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## Gnomes of Cashmere celebrate five years, holds treasure hunt

Folks who stroll around Cashmere may spot tiny doors or rooms no larger than six inches in businesses and local landmarks. These doors and buildings belong to Gnomes of Cashmere.

Gina Imperato, Cashmere Chamber of Commerce Chamber Manager, notes the Gnomes of Cashmere is a free, family-friendly, self-guided walking tour that takes residents and visitors through different businesses and locations throughout the city. Imperato noted that the tour has grown from 12 stops to 40, with many local businesses participating in the

Folks may have to look high or low to find the doors and rooms, while others are easy to spot in window fronts or outdoors. and are a miniature replica of that location.

The Gnomes of Cashmere also host activities during the year, such as a rock hunt and storytime at the Cashmere Public Library, as well as participates in local events.

Erika Pina has been a Gnomes of Cashmere committee member for three years. She originally helped Imperato with ideas before she was asked to join the group. Pina is also on the Cashmere Chamber.

"Entering the five years has been a blessing for the gnomes," Pina said.  $\,$ Another Gnomes of Cashmere

member committee Karen Christensen has been with the organization for a little over two years. Christensen had heard of the gnomes when she and her family moved to Cashmere nearly four years ago and saw the gnome doors around town. She attended a storytime at the library where she met Gnomes committee member Lisa Lawless who introduced Christiensen to Imparto.

While most of the original Gnomes of Cashmere committee members have left the organization due to life reasons, Christensen feels the Gnomes of Cashmere continues to

gain momentum through exposure on social media.

"There are lot of people interested in the gnomes," Christensen added. "Word is spreading about these gnome houses and people come to see them."

One of the major activities for the organization is the Find Your Way Gnome Treasure Hunt on Aug. 3. The treasure hunt, which is in its second year, is a family-friendly event in downtown Cashmere from 10 a.m. to

Folks can retrieve maps with clues at the group's downtown booth or participating businesses. Once they have retrieved all 11 treasure chests, they can mark their map. Participants who turn in a completed map will be entered in for a grand prize giveaway.

Pina said the Gnomes of Cashmere created the treasure hunt as a fun activity for kids in the summer that was not time consuming, easy to complete and allowed them to utilize

## Cashmere council approves Crunch Pak road maintenance agreement

The Cashmere City Council breezed through a light agenda at their July 22 meeting.

In one of the only two action items of the evening, the council voted 4-0 to approve a road maintenance agreement between the city and Crunch Pak. Daniel Scott was absent from the meeting.

The purpose of the agreement is to authorize Crunch Pak to provide street maintenance and improvements on city streets it uses, including Foster Street and a portion of Chapel Street located north of Mission Creek and Sunset Highway.

According to the document, Crunch Pak requested permission from the city to oversee maintenance on those roads. The company will perform snow and ice removal and maintain streets during the winter time. It will also keep streets clear of obstructions, such as fallen trees and branches, as well as manage vegetation so it does not interfere with public use.

The agreement states that Crunch Pak will also repair potholes and patch pavement. The document also notes that Crunch Pak will cover the costs of maintaining the roads, and the work they do will remain consistent with the city's street maintenance standards.

While Crunch Pak will be responsible for maintenance, the company will collaborate with the city regarding any major improvements on the streets.

"If there's a big overlay project, we will work with them to pave it," added Director of Operations Steve Croci. "They're (Front and Chapel streets)

not priority streets for the city, so they don't get taken care of as much as others.'

In the second action item of the evening, the council authorized Mayor Jim Fletcher to sign a preemployment transition services work experience agreement with Skill Source regarding trainee Skyler Wierima. According to the agreement, the city will provide instruction on tasks assigned in the plan to the trainee and evaluate their competence in performing them.

The agreement also notes that the trainee will not replace any laid-off staff or terminated employees, nor will they be involved in political activities during work hours.

Croci noted that Wierima is a Cashmere High School student and Skill Source will be responsible for paying his wages. He added that Wierima met with maintenance and water crews, who are interested in taking the CHS student under their wing.

"He's interested, he wants to learn, he wants to work," Croci said. We'll expose him to different things (around the city). He said he does not want to sit at an office and work at a desk."

In progress reports, Croci provided an update about the Chapel Street project. He noted that crews hit three water lines and managed to take care of two rather quickly. The third was a six-inch water main. It took "a little while to figure out and we eventually shut it off.

Croci added that crews will replace some of the rusty water lines.

"With what happened with these breaks we will may get a bill from the contractor because they were not marked (in the work)," he said.

As for the Sherman Water Reservoir, Croci said he met with Bethlehem Construction, who had two designs for replacement roofs. Staff should have a cost estimate on the replacement roof in the next week. He added that the city's insurance provider contacted him because of the project's estimated cost and they want to send another insurance adjuster to Cashmere to investigate the claim.

"If they have to have another party come out and look at it, it means they haven't said no," Croci added. Other business:

Fletcher purposed forming a citizens committee regarding buildings and utilizing building space within the city.

- He also suggested the council and staff schedule another focus committee meeting similar to the one they held earlier in the year.

#### Free MMR Vaccine Now Available for Child Care Workers

**OLYMPIA** - The Department of Health is collaborating with Safeway Inc. and Albertsons Companies LLC and with the Department of Children, Youth, and Families to offer free measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccination for uninsured child care workers and volunteers. As of July 28, 2019, Washington state law will require staff and volunteers of

licensed child care centers to be immunized against measles. Fifteen Albertsons and Safeway pharmacies across the state will offer MMR vaccine free of charge through June 2020 to uninsured child care staff and volunteers who need it. The pharmacies will also waive the administration fee. The cost and fees will also be waived for those who are

underinsured and cannot afford the vaccine.

Find the list of participating locations on the Department of Health's website.

Child care staff and volunteers who have insurance also have options to get vaccinated. MMR vaccine for those age 19 and older is covered by most insurance companies and by Medicare and Apple Health

(Medicaid). Learn more about the cost and coverage of adult vaccines. Washington also provides recommended vaccines at no cost to everyone under the age of 19. The effort is a collaboration between Safeway and Albertsons; the Department of Health; the Department of Children, Youth, and Families; and the Washington State

Pharmacy Association.

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#### Cashmere resident killed in crash

The Chelan County Sheriff's Office confirmed that Jose M. Arroyo-Mejia, 29, of Cashmere, was killed in an vehicular collision.

In a July 22 news release, Chelan County Sheriff Brian Burnett reported that deputies and EMS services responded to a traffic collision near the intersection of Stine Hill and Pine Flats Loop roads, west of Cashmere, on July 20 at approximately 3:40 p.m. The release noted that deputies received a report about a small, dark-colored vehicle, later identified as a 2008 Subaru Impreza, was seen going fast, eastbound on Stine Hill Road. A short time later, reporting

parties informed Rivercom dispatchers hearing an explosion and that the vehicle was in pieces with the subject trapped underneath it.

Deputies and EMS confirmed the vehicle's lone occupant was killed during the crash. Crews closed Stine Hill Road for several hours during the investigation. The road was reopened at around 6:30 p.m.

Chelan County Coroner Wayne Harris arrived at the scene and took position of the deceased. Officials later identified the victim as Arroyo-Meija.

During initial the investigation, deputies determined that Arroyo-Meija was traveling well above the 45 miles per hour speed limit when the vehicle failed to make a sweeping left curve, left the edge of the roadway and struck a speed limit sign and culvert. It then flew into a rock outcropping before flipping back onto the roadway and into a guardrail.



## Foot and ankle doctor comes to Cascade Medical

Dr. Kevin Morris wants to help people in the Upper Valley stay on their feet. Under a new partnership with Cascade Medical, Dr. Morris will schedule appointments twice a month at the Family Practice Clinic to treat patients with a wide range of foot and ankle problems.

Dr. Morris is a mobile

podiatrist from Foot and Ankle Clinic of Wenatchee who travels to rural communities such as Quincy, Ephrata and Chelan. An independent practitioner, he leased space in the clinic starting in January because of the demand for podiatry here.

"We have a number of patients from the Upper Valley," Dr. Morris said. "Cascade Medical seems very patient- and relationship-

oriented, which is in line with my own practice, so I approached them about doing some outreach there so people don't have to drive to Wenatchee as often."

The Foot and Ankle Clinic of Wenatchee has treated more than 1,800 patients from the Upper Valley, including 800 from Cashmere, 700 from Leavenworth and nearly 200 from Peshastin and Dryden.

With 25 years of experience, Dr. Morris treats patients for diabetic complications, podiatric sports medicine, skin and nail deformities and other painful foot conditions.

"I tend to spend a lot of time listening," Dr. Morris said. "It's not just a foot, you're really treating the whole person. I try to educate people about why it's happening and how to treat the cause of it, not just the symptoms."

completed Не undergraduate studies in 1984 at Washington State University and attended medical school at California College of Podiatric Medicine in San Francisco. He served on the board of directors for the Washington State Podiatric Medical Association for over 12 years, and was awarded Washington State Podiatrist of the Year in 2001.

Dr. Jay Jerome, who helped facilitate the partnership, said the new service has been a

welcome addition. "He works collaboratively with the medical staff here to help our patients with foot problems," Dr. Jerome said.

Foot and Ankle Clinic of Wenatchee manages billing and scheduling for Dr. Morris' appointments in Leavenworth. Any related tests or treatment -- such as CT scans, x-rays, rehabilitation therapy or lab work -- is managed through Cascade Medical.

Cascade Medical Center is a nonprofit, communityowned, critical access hospital that delivers extraordinary healthcare by taking more time with each patient and their families. Centered around primary care, the medical center also provides lab and screening services; physical, occupational and speech therapy; ambulance service; emergency and acute care, and inpatient rehabilitation.

## Difference between antiperspirant, deodorant

Q: What's the difference underarm between an antiperspirant and deodorant?

In 1984, the Gillette Company launched one of the most successful advertising campaigns ever created, making its Dry Idea® antiperspirant a household Using popular name. celebrities including a fashion designer, actress, comedian and NFL football head coach, each advertisement featured an individual who shared three pieces of "advice" with their audience, each one starting with the word "Never..." The first two "neverisms" were related to their profession, and the third one was always the same, a tag line created just for Gillette's Dry Idea® marketing: "Never Let Them See You Sweat".

Sweat happens. The average adult makes between 0.5 and 1.5 liters of sweat every day. Created inside special glands called sweat glands, sweat is delivered to the skin through tiny tubes called sweat ducts.

Humans have 2 types of sweat glands: eccrine glands that are active from birth, and apocrine glands, which don't become active until puberty. The sweat from eccrine glands is odorless and nearly 100% water, while apocrine glands secrete a thicker, oily substance with a musky scent.

Sweat glands concentrate in certain areas, including your forehead and temples, your armpits, the palms of your hands and the soles of your feet. Although you have far more eccrine sweat glands than scent-producing apocrine

anxiety, fear, or pain. Although the sweat from your eccrine glands is odorless when secreted, it creates an odor when the bacteria that live on your skin digest it. Eccrine sweat also makes the smellier sweat from your apocrine glands much more noticeable.

There are 4 ways you can combat the body odor and wetness created by sweating. The first way is by using good hygiene like showering or bathing regularly, which removes both types of sweat deposited on your skin before it can be digested by bacteria, and also reduces the number of bacteria on your skin available to digest it.

You can also block perspiration from landing on your skin by applying an antiperspirant product to the areas that have the most sweat glands, like your underarms.

Two other ways to prevent development of body odor from sweat include inhibiting bacterial digestion of the sweat already on your skin by applying an antimicrobial, and by using a fragrance to offset body odor.

All topical antiperspirants are compounds called astringents. When applied to the skin, astringents cause proteins on your skin cells to clump up. This clumping action blocks the sweat ducts on your skin, keeping that particular area of skin more dry. Since astringents also work as antimicrobials by interfering with the bacteria living on your skin, all antiperspirants also work as deodorants.

Most antiperspirants contain salts of aluminum, either alone or in combination with zinc. The most desirable antiperspirants keep skin dry without caking or flaking off, damaging fabrics, or causing skin irritation. The most common antiperspirant ingredients used today are aluminum zirconium. aluminum chloride, and aluminum sulfate, also called

Benzalkonium chloride is a mild astringent and antimicrobial agent widely used in products for skin and mucous membranes and also as a preservative commonly used in contact lens solutions and nonprescription eye

Choose between an antiperspirant/deodorant or deodorant only product.

I often use just a deodorant because while antiperspirants keep my armpits dry, it sometimes backfires with my entire back becoming totally soaked in sweat.

Make your choice based on what scent you like, not by your gender.

The strength and chemical composition of underarm antiperspirant/deodorant products is identical for those marketed for men and women. The only difference between them is the fragrance used.

3. There are stronger antiperspirant products without available prescription.

You can use a "clinical strength" antiperspirant product which contains 20% aluminum zirconium instead of the typical 15%, or try the non-prescription antiperspirant Drysol®, which contains 20% aluminum chloride hexahydrate in concentrated ethyl alcohol.

#### A crazy buggy summer: Tips for dealing with insect invasions (STATEPOINT) - Spotting more

bugs than usual around the house? While a pest problem can cause embarrassment and concern, this summer you can take comfort in the fact that not only are you not alone, there are new ways of dealing with insects that can help vou manage the problem without harsh chemicals.
