Local Fire Districts Receive \$720,000 to Replace Aging Equipment

Chelan County Fire Districts 3, 6, and Lake Wenatchee Fire and Rescue are pleased to announce the receipt of a Regional Assistance to Firefighters Grant award to support the purchase of new self-contained breathing apparatus for all three departments. The three departments were awarded \$722,629 in federal funds to replace their aging equipment.

Self-contained breathing apparatus are necessary to keep firefighters safe inside burning buildings or in other hazardous environments where the air is dangerous. Self-contained breathing apparatus are one of the most important, and expensive, pieces of protective equipment firefighters wear. With each unit costing over \$6000, federal assistance makes a significant difference.

"This equipment is critical to our operations," stated Chelan County Fire District 6 Chief Phil Mosher, "and we would not be able to make this region-wide replacement without grant funding."

The departments came together almost one year ago to start working

through the regional application. According to Lake Wenatchee Fire and Rescue Chief Mick Lamar, "We train together and support each other on active incidents. But up to this point we have had equipment that was mutually incompatible. It made sense to do this together."

To date this year, the Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program has awarded \$315 million dollars to over 1830 fire departments across the country. "We understand that over 8000 applications were received this year so this is a very competitive process," said Kelly O'Brien, Chief of Chelan County Fire District 3. "Our award is in the top 3% in terms of amount, so to be successful at that level is something that makes us incredibly proud."

A committee made up of members from each department is busy working through the acquisition process. The new equipment is estimated to be in service in the Spring of 2020. This much-needed upgrade will enable all three departments to ensure the safety of the men and women working hard to protect their communities.

Disappointed

I am frustrated and saddened by Mr. Forhan's editorial on Oct. 2nd, in which he decries the student-led climate strike in Leavenworth.

Mr. Forhan doubts the legitimacy of scientific consensus on climate change. However, "real" scientists include those who have earned the honor to be in the National Academy of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine (NASEM), a scientific advisory body established by President Lincoln in 1863.

The NASEM website declares, "Scientists have known for some time, from multiple lines of evidence,

that humans are changing Earth's climate, primarily through greenhouse gas emissions. The atmosphere and the Earth's oceans are warming, the magnitude and frequency of certain extreme events are increasing, and sea level is rising along our coasts. A solid foundation of scientific evidence on climate change exists. It should be recognized, built upon, and most importantly, acted upon for the benefit of society."

The scientist Mr. Forhan admires, named Patrick Moore, is not a climate scientist. His background is in forestry, and a check on Wikipedia shows he's had close ties to many industries, including logging and salmon farming, so one should consider how these influences could affect his judgment.

Mr. Forhan describes the engaged youth as "zealots" of the new "religion" of climate change, attempting to antagonize those who have different opinions than he does. In fact, the students hold a range of religious beliefs, which is not actually relevant, because the science of climate change is based in our natural world. Religion deals entirely with the supernatural, so the two do not overlap.

The high school did not inculcate ideas into these teens. The school merely gave an avenue for the students to express their American rights to freedom of speech, assembly and petition. If Mr. Forhan had attended the Climate Strike rally, he would have been as impressed as I was at the articulate and thought-provoking speeches.

These students weren't mad at the preceding generations. They recognized knowledge of climate change is evolving, so we must be willing to adapt to counteract the global temperature rise. Claire Nelle, a senior, said, "This is not an unsolvable problem." It wasn't finger pointing. "Forge a pact with yourself to be a better steward of our planet," she said.

Mr. Forhan, think about the mathematics. In the 60's you reference, there were only 3 billion people on the planet.

Now there are 7.5 billion, and most of us use a lot more resources per person. Be willing to rethink your ideas. This is not a generational, us-versus-them issue. We all need to work together to come up with creative solutions.

After the Climate Strike and rally last Friday, the students returned to school where they could continue learning not only history, science and literature, but also how to think for themselves. I would be wary to recommend education be in the hands of parents alone. Maybe, Mr. Forhan, you should read the book. Educated. It might change your mind too.

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Pastor's Corner

According to the church calendar, October is Pastor Appreciation Month. It is a time set aside every year to make an effort to encourage, bless and show our gratitude to the pastors in our lives because let's be real, being a pastor is rough.

I should know, I am one.

Out of all the vocations one could take, the role of a pastor is by far the most challenging. That may surprise some because often the only glimpse of a pastor's duties is what is performed on Sunday. Yet what you see in a Sunday morning service is but a tiny fraction of what a pastor does and doesn't convey the overwhelming daily pressure he constantly experiences during the week.

The pastorate is one of those positions that one will never master. As a pastor, you will never come to a place where you have got it made. You will never be at the top of your game nor will your workload ever end.

During the week, your pastor will wake up in the morning and the first thought that crosses his mind is thanking God that He has given him another day of life. The second is the crushing reality of his responsibility and a hyper-awareness of his inadequacy which drives him to his knees, pleading with God for a measure of grace to sustain him and for the Holy Spirit to empower every step he takes.

After a time of thanksgiving, begging and praise, he will emerge to face whatever the day brings.

Then a notification alert from his phone alerts him of an email. As he reads the contents, his shoulders become heavy. A family whom he has been closely ministering with has decided to worship elsewhere, severing the relationship. Swallowing the temptation to respond bitterly and fighting through the feeling of disappointment, the pastor responds with a loving exhortation for them to grow closer in Christ and warm appreciation for allowing him to minister to them for a

Before hitting "send", a quick prayer is offered for the family and then off to a counseling appointment where an individual will confess that they have been growing cold in Christ and doubting whether or not they believe anymore.

After pointing them back to the Bible and answering their questions, the pastor returns to the office to spend hours preparing for the sermon on Sunday. Prayer, study and then more prayer, the pastor on average, will spend 10 to 15 hours in sermon preparation and that is amidst phone calls, visiting the sick, responding to emails, and a whole host of tasks that can suddenly spring up unannounced.

The workweek of a pastor is not the typical 40 hours, rather he is expected to be on-call 24/7. Your pastor will miss meals, lose sleep, and shed numerous tears all because the "keeping watch over your souls" (Heb. 13:17) demands it.

Given the intensity of the role and the familiarity with grief, disappointment, and suffering, why would anyone choose to become a pastor?

They don't. God chooses it for them.

God puts a special calling on these men, knowing their weakness and their frailty and places them in the highest vocation in the world today so that through their inadequacies the power of God may be demonstrated.

Again, the pastorate isn't a job, it's a calling. They are God's men and they are God's men for your sake.

So, to the pastors that God has placed in your life, this month, let them know that you care. Send them a note of encouragement, take them out to lunch, or do something special for their family because I know they'll appreciate it.


An obituary is a way for family members to commemorate a loved one's life and to notify the larger community of the deceased.





THE WASHINGTON OUTDOORS REPORT

A Weekly Round-Up

By John Kruse

FISHING:

Puget Sound: Anglers have been having good success catching coho salmon out of Marine Areas 10 and 12 over the last two weeks. Crabbers are dropping their pots again with the reopening of crab season in most of the Sound though Marine Areas 11, 12 and 13 remain closed.

Washington Coast: The lingcod and rockfish season closes on October 20th but when charter boats can get out the fishing has been good. A case in point, the October 2nd fishing report from "The Slammer" out of Westport. Eleven anglers on board caught 26 lingcod and 77 yellowtail rockfish during a day trip and that fishing has been the norm in recent days.

Eastern Washington: Clark's All Sports in Colville reports Lake Roosevelt is a very good bet for walleye in both quantity and quality though the cold weather of late September made things challenging for a few days. You can also catch sturgeon in Lake Roosevelt and for now, you can still keep them if they measure between 53 and 63 inches from the nose to the fork of the tail. This unique fishery can close anytime though so check for emergency

rule changes before hitting the water. Finally, if you are after rainbow trout you can catch a bunch of 10 to 12-inch fish in the Pend Oreille Lakes Chain.

HUNTING:

Quail, chukar and gray partridge season opens up in Eastern Washington on October 5th. Here is a short preview for how the season is looking in three popular

hunting regions from the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife:

Statistically Yakima County is your best bet as a quail hunter and there are chukar to be found here too. However, state biologists say "The quail population in 2019 is hard predict. No significant snow fell until early February, but persisted until almost April. Quail in natural habitat likely

had high mortality. Areas near artificial food sources (houses, cattle feed lots) have the highest probability of good bird numbers." If you go try hunting the Sunnyside-Snake River Wildlife Area or hunt Yakama Nation lands though a separate hunting permit is required and quail hunting does not open on tribal lands until October 12th.

With lots of public land and good riparian habitat, Grant

County was the second-best area for quail hunting last year with nearly 20,000 birds harvested. WDFW biologists say "Quail hunting is expected to be good again this year with reports from the field being very positive with lots of quail broods frequently being observed." If you are after chukar try walking the hilltops and ridges around Lake Lenore and Banks Lake or the Columbia River near Vantage.

In the far southeast corner of the state, chukar hunting along the Snake River breaks can be good. As for quail hunting, biologists say 2018 was not a good year in this area and with unfavorable conditions for these birds this year it could be a tough season.

HIKE/BIKE/PADDLE OF THE WEEK:

That September cold snap was a reminder the mild autumn weather we love in October may not be with us for long. That's why this week is a great week for one last bike ride! Two of the better rides you can enjoy east of the Cascades are found in:

Wenatchee: The Riverfront Loop Trail, also known as the Apple Capitol Loop Trail, is a 10.5-mile loop ride on a paved trail taking in a variety of different views of the Columbia River from well-maintained riverfront parks on the west side of the river to wilder and more natural habitat on the east side. If you want more exercise there are extensions of the trail on the east side of the Columbia River to Lincoln Rock State Park to the north and to Hydro Park to the south.

Lyle: The Klickitat Rail Trail is a 31-mile gravel and dirt rail trail starting (or ending) in Lyle where the Klickitat flows into the Columbia River. The trail offers you great views of the Klickitat River while riding amongst oak savannas. Wildlife such as deer and turkey are common sights.

WENATCHEE - Seventysix percent of Chelan County has access to Chelan PUD's super-fast broadband network. Customer comments during strategic planning included clear support for continuing efforts to build network access

to even more locations. To keep the conversation going, Fiber staff invited the community to three open houses to talk about what goes into deciding where to build access next.

The open houses were from 4:30-6 p.m. on at the Leavenworth PUD office, 222 Chumstick Hwy. on October 8, and October 9 at the Entiat Fire Hall, 2200 Entiat Way and on Oct. 10 at the Manson Grange Hall, 157 E. Wapato Way

Chelan PUD is committed to reaching 85-90 percent of the county as a Public Power Benefit (PPB) project funded in the previous strategic plan, said Mike Coleman, Fiber and Telecom managing director. Plans call to reach the goal by the end of 2025.

Warts and Wart Removers

had a small round, raised spot on the pad of my right index finger. It was hard and flat, a light gray in color. I looked more closely at it. It wasn't a blister or a burn. It wasn't part of a rash. It didn't itch or burn, but it was tougher than the skin around it.

A month later, it was STILL

Two months later, it was STILL there. It stayed just like it was: a small, round, raised, flat and light gray spot on the pad of my finger.

Hmm. Could it be a wart? When I showed it to my doctor the following week at a checkup, he confirmed my suspicion. That spot on my finger was a wart.

I'm not alone. After acne, warts are the most common and annoying skin condition that people want to get rid of.

Warts are a viral infection of the outer layer of your skin called your epidermis. It's caused by the human papillomavirus, or There are about 100 different subtypes, and the infected skin grows into a thickened mass that juts out from the normal skin surrounding it. They can be different colors, too, such as light gray, yellow, brown, even gray-black. Warts are more often found on your hands and feet, and children are more likely to be affected than adults. There are several main types

of warts found in humans, including common warts, flat warts, palmar (on the palm of your hand), plantar (on the sole of your foot), and genital warts. Most warts are fairly flat but some grow outward with a "bushy" cauliflower-like appearance.

Although annoying and unsightly, most warts are benign unless they are on an obvious place, like on your face, or grow on a weight bearing surface, like the bottom of your foot. When a wart creates pressure or

pain when you walk on it, it should be removed as soon as

reasonably possible. How do you remove a wart? Most treatments work by damaging or destroying the infected skin, triggering your immune system to address the wounded area, which attacks the virus that is living there and helps eliminate it.

If you do nothing, nearly half of all warts will eventually go away by themselves, without any treatment, within about 2 years for children and within -5 years for adults.

Most wart treatments involve applying a topical product to the wart for several weeks to about 3 months. For many people, this will work, but some warts stubbornly refuse to die

Going to the doctor gives you the option of freezing the wart or using a very concentrated chemical on it, more expensive

and possibly leaving a scar. The 2 most common approaches are to chemically

"peel" the skin over time with a liquid or gel containing salicylic acid or other caustic chemical. There are wart removal products with salicylic acid and others that cause a freezing effect, both available without a prescription. Most Compound W® formulations contain salicylic acid as a concentrated liquid or as a

Here are 7 Tips to Help Treat Warts Effectively: 1. Remove the Top **Layer First**

To enhance the penetration of your remedy into the wart, ALWAYS soak it in warm water for at least 5-10 minutes, and then remove the upper layers of the wart with sandpaper or an emery board. 2. Never Reuse Emery

Board or Sandpaper I prefer to use sandpaper so I can throw it away. DON'T

board used on your wart because it is now contaminated with the HPV virus that you just scraped off, and could reinfect you.

reuse the sandpaper or emery

3. Protect The Skin **Around Your Wart**

Avoid using abrasives like sandpaper or emery boards on the normal skin around your wart, and apply your treatment ONLY to the wart itself. Injuring nearby healthy skin makes it easier for a wart to spread.

4. Give it Time

It takes weeks to respond to wart removal treatments and up to 3 months for warts to completely go away, and no treatment works on everyone. If you don't notice improvement after 2 months, try something else.

5. Try Salicylic Acid First Concentrated salicylic acid has the best overall track



record for removing warts. I suggest using the most concentrated version of gel, then covering it with a bandage or even duct tape.

6. Combine **Approach**

For stubborn warts, both freezing and using a topical agent will give better results than using only one at a time.


