies make lightweight ones, the lightest of them coming in at three pounds from Wilderness Lite.

Put it all together and you’ve got the information you need to hit the trail, head to an alpine lake, soak up some scenery, and catch some trout this summer!

Todd has also been deeply involved in the NAR (New Apostolic Reformation) that mixes New Age mysticism and pagan doctrines with the Bible. Additionally, he has repeatedly condemned evangelism which shares a Biblical gospel and accuses anyone who would dare call him to a more orthodox perspective concerning sin, salvation, and righteousness as being “demonically inspired”.

Needless to say, Todd White has been way off for years.

But there apparently is a change that can only be described as a work of the Spirit in that man’s life.

In Todd White’s sermon, “God’s Heart for Humanity”, he stood before a crowd with tears in his eyes, saying “I repent for not preaching the whole gospel” and then spent the duration of the sermon preaching just that—the whole gospel. There was a remarkable difference in this man from previous as if now he finally understood what it meant to

Cashmere Planning Commission

The Cashmere Planning Commission’s Aug 3rd agenda included Chickens, Accessory Dwelling Units (ADU) and Short-Term Rentals (STR). Due to the lack of a quorum since only 3 Commission members were present, chickens was the only item discussed. Eva Lorenz, a Cashmere resident, addressed the Commission asking that they consider revising the city code, which only allows chickens on lots 1 acre or larger. Lorenz said she has lived in the area for 6 years but just recently bought a home in Cashmere on a

quarter acre lot and so she cannot have chickens. She told the Commission that other towns in the region allow chickens on small lots. According to Lorenz a lot of people in Cashmere do already have chickens on lots smaller than 1 acre.

For comparison purposes, Steve Croci, Cashmere’s Director of Operations, provided the Commission with the livestock related city codes from Wenatchee, Leavenworth, Entiat and Chelan. Rick Shorett said the city has some really tiny lots and he wants to look more in-depth at lot size requirements. He added that he would not want to allow roosters in the

city. Charlie Cruickshank commented that limiting the number of chickens allowed per 1000 sq. ft. would be something to consider. Christina Wollman, a city planner with Perteet, Inc., said it is common to limit the number of chickens per acre. Leavenworth, Wenatchee, Chelan and Entiat all limit the number of poultry per acre to 12 birds. Maureen Lewison said it would be great to allow more chickens. The Commission said they will look into this further. Lorenz concluded by saying, if people can raise chickens in New York City surely we can have them in rural Cashmere.

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Todd White was a heretic, there is no denying his past. Yet, he has encountered the true and living Gospel and as it stands now, seems to have changed.

Todd White cements more the reality that if God can save a heretic like Todd and bring him to repentance as well as save a wretched sinner like me, delivering me out of the slavery to sin, then God can

save anyone.

Are bailouts the new normal?

The amazingly strong stock market recovery coincided almost perfectly with the first major stimulus package from Congress. Although my clients benefitted greatly from the largesse of the government over the short term, I can’t help but worry about the future.

In one way, this was the perfect time for massive government bailouts, because no one was at fault for this crisis. Yes, you can blame China, or a poor response from our leaders, but the losers of this crisis (tourism, retail, restaurants, airlines...) were losers out of pure bad luck; it’s not that they ran their businesses

badly. Similarly, Netflix, Amazon and Zoom didn’t plan their business model around everyone being stuck in their homes for months – they got lucky. So, if there was ever a time for a bailout, this was it.

On the other hand, whatever happened to having an emergency fund? Shouldn’t a profitable corporation be able to make it through a few lean months without needing taxpayers to bail them out? The more our government bails everyone out when a crisis hits, the more it’s expected. So, instead of responsibly planning for emergencies, the government is the emergency fund. That’s just

not sustainable.

But there are no easy answers. If our businesses overprepare for disasters, they won’t be as dynamic. A tank is very resilient, you’ll reach your destination no matter what. However, a Porsche will get you there a lot faster – but with a lot more risk. So, do we want our businesses to be resilient like a tank, or high octane like a Porsche? Here’s another way to look at it: If I gained 50 pounds, I’d be better prepared for a famine, but less dynamic during the normal times.

Imagine a sober-minded CEO stockpiling cash for an emergency fund over the last decade while every other CEO was showering their stockholders with money through dividends and stock buybacks. That CEO would have been fired long before this crisis made

them look smart. Actually, even then they wouldn’t look smart because everyone else got bailed out.

Right now, our economy is lean, mean and highly efficient, but also so fragile that we need bailouts every 10 years. Obviously, that’s not an ideal situation. However, if we decide to make our economy into a tank, what if China decides to be a Porsche?

For now, the bailouts will continue, and that’s probably for the best. I just hope we can find a better balance between dynamism and resilience in the future.
