## **Pateros Community Market** season finale is Sept. 10-11

PATEROS - The last of three Pateros Community Market & Movie events will pop up this Friday and Saturday, Sept. 10-11 at Lakeshore Park, culminating the city's trial of a family-oriented weekend shopping and entertainment experiment. A special feature of the final Saturday will be a Kids Market for ages below 18 to sell products of their own making.

The Friday market will run from 5-8 p.m. and feature an Arbor Day celebration from 7-8 p.m. There will also be a

special Story Time prior to the 8:30 p.m. movie. Families begin arriving early for good seats for the wildly popular movie shown on the giant inflatable big screen erected in front of the multi-purpose building. Both the kids' and adult

Coffee and pastries will be sold to raise funds for the farmers' market. Plans are under discussion for a weekly market for the 2022 season.

## Last year wildfire, this year pandemic 74th annual Okanogan County Fair forges ahead Sept. 9-12

OKANOGAN - Last year at this time the Okanogan County fairgrounds were serving as an evacuation site for domestic livestock and a distribution base for emergency supplies as the Cole Spring wildfire raged through the Colville Reservation and beyond. Fairgrounds manager Naomie Peasley had her hands full arranging stalls and corral space for animals, designating storage spots for donated supplies, and drop sites for livestock hay and straw. In place of wildfire this year the COVID-19 pandemic is the opponent but the 74th annual Okanogan County Fair will open on schedule Thursday, Sept. 9.

The Fair Advisory Committee (FAC) met August 26 to address last-minute details including those attendant to holding an event of its size and complexity amid the existing pandemic. FAC Chairman Mike Egerton said the meeting was principally to assure county health officials that proper measures were in place to mitigate the spread of COVID.

"Naomie was very proactive," said Egerton, "assuring that signage, handwash stations, and antibacterial dispensers are in place for

Chris Branch crowd safety."

Egerton said the only enhancement county health officer Dr. James Wallace wanted that was above and beyond what the governor's proclamation asked for is that all food vendors be masked up.

"I have so advised the vendors," said Egerton. "A few are not happy with the requirement but will comply.'

The three Okanogan County Commissioners support the Fair going forward this year. Chairman Chris Branch expressed his support in a letter sent to Fair officials which said in part:

"Across the nation decision makers struggle with allowing the assembly of large groups that have the potential to result in dire public health outcomes," wrote Branch. "However, I've joined with County Health Officials, Emergency Management, Fairgrounds Management, and Fair Officials to come together with the intent to lay out a strategy to minimize the risk to the public so that we may realize the benefit of all the efforts of

it happen,"

Branch added that the Commissioners are relying "heavily on everyone involved, from the exhibitors to the patrons of the Fair, to do their part in taking the precautions necessary to achieve our goal."

Race Director Carol Sivak said the popular relay races took a hit this year when the Muckleshoot tribe, owner of **Emerald Downs Racetrack** in Auburn, changed its race

PATEROS – Memorial Park in Pateros, Columbia Cove Park in Brewster, and Conklin Landing Park in Bridgeport are among four locations

where wildlife viewing kiosks will be placed as part of a Federal Regulatory Energy Commission (FERC) license requirement for the Wells Hydroelectric Project (Wells Dam) as part of the latter's Wells Project Recreation Man-

agement Plan (RMP). The RMP specifies that Douglas PUD must install wildlife viewing enhancement measures within the Wells Project boundary that includes those three cities. The utility installed interpretative exhibits

and a trail at the Wells Overlook Interpretative Center in 2017.

To accomplish this installation Douglas PUD has consulted area wildlife managers

regarding measures that will

## STCU, CDFCU to merge October 1

**BREWSTER - A friendly** merger that has been in the works for a year will culminate in one month, when CDFCU and STCU are joined, giving CDFCU's 14,400 members access to a broader suite of products and services.

In preparation for the merger, Spokane-based STCU mailed information to CDFCU members in late August, outlining how their accounts will transition into STCU accounts, and other need-to-know information. More detailed information, specific to each member, will be provided prior to the merger.

Other recent merger-related activity includes some remodeling and painting at CDFCU locations. In addition, CDFCU staff are receiving remote training to become familiar with STCU systems and processes. Starting in early September, communities served by CDFCU will start seeing STCU messaging on billboards, in newspaper ads and online.

But most of the work has been behind the scenes, where IT departments and others are ensuring that the transfer of member data goes smoothly on October 1.

"Preparing for the merger

has been a major project involving thousands of details," said Colleen Manley, CEO of CDFCU. "The two teams have worked well together, and share a common goal of making the transition as seamless as possible for our members."

The merger, which maintains current staffing at CDFCU locations, was approved by state and federal regulatory agencies and by unanimous votes of the boards of both credit unions. Put to a vote of CDFCU members, the merger was approved by a large majority.

**Final steps** 

To facilitate the merger, all five CDFCU branches will be closed on Friday, Oct. 1. They'll reopen on Monday, Oct. 4, as STCU branches.

Access to CDFCU accounts, including online and ATM access, will end the evening of Thursday, Sept. 30, and CDFCU debit cards will be deactivated at that time. CDFCU members can activate their new STCU debit cards and begin using them Oct. 1, and may enroll in STCU online banking and download the STCU mobile app starting Oct. 4.

CDFCU credit cards will remain active until well after the merger, and members may continue using CDFCU checks until they run out. Those who anticipate needing cash the weekend of the merger are encouraged to make withdrawals in advance.

Over the summer, the credit unions have encouraged CD-FCU members to double check the accuracy of their contact information on file with CD-FCU. That step will ensure they get the information they need, when they need it.

**Deep community roots** 

Founded in 1941, CDFCU originally served U.S. Bureau of Reclamation employees at Grand Coulee Dam. Today, it has \$199 million in total assets, and branches in Coulee Dam, Brewster, Republic, Creston and Omak, Wash

STCU started in 1934 to serve schoolteachers during the Great Depression. It has \$4.3 billion in assets, more than 210,000 members, including more than 3,000 in the communities served by CDFCU. STCU, which open its 30th location Sept. 1 in Spokane Valley, has been named "best credit union" for 16 consecutive years in the Inlander newspaper's comprehensive annual reader survey.

#### Friendly and mutually beneficial

While both credit unions are financially sound, it is increasingly difficult for small and medium-sized credit unions like CDFCU to provide the technology and financial products needed to ensure continued success. STCU has the resources to meet those challenges.

"This is a natural match for a friendly, beneficial merger," said Ezra Eckhardt, STCU president and CEO. "While the name will be different, the care and dedication that has earned the trust of CDFCU members will remain unchanged."

STCU marketing efforts in the region will feature "dual citizens," as members of both credit unions are affectionately known. Those featured are Electric City resident John Nordine, and Kirsten Brudevold, a fisheries biologist working on salmon restoration efforts.

Brudevold, an Omak resident and longtime CDFCU member, joined STCU while attending Eastern Washington University. She described the upcoming merger as "a little bit Spokane, a little bit Omak," adding: "STCU will be great for our community."

#### Outdoors Round Up

#### **Fishing Reports**:

**Columbia River Gorge:** At Gorge Outfitters Supply in Rufus, Megan Eshleman reports anglers are catching Chinook salmon off the mouth of the Deschutes River but winds have kept anglers off the water for several days during the past week. Walleye fishing remains consistently good above the John Day Dam to Roosevelt on the Columbia River. Purple and chrome colored spinner worm harnesses trolled behind bottom bouncers are what's working best to catch these fish. Meanwhile, green pumpkin colored tube jigs are also picking up smallmouth bass in both the The Dalles and John Day Pools of the Columbia right now.

As for steelhead fishing, the summer run return is looking grim. As of August 31, just over 39,300 summer steelhead had passed over Bonneville Dam, far below the ten-year average of 142,300 fish. Oregon has already closed several tributary rivers (the John Day, Umatilla and Lower Deschutes from Moody Rapids to Shearer Falls, for steelhead fishing. Washington State has already limited boat fishing for steelhead at Drano Lake and is also closing the Wind River above Shipherd Falls beginning September 16 to protect a fragile run there. Check the WDFW website's emergency fishing regulations in the coming days for what will likely be more closures and restrictions as we deal with what is being called the worst return of steelhead since 1938 up the senting a number of potential hazards to boaters. While trout, walleye and smallmouth bass fishing has only been fair, angling for largemouth bass and panfish remains good. For bass, use topwater baits in shallow waters in the morning and evening. Mid-day, the bass will be found between 15 to 25 feet deep where jigs and deep diving crankbaits will be more effective. The panfish remain schooled at the face of the sand dunes and near the mouth of Crab Creek where they can be caught trolling Berkley Flicker Shad plugs, cast to with small spinners, or reeled in using jigs below slip bobbers.

Lake Roosevelt: Freddie Giannecchini at Clark All Sports in Colville says anglers are doing well catching trout and triploid trout throughout the lower two-thirds of Lake Roosevelt. As for the walleye, anglers are catching some

plus feet deep), and scattered

throughout the lake. Giannec-

chini recommends using your

electronics to find the fish.

In other news, the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife has expanded a catch and keep sturgeon fishery throughout Lake Roosevelt from Grand Coulee Dam to the border with Canada through September 30. Anglers can keep one sturgeon per day and two sturgeon per season measuring between 50 and 63 inches from the nose of the fish to the fork of the tail. This expanded fishery is taking place thanks to a hatchery sturgeon program started in 2001 in British Columbia and 2004 in Washington State that has proven very successful.

#### **Dove And Turkey Hunting:**

The hunting season for mourning doves opened September 1 and huntable numbers of these migratory birds should remain available throughout Central and Eastern Washington until cooler weather moves them south. The fall turkey season also opened in many game management units on September 1 and according to state game biologists in Northeast Washington hunters should enjoy a good harvest this season. As for finding the birds, they write, "In the fall, food remains critical for growth of poults (juvenile turkeys) and for adults adding fat reserves. Forest edges that offer seeds, nuts, and fruits, as well as some green vegetation, are used the most. At this time of year, turkeys are at their highest population and widest distribution within northeast-





## Accounting Critic Says Biggest Problem Facing Social Security, Medicare Is Trillions in Unfunded Debts

#### **MARK TAPSCOTT**

Social Security and Medicare trust funds are in dire financial condition due to rising benefit costs, but the biggest problem facing the two largest federal entitlement programs is how they're funded, according to a nonprofit that advocates greater government transparency and accountability.

"Our bottom line is the trust funds are all a shell game, there is no money in the trust funds. As [former U.S. Comptroller-General] David Walker says, trust funds have no funds and should be distrusted," Truth in Accounting (TIA) President Sheila Weinberg told The Epoch Times on Sept. 2.

Weinberg was referring to the fact that the trust funds receive what are in effect IOUs from the Treasury Department that are called "securities"—promises to pay a specified amount at a future date.

On Social Security, for example, the government pays interest on the securities, generally about 2 percent, and the total value of the securities is presently just less than \$3 trillion. Securities are paid out of general revenues when they come due.

"We would also highlight the massive underfunding. Social Security is underfunded by \$40 trillion, Medicare by \$55 trillion. This represents the amount of money the government has promised in benefits, and they have no idea where they are going to get the money to pay for those promises," Weinberg said.

The official U.S. national debt is

\$29 trillion, but Weinberg's group maintains that the true amount is more than \$133 trillion when the costs of benefits such as those promised by Social Security and Medicare are included in the calculation, according to the Chicagobased TIA.


Private sector pension plans are required by federal law to account for future benefits and to properly fund them. But the federal government doesn't follow the same law for its own pensions.

Medicare has the largest unfunded benefits total at \$55 trillion, followed by Social Security at \$40 trillion, and government employee and retiree pensions such as the Civil Service Retirement System (CSRS) at \$9 trillion. The official public debt and assorted other federal liabilities such as loan guarantees make up the balance.

Trustee reports made public earlier this week show that the Medicare trust fund that pays for hospitalization is due to reach insolvency in 2026, while the Social Security trust fund will reach that point in 2033, barring major reforms in how the two programs are funded and pay benefits.

Weinberg is far from alone in pointing to the unfunded debts of Social Security and Medicare.

"Yesterday's reports on the financial status of various Medicare and Social Security trust funds once again identify unsustainable benefit promises in Medicare and Social Security programs," Sen. Mike Crapo (R-Idaho) said in a statement

#### on Sept. 1.

"The Hospital Insurance trust fund is projected to be exhausted around 2026; there are \$60 trillion of unfunded liabilities in Social Security programs; and unfunded liabilities increased by trillions of dollars over the last year alone."

Differences in unfunded liabilities calculations are typically due to differences in the number of years covered, how future benefits are estimated, and differences in demographic assumptions.

"While bipartisan efforts are nec-

essary to make needed changes to address Medicare and Social Security long-term financial challenges, most Democrats want only to expand benefit promises further without generating sustainable trust fund solvency," Crapo said.

"I agree with the report's recommendation that 'Congress and the executive branch work closely together with a sense of urgency to address these challenges,' and urge bipartisanship and cooperation to do so."

Crapo is the ranking minority member of the Senate Finance Committee, which would be a major player in any congressional or presidential initiative to reform the Social Security and Medicare trust funds.

President Joe Biden hasn't offered any proposals to reform the funding underlying either Social Security or Medicare.

## House Committee Paves Way for Military Conscription of Women

After scuttling an amendment that would have effectively suspended military conscription, the House Armed Services Committee (HASC) took a 180-degree turn on Sept. 1 by voting to expand the hasn't responded to questions from The Epoch Times about whether she intends to reintroduce the provision—nor did she say why the amendment was killed, either.

The House NDAA is now in sync with the Senate NDAA in terms of military conscription, with both proposing to expand the duty to women. "The bottom line remains that neither the nation nor DoD [Department of Defense] will know for certain what a future conflict may entail, what skillsets will be necessary, or who would qualify for draft induction under specific qualification criteria," the commission—a body established by Congress to study the issue-said in its March 2020 final report. 'Therefore, enabling DoD to utilize all the nation's talents and abilities is essential to mitigating the risks imposed by an uncertain future."

But Hasbrouck said he thinks that the writing is on the wall.

"It's now overwhelmingly likely that the Fiscal Year 2022 NDAA to be adopted in late 2021 or early 2022 will authorize the president to order women to register for the draft at age 18, starting in 2023 with women born in 2005 and after," he wrote on his personal site. Hasbrouck, who spent about four months in a federal prison camp in 1983 for refusing to register for the draft, wrote that he thinks now is the time to shift focus from congressional lobbying to resistance. Citing testimony from former Selective Service System officials, he said most men don't comply with the registration rules—and that he thinks compliance will be even lower among women. "As I pointed out in my testimony in 2019 to the National Commission on Military, National, and Public Service (which invited no draft-age women to testify about whether they should or could be forced to register), 'Both feminist and anti-feminist women will be more likely to resist being forced into the military than men have been, and more people will support them in their resistance," he wrote. "There's a long tradition of antiwar feminism that identifies militarism and war with patriarchy. Women have been an important part of draft resistance movements even when only men were being drafted and when most public attention has been on male resisters."

## Over 100 Americans Remain in Afghanistan: White House

Over 100 Americans remain in Taliban-controlled Afghanistan, the White House said Sept. 2.

Between 100 and 200 U.S. citizens were believed to be in the Middle Eastern nation when U.S. troops pulled out on Aug. 30. That number remains above 100, but "it is closer President Joe Biden kept the withdrawal deadline in place, reneging on his promise to keep troops there until all Americans who wanted out were out.

The Taliban, a terrorist group, has promised to allow Americans to leave. Meanwhile, Taliban fighters stopped some Americans from passing through checkpoints even when U.S. troops were still on the ground, and beat multiple Americans in Kabul. Ned Price, a State Department spokesman, told reporters in a separate briefing that the United States remains committed to the American citizens still in Afghanistan as well as to Afghans at risk from the Taliban. "We will provide them tailored guidance. But that is not something we will provide to all of you. And we won't do that for their safety. And we won't do that because it is tailored to them. And we are working on all possible options to effect their safe departure from Afghanistan," he said. In yet another press conference, Pentagon spokesman John Kirby defended leaving Americans and Afghans who assisted U.S. troops behind.

The decision came late in the markup of the 2022 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA), with lawmakers voting 35–24 to pass a bipartisan amendment by Reps. Chrissy Houlahan (D-Pa.) and Mike Waltz (R-Fla.).

"Women make up over 50 percent of our population, and not including them in the Selective Service is not only a disservice to these women, but also to our nation as a whole," Houlahan said.

There was a proposed NDAA amendment that would have put the Selective Service System in limbo, but that proposal was scuttled before the HASC started its markup. Anti-draft activist Edward Hasbrouck told The Epoch Times that the amendment was ruled out of order due to what he called "arcane" PAYGO rules, which prohibit legislation that increases the deficit—though those rules contain numerous exemptions.

The HASC didn't respond to requests for comment by press time regarding why the amendment was killed.

Hasbrouck said an anti-draft NDAA amendment can still be introduced on the House floor, but he said amendments rarely succeed unless they're introduced in committee first. The amendment's author, Rep. Jackie Speier (D-Calif.), However, anti-war activists, civil libertarians, leftists, and MAGA conservatives have come out against drafting women.

Sen. Rand Paul (R-Ky.) co-sponsored a bill earlier this year with Sen. Ron Wyden (D-Ore.) that would "finally put an end to the expensive, wasteful, outdated, punitive, and unnecessary military draft registration system."

"We believe that a better way to achieve equality under the law would be to end military draft registration altogether and scrap this needless and expensive bureaucracy," Paul and Wyden stated to 100" than 200, White House press secretary Jen Psaki told reporters in Washington.

"We are in close touch from the State Department, from our diplomatic officials, with all of these individuals, working in close coordination with them to determine how they can leave the country, if they've left the country," she said.

A chunk of the remaining Americans are school students in California. Up to 30 from two school districts were in Afghanistan as of Sept. 1, with no updates available on Sept. 2, district officials told The Epoch Times.

Without a military presence in Afghanistan, the United States is attempting to use diplomatic means to secure safe passage for the Americans stranded in the country.

It's not clear how many made it out after U.S. troops withdrew.

"We know there are people that didn't make it out—American citizens as well as Special Immigrant Visa applicants," he said.

"We're all heartbroken that we weren't able to get every single person out. We all recognize that. And don't think for a minute that people don't feel it here, because we do. But it is also important to remember the extraordinary effort that was expended over the course of some 17 days to get over 124,000 people out, including 6,000 American citizens—the vast, vast majority of those we believe that were there."
