Pettoello to paint Cashmere Grads names on the football field

Because of COVID-19 Cashmere High School wanted to do something extra special for the graduates this year. I saw the attached article in The Spokesman-Review on line and called Rogers High School. The secretary gave me the email address for Tom Pettoello and he emailed me back within 5 minutes and said, let's just talk on the phone. I asked him a whole bunch of questions thinking that I would try this myself, and then he said, why don't I just come over and do it for you. We talked a little longer and we found out we had friends in common, small world huh? I talked with my principal, Tony Boyle and he loved the idea. So, we hired him.

We are going to have a professional photographer while he is painting, Photos by Drucille. We have also arranged for a drone to fly over so we can not only

have a beautiful memory of the graduates but capture the moment as well.

Tom Pettoello is coming to Cashmere June 2, at 9 a.m. to paint all 106 names of our 2020 graduates on the Cashmere High School football field.

The following article by Jim Allen from the Spokesman-Review explains more of what Tom does.

In the spring of COVID-19, memories mean a lot more because so many already have been lost.

Small wonder, then, that Tom Pettoello has become the most popular spray-can artist in the West.

One high school football field at a time, Pettoello is creating memories that will last a lifetime for the class of 2020.

Monday found him at Ferris High School, where the football field came to life like some gigantic yearbook page. The school logo, in red and white (or scarlet and

silver, perhaps), appeared above hundreds of names of graduating seniors in foot-high white lettering.

The work is harder than it looks. By one o'clock, Pettoello and assistant Carol McQuaid had toiled for five hours and consumed 40 cans of spray paint, yet weren't even halfway done.

Stooping for every letter, every name, Pettoello admits to getting a bit cranky at the end of the day.

But after going through about 700 spray cans at seven high schools, Pettoello has learned one thing.

"Every name has a story," said Pettoello, an art teacher at Rogers High School.

Even as Pettoello toiled on his massive canvas, the students trickled through. They talked about what's gone missing this spring because of the coronavirus and the closure of school buildings.

This spring, there are no proms, no track meets and no yearbook signings in the hallways. The point was reinforced when a Ferris baseball player – a senior who'll never get to play again – dropped by in uniform.

On the parking lot above the

Herbert Allen Lowers
Herb was born on January 3, 1927, at St. Anthony's Hospital in Wenatchee, WA, to Mr. and Mrs. H.F. "Hap" Lowers. He attended school in Cashmere, graduating in 1944. In high school, he played football and basketball, and was a member of the band/orchestra. He was active in Boy Scouts and attained the rank of Eagle Scout, as did his two sons, Scott and Mike.

Upon graduating, he joined the U.S. Navy and served two years duty in World War II in the South Pacific. Upon his honorable discharge, he enrolled at Washington State College, where he was very active in his Acacia Fraternity and in campus activities. He was honored by being selected for membership in the Senior Men's Service Honorary for his scholarship, leadership, and service to the college – the Crimson Circle. In his words, the highlight of his college days was meeting his future wife, Roberta "Buddy" Frink. After his graduation, Herb and Buddy were married on August 12, 1950, and made their happy home in Cashmere, raising their four children.

He was employed in the fruit industry and served on many industry committees. He was an avid outdoorsman – hunting, fishing, golfing – and was a past president of the Cashmere Sportsman's Association. He was a member of the Cashmere School Board for two terms. He

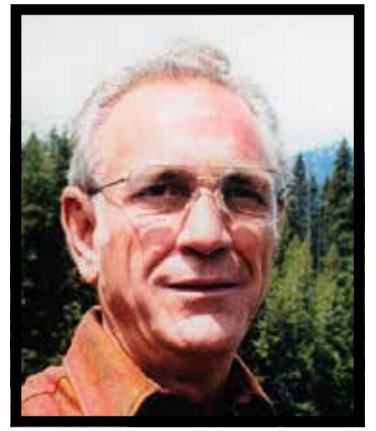

was a 50+ year member of Lions Club International and earned Life Membership and the Melvin Jones Fellowship, the highest recognition from the Lions Club International Foundation from the Cashmere club. He went on to be District Governor, and later was named Coordinator for Eastern Washington, Northern Idaho, and Central British Columbia in the Lions International Sight First program to help rid the world of unavoidable blindness. For his work regarding sight and blindness, he was awarded the Lions top honor, the International President's Award.

Herbert Allen Lowers, 91, passed away peacefully on Friday, October 26, 2018.

Herb is survived by his four children: Scott Lowers, Mike (Shelley) Lowers, Susie (John) Becker, and Janet (Tim) Smith; and his sister, Joan (Dick) Braun. The joy of his life were his ten grandchildren, and 25 great-grandchildren. Nothing brightened his days more than seeing them. He was preceded in death by his loving wife of 66 years, Buddy.

field, Principal Ken Schutz looked on with mixed feelings.

"These seniors have lost a lot," said Schutz, who last month supervised the distribution of yard signs to all 450 Ferris seniors.

That was a nice gesture, all agreed. But after hearing about the magic Pettoello created on the football fields at Rogers, West Valley and five other schools, the parents at Ferris wanted the same treatment.

"Our parents and myself saw the idea, and they ran with it," said Schutz, who planned to spread the news by phone Monday night.

Meanwhile, Pettoello and McQuaid will take a few days off before heading to distant fields in Wenatchee, Cashmere and even California.

"It's a lot of fun," Pettoello said. "And this is great for all the kids, especially the ones who don't get a lot of attention."

"That just makes it even more special," said Pettoello, who finished the Ferris project Monday night. How right he was: Soon after he and McQuaid left, families visited the field, posed for photos and shared a few memories – the kind that won't be forgotten.

Council votes to cancel Riverside Center Lease

In recognition of the hard work and dedication of the Chelan Douglas Community Action Council, the Cashmere City Council and Mayor Jim Fletcher declared May 2020 as Community Action Month.

"It is done!" Steve Croci, Director of Operations, said when referring to the Sherman roof replacement project. The Cashmere City Council then unanimously voted to accept the project as completed. Croci added that some routine maintenance will continue at the reservoir.

Following substantial discussion, the Council voted 3 to 2, to allow the mayor to proceed with negotiations to terminate the lease agreement of the city's Riverside Center. Fletcher said that due to the pandemic, all spring and summer events have been canceled and events scheduled for the fall are also being canceled. The lessee has had no income from

the Riverside Center, since the ordered closure. She has also been refunding money to groups who had already made deposits. The council had previously voted to waive the required monthly rent, but Fletcher said that the lessor still has about \$1500 per month for other operating costs. He said if the city terminates the lease agreement, which is in effect until Dec. 2021, the city would be able to look for others to rent the facility. He added that with the current situation, and likely upcoming recession, it might be difficult to find another good vendor to lease the building. Council member Daniel Scott said that currently the business owner and the city are sharing the burden of the closure and if the city terminates the lease he is concerned that the city will take on all of the burden. He added that taking on risk is part of being a business owner. Chris Carlson said he would prefer that the city negotiate the agreement as best as possible without driving anyone out of business. Jayne Stephenson

said that she felt the city might be worse off by doing a half and half agreement, rather than just terminate the agreement, and look for a new lessee. Dave Erickson made a motion to authorizing the Mayor to negotiate termination of the lease. Council members Scott and Derek Pratt voted against the motion and Stephenson, Erickson, Carlson voted for motion.

The council unanimously approved a service agreement with RH2 engineering firm to improve four crosswalks on Pioneer Ave. The cost for the design is \$20,203.27. Funding for the Safe Routes to School project is from a Washington Department of Transportation grant. The project will include the installation of solar-powered rectangular rapid flashing beacon systems at four locations along Pioneer Avenue. One of the systems will also have an advanced flashing beacon system. The proposed project will include an Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) curb ramp at one of the locations along Pioneer Avenue, the other three

locations already have compliant ramps. According to Croci, four engineering firms responded to the request for proposal to design the project. RH2 was selected as the best qualified to complete the design work. Some council members expressed concern about differences between the contract and the grant, a motion was made to approve the service agreement, with the stipulation that the language in the grant match the contract.

The city has received an \$11,200 grant from the Washington Department of Ecology to review and update the Shoreline Master Plan. The review is periodically required and must be completed by June of 2021. The council unanimously voted to accept the grant and to hire Pertee, Inc. to complete the review and update the plan.

The mayor provided some additional updates to the council. He said that rafters and other boaters are starting to use the city restrooms again. He plans to keep the restrooms with the river open on the weekends. This will require some additional overtime

for employees to maintain the restrooms.

Planning for repairing the pool's substantial leak is ongoing. Previously a number of solutions had been attempted to stop the leaks, but they have been unsuccessful. The city plans to have Pace Engineering put together specs and find a specialist to do some exploratory work to determine how best to solve the leak issue.

Fletcher said the state has allocated \$93,000 dollars for the city of Cashmere. The funds are part of the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act and must be used for COVID related budgetary items. How the funds can and cannot be used is strictly regulated. He will be meeting with the county and other local mayors to discuss options. According to Fletcher the city has very few expenses directly related to COVID but he wants to determine how the city can best benefit from the funds.

In the final progress report of the evening, Croci said he was applying to have two electric vehicle charging stations installed in the city.

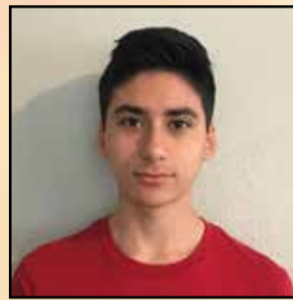

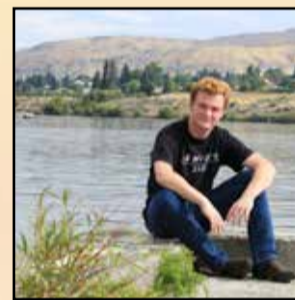

How to relieve itchy eyes

Q: When my allergies kick up, a nasal spray helps my sneezing and runny nose, but my eyes are still red and itchy. Can an eye drop help me?

Years ago, I bought my dream car, a classic jet-black 1985 Jeep CJ7 hard-top. I can still remember a mid-August Saturday afternoon when my husband Charlie and I took the top off the Jeep and drove through the backroads of central Ohio. Moist earth greeted us as we cruised by rows of tall stalks of corn alternating with lush fields of bushy soybeans.

Saturday afternoon was magic, but Sunday morning was a nightmare. When I woke up, my nose was stuffed up nose, and my eyes itched like fire.

What could have set off my allergies? The only thing I'm allergic to is ragweed, and we drove past corn and soybeans.

I hate to tell you, honey, but we definitely drove past ragweed yesterday. I saw TONS of it growing thick in the ditches by the sides of the road.

Aaargh!

If you need to soothe the discomfort of itchy eyes from allergies gone wild, you'll find several eye drops available without a prescription. How do you choose the best one?

Lubricating eye drops can ease the burning and help relieve dryness. Systane®, GenTeal®, or Refresh® help reduce the isand in your eyes feeling



by flushing pesky pollens away, but can't shut down your allergic reaction once it starts.

Decongestant eye drops help your eyes look less red or bloodshot by shrinking the blood vessels in the whites of your eyes. They can help reduce puffiness around your eyelids but don't help reduce allergic reactions.

Naphazoline is the only decongestant eye drop available without a prescription. Sold as Naphcon, it's also available combined with an antihistamine, such as Visine-A® and Naphcon-A® ("A" means antihistamine). Eye drops containing naphazoline can cause trigger dry eyes and aggravate certain types of glaucoma, threatening your vision. Because of this risk, avoid using naphazoline eye drops for more than 3 days at a time. If you have glaucoma, you should avoid using naphazoline eye drops completely.

Antihistamine eye drops help reverse eye itching and swelling from allergies. Pheniramine maleate is an antihistamine available in both Visine-A® and Naphcon-A® eye drops. Because these eye drops also contain the decongestant naphazoline, they should only be used for 3-5 days at a time.

The most effective eye

drops to use when allergies strike is ketotifen. Ketotifen works both by helping prevent an allergic reaction and by calming it down once it starts.

When you encounter something you are allergic to, it triggers a chain reaction leading to redness, swelling, and itching. This reaction is triggered by a chemical called histamine. Your body stores histamine in specialized cells called mast cells. When it recognizes pollen or cat dander as something you are allergic to, these mast cells open up and release histamine into your bloodstream, creating the misery of an allergic reaction.

Medicines called mast cell stabilizers BLOCK this chain reaction from getting started because they keep histamine locked up inside your mast cells. Ketotifen and olopatadine are mast cell stabilizers used in eye drops. Thanks to them, I can drive past ditches full of blooming ragweed without suffering the next day, because they can keep histamine safely inside my mast cells.

Ketotifen and olopatadine have other effects than keeping histamine safe inside your mast cells. They also work as antihistamines to prevent and relieve allergic reactions. Once sold as the prescription drug Zatidor®, ketotifen is also available as Alaway® brand eye drops. Prescription-strength olopatadine (Pataday®) is

now available without a prescription.

Here are 4 Tips on Using Eye Drops for Allergies:

1. Avoid naphazoline eye drops.

Decongestant eye drops don't address the allergic reaction and only reduce redness. Limit your use of naphazoline eye drops to three days at a time, and avoid it entirely if you have glaucoma.

2. Choose ketotifen (Zatidor®) or olopatadine (Pataday®) eye drops for best results.

Ketotifen and olopatadine work both as antihistamines and mast cell stabilizers to relieve itchy eyes. They are also safe to use in children as young as 2 or 3 years old.

3. Use only one drop in each eye.

Any more than one drop at a time will just run out and be wasted. Wait a bit before giving yourself another dose.

4. Keep it clean.

Always wash your hands first and avoid touching the tip of the dropper directly to your eye or to any other surface.

Tournament fishing and humble pie

My fishing partner, Rusty Johnston, and I always considered ourselves to be very good bass anglers. At least, we did until we decided to dip our toes into the world of tournament fishing.

Every September there is an event at Potholes Reservoir called the "Old Fart's Bass Tournament" where at least one of the two anglers in the boat has to be over 40 years old. The rules are simple. Fish for eight hours and weigh in the five heaviest bass from each boat by 3 p.m. All the bass are released after the weigh-in.

Our first foray into tournament fishing didn't go well. We weighed in a five-fish limit but altogether they only weighed three pounds. Yikes! We've fished this annual tournament five times. Our heaviest bag was a five-fish limit weighing 14 ½ pounds. Not bad but not anywhere near a paycheck when the winners routinely weigh in 20 to 25-pound limits.

We've learned a few things along the way. First off, your boat and motor matters. Rusty owns a 1994 16-foot aluminum boat with a 40 HP outboard motor. Top speed? About 29 MPH. The competition? They primarily fish out of 17 to 20-foot bass boats with outboards ranging from 90 HP all the way to 200 HP and they can top out at nearly 60 MPH. When it comes to getting to the hot spot at first light, we don't stand a chance.

Then there's the issue of staying on the hot spot.

Many new bass boats have power poles mounted on the stern that can anchor a boat in shallow waters of less than 10-feet. Other's have trolling motors with a feature called Spot Lock that keeps the boat in place. If you are fishing a piece of structure like an underwater hump you can lock yourself in at the top and fish the slopes where the fish often hang out. As for us? We have an old anchor and a rope. It works but we tend to float away several yards from where the anchor drops, meaning our positioning (and ability to target the fish) is not as exact.

Something else we've found is the need for a modern fishfinder with a GPS plotter and map. We have a basic fishfinder that shows us the bottom and fish but it doesn't have a GPS plotter. During one tournament, we drifted over a habitat box at the

bottom of the lake. These boxes provide cover for bait fish and bass are attracted to these boxes too. We picked up a decent bass as we drifted over the box but with no GPS, we couldn't find that box again despite trying to do so for ½ an hour. At about that time a modern bass boat roared in. Using a way point the anglers had previously marked with their GPS, they went right to that habitat box. In 15 minutes, the anglers on board reeled in five good bass and sped off to the weigh-in site.

That was the moment we realized it was time to upgrade! We can't afford to buy a new boat or motor but we are upgrading to a modern fishfinder. We've ordered a new Lowrance Hook Reveal 7 that has incredible sonar with the ability to see not only what's below with incredible clarity but also a side sonar feature to see

what's on either side of the boat. This Lowrance unit also has a GPS plotter and a Navionics map with topographic information for 11,000 lakes to include Potholes Reservoir. Better still, it's all displayed on a 7-inch color screen and is very easy to use.

We'll spend the summer using this to mark the humps and habitat boxes around the lake that hold fish in the fall. We are also fishing a new event; the Berkley Big Bass Tournament taking place October 3rd at Potholes Reservoir. With our new Lowrance and a little luck, we might finally take home a paycheck. Then, we can go back to believing we are as good of anglers as we once thought we were! I'll let you know how it goes.
