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Rep. Steele, Chelan-Douglas Health urge virus vigilance

Representative Mike Steele (12th District), ranking member of the House Education Committee, stated last week in regards to Governor Jay Inslee's mandate that all public and private K-12 schools in King, Snohomish and Pierce counties close for the next six weeks. "This is the right thing to do." Steele, (R-Chelan), said, "I support the governor's decision to close the schools. In the beginning, I had reservations. But after meeting with the governor and senior officials from the Department of Health throughout the morning, I believe these steps will help slow the spread of the virus.

"My hope is that school districts not located in Central Puget Sound remain vigilant and continue to work closely with public health officials when making school closure decisions.

"For the parents, students and the public, I urge caution and calm. It's critical that we all do our best to respond appropriately and effectively to what we know is a serious health threat."

COVID-19, as the Coronavirus is diagnostically labelled, has been wreaking havoc all over Washington state, or what the national news calls "the epicenter" of the pandemic as manifested in the United States.

On an hourly basis, Leavenworth, Cashmere, Wenatchee, Chelan and Okanogan County events are being cancelled, some by event organizers, some by governmental authorities and others by common sense.

An open house to celebrate the new West Cashmere Bridge was one such victim with the Chelan County Department of Public Works stating, "We will be following the advice of the Chelan-Douglas Health District and canceling in-person group events that we have planned. That

includes the March 24 open house for the West Cashmere Bridge replacement project." Spokesman Jill Fitzsimmons also said, "Our efforts next week will turn to creating a virtual open house."

Fitzsimmons ended the press release by stating she hoped to have the link up by March 24.

According to real estate industry experts Trepp, "As COVID-19 continues to spread, the impact to business, markets, and everyday life is changing on a daily, if not hourly basis, which makes forecasting potential economic impacts a nearly impossible task. While it is growing more likely that the COVID-19 outbreak will cut across all industries, the initial impact of the COVID-19 and recent oil price shock will initially be felt more acutely in a handful of areas. These include travel. oil and gas extraction, entertainment, restaurants, and some sectors of retail."

Cashmere-based Certified Financial Planner Brad Blackburn stated last week, "After 10 years of shaking off every punch, the stock market was finally knocked down - and the longest bull market in history came to an end. It wasn't the trade wars, or the Fed, or Brexit, or the Fiscal Cliff, or Greece, or any of the things that worried the financial world over the last decade. Instead, it was the Coronavirus."

Jennifer Bushong, spokesman for the Town Toyota Center, announced last week that the ice rink would be closed to public skating. "Due to the recent information provided by Chelan-Douglas Health District regarding the Coronavirus COVID-19, the TTC management made the decision to cancel public ice skating for the foreseeable future."

The area's only professional sports team, the Wenatchee Valley SkyHawks indoor arena football team, postponed its first game, scheduled yesterday, March

17, but pledges to honor all tickets for refunds or future game use.

Leavenworth's Icicle Creek Center for the Arts has also canceled several performances and the Leavenworth Ale Fest was canceled last weekend as well.

The city of Wenatchee has postponed its annual recycling event until the fall. A scheduled meeting of the Grant, Chelan and Douglas counties PUD's was also canceled last week amid fears of transmitting the disease. Many events were not canceled, but "postponed" until a future date, even though it is unknown when this health scare will become contained.

Most governors across the nation (at least 30 as of this writing) are banning any events where groups of 100-250 or more people are expected.

Cashmere's Evergreen Baptist Church Pastor John Smith isn't keen to that idea. "Gov. Inslee has banned large gatherings (250 or more) from meeting within the Seattle area in the hopes of preventing the spread of the Coronavirus. However, I cannot help but wonder how this is going to impact churches? Did any of us ever think that there would be a day when we would witness a governmental entity look to a church and say "you are not allowed to worship together"? We would expect this to happen in China, or the Middle-East, but in 2020 America?

No, I am not wearing a tin-foil hat when I am writing this but if the State can prevent churches from meeting over a perceived

viral outbreak, what other "reasons" will they give to shut churches down?

Only time will tell and we should be aware that this sets a very dangerous precedence,' stated Smith.

The vast majority of deaths so far in this state have been at a westside nursing home. No local deaths have been reported as of March 13.

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COVID-19 virus impacts legislative session... now threatens student learning and economy

EAST WENATCHEE ---The Legislature completed its 60-day session in Olympia on schedule on March 12. This year's session was a busy time for me, as I continued in elected leadership my position as assistant floor leader for our caucus. I also served again as the Senate Education Committee's ranking member, which is the top-ranking Republican member of the committee. In this role, I worked closely with the committee chair on policy issues and recently on communications about school closures resulting from the COVID-19 virus.

the Legislature \mathbf{As} approached its final day, with the state reeling from uncertainties about COVID-19, the committee chair and I found ourselves in the Governor's office discussing the upcoming announcement on school closures in King, Pierce, and Snohomish Counties, expanded statewide the following day. In a speedy effort to wrap up legislative

work and disperse the large gathering of lawmakers, staff. and advocates at the Capitol, the session adjourned later that evening.

The Legislature approved all three budgets for the remainder of the 2019-21 biennium and a COVID-19 response bill.

The operating budget (\$53.5 billion), capital budget (\$5 billion), transportation budget (\$10.5 billion), and the COVID-19 response bill (\$200 million) were finalized on the final day of session after much negotiation. I voted for the transportation budget, capital budget, and COVID-19 emergency authorization, but I voted against the final operating budget. I could not support the broad scope of spending in the operating budget, especially during a time when the state is responding to the ongoing COVID-19 virus. There are

19 virus while preserving important state resources, minimizing adverse health impacts, and hopefully saving lives. The challenges associated with school closures though include less accessible public facilities, limited serving of school meals, impacts on childcare for working families, and reduced student learning time. For a state dependent on its sales and business tax revenues - and one that relies on exports to overseas markets including to China - the worldwide effects of this virus could have profound impacts on our state economy. School



closures will likely also impact student academic progress, which is especially unfortunate following the state finally resolving its longstanding McCleary case with the Supreme Court related to basic education.

Fortunately, the unanimous authorization of a \$200 million COVID-19 response bill is a good sign of bipartisan cooperation toward meeting the state's upcoming challenges. The final operating budget simply spends too much for the remainder of the 2019-2021 biennium, in my opinion, especially given rapidly the changing

COVID-19 crisis, so I voted against the final budget. Despite its nearly \$3 billion in projected reserves, which includes a robust "rainy day" fund, our healthy state economy will now be tested by this fastmoving virus. My hope is that our state and its people will quickly overcome what will hopefully be a shortterm situation.

it was the Coronavirus. We've never seen anything like it. Whether it was SARS, the swine flu, or Ebola, none of those caused the complete shutdown of major economies across the globe. I don't want to ignore the human toll of all of this, but from the standpoint of investors, this is as scary of a situation that we've seen since the financial crisis. For the next few

weeks. or maybe longer, there will be no public events, a lot less travel, a lot less eating out – a lot less of everything; it's a selfinflicted recession. We've

never done this economic experiment before: Will it cause a short-term economic hiccup? A mild recession? A major crisis? This is the question the stock market is wrestling with.

Looking at the bigger picture, should Microsoft,

major companies be worth 30% less than they were a month ago? That seems like an overreaction by the stock market. On the other hand, the potential for bad outcomes has definitely gone up. So, maybe the stock market isn't overreacting after all.

or Wal-Mart, or any of our

By its nature, the Coronavirus is a temporary event. However, in the same way that falling real estate prices exposed the disfunction and fraud in the financial world back in 2008. this shock could expose a bigger problem that we don't see right now. Thankfully, our current problems weren't caused by any fundamental problem with the economy or stock market. So, unless something else breaks under the pressure, we should recover.

At this point, a record number of people have jobs, which is the most important thing for an economy. Over the coming weeks and months, new hiring will come to a screeching halt. The key thing to watch will be layoffs. If lots of people begin to lose their jobs, this could turn into a longerterm problem. However, this is one of the tightest job markets in history. All the employers I know have been working diligently to find and keep good employees. So, I expect the business world to do everything possible to avoid laying people off. If that proves to be true, the economy should recover quickly.

After natural disasters, bad economic news is

expected. So, any bad economic news in the coming weeks or months will likely be written off as the temporary result of the Coronavirus. On the other hand, any good news will be celebrated as a wonderful surprise and a sign of a recovering economy. In other words, the stock market will give the economy the benefit of the doubt for a while. So that will be something to look forward to - at least once the stock market stops falling.

I am very concerned. All of us -- including myself -- are scrambling to keep track of the federal, state, and local governments' list of can's and cannot's. They keep changing on an almost hourly basis. Anytime so many governments are mandating so many evolving constantly restrictions, citizens need to be especially vigilant so the government doesn't make a bad situation worse.

"The price of freedom is eternal vigilance." That sure fits this.

Coronavirus is something we're all very concerned about -- there are people who have died from it and will die from it and all of us mourn for them and their families. And we're grateful to those heroic people in the health care field who are doing their absolute best. Coronavirus is rightfully getting a lot of attention.

But what's not getting the attention it deserves is the government's reaction to it. It's something all of us need to recognize: there are legions of examples in our nation's history where the government -- federal, state, and local -- made a bad situation worse and basic constitutional rights were trampled. During World War 2, Japanese Americans were put in internment camps. During the 50's, there was the House Committee on Un-American Activities and Hollywood's "black list". After 9-11, the federal government imposed restrictions that were not consistent with our US Constitution. There are innumerable examples.

At the meet-and-greet in Oak Harbor yesterday, I talked about this and it was very well received.

I highlighted my own personal history that influences my convictions: when we were doing our local initiatives to let the voters decide on red-light ticketing cameras in 2010 and 2011 -- the voters sided with us every time. The

During those campaigns, often cited the famous quote by Benjamin Franklin: "Those who would give up essential Liberty, to purchase a little temporary Safety, deserve neither Liberty nor Safety.

The First Amendment guarantees the citizenry the right to peaceably assemble. I am very concerned that during fear-intensive situations like this that the government infringes on basic constitutional rights without sufficient questioning. And when that happens, I've seen the media is often silent or even complicit. It's on the job, there needs to be people with the courage to question it, challenge it, debate it. Jay Inslee did not "suggest" the suspension of the First Amendment, he ordered it. That is deeply disturbing to me. Nothing wrong with the

government saying -- we strongly urge citizens to do the following -- that's fine.

But using the full weight and authority and power of the government to order the end of political discourse, the suspension of worship, these are basic rights that do not need to be and should not be sacrificed

liberty but only if you elect people who are committed to both.

My update on Saturday and the meet-and-greet in Oak Harbor were intended -- and they've succeeded -- in provoking a needed debate.

"No man is entitled to the blessings of freedom unless he be vigilant in its preservation." Douglas MacArthur.

People need to be concerned, not just about COVID-19, but also the government's continued escalation of restrictions. Here's the latest from Governor Inslee:

proclamation tomorrow to temporarily shut down restaurants, bars and entertainment facilities."

It's a serious question: what's next?

These are very trying times that we are facing right now. I ask you to join me in praver. I ask vou to join me in asking questions that aren't being asked. I am very concerned, but I am also very certain that together, we can overcome these challenges without sacrificing what makes America so special.

Banning Sunday Services

In Washington, Gov. Inslee has banned large gatherings (250 or more) from meeting within the Seattle area in the hopes of preventing the spread of the Coronavirus.

However, I cannot help but wonder how this is going to impact churches? Did any of us ever think that there would be a day when we would witness a governmental entity look to a church and say "you are not allowed to worship together"? We would expect this to happen in China, or the Middle-East, but in 2020 America?

No, I am not wearing a tin-foil hat when I am writing this but if the State can prevent churches from meeting over a perceived viral outbreak, what other "reasons" will they give to shut churches down?

Only time will tell and we should be aware that this sets a very dangerous precedence.

As I observe and look ahead to the future, the banning of large churches from meeting together reinforces the idea that the mega-church model is unsustainable. When I say "mega-church model" I am referring to the popular understanding that the way we do church is to get as many people in the sanctuary we can. According to this model, "church" is a numbers game and the more numbers you have attending a Sunday service, the more successful you

are. This model of doing church pervasive is within modern evangelicalism and I would assert, distinctly American, where Bigger is always better."

A WALK take a Yet look at what has PASTOR happened in the past week. One executive order from the State and those large churches are banned from

meeting together on the Lord's Day. So, what are these

churches to do? Well, either they can cave to the government and shut down or they could defy the State and keep their doors open. But still, there is another

option: a move toward the small. It is situations like the one we are in that I hope causes us to reevaluate somethings like, "Is bigger always better?" and the level of commitment we have concerning gathering with others to worship God. Will we stop worshipping because the government



says we can't or will we gather into smaller and more intimate groups, where the worship of God is present and the Bible is taught?

stand me, I am not entirely against large churches. I have spent much of my early days in ministry serving in one and I praise God for that experience. However, one of the maladies concerning large churches is the problem of connectivity and accountability. Often people go to be a spectator rather than a participant and it is easy to hide within a congregation of hundreds or thousands.

On the other hand, it's difficult to hide in a small gathering of 10 or 20. Small fellowships enjoy a Christian intimacy that is difficult, generally, for larger churches to pull off. In these small and humble gatherings, you can look at your brother or sister in the eye, know them and their struggle but also see and experience how the Holy Spirit has uniquely gifted them for ministry. Furthermore, smaller gatherings are a bit more flexible and scrappier than larger ones.

Please don't misunder-

They don't have the added pressure of maintaining numbers or trying to move behemoth like programs and infrastructure to get gospel work done. From what I have witnessed, they just get the work done with,

> dare I say, supernatural expediency. When I think of a move toward the small, I am reminded of not only how it was in the early days of Christianity but also that this is the present reality for most Christians in the world today. The majority of churches in our world, do not have the luxury of meeting in places that hold thousands. Rather, they meet in homes or caves, often fellowshipping in secret to avoid persecution. Although these gatherings are small and with very little resources, God has used them to multiply disciples and spread the influence of the gospel in places like China and Iran, where you could be imprisoned or killed for being a Christian.

In some ways, this coronavirus and the executive order by Gov. Inslee is a good thing for the churches in Washington. It should wake us up to the times we live in but also to spur us to evaluate how we do church and cause us to be courageous in taking the exhortation "to not neglect to meet together" (Heb. 10:24) seriously.

The rise of handwashing a vitally important life skill

Last year we moved into our current log home, a house that has TWO bathrooms. Whoo-hoo! There's a loft with a master bathroom upstairs and a main bathroom downstairs. This is the first house I've lived in that has more than one bathroom. I grew up in an old Victorian house, where my 3 sisters, 2 brothers and parents shared ONE bathroom. You'd often hear someone pounding on the bathroom door, followed by someone inside calling out, "I'll be out in a minute!" Do you know how long a minute is? That depends on which side of the bathroom door vou're on...

Our main bathroom has a Christmas tree shaped container filled with deep green liquid hand soap that smells just like Christmas. We liked it so much last year that we've kept using it even after the holiday season ended. The bottle is almost empty now, and I'm looking for something to refill it with.

Why do I care about hand soap that smells like a Christmas tree? Because it makes washing vour hands a more pleasant experience, and handwashing is important.

Handwashing is one of the most useful and important personal skills you can have, one that directly protects the health of yourself and your loved ones from colds, the flu, and other illnesses like coronavirus.

How should you wash your hands?

First, you have a choice between hand soap or hand gel or sanitizer. Which one is best? That depends. Unless your hands have dirt, visible soil or grease on them, you can effectively wash or sanitize your hands using either soap and water or an alcohol-based gel or foam, as long as the alcohol gel or foam contains at least 65-70% alcohol. If your hands are dirty or greasy, washing them with soap and water is more effective than using gel or foam. In health care settings like clinics, hospitals and nursing homes, using alcohol-based hand rubs for hand hygiene is strongly encouraged because they are more convenient to use and when used properly, they can kill bacteria more effectively and quickly than washing with soap and water. Alcohol based hand gels are also less irritating to the skin than soap and water, which is important because health care workers need to wash their hands frequently during each shift as they care for their patients. Do you need an antibacterial soap? No! The key to effectively cleaning your hands is removing bacteria and viruses from their surface by using friction and then rinsing them away, not by attacking them with a chemical.

Ask... Louise

What's most important is HOW you wash your hands. You should rub the soap or alcohol gel over every surface of your hands, including your fingertips, fingernails, and between your fingers, for at least 15 seconds.

To keep you rubbing long enough, hum a song that takes you 15-20 seconds to finish while rubbing your hands in a systematic pattern over the tops of your hands, palms, between your fingers, fingertips and fingernails. One verse of a song like Freres Jacques, The Itsy-Bitsy Spider, or two verses of shorter songs like Happy Birthday, the Alphabet Song, or Row, Row, Row Your Boat all last about 15-20 seconds. My own personal favorite? The Itsy-Bitsy Spider.

Passing on this vital personal skill is easier now than ever, with plenty of free information available online to help teach effective hand-washing technique to your children and grandchildren. Here are 6 Key Strategies for Effective Handwashing:

1.Do it frequently.

Wash or sanitize your hands **BEFORE** eating, **BEFORE and AFTER car**ing for loved ones who are ill, AFTER using the bathroom, handling animals or pets, and sneezing or wiping your eyes or nose.

2.Check the label.

For effectiveness, make sure the alcohol-based hand gel you buy and use contains at least 65-70% alcohol.

4.Don't skimp on hand gel.

Many people swipe hand gel around and that's it. Apply enough gel so that it takes about 15 seconds to dry completely.

5.Sing a song.

Sing or hum a catchy song that lasts for at least 15 seconds while you wash your hands. It helps kids learn effective handwashing and keeps you (and them) from stopping too soon

6.Antibacterial soap is not required.

Effective handwashing or sanitizing depends on using good technique, not on wiping with soap that contains an antibacterial chemical.
