

The school year is rounding out and the finish line is near for class of 2019 seniors - but one group of Cashmere High School students are eyeing one last hurdle to clear that won't be until the fall. Cashmere High School FFA returned from state with another accomplishment. The Environmental Natural Resources (ENR), Milk Quality and Food Science teams will be heading to nationals in Indianapolis, Indiana as representation of not only Cashmere, but Washington state.

"We're looking for all three teams to go top five of all the 40 teams there. In these events, you have to win the state (competition) to go and represent the state," said Finch.

The crew will head out of Washington on October 26 and return from Indianapolis on November 2. Despite having a few months spanning between them

and the competition, plans have already been put into motion by the passionate students.

For the Milk Quality team, preparation comes in the form of visiting dairy farms, and according to Maggie Finch, the crew will also practice getting better at testing for cows somatic cell counts and learning more in depth about the process. For food science, according to Brenda Berglin, the team is going to practice as much as possible and focus on the test and different components. Rusty Finch also stated the team will tour some local food processing facilities.

"For ENR, my mom got me an internship with Tower Design and they do a whole bunch of soil testing for designing septic systems. So I'll be working with the soil for the summer which should really help," said Maddie Fadenrecht.

Cashmere council approves road projects

The majority of the May 13 Cashmere City Council meeting dealt with upcoming road projects.

The council approved a contract between the city and A&W Paving for the 2019 Chip Seal project.

Director of Operations Steve Croci explained that Mission Creek, Valley, Big Rock and South Douglas roads are in need of resurfacing. The city budgeted \$75,000 for the project, but the bids staffed received from both contractors to complete all four roads exceeded the allocated amount.

Croci noted that both bids were divided into four parts for each street, and after examining the city's budget, and its short- and long-term priorities,

city staff recommended chip sealing Mission Creek, Valley and Big Rock roads. A&W Paving's bid of \$64,585 to complete the three roads was the lower amount.

He added that staff is hoping to resurface South Douglas Road in the

"2024 is when we're supposed to do the big sewer, water, and road project, so we just wanted to get something done to maybe hold it over until then," Croci said. "We'll look at the budget and maybe see if we can do it in the summer."

Croci said the project will begin 30 days after A&W Paving receives the Notice to Proceed.

In other action items, the council also authorized a contract between the city and Hurst Construction for the Chapel Street Project.

For the project, crews will replace water and sewer lines on the 300 block of Chapel Street. Of the four bids, Hurst Construction, of East Wenatchee, had the lowest amount with \$626,749.91. The other bids the city received were Pipkin Construction (\$630,531.96), Strider Construction (\$705,744.01) and Smith Excavation (\$771,193.15).

Hurst Construction's bid came in 16 percent below the engineer's estimated cost.

Croci said the project is scheduled to begin in June after school is over, and finished before the new school

Fadenrecht who is competing on the ENR team, are tapping into outside resources, beyond the school campus to prepare. It seems the students are extending themselves to find a variety of routes to utilize in order to prepare, despite being on a school hiatus for the summer or relocating for

"It's nerve wracking cause it's one thing to be competing against schools we see in a lot of other competitions and knowing their chapter by their town name. And now to be going on and up against teams representing all of the other states, it's a little bit more nerve wracking to go up at the national levels," said Gavin McCabe.

The students shouldn't be nervous about lack of talent or even the competition being the best from every state, but

Finch said the challenge will be intertwining nationals with

"They're going to have to do a balancing act and shift gears. Time to put college on the back burner for a little bit," said Finch.

The students will have to balance the fast paced college lifestyle while taking a week off to join their former classmates in Indianapolis. Despite the departing seniors being missing in action on the Cashmere front, Elizabeth Worley stated that her and Aranza Arroyo (FFA president) already have plans to utilize the resources available on their future college campuses. The duo also confirmed they'll be making the trek back on the weekends to prepare as well.

"We'll use their resources to study like animal skulls and the pelts for the ID's. And we'll probably be coming back to study," said Worley, FFA vice president.

The devotion to preparing for nationals was evident. "So we work them, we're

there to compete. But we'll have a little fun as well." said Finch. Work hard, play hard - the

students are going with a no nonsense attitude when it comes to scooping a national title, but are looking forward to being outside of the Cashmere city limits. The hardworking team will have the opportunity to shave off some time to explore Indianapolis.

"We do a lot of fun things, because we're in a different part of the nation. It's usually during Halloween, so we'll do haunted houses and zip lining and eat a lot of good food," said Maggie Finch.

Beyond competing, Finch also said the trip will also give the students time to immerse themselves in their industry in a new setting. The Food Science team will work with Park 100 Foods, a food

development company. The team will also get a chance to visit Purdue University's food science lab. The Environmental Natural Resources team will get to check out the Waste Management facilities and also head to Purdue to work with the soil scientists. As for Milk Quality, they'll visit a local dairy. "I'm super excited. This is

my first time going back to Indianapolis. Super excited to represent both Cashmere and Washington State," said Arrovo.

With big plans to represent Washington State and also dabble in some fun to celebrate their hard work, the cost to go can be hefty. Each student will have \$1,000 in costs to go to nationals which is a pretty hefty chunk of change to churn out of a small school's pockets. According to Finch, fundraising plans are already being plotted.

"Our booster club will be

helping with the prime rib dinner, probably in October. We're going to try to connect to some industries that relate to their particular event," said Finch. "Trying to connect and sending letters to industries, either in our community or in Washington State, that would hopefully help sponsor these guys a bit considering their endeavors that's ahead of

The students are on the hunt for sponsorship from related industries far and wide starting this summer. After the community poured in rapidly to scoop a new plant, the May 4 plant sale (helped fund the iourney to state) sold out by noon. Finch and the FFA team stressed their gratitude and are eager to represent the supportive community at state.

"I'm most excited at a chance at winning and a national title and coming back and showing the community all our hard work," said Arrovo.

Rock climbers and mountain lovers will flock to Leavenworth May 24-26 for the annual Rock Fest event. The event, hosted by the Leavenworth Mountain Association, is putting on a plethora of activities for its

20th anniversary. This year's Rock Fest headquarters is at the Icicle Center for the Arts. Camping will be found at Spromberg Canvon Meadows. The venues do not allow dogs and officials ask owners to leave their pets at home. If a dog is needed for aid, organizers ask the animals be kept on a leash.

One of the featured events is the Der Klettergarten Bouldering Competition. During the event, competitors will climb as many routes as they can between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. The top scorer in each category will earn fame and

The cost to participate in the event is \$35. Divisions are divided by 8-12 years and 13-18 years, for boys and girls. Climbers will need to register for the event before the event, or by 8 a.m. on May 25.

Folks can attend one of the event's climbing clinics. The Northwest Mountain School returns to host clinics in the morning and afternoon. Each three-hour clinic focuses on an aspect of climbing and range from introduction to rock climbing to specialized clinics.

for Outstanding Overall Musical. As for the play 'Play on!', several students gained recognition for their parts in that performance. Faith Kruse, Sam Wilson, Gabby Kennedy, Hadleigh Murphy and Issac Peyton were all nominated along with the play being up for the Outstanding Overall Play.

"It felt really great (for all of the students and performances to be selected) and was a surprise," said Gubsch. "I felt a lot of pride."

 $Volunteer\,judges, that\,were$ selected based on performing arts expertise, measured the performances and performers based on criteria focusing on the unique and creative elements intertwined in the shows.

"It's nice that there have been judicators that have volunteered to go to all the shows and give feedback to the kids. Not only do they get recognized, but get feedback from the judicators which then helps us improve our program," said Gubsch.

The award ceremony goes beyond recognizing

outstanding performances within the valley, but also to use the program as a channel to promote the performing arts in the valley.

"A theatre awards program is something a lot of people have wanted to do over the years, so we're very excited to be able to finally get it off the ground," said a statement from Alex Haley, Numerica PAC's program manager in a press release. Respond in love


When you walk with the Lord for any length of time, you will experience a bit of reviling and maligning from people. In fact, opposition and insult is a clear sign that you are in the middle of God's will for your life.

I am reminded of a story about John Wesley whose preaching ministry had gained enormous popularity during the 18th century. 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

Bulldogs boys soccer ends season in state tourney

The Cashmere High Bulldogs endured a heartbreaking 2-1 overtime loss to South Central's Connell in first round of the 1A Boys Soccer State Championship tournament on May 14.

With the loss, the Bulldogs end their season with a 15-3 overall record.

Cashmere controlled the ball for most of the contest, displaying solid defense and passing, but were unable to score a goal. The Bulldogs had some close shots across the bar, as well as some close saves from goalkeeper Brian Damian.

Alemu Keksitalo made a goal late in the second half to give the Eagles a 1-0 lead. The Bulldogs were minutes away from ending their season when Caleb Bakken, with Connell defenders in pursuit, moved

the ball down the middle and fired a shot into the Eagles' goal to tie the game at 1-1 at the end of regulation.

During the second overtime period, Connell scored their second goal to end the game.

"It was a playoff game and we knew they would come in and play hard," Head Coach Juan Valle said. "It just didn't go for our way."

The loss to Connell in the state tournament ends an impressive 2019 campaign for Cashmere. The Bulldogs, sporting a deep roster that included several experienced players, won 12 of their 14 regular season games, including sweeps Caribou Trail League rivals Chelan, Okanogan and Omak. Cashmere's first two losses came at the hands of cross-town rivals Cascade. The regular season contests between the Bulldogs and

Kodiaks went beyond both overtime regulation periods and ended in penalty kicks.

After a second-place finish in the CTL, Cashmere went on a tear through the District 6 tournament, defeating Manson (4-1) in the quarterfinals and Bridgeport (2-1) in the semifinals. The victory against the Tigers not only earned Cashmeres their first state tournament trip in a season, but also advanced them to the championship match where they faced CTL champions Kodiaks once more.

Unlike their first two encounters, the Bulldogs earned a 2-0 win to avenge the regular season losses, capture the District 6 championship and host a state tournament game.

"We finished 15-3, which is not a bad ending," Coach Valle said. "We had hoped we could get deeper into the

tournament. Overall, I'm verv proud of the guys, they played game in and game out. I'm sad for the seniors, they've been through a lot in four years. But we won Districts and we had good numbers this year. Overall, the season was good."

Cashmere loses seniors Bakken, Corbin Evans, Isaiah Hall, Jose Lima and Armando Vazquez to graduation. Several players from this year's roster are expected to return next season, including Damian and forward Javier Reyna, who will be seniors, and captains Evan Bakken and Jose Lazuna who would return as juniors. Coach Valle added that several freshmen who competed on this year's JV team who will have an opportunity to move up to play on varsity next season

"Our team is still complete for next year," Coach Valle said. "We'll be in good shape."

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



Global Juice Celery Movement

Late last year Medical Medium, Anthony Williams published a book called, Celery Juice: The Most Powerful Medicine of Our Time Healing Millions Worldwide. Now that is quite a claim from someone that has no medical or nutritional training, but is highly touted by actress Gwyneth Paltrow (do I you need to say more). Due to the current eating trend of "juicing" this book has had tremendous sales. The followers of his diet are told that they need to drink copious amounts of celery juice everyday. Apparently he has a lot of followers as the price of an 18 pound box of celery in December sold for \$12.00 per box wholesale. That same box of celery has soared to \$90.00 per box this Spring. Many retailers are selling it at a loss as most consumers are not willing to pay a soaring retail price for what is considered just celery. Let's face it celery is that item on the veggie tray that is only eaten after the baby carrots are gone. Don't get me wrong I like celery and it is packed with all sorts of health benefits. One of the things about celery is that it full of fiber, and fiber helps feed the stomach bacteria to keep the body functioning properly. Juicing destroys the fiber, so that's one benefit you lose.

California is the major producer of celery with about 26,000 acres planted in Central and South Coast counties. The predominate variety is "Paschal" but there are other varieties commercially grown. Celery seeds are very tiny and difficult to germinate. All commercially produced celery is planted as transplants which have been grown in greenhouses and nurseries . Another fact about celery is that it is among a small group of foods (such as peanuts) that can provoke a severe allergic reaction, such as anaphylactic shock. This allergen is not destroyed in cooking. For some reason this is more common in Europe, and food containing celery or possible traces of celery are labeled as so. Europeans also eat more Celeriac (the Bulb) that the stalks which may be a factor.
